SIR—There were 823 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 28, 1885, which is an increase of 62, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 143 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending February 21, 1885, was 771, which is 107.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.99 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,383,087.
