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## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

### (PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Thursday, October 12, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen (Acting President Sullivan), the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

### ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY FOR NEW YORK CITY.

The following report from the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York was presented:

October 9, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

SIR—In compliance with the Laws of 1905, chapter 724, section 2, which provides that it shall be the duty of the Board of Water Supply to proceed immediately and with all reasonable speed to ascertain what sources exist and are most available, desirable and best for an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York, the said Board makes the following report, accompanied by maps, plans, specifications, estimates and investigations as set forth herewith, accompanied by the report of the Chief Engineer and the Consulting Engineers to the Board of Water Supply, which are made a part of this report:

Immediately upon organization the Board of Water Supply proceeded to put itself in possession of all available data, the most important of which are the report of the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission and the additional report of those Commissioners to the Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York.

Additional data are:

The report of the Manufacturers' Association of 1897, recommending among other things the separation of the water debt from the constitutional debt limit of the City. This has been adopted by the Legislature as an amendment to the constitution, section 10, Article VIII, and will be voted upon at the coming election on referendum. Emphasis is laid upon this amendment to the constitution, as it will enable the City to finance the water problem without crippling other municipal activities.

The report of John R. Freeman to Comptroller Coler in 1900.

The report of the Merchants' Association.

The studies of the Department of Water Supply.

These data, with the recent surveys and investigations of our own Engineers, have been used as the basis for this report.

In the early stages of the work, the Board secured, as Consulting Engineer, John R. Freeman; as Chief Engineer, J. Waldo Smith, and for Consulting Engineers of the Advisory Board of the Chief Engineer, Prof. William H. Burr and Frederic P. Stearns. Immediately upon the appointment of the Chief Engineer and the consulting staff, instructions were given for a careful survey of the sources of supply, the proposed line of aqueduct and the Brooklyn situation.

The Board of Water Supply personally inspected the Metropolitan Water System of Massachusetts, the Esopus Watershed and the Long Island Watershed.

Finding itself necessarily limited as to territory for water supply by the act of Legislature, which eliminates Suffolk County and certain other watersheds recommended by the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission, the Board has held itself to a strict accountability in this matter, and has definitely directed its efforts in accordance with these restrictions. This necessitated a change of the plan for taking water from the Catskill Mountains by changing the location of the aqueduct line, by raising the elevation of the flow line of the Ashokan Reservoir to about 600 feet above tide level, thereby so increasing the storage capacity as to involve at an earlier date than previously proposed the construction of a long tunnel to tap the Schoharie source, and by the addition of the Rondout and Catskill Watersheds by the construction of a series of storage reservoirs in those localities. By these means, a daily supply of 500,000,000 to 600,000,000 gallons of water will be secured, even in years of smallest rainfall. It is believed that an aqueduct of a capacity for about 500,000,000 gallons is, under present conditions, an economic limitation as to size. These storage reservoirs, together with this aqueduct, will probably furnish an additional supply of water for Greater New York sufficient for the increase of population to the year 1925 A. D.

Simultaneously with its instructions to the Engineering staff, regarding the water supply for Greater New York, the Board of Water Supply called particular attention to the situation in Brooklyn, Richmond and Queens, as being the most pressing, and passed a resolution to the effect that steps should be taken to secure from the Long Island Watershed, in anticipation of the supply from the north, sufficient water to make good the serious deficiency now existing.

Until contracts are let, estimates of expense must necessarily be approximate, and the report of the Chief Engineer shows what these estimates are: The map covers in full the sources for the additional water supply proposed for immediate development.

In conclusion the Board of Water Supply desires to state that it has given its undivided and unremitting attention to the investigation and determination of this work. The eight years' study of the situation, previous to the appointment of the Board, has placed at its command valuable material upon the subject, and it has been fortunate in securing immediately the services of Engineers experienced in the recent development of the Croton supply and the recent extensive water works construction for other cities. It has thus been enabled to determine its plan and present it at this time.

The necessity for water is imperative, therefore the Board of Water Supply respectfully requests the consideration of the map and plans herewith submitted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and their adoption at the earliest date possible, in order that the same may be submitted to the State Water Supply Commission for approval, and that the work of construction may proceed without delay.

### REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER ON SOURCES OF ADDITIONAL SUPPLY, OCTOBER 7, 1905.

Board of Water Supply, No. 299 Broadway, New York, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with your resolution of August 9 approving a general plan for securing an additional supply of water from the Catskill Mountain region and directing the Chief Engineer to submit plans and additional information for securing water from this source, the following report is submitted. Accompanying it is a large map on which the positions of the most available sources are shown in relation to New York City, to the Hudson river and to the surrounding cities and towns. On this map is shown also the general location of an aqueduct suitable for conveying daily to New York City 500 million gallons of this water.

### Catskill Mountain Sources.

The sources of supply in the Catskill Mountain region here shown have been pointed out for so many years and by so many eminent engineers that there is now no room for doubt that they are the most quickly available, and both the best and the cheapest large sources that can be obtained under present conditions. The Housatonic is ruled out because of its location in the State of Connecticut and the delays that negotiations for its diversion, if found practicable, would entail. Ten Mile river, a tributary of the Housatonic, flowing into Connecticut, is also ruled out by the uncertainty of the law governing the diversion of interstate waters, and the watersheds adjoining the Croton on the north are ruled out by the prohibitions of the Legislature in 1903-4.

In studying the Catskill sources as shown on the map, your Engineering Department has had the benefit of the results of careful investigations made in 1899-1900 of various water sources available for the supply of The City of New York, on record in the report of John R. Freeman, C. E., to the Finance Department of The City of New York, and in the report of the Merchants' Association, of similar date, but has been guided chiefly by the very full data found in the report of the Commission on Additional Water Supply (the so-called "Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission"), appointed by Mayor Low in 1902. The elaborate studies detailed at length in this report, published by the City in 1904, were carried on by a corps of engineers, experts and assistants, comprising in all about 200 men, who spent an entire working season in the field and very carefully studied the quality and feasibility of all available sources in the State of New York, excepting the interstate rivers.

