THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Special Meeting.

Thursday, August 18, 1910, 1 p. m.

In the absence of the President, the Vice-Chairman, Hon. Francis P. Bent, in the chair, and a quorum present.

Alderman Dowling offered a resolution denouncing the dastardly, murderous assault on Mayor William J. Gaynor and praying for his speedy and permanent recovery, which was unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions calling attention of the Board to the mandatory provisions of chapter 659 of the Laws of 1910, relative to court positions, which was the object for the call for a special meeting.

Three resolutions were received from Board of Estimate and Apportionment which had been adopted July 29, recommending the establishment of additional grades of positions in the City Magistrates' Courts of the First and Second Divisions, and the Court of Special Sessions. The resolutions were severally adopted by a unanimous vote.

The Board then adjourned.

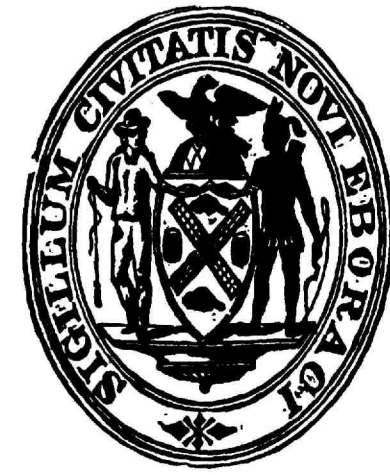

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
