

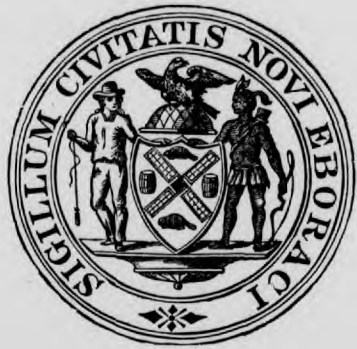

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held February 23, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews, and Koch.

The minutes of the meeting held February 17, 1887, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table to await action as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Respecting penalties imposed for violation of the rules and regulations adopted by the Board, for the government and care of wharf property. Referred to Executive Session.

From Simon Stevens, Attorney for the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting the Department to advertise in the next sale, a ten-year lease of Piers, 51 and 51½, East River.

From Providence and Stonington Steamship Company—In reference to erecting a platform south of Pier, old 29, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Frank Phelps, lessee—Requesting permission to drive piles and repair inner crib on the west side of Pier 40, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Opinion respecting the advisability of carrying the case of Edward G. Ames to the Court of Appeals. Referred to Commissioner Koch to reply thereto.

2d. Requesting information in reference to the leasing of the Pier foot of Fifth street, East river, to Joseph V. Brown. The President authorized to furnish the information desired.

From Alfred C. Chapin, attorney, Screw Dock Company—Offering to sell to the Department Pier 39, East river, and the bulkhead adjoining. Referred to Commissioners Koch and Matthews.

From R. P. Dobbins—Stating that he will call on the Commissioners in reference to a berth for the steamer "City of Long Branch."

From J. M. Goetchius—Requesting better facilities for the boats of the Fort Lee Ferry Company at Pier, old 42, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending February 19, 1887.

2d. Reporting the assignment of employees to special duty.

3d. In reference to the water front between One Hundred and Twenty-second and One Hundred and Twenty-third streets, Harlem river, and reporting that there is no water-grant at the said location, all the property, including some land outside of the original high-water mark which has been filled in, the old platform and the land under water on which it stands, belonging to the City. The President authorized to request the Counsel to the Corporation to take such steps as may be necessary to place the Department in the possession of said premises.

4th. Reporting that repairs have not been made to Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street, North river, as ordered by the Board. The President authorized to request B. M. Shandley to call on the Commissioners on Friday, February 25, instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.

5th. Reporting that repairs have not been made to Pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street, East river, as ordered by the Board. The President authorized to advise the Department of Public Charities and Correction of the repairs required thereat and request them to do the said work under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted November 5, 1885.

6th. Reporting that one of the crosswalk stones on the newly-paved ground in front of Pier, new 40, North river, is broken. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair at once, was approved.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3993, in reference to fencing off Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4055, that he had repaired cobble pavement at the bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6050, that he had made requisition for dredging in front of the bulkhead between West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets and at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, and supervised the work thereat, which was done by the Union Dredging Company.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6190, that he had superintended replacing spring piles on the outer northerly corner of Pier, old 29, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6194, that he had refastened spring piles and replaced fence, Pier 37, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6202, that he had directed and superintended the shifting of boom from Pier 49 to Pier 48, East river.

From Patrick Curley, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that repairs are required to the approach to Pier, old 42, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.

2d. Reporting that the bulkhead, between Piers, new 37 and 38, North river, is in need of cleaning. The action of the President in requesting the Department of Street Cleaning to clean the bulkhead, was approved.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to remove small office building from Department Yard, foot of East Seventeenth street, East river, and place it on Pier, foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, for the use of the Dock Master.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, reported that he had renewed the insurance on building, furniture, etc., on Pier A, North river, in the following companies:

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6073, submitting form of contract and specifications for extending crib bulkhead between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets, North river, was received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, form of contract and specifications as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief for extending the crib-bulkhead southerly from West Seventy-eighth street, North river, to the southerly line of West Seventy-seventh street, North river, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing the said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

On motion, John J. McEntee was appointed Dock Builder.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending February 21, 1887, amounting to \$3,409.13, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

#### Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Monday, February 14, 1887, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioner Spencer, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

Also Consulting Engineer Fteley.