The development of the Catskill sources now proposed was recommended by the Commission on Additional Water Supply, but as a step toward this, they contemplated the earlier development of the upstream half of the Fishkill and Wappinger watersheds as more quickly available and obtainable with smaller expenditure. In January, 1905, subsequent to the prohibition of the Dutchess County sources by the Legislature of 1903-4, the same Commission was reconvened by Mayor McClellan, and after further study, recommended the Catskill Mountain sources without reserve as now the most available for a large future supply. Your attention is particularly directed to these two reports of the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission, and they are made a part of this report. Without the mass of information presented in these printed reports and the many survey maps on a larger scale made during these investigations and since turned over to the Engineer Department of your Board by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, it would have been impossible for your Engineer to render a proper report at this early date.

In other independent investigations the Catskill Mountain sources now recommended have been repeatedly pointed out and their merits discussed, notably in the investigations under the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of New York City during the years 1902 and 1904. These are, moreover, the same sources from which the Ramapo Company in 1899 proposed to supply the City, although under much less comprehensive plans and by far less efficient means.

### Investigations of 1905 for Board of Water Supply.

Starting with the data contained on the plans, maps and reports above mentioned, and aided by the advice of members of the former Commission and of certain Engineers who were actively connected with the investigations above described, your Engineer made further investigations in the field, employing as large a force of experienced engineers as could be quickly engaged with proper observance of the Civil Service rules. This work has been directed principally toward locating an aqueduct line between the proposed Ashokan Reservoir and New York City, for although an aqueduct line between the same terminals had been very carefully studied by the former Commission, the cutting out of the Dutchess County sources made it desirable to find a more direct line from the Ashokan Reservoir in the Catskill region down to the City. Fortunately the previous surveys of the sites of the proposed reservoirs in the Catskill Mountains have been found sufficiently complete for the purposes of this report, with but a small amount of additional work.

The aqueduct line presented on the accompanying map has all been reconnoitered in the field by Engineers in the employ of your Board and found feasible. It is, however, probable that closer study and more complete surveys will reveal here and there sections where the line can be improved or cheapened, or where some relatively small change of location will cause less disturbance to property-owners.



*Specific Sources Not to be Considered.*

The Commission on Additional Water Supply recommended that steps be taken at once toward the building of structures sufficient to gather, filter and convey to the City 500 million gallons daily of water from the new sources, and that the construction of an aqueduct of the size appropriate to convey this quantity be started immediately. Whatever new data have come to hand since the investigations of that Commission relative to the rate of growth of the several boroughs of Greater New York, on which the above conclusion was based, tend only to emphasize this conclusion, and no reason appears for lessening the size of the aqueduct, although the sources in Dutchess County are withheld. Everything still points to the development of the new supply to the extent of at least five hundred million gallons daily by adding at least sufficient water from other sources to compensate for these Dutchess County streams, and the provision of the law of 1905 for the supply of other municipalities along the line of the aqueduct tends also to forbid any diminution of the size of the works, and as the details of the work are studied it may be perhaps found advisable to increase somewhat this size. There are sources within the Catskill Mountains which, combined, are sufficient to supply even more than five hundred million gallons per day.

Your Engineer, after conferences with the consulting engineers, recommends that the new main aqueduct be continued all the way from the main distributing reservoir at Hill View up to the Ashokan Reservoir, of a suitable size for the delivery therefrom of a mean annual quantity equivalent to at least five hundred million gallons daily, and that, as provided in chapter 723 of the Laws of 1905, immediate application be made to the State Water Supply Commission for the appropriation of the waters of the following-named sources for the supply of The City of New York, viz.:

*Sources to be Appropriated for New York City.*

1. Esopus creek, to be taken at a point near Olive Bridge.
2. Rondout creek, to be taken at a point near Napanoch; three small streams tributary to the Rondout, to be taken as shown on the map.
3. Schoharie creek, to be taken at a point near Prattsville.
4. Catskill creek, to be taken at a point about one mile north of East Durham; six small streams tributary to aqueduct from Catskill creek to Ashokan Reservoir to be taken as shown on map.

The estimated yield of these sources, under most favorable conditions of development, with dams, reservoirs and connecting tunnels, all of the largest reasonable size, so that the impounding and storing of flood waters may be of the greatest practicable extent, is stated in the table following. But it should be remembered that these estimates, while carefully made, are in part based on observations of rainfall and stream gaugings within this region covering less than a single year.

From reconnaissance surveys and for purpose of estimating cost, it appears best to make the high-water level of this reservoir 600 feet above tide. Further investigations with borings and test pits at dam sites may demonstrate an elevation of 590 as sufficient and more readily feasible.

While the yield of the Esopus watershed was investigated with much detail by the Commission on Additional Water Supply, and several reservoir sites on the Esopus were studied, the studies of the maximum amounts of storage that can be reasonably developed on the Rondout, Schoharie and Catskill watersheds were not made in great detail because of lack of time and funds. The above estimates of yield of these several watersheds are conditioned on storage reservoir construction, and each is subject to revision. But from the surveys already made it is certain that the sources named above are sufficient to supply fully 500,000,000 gallons daily, and with present rate of growth and use continued, it is certain that New York City will, within twenty-five years, need substantially all the water that these sources can supply in years of extremely low rainfall.

It is proposed to construct at first only the great Ashokan Reservoir, and to build this of the largest practicable size, deferring the expenditure on development of the other sources until such date as the growth of the City will demand them. Economy requires that the portions of the aqueduct that are of masonry or in tunnel be constructed of full size from the start, and that it all be located with reference to the successive additions of the other sources. Therefore, a comprehensive plan for the development of all the Catskill sources mentioned above must be provided for at the present time.

Now that it has been prescribed by law that the Fishkill and Wappinger and Jansen Kills are not to be diverted, more complete surveys of the Rondout, Schoharie and Catskill will be soon undertaken by your engineering department. The prohibition of more than a single reservoir on the Esopus (section 3, chapter 724, Laws of 1905), as also the early requirement of connection to the Schoharie and Catskill watersheds, render it desirable that the Ashokan Reservoir be of the largest practicable capacity.

*Rye and Kensico Reservoir.*

The elimination of the Wappinger and Fishkill sources, the consequent more direct line permitted for the aqueduct from the Ashokan Reservoir to the City, and the greater length of aqueduct between equalizing reservoirs, also rendered necessary by these changes from the plans of the Commission on Additional Water Supply of 1902-1903, causes a new location to be sought for the future filtration works, and makes desirable the use of Rye pond for an equalizing storage reservoir at the downstream end of the main aqueduct, much as was contemplated in the plans of G. W. Birdsall, Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, presented in 1904.

The availability of Rye pond and Kensico Reservoir for enlargement into a great equalizing reservoir, has long been appreciated. It formed an important part of a plan for developing the Ten Mile Watershed for the supply of Brooklyn, made in 1896. It was also favorably considered in the report of John R. Freeman, Civil Engineer, to the Finance Department, in 1900, and the building of a great equalizing reservoir at this point has been recently given further study by your engineering corps. This site certainly has natural advantages possessed by no other for the building of a great reservoir on the line of the aqueduct sufficient to supply the City for many days in such emergency as an accident anywhere along the sixty-nine miles of aqueduct intervening between this point and the Ashokan Reservoir, and thus making it safe to rely on a single aqueduct for the entire Catskill supply. This large storage would also be of great value in permitting the water to be shut out of the main aqueduct for a week or more at a time for the purpose of inspection, repair and thorough cleaning. These studies, so far as completed, show that the best and most reasonable development of storage for this purpose can be made by a dam located near the present Kensico dam of the New York Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, but much higher, so that the water level of the proposed reservoir will be about 355 feet above mean tide. This would form a reservoir of about 3.60 square miles area, containing 25 billion gallons, or fifty days' supply at 500,000,000 gallons daily, available for draft above the inlet to the aqueduct leading to the several boroughs. A suitable site for a filtration plant of 500,000,000 gallons daily capacity has been found near Scarsdale, about four miles south from Kensico Reservoir.

*Portions to be First Built.*

A consideration of the fortunate excess of capacity in the present Croton aqueducts above the yield of the Croton watershed in a dry year is important at this time in planning the portions of the work to be first begun and first completed.

The "New" Croton Aqueduct, completed fifteen years ago, when running at its full capacity, can, in its present condition, deliver about 295 million gallons per day.

The "Old" Croton Aqueduct, as now being repaired, can be relied on to convey about 80 million gallons per day, or both together will convey about 375 million gallons per day.

It is probable that, by making some structural changes in the line of the new aqueduct, so that it could be run under the full pressure corresponding to the level in Croton lake, it could be made to convey a still larger quantity. In years of extreme drought, the Croton watershed with all present reservoirs, including the great new reservoir now nearing completion, although every reservoir should be drawn to the bottom, can be prudently relied on to yield not more than 300 million gallons per day.

This safe yield cannot be increased by the construction of additional reservoirs in the Croton valley to much in excess of 325 million gallons per day.

The consumption of Croton water has already averaged for an entire month 318 million gallons per day, and for a year 292 million gallons per day.

For ten years past the increase each year has been at the average rate of 14 million gallons per day.

Obviously, therefore, if the new large Catskill Mountain sources can be made available and an aqueduct completed thence down to the edge of the Croton watershed, a sufficient quantity to relieve the immediate danger of water famine can be taken down Croton lake and through the two existing Croton aqueducts. Hence, in constructing the aqueduct, attention should be first given to that portion lying between the Ashokan Reservoir and the Croton watershed, aggregating 54 miles in length.

*Hudson River Crossing.*

The crossing of the Hudson river by the 500-million-gallon aqueduct is one of the most important matters for immediate consideration, and borings were begun recently to determine the character of substrata at the point where the surface indications give the greatest promise of favorable conditions. The work of boring is now in progress.

Studies on the surface of the ground have indicated that it will be feasible to locate this crossing near the Village of New Hamburg, as shown by the accompanying map.

Either one of several types of river crossing may be made, according to the character of the bed of the river revealed by the borings.

*Hill View Reservoir.*

A reservoir at this point was strongly recommended in the report of John R. Freeman, C. E., to the Finance Department in 1900. The engineers of the Merchants' Association, in 1899 and 1900, arrived at a similar conclusion. This site was again recommended in the report of the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission in 1903, and definite plans for its development and the type of construction to be employed were presented in that report. While the construction of a great reservoir at Rye and Kensico, as now recommended, will permit a smaller expenditure at Hill View in the immediate future, it is the belief of your Engineer that the entire Hill View site, as contemplated by the reports above mentioned, comprising in all about 325 acres, and the site for the filtration plant near Scarsdale, should be immediately secured.

*Connections to Distribution System.*

Since evidently the matter of first importance is to secure the most available sources of supply and to plan the more difficult portions of the aqueduct for bringing this water to the City, and particularly to design those portions of the work which will require the longest time for their construction, but little opportunity has yet been found for planning these several lines of distributing aqueducts or conduits for delivering the new supply to the several boroughs. It is obvious from a study of the map and from the inspection of the ground already made by the Engineers of your Board, that these distributing lines present no uncommon difficulties. A tunnel of 250,000,000 gallons daily capacity, across the East river, with a connection suitable for delivering 100 million gallons daily to Brooklyn, has been in part studied out, and is shown on the accompanying map, ending in Forest Park; a line suitable for delivery of about 20 million gallons to Staten Island by way of Brooklyn has also been reconnoitred, and the approximate location is shown on the map. It is possible that studies made more in detail will indicate some modification of this line to be advisable, and the precise form, dimensions and locations best adopted for the proposed terminal reservoirs of the aqueduct system in Brooklyn and on Staten Island, remain a subject for further study. The main distributing lines from Hill View Reservoir to the boroughs of Manhattan, Queens and The Bronx are matters for later consideration.

*Special Needs of Brooklyn.*

With the legal restrictions and the limitations that surround large construction work for The City of New York, it now appears probable that even with the most vigorous beginning and the most rapid progress, from five to eight years must elapse before water from the new source can be delivered into Croton lake, and thence to Manhattan, Brooklyn and the other boroughs. Although the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, being more directly on the line of the aqueduct that will end in Brooklyn and Richmond, will, therefore, be naturally the first to be benefited, it must be recognized that the present needs of Brooklyn are even more pressing than the needs of Manhattan, and they have, therefore, already engaged the attention of your Engineers. The water shortage in Brooklyn during the past season is almost without precedent in the history of a large American city. The consumption so outran the supply that there were hours in the day and even days at a time when houses on upper levels are said to have been deprived of a public water supply. In the course of this shortage resort was of necessity had to the throttling of gate valves in street distributing pipes to lessen the pressure and choke the draft, so that in many parts of the city water could not be drawn in the upper stories of dwellings during the working hours of the day. This throttling of water gates invites a conflagration hazard which it is not pleasant to dwell upon.