The minutes of the adjourned meeting of the 11th instant were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported that they had examined the bids received for the construction of the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and found the checks received as security, amounting to \$7,000, correct; and that the said amount had been transmitted to the Comptroller, and a receipt taken therefor; and that they approved of the several sureties proposed by Messrs. Smith & Brown, Frank Stollmeyer, John Pierce, Page & Carey and Richard A. Malone; and that the matter of the approving of the sureties proposed by John Brown and Leavey & Buckley, who resided out of the city, was postponed to enable the Committee to obtain information relative to the same.

In connection therewith Commissioner Barnes offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Whereas, The bids received for the construction of Section 15 of the New Croton Aqueduct, being the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, having been considered by the Commissioners in executive session, and by the Committee of Finance and Audit; therefore be it

Resolved, That the work of the construction of said gate-house be awarded to Richard A. Malone, of Lancaster, Pa., he being the lowest bidder.

The resolution was adopted by the affirmative vote of all the Commissioners present.

J. Imbrie Miller, Principal Assistant Engineer of the Northern District of the New Aqueduct, under date of the 12th instant, submitted a report with reference to instructions given him by resolutions adopted by the Commissioners on the 11th instant, directing him to see that the highways at the Pocantico river were placed in a proper condition.

In connection therewith the following communications were read by the Secretary: one from Brown, Howard & Co., contractors; Henry C. Griffin; G. Hart; Abram Storms, Street Commissioner of North Tarrytown; and Nelson H. Baker, District Attorney of Westchester County.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report of Principal Assistant Engineer Miller and the said communications were placed on file.

Attention was then called to the action of the Commissioners, had on the 7th instant, when the report of the Committee on Construction upon the Quaker Bridge Dam and Reservoir was adopted; wherein it was resolved that opportunity be given to Commissioner Newton to record his vote on the subject at such subsequent meeting of the Commissioners as he may attend.

Commissioner Newton was then recorded as voting in the affirmative upon the adoption of said report.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

The Commissioners met to open bids received for the construction of Additional Shaft No. 13 A, situated on Section 7 of the New Croton Aqueduct, at about Station 112, in pursuance to the public notice published daily for fifteen consecutive days, commencing January 31, in the CITY RECORD, "New York Star," and "New York Tribune." After the reading of the aforesaid notice the bid-box was opened by the Commissioners, and the following bids—upon which the required deposit had been made—were opened and read aloud by the Secretary:

Whereupon Commissioner Ridgway offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to have the said bids calculated and tabulated with his estimates of the work, and report the same to the Commissioners for consideration and canvassing by them on the 23d day of February, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the bids and checks of the bidders received for the construction of Additional Shaft No. 13 A, situated on Section 7 of the New Croton Aqueduct, at about Station No. 112, are hereby referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for examination, and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders. Unanimously adopted.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 2394 to 2404, inclusive; and on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred the bill of Rossiter W. Raymond, for services as an expert in the examination of the lighting and ventilation of the shafts and headings of the New Aqueduct, reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

That they have had under consideration the accompanying communication of the Chief Engineer, which was referred to them on the 9th instant, recommending the appointment of three Assistant Engineers, to be detailed to inspect the work which is being done at night on Sections A and B, to insure faithfulness on the part of the inspectors engaged on the work, and recommend that such appointments be made. Adopted.

That on the 14th instant, the Committee decided to recommend to the Commissioners the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That W. D. Kelly, Jr., be appointed Special Assistant Engineer, at a salary of \$1,800 per annum, he having passed the required Civil Service examination for such position, to take effect from this date. Adopted.

Commissioners Ridgway and Fish voting in the negative so far as the appointment of Rollin B. Vose was concerned, and as to the balance of the report in the affirmative.

The Committee on Real Estate submitted a report concerning the lands adjoining those heretofore taken for the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, the lands in question belonging to the Academy of the Sacred Heart; and recommending that the Committee be authorized to cause proper steps to be taken by the Counsel to the Corporation to obtain from the owners of the land an agreement to bring in the additional pieces of land referred to in the manner indicated by said Counsel; and to cause the value of the same to be fixed by the Commissioners of Appraisal for that section of the New Aqueduct. Recommendation of the Committee adopted.