From the investigations and report of the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission, it appears plain that if the present rate of increase in consumption continues, Brooklyn cannot be properly asked to wait for the new supply from the north.

From the studies of the ground water supply presented in the report of John R. Freeman, C. E., to Bird S. Coler, Comptroller, in the year 1900, and particularly from the more elaborate investigation of the Long Island underground sources made by the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission, it is plain that the additional sources most quickly available for relieving the great need of Brooklyn for more water, are to be found on Long Island, and no effort should be spared to make all those sources available. Nevertheless, Brooklyn must also be in part supplied from the Catskill sources, and, as already mentioned, a branch aqueduct for this purpose is shown on the accompanying map.

Your Engineering Department has already begun studies directed toward the further exploration of the deep underground sources of Long Island, and, purely as a matter of obvious and prompt relief as well as of good engineering, regardless of present legislative limitations, feels it incumbent as a matter of engineering to record the fact that while Brooklyn should be given connections to the new supply from the north with all possible promptness, this relief is probably eight years off, and that its quickest and cheapest source of relief is in the ground waters of Long Island—particularly those of the region farther to the east than that yet drawn upon for the City supply. From these more easterly sources a large surplus that now runs to waste into the sea could be taken for the use of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, without real injury to the local communities, and it would for a long future remain one of the cheapest and purest sources, too valuable to be disregarded, even after water from the Catskill sources is delivered to Brooklyn and Queens.

Fortunately the structures required for securing this ground water and delivering it into Brooklyn are of a simple character, permitting very rapid construction and therefore early relief, providing existing complications can be met and overcome.

*Borough of Richmond.*

Purely as an engineering problem, the cheapest and most available source for relieving the urgent needs of the Borough of Richmond would be water from New Jersey, but with this withheld by questions of interstate law, recourse must be had to bringing the water across from the Borough of Brooklyn in a deep tunnel or submerged pipes, while on land the conduit would consist of a single 48-inch main laid in the streets, diverging from the end of the tunnel under the East river, as shown on the map. On favorable high ground on Staten Island a terminal reservoir would be built



giving sufficient storage to tide over an accident. The needs of Staten Island require that this terminal reservoir and a portion of this conduit should be constructed in the near future sufficient to connect with the distribution mains of the present or prospective ground water supply to Brooklyn, thus bringing relief several years earlier than the completion of the aqueduct from the Catskills.

#### Urgency for Rapid Progress.

It is unnecessary to dwell at this time on the necessity of an additional supply except for the purpose of emphasizing its great urgency and the danger that the City incurs from a water famine in the years intervening before any large new supply can be delivered. This great urgency demands a most vigorous prosecution of the work and calls for a more elaborate organization, with department engineers who should be men of larger experience and higher skill for separate branches of the work than would perhaps be called for if it were allowable to carry on the work of construction in this wide range of territory with greater deliberation. Each main division of this work extending over 140 miles of territory, from the head of the Ashokan Reservoir to the terminal reservoir on Staten Island, requires the undivided attention of an engineer capable of deciding important questions in the field and meeting many emergencies as they arise. With proper organization, the most vigorous and rapid prosecution of the work need add but little to its cost, and indeed it is possible there may be on the whole a saving due to lessening the interest charges on the expenditure during the period of construction before the structures are put into use.

The estimated cost of constructing the Ashokan Reservoir and an aqueduct of 500,000,000 gallons daily capacity from this point to Hill View Reservoir, including the Rye Pond development, together with a conduit of 100,000,000 gallons daily capacity from Hill View Reservoir to Brooklyn, with a terminus at Forest Park, and a pipe line of 20,000,000 gallons daily capacity to the Borough of Richmond, as shown on the map, is \$112,092,000. This will insure the delivery of 250,000,000 gallons per day to Hill View, of which 100,000,000 gallons per day will go to the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond.

The expenditure of this sum of money will extend over a number of years, and the amount to be expended each year is estimated as follows:

The additional 250,000,000 gallons daily necessary to provide the full capacity of the aqueduct will be furnished later from Rondout, Schoharie, and possibly also the Catskill watersheds at an additional expenditure, including filtration, of about \$49,765,000. This estimate is shown in more detail in the attached table.

#### Conclusions.

1. The Catskill Mountain watersheds are the most available, the best and the cheapest from which to obtain a proper additional supply of water for The City of New York.

2. The order of development of these sources should be Esopus, Rondout, Schoharie and Catskill.

3. The Borough of Brooklyn should look for immediate relief from the water famine conditions existing to the water collected and stored in the sands of Long Island and should use every effort to make these sources available.

4. To insure an addition at the earliest possible time of some 80 to 150 million gallons per day to the safe available Croton supply, work should be concentrated on the location and construction of the aqueduct from the Croton watershed to Ashokan Reservoir and the construction of the Ashokan Reservoir.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution adopted at a joint meeting of the Local Board of the Morrisania and Chester Districts on April 8, 1905, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the Bronx Boulevard, between the old Boston Post road and East Two Hundred and Forty-second street (Demilt avenue).

The final maps of the Bronx Boulevard, between Boston road and East Two Hundred and Forty-second street, were adopted on December 23, 1904, the street having a width of 60 feet between the old Boston Post road and the northerly boundary of Bronx Park, or Morris street, and between Nereid avenue and East Two Hundred and Forty-second street, the intervening section having generally a width of 100 feet. The street includes within its lines several old roads which have undoubtedly been dedicated to public use, the same including Duncomb avenue, between Morris street and Gun Hill road; Second street, Bronx terrace and First street, between Gun Hill road and East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street; and Railroad terrace and Marian street, between East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street and Demilt avenue. There is also included Lowmede street south of Gun Hill road, title to which has been legally acquired. Excluding the Mosholu parkway, Morris street, Gun Hill road and East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, all of which cross the lines of the Bronx Boulevard and have been legally opened, the length of the street affected by the proceeding is 19,441 feet, and the area of the land to be acquired is 1,672,769 square feet, the average width of the street being, therefore, 86.05 feet. The area which has been dedicated to public use, including that of Lowmede street, is 676,328 square feet. Assuming that the dedicated area extended the entire length of the street, it would correspond with an average width of 34.79 feet. Treating the proceeding as the widening of a street having a width of 34.79 feet to one having a width of 86.04 feet, the City would assume, under the rule of July 25, 1902, 25 per cent. of the costs.

The approval of the resolution is recommended, 25 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding to be assessed upon the City and the remainder upon the property benefited. There are buildings upon the land to be acquired.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Bronx Boulevard, from old Boston Post road to East Two Hundred and Forty-second street (Demilt avenue), in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Resolved, That twenty-five per cent. of the cost and expense of said proceeding (including any amount which may be assessed for buildings) shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and that seventy-five per cent. of the said cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—14.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Friday, October 20, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

#### MANHATTAN APPROACH TO MANHATTAN BRIDGE.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of lands to be acquired for the Manhattan Bridge approach, closing certain portions of adjacent streets and laying out two new streets between Forsyth street and East Broadway, and between Bayard street and East Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, affidavit of publication was presented showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Mr. Lawrence Veiller appeared in opposition to the taking of the two blocks at the Bowery and Canal street; Mr. Albert F. Hagar, representing Clarence R. Conger, individually and as trustee, appeared in opposition to the taking of No. 70 East Broadway and asked for an opportunity to be heard at some future time; Messrs. Deyo, Duer & Bauerdorf, representing Mr. Shulman, owner of Nos. 134 and 136 Canal street, appeared in opposition to the taking of that property.

The following protest was placed on file:

To the Honorable the Mayor and Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

SIRS—We, the undersigned, owners of the fee of the premises known as Nos. 134 and 136 Canal street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and conducting a business which has been therein established for a period of years, hereby most respectfully protest against the taking by The City of New York of our property and the destroying of our business therein conducted for the following reasons:

1. In the year 1893, after having been established in the locality of the said premises, in the retail business, for a period of upward of ten (10) years, our senior partner bought what was then known as Pythagoras Hall, and had the building altered, at a very great expense, to suit the purposes of our business.

We have successfully continued the business that we established therein for a period of twelve (12) years, doing a lucrative business, which is the support of the three partners, consisting of father and two sons, and of a third son, who is employed in connection with the business; it has been the means of furnishing us with a comfortable living, leaving a surplus of several thousand dollars per year in addition thereto.

2. There is no other store or building of similar dimensions and facilities that we require in our business to be had in the location or immediate vicinity of said premises at any price; we will be thrown out of business, and thus deprived of the means of a good livelihood, and the profits in addition thereto, that we are now earning.

3. Even if we were notified six months or a year before the taking of the property we would have an amount of goods left on our hands which would have to be disposed of at auction, and thus cause a loss of many thousands of dollars to us.

4. In the experience of our senior member, whose wife was the owner of a parcel of property taken for Seward Park, in June, 1897, and not paid for until June, 1901, a period of four years, during which the owner was deprived of her property and the use of the value thereof, which in all probability will occur if our premises are taken, the taking of the said premises will result in leaving the senior member of our firm, who is now sixty-eight years of age, without the means of a livelihood, and there is great probability that said senior member will not survive to enjoy the benefit of the result of his labors of a lifetime.

5. We believe that it is unlawful and unconstitutional to take the private property of an individual for public improvement without immediate, proper and adequate compensation, in view of the fact that the constitution protects every citizen in the enjoyment of his life and property.

For these reasons, which we respectfully submit are not only substantial but meritorious, we earnestly protest against the taking of the said property by The City of New York as is contemplated by your Honorable Board.

Title to Forty-eighth street has never been acquired under formal proceedings, but a certificate has been presented by the Topographical Engineer of the Borough showing that the street has been dedicated to public use. The roadway is in use and has been neatly shaped, shade trees have been planted, a cement walk has been completed, and the street is lit by gas.

I think that there can be no question as to the sufficiency of the dedication, and the outlet sewer having been provided, the approval of the resolution is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

150 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer.

1,250 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer.

14 manholes.

To construct a combined sewer, with appurtenances, in Morning Star road, from Tait's lane to Richmond terrace; in Richmond terrace, from Morning Star road to a point about half-way between Van Pelt avenue and Van Name avenue; in Prospect street, from Morning Star road to a point about four hundred and sixty-five (465) feet to the eastward; in Sherman avenue, from Morning Star road to a point about five hundred and fifty-five (555) feet to the eastward; in Innis street, from Morning Star road to John street; in Cedar street, from Morning Star road to Housman avenue; in Simonson avenue, from Richmond terrace to the tracks of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company; in Housman avenue, from the line of Forest avenue extended to the pier and bulkhead line; in Van Name avenue, from Richmond terrace to the tracks of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, and in Bay avenue, from Richmond terrace to the tracks of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company; all being in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, and within the District known as Sewer District 17A, and to connect with an outlet sewer at the foot of Housman avenue, and to do such other work as may be necessary to the completion of the work described.

REPORT No. 3276.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
October 12, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Staten Island District, Borough of Richmond, on August 29, 1905, initiating proceedings for the construction of sewers in the following-named streets:

Morningstar road, from Tait's lane to Richmond terrace.

Richmond terrace, from Morningstar road to a point about half-way between Van Pelt and Van Name avenues.

Prospect street, from Morningstar road to a point about 465 feet to the eastward.

Sherman avenue, from Morningstar road to a point about 555 feet to the eastward.

Innis street, from Morningstar road to John street.

Cedar street, from Morningstar road to Housman avenue.

Simonson avenue, from Richmond terrace to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad tracks.

Housman avenue, from the line of Forest avenue extended to the pier and bulkhead line.

Van Name avenue, from Richmond terrace to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad tracks.

Bay avenue, from Richmond terrace to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad tracks.

The plan showing these sewers was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 7, 1905. The sewers which it is proposed to build are all connected and form a compact system which might properly be included in one resolution and contract. The descriptions are all clear, except that in the case of Housman avenue the southerly limit is given as the line of Forest avenue extended, while no such street as Forest avenue appears on the sewerage plan and it can only be found as a short street one block long some distance to the west. Accompanying the resolution are a number of affidavits setting forth that all of the streets in which it is proposed to build sewers have been open and used for public highways for from twelve to twenty years; that they were recognized by the village authorities as open for public use; and that they have been maintained as public roads at their present width and at public expense for the time above mentioned. An inspection of the various streets confirms the statements made in these affidavits, and without describing each of them in detail it can be said that the streets have been graded, partly curbed, in some instances macadamized, sidewalks have been flagged and others are in use as cinder paths for the greater portion of the distance. There is, in my judgment, no question but that the roadways, and in nearly all cases the sidewalks, have been completely dedicated, and in some instances improved by the town authorities. On April 14, 1905, the Board approved of a plan laying out streets in a territory which includes the proposed sewers. This plan, while admittedly crude and requiring substantial amendment when the final maps of the borough are made, was adopted for the express purpose of permitting the construction of sewers. The streets were by this map shown of certain specific widths varying from 40 feet to 80 feet, and the lines laid down on this map are, therefore, the official lines of these streets. The roads above described, while lying within the streets, do not in many cases cover the full width of the streets as mapped. In connection with a resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, providing for the construction of a sewer in Bay Fourteenth street, between Benson avenue and Eighty-sixth street, the Corporation Counsel, under date of April 10, 1905, gave an opinion in which he said:

"I am of the opinion that no dedication of the street sufficient to authorize the construction of a sewer therein is shown, and I advise you that it would not be safe to construct the contemplated sewer until title to the land in the street has vested in the City."

It happened in this case that proceedings to acquire title to the street had already been instituted, but there was an urgent desire for the construction of a sewer, and it was thought that there was a sufficient dedication to justify the Board in authorizing the building of the sewer before the consummation of the opening proceedings. In a report submitted by your Engineer, which was forwarded to the Corporation Counsel with the request for his opinion, it was stated that—

"An examination made at the time the opening was being investigated showed that there is a roughly-shaped roadway in use through the block; that a portion of the sidewalk is in use; that the street is lighted by gas; and that there are a number of frame dwellings on the abutting property. The dedication was not complete, hence opening proceedings were deemed to be necessary. There is no question, however, of the dedication of the central portion of the street covered by the roadway, which has been in use for many years, and through which the abutting property-owners gain their outlet."

The Corporation Counsel thought that it would be better to defer authorizing the sewer until an unquestioned title could be obtained through the opening proceedings. In his opinion he made the following statement:

"The Greater New York Charter provides for the laying out and opening of streets, and a dedication of a highway to the City to be effective must be the dedication of a street which would include the land within the lines of such street as laid down upon the map or plan of the City."



If the Board were to be guided literally by this statement in considering resolutions providing for the building of sewers, it would be prevented from authorizing many much needed improvements essential to the health of the community where it happened that old roads fully dedicated did not cover the entire width of a street laid down upon the map of the City to include such old, well recognized, and in many cases important highways.

The attention of the several borough authorities has been called to this opinion of the Corporation Counsel, and they have been advised that if the Board followed it literally it would be obliged to decline to authorize sewers in many cases where they were unquestionably needed to relieve unsanitary conditions. The resolution from the Borough of Richmond now presented is an admirable illustration of such a case. At my request the borough authorities have furnished me with photographs showing these streets as they are, and in nearly all of them there are portions where the evident dedication, especially of sidewalks, does not cover the full width of the street as laid down on the map which was adopted on April 14, 1905.

It is possible that the Corporation Counsel did not intend to have the opinion above referred to applied so literally, and I would recommend that the resolution herewith submitted, with the statement of the case given above and the illustrations furnished by the borough authorities, be submitted to him for advice as to what should be done under these and similar circumstances.

REPORT No. 3300.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
October 21, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—On October 12, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment received from the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York a communication dated October

9, 1905, submitting a report of the Chief Engineer of the Board, together with a map showing a general scheme for the increase of the water supply of the city. It was decided that a public hearing upon the report and plans should be given by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 27, and the papers and plans were referred to the Engineer of your Board for examination and report.

Attention may properly be called to the powers and limitations imposed upon the Board of Water Supply in its study and plans for increasing the water supply of The City of New York. The Legislature of 1905 enacted six laws upon this subject, namely:

Chapter 723, creating a State Water Commission, to which all plans for additional supplies for any municipal corporation in the State shall be submitted and by which such plans must be approved before they can be carried out.

Chapter 724, creating a Board of Water Supply for The City of New York, the duties and powers of which are prescribed in considerable detail.

Chapter 725, containing certain provisions governing procedure in the acquisition of property by The City of New York and authorizing building roads, bridges, etc.

Chapter 726, which is a new section added to the City Charter, restricting the power of the City to acquire lands and water rights in Putnam County.

Chapter 738, preventing the City from acquiring additional lands for watersheds in Westchester or Putnam Counties, except that needed for the proposed Cross River and Croton Falls Reservoirs and the Kensico Reservoir suggested in the plans under consideration, but permitting the building of filters, aqueducts, etc., for water brought from other counties or for the purpose of connecting existing reservoirs, and

Chapter 734, permitting the City to use its water supply to generate electricity for the use of the municipality, provided such use does not increase the amount of water which the City would take were it not so utilized.

Previous legislation has debarred the City from diverting streams in Dutchess County, so that by a process of elimination the City is prevented from obtaining any new supply of water from the east side of the Hudson river, and the Board of Water Supply has therefore been obliged to confine its plans to the development of a supply from the west side of the river or to the Catskill Mountain region. The reports and plans now submitted follow closely those outlined by Messrs. Burr, Hering and Freeman in their reports to the Mayor. The plan is necessarily general in character and consists of a map showing the Hudson River Valley from New York City to Troy, with a part of the westerly side of the Mohawk and entire Catskill Mountain region. Upon this map are indicated the watersheds from which it is proposed to draw the supply, the location, sizes and capacities of the reservoirs for impounding the water, the aqueducts by which it will be conveyed to the city and the filters in which it will be treated before distribution. The watersheds upon which it is proposed to draw, with their area and estimated yield, are as follows:

	Area (Square Miles).	Total Supply, in Gallons.
1. Esopus .....	255	250,000,000
2. Rondout and three tributaries.....	176	125,000,000
3. Schoharie .....	228	136,000,000
4. Catskill and six tributaries.....	245	149,000,000
Total.....	904	660,000,000

It will be noted that either Rondout, the most southerly, or Catskill, the most northerly of the above watersheds, could be omitted, and the estimated daily supply would still be something over 500,000,000 gallons, which has been the amount of the additional supply mentioned in discussions of this subject.

The method by which it is proposed to develop these different watersheds is as follows:

1. In the Esopus watershed it is proposed to construct the Ashokan Reservoir by building a short but high dam across Esopus creek at Olive Bridge, with additional dams, or dikes, between Olive Bridge and Woodstock. This reservoir may be so built as to have the unprecedented capacity of 170,000,000 gallons. The Act providing for this increase in the supply distinctly prohibits the construction of more than one reservoir in the Esopus Valley, which shall be the one designated in the reports of Messrs. Burr, Hering and Freeman, and this restriction has been regarded by the Board of Water Supply in its plans. The capacity of the reservoir is greater than that required for impounding the run-off of the Esopus watershed, for the reason that the Schoharie drainage now flows northwardly into the Mohawk, and it is proposed to divert it into Esopus watershed by tunneling through the ridge separating the two watersheds, and the water from Catskill is also to be stored in this reservoir.

2. The Rondout watershed is to be developed by the construction of the Lackawack and Napanoch reservoirs, having a combined capacity of about 18,000,000,000 gallons, while the run-off of the three tributary watersheds will be provided for by three small reservoirs.

3. The Schoharie drainage is to be impounded by a reservoir having a capacity of 9,400,000,000 gallons, immediately above Prattsville. As already stated, the water from this reservoir will be carried to Esopus creek at Shandaken, by an aqueduct in tunnel.

4. In the Catskill watershed it is proposed to build reservoirs at Franklinton, Preston Hollow and Oak Hill, having a combined capacity of about 25,000,000,000 gallons, while the run-off from the six tributary watersheds, varying in area from three and a half to thirty-nine square miles, will be collected in small reservoirs.

The water so impounded will be conveyed to the city through an aqueduct beginning at West Hurley, where it will be connected with the Ashokan Reservoir, passing under the Hudson river at New Hamburg, crossing the Croton Valley about three and a half miles above the New Croton Dam, and leading to the Kensico Reservoir, which it is proposed to enlarge to a capacity of 40,000,000,000 gallons, at an elevation of 355 feet. From Kensico Reservoir an aqueduct will bring the water some five miles to filters at White Plains, whence it will be taken to Hill View Reservoir, just north of the city limits, after which it will pass into the distribution system.

The plans indicate an aqueduct traversing the Borough of The Bronx, passing under Hell Gate to Forest Park, near the line dividing the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, with a branch traversing the Borough of Brooklyn and passing under the Narrows to the Borough of Richmond.

Of course it has been impossible for the Board of Water Supply, in the plans now submitted, to indicate at what depth this aqueduct will be carried beneath the Hudson river and the various streams which it will cross, or whether it will be carried beneath them in deep tunnels or pipes. The grade of the aqueduct and its general location are defined in the plans. Into this great aqueduct from the Ashokan Reservoir will discharge another aqueduct leading from the Rondout watershed and taking in the supplies collected from the tributary areas already referred to. The supply from the Catskill area will be carried to the Ashokan Reservoir by an independent aqueduct some thirty miles in length, while the tunnel connecting Schoharie with Esopus has already been described.

It will be seen that this plan places before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the entire scheme for an increased supply, showing the drainage areas from which it is proposed to draw and the method of conducting the water to the city's distribution system. The plan is submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the provisions of section 2 of the Act creating the Board of Water Supply, and defining its duties and powers, and the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is required before the Board of Water Supply can submit its plans to the State Water Supply Commission. Section 3 of the Act referred to gives the Board of Estimate and Apportionment power to adopt, modify or reject the plans in whole or in part, to cause additional surveys to be made and further information to be obtained, in order that it may act intelligently in the premises. Had the Board of Water Supply, during the brief interval which has elapsed since its organization, been compelled to conduct a new investigation, with no material at its hand, it would have been impossible for it to present in these few months a well-digested and intelligent scheme. The Board has, however, as it states in its communication, had the benefit of the exhaustive investigations which have been made during the past two years. It has also been practically limited by statute to the territory which it is proposed to utilize. The Board of



Estimate and Apportionment may, therefore, feel assured that this is not a hastily prepared or immature plan, but one which has been well thought out by some of the most eminent hydraulic engineers, of whose services the Board of Water Supply has been prompt to avail itself.

The rights of those owning property in the watershed and along the lower portions of the streams which will be intercepted, appear to have been carefully protected by legislation, especially the most valuable right of the towns and cities in the territory to which these watersheds are tributary, to obtain a pure and wholesome supply for their own use, as The City of New York is compelled to furnish them from its proposed reservoirs and aqueducts with an ample supply under the same terms and conditions upon which such supply will be furnished to its own inhabitants.

I would therefore recommend that the plan as submitted by the Board of Water Supply be approved.

Included in and appended to the report of the Chief Engineer are estimates of the sums which will be required from year to year to carry out this great improvement, with approximate estimates of cost of the Ashokan, Kensico and Hill View reservoirs and the aqueducts from the Ashokan Reservoir to Forest Park and to Staten Island. The total of these estimates is \$112,092,000, based upon a supply of 500,000,000 gallons per day. I do not think that the Board desires to take up this question of cost at the present time, but that it will consider only the plans which have been submitted, the approval of which has already been recommended.

Whereas, The Board of Water Supply of The City of New York, pursuant to chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, has made such surveys, maps, plans, specifications, estimates and investigations as it deemed proper, in order to ascertain the facts as to what sources for an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York exist, and are most available, desirable and best for the said supply, and has reported to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with recommendations as to what action should, in its opinion, be taken with reference thereto, which said report with a map, plan and profile accompanying the same, bears the date of October 9, 1905; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in order to afford to all persons interested a reasonable opportunity to be heard respecting the said report, map, plan and profile, has given reasonable public notice of such hearing, and in addition, has given notice of such hearing by mailing or delivering to the Chairman and Clerk of each of the Boards of Supervisors of the counties where the real estate to be acquired is situated, a notice of such hearing at least eight days before the 27th day of October, 1905, to wit, to the Chairman and Clerk of the respective Boards of Supervisors of the Counties of Westchester, Putnam, Dutchess, Ulster, Greene, Schoharie, Albany and Orange, and to the President of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, and to the City Clerk of The City of New York, for the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond; and

Whereas, The said notice of such hearing was published in all of the papers specified and referred to above, being the City Record and the official City papers, the "Herald," "Times," "Tribune" and "Press," and in all papers designated by the respective County Clerks of the several counties as the papers in which official notices are to be published, all of which is evidenced by the affidavits, certificates and documents filed in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and

Whereas, On the 27th day of October, 1905, at 10.30 a. m., at Room No. 16, in the City Hall, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment met pursuant to said notice, and a public hearing was given to all persons interested in the matter and a reasonable opportunity to be heard respecting the same was afforded to such persons, at which hearing the said report with the map, plan and profile accompanying the same was considered and due deliberation was had, and no one appearing in opposition, but many in favor of the said report, map, plan and profile; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby approve and adopt said report, and the map, plan and profile accompanying the same, bearing the date of October 9, 1905, and presented by the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York, for obtaining an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York, and does direct that the said map, plan and profile be executed, signed, certified and filed as directed in section 3 of chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905 and does hereby declare the same to be the final map, plan or plans, approved and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided for in said section; and be it further

Resolved, That The City of New York make application by petition in writing to the State Water Supply Commission, as speedily as possible, for the approval of the said maps and profiles of the said proposed new or additional source or sources of water supply of The City of New York, pursuant to chapter 723 of the Laws of 1905, and that the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to prepare such papers and to take such steps with that end in view as may be proper.

#### SEWERS IN UNIONPORT, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Chief Engineer was presented:  
REPORT No. 3302.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
NEW YORK, October 23, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on the 20th inst. the President of the Borough of The Bronx urged the immediate authorization of the construction of a number of sewers in the Unionport District.

A memorandum had been submitted by your Engineer showing that these sewers are covered by five different resolutions, the estimated cost of the work under these

resolutions varying from a minimum of \$172,700 to a maximum of \$829,000, with a total of \$2,109,500. This memorandum drew attention to the fact that proceedings had been begun for acquiring easements in a number of these streets, but that the Commission for that purpose had not yet been appointed; and it was further noted that in cases where easements were not to be acquired affidavits had been forwarded to show a dedication, but that the evidence of such dedication was in many cases unsatisfactory. The Board instructed the Engineer to report specifically upon one or more of these resolutions at the meeting to be held on the 27th, and state whether any of the improvements could properly be authorized. The Borough President especially asked for the authorization of the main outlet sewer in Avenue E, estimated to cost \$332,300. This sewer would extend from East One Hundred and Fifty-second street to Westchester avenue. The greater portion of this distance, namely, from East One Hundred and Fifty-second street to what is known on the old Unionport map as Ninth street, and from Fourteenth street to Westchester avenue is covered by the easements to acquire which proceedings have been commenced. There remain five short blocks, namely, from Ninth street to Fourteenth street, the dedication of which has been claimed. The evidence of dedication consists of two affidavits, one signed by Jacob Weinheimer and the other by Frank Gass. They state that the affiant has been for more than five years the owner of property on Avenue E; that his ownership extends into the said avenue, and that the street is and has been for more than five years thrown open to public use as a street about 50 feet wide from Fourteenth street to Tenth street. It will be noted that neither affidavit covers the block between Ninth and Tenth streets, and also that it is stated that the street has been thrown open for a width of about 50 feet, while the street is laid down on the map to have a width of 80 feet. Notes of an inspection made upon the ground on September 22 are as follows:

At Fourteenth street, Avenue E is a narrow lane used as a farm road, with a stone wall on the westerly side; pasture land on the west and a garden on the east. Between Fourteenth and Twelfth streets there is a narrow lane with an irregular farm fence on the west side and no buildings and no footpaths. Between Twelfth and Eleventh streets there is an unshaped road with footpaths and two frame houses, and the easterly side is fenced. Between Eleventh and Ninth streets there is no sign of a road. The natural grade falls, and at about Ninth street it reaches the level of the marsh. For these two blocks there is open country, with no buildings and no road.

The conditions above noted certainly do not constitute a dedication, and there is no sign whatever of such dedication for the two blocks last mentioned.

As to the portion of the street covered by the easements, I beg to state that a map showing these easements was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 25, 1904, and on June 10 following the Local Board instituted proceedings to acquire these easements. This resolution was reported upon on June 26, and on July 7 the Board authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute proceedings for acquiring the easements. I have made several inquiries at the Bureau of Street Openings, and am advised that the Commissioners in this proceeding have not yet been appointed. It is assumed that as soon as they shall have been appointed and their oaths shall have been filed title to the easements can be taken in the same manner as in a street opening proceeding.

Even were the way clear to authorize the construction of this sewer in Avenue E it would have no outlet, such outlet being furnished by the sewer in East One Hundred and Fifty-second street and White Plains road, which is covered by a separate resolution of the Local Board, together with certain other sewers, the total estimated cost of which is \$829,000.

With the hope of finding that in the case of one of the other resolutions the way might be clear for the authorization of the work I have been over them carefully, but can find no instance of which the conditions above described are not typical: for instance, the resolution for sewers in Avenue B, etc., estimated to cost \$172,700, covers eighteen different streets, of which two have been opened; seven are the subjects of affidavits designed to show their dedication, and the remaining nine are covered partly by the easements and partly by affidavits. The conditions on the streets covered by the affidavits are in the majority of cases such that in my judgment no proper dedication can be shown, and I believe that it was unfortunate that when the proceedings to acquire easements were instituted they did not include all of the streets where the dedication was not perfectly clear. I have always believed, and have so stated to the borough authorities, that it would have been more economical and more satisfactory to have initiated proceedings to acquire title to the streets needed for these sewers, instead of securing easements. I regret therefore that I am unable to show that in any one of the five resolutions covering this district the Board can, consistently with the policy which it has heretofore followed, authorize the improvement.

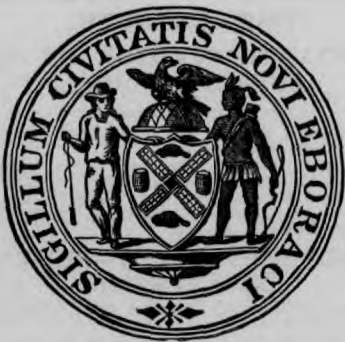

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
