

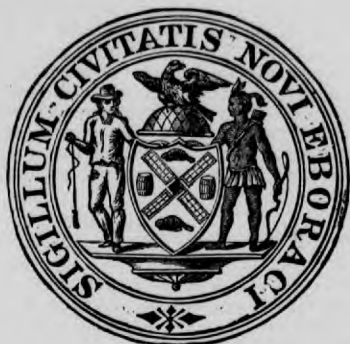

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Wednesday, March 5, 1890.

Present—President Post.
" Commissioner Matthews.
" Cram.

The Board met for the purpose of receiving estimates for repairing the Pier foot of Fifty-fifth street, North river, advertised to be opened this day at 12 o'clock M. A representative of the Comptroller was present.

Three estimates were received, as follows:

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits made by said bidders and accompanying their estimate.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for repairing the Pier foot of Fifty-fifth street, North river, be and hereby is awarded to John D. Walsh, he being the lowest bidder, upon the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held Thursday, February 27, and Friday, February 28, was postponed until the executive meeting of Friday, March 7, 1890.

The following communication was received from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, March 4, 1890.

To the Board of Dock Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Will you have the kindness to designate a representative of your Board to attend at this office on Friday, the 7th instant, at eleven o'clock, for the purpose of consulting with the heads of the several Municipal Departments with reference to pending legislation at Albany affecting the interests of this city.

The action of the President, in advising his Honor the Mayor that as the representative of this Board he will have the honor of attending at the hour named, was approved.

From Theo. W. Myers, Comptroller:

1st. Referring to Vouchers Nos. 11124 to 11138, and requesting this Department to attach to the vouchers a copy of the Treasurer's Order in each case, and in cases where prices are based upon estimate or agreement, a copy of the same, and also respecting the time of delivery of material. The Secretary directed to advise that orders have been issued to have his request complied with.

2d. Approving sureties of John D. Walsh on Contract No. 325, for repairing Pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file.

3d. Submitting plan of proposed ferry, between the Piers foot of Little West Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, North river, with waiting room, etc., on a platform outside of the present bulkhead line, and desiring to be informed, whether the plan is in conformity with the approved plans of this Department for the improvement of the water-front in that locality, and whether the sides of the piers, on each side of the ferry-landing, are leased, and if so to whom and on what terms and conditions, and also whether the platform in front of the bulkhead, between the piers, is leased, and if so to whom and on what conditions, and whether the land under water outside of the bulkhead belongs to the city.

On motion, referred to President Post, to examine and report to the Comptroller.

From Health Department:

1st. Inclosing copy of resolution adopted February 25, 1890, together with a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Moreau Morris, M. D., respecting the condition of premises at Pier, new 40, North river, foot of Clarkson street.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to make repairs to the sewer thereat as recommended in said report.

2d. Inclosing a copy of the resolution adopted February 25, 1890, together with the report of Sanitary Inspector Moreau Morris, M. D., on premises between Piers, old 16 and 17, North river, and the northerly ferry-rack of the Communipau Ferry.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the Secretary directed to send the Engineer-in-Chief a copy of said report.

From William Murray, Superintendent Police—Acknowledging receipt of letter dated 1st instant, requesting a detail of an officer at the Piers foot of Fifty-fifth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river, and stating that the matter has been transmitted to the Board of Police with his recommendation that such detail be made.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file.

From William H. Clark, Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Inclosing blank form of lease to the Cunard Steamship Company of rights of wharfage on northerly side of Pier, new 40, North river, for a renewal term of ten years from May 1, 1889, and advising this Board to tender the said lease to the Cunard Steamship Company and offer to execute it.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to make the necessary arrangements for the execution of the lease.

2d. Enclosing duplicate copies of a judgment granted by Judge Ingraham, dated February 13, 1890, directing the said steamship company to remove the shed now maintained by it outside of Pier, new 40, North river, and bulkhead lines thereat, and enjoining its further maintenance and advising the Board that it is the duty of the company to primarily remove the illegal structure, and if not removed within a reasonable time after notice of said judgment had been served upon the Superintendent of the Company in charge of the pier and such other officer or servant of the company having charge of the obstruction, it will be competent for this Department to remove the same as a public nuisance.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify Vernon H. Brown, agent of the Cunard Steamship Co. that if the said shed is not removed within thirty days after receipt of a notice from this Department, the work of removal will be done by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department at the cost and expense of said steamship company.

3d. Approving form of contract and specifications for furnishing sawed spruce timber.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file.

From Police Department, Office of the Inspection of Steam Boilers—Stating that as John J. Givnan, Steam Engineer, failed to pass the requisite examination, a certificate was therefore denied.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file.

From James D. Leary, ship builder and contractor—Requesting this Board to consent to the change of plan under which the Messrs. Astor are improving their property on the Harlem river by omitting "anchor-cribs," and substituting therefor their estimated cubical contents.

On motion, permit granted.

From Brown & Fleming;
1st. Requesting permission to repair the bulkhead about two hundred feet east of Gouverneur street, East river, and dredge thereat. The action of the President and Commissioner Matthews in issuing a permit upon the usual terms and conditions, was approved.

2d. Requesting the privilege of estimating for the furnishing of such filling as this Department may require, on the North and East rivers.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to advise them that hereafter the right to do this work will be sold at public auction.

3d. Requesting permit to use a part of the dumping-board at Pier 12, East river, for the purpose of taking away cellar dirt, together with a communication from Horace Loomis, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, stating that he had granted the said privilege to Brown & Fleming, provided they obtain the consent of this Department.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the application was denied for the reason that the Board understood that an injunction had already been issued prohibiting the dumping of material at that pier. The Secretary was directed to advise Commissioner Loomis of the action of the Board.

From G. W. Stillwell, General Manager Inland Transportation Line—Requesting a berth on the lower end of Pier, old 3, East river, next to ferry slip, and between Piers 3 and 4, East river. The Secretary was directed to advise that as the said premises is private property, and in the "Canal District," this Board cannot grant his request.

From West Shore Railroad—Requesting a permit to place two mooring-piles, and cut two new gangways in Pier, old 34, foot of Harrison street, North river. Permit granted upon the usual terms and conditions.

From John L. Cadwalader, attorney and counsellor at law—Desiring to be informed how far into the North and East rivers the city now has title to the lands under water, and how such title, as to such land beyond the exterior boundary of the Montgomery grant, was acquired. The action of President Post in replying thereto was approved.

From Lehigh Valley Railroad Company—Requesting permit to place picket gates on the bulkhead at Pier 3, North river.

On motion, referred to Commissioner Cram to examine and report.

From Cecil Campbell Higgins, attorney—Stating that he has been informed by his clients that the injunction of the United States Circuit Court forbidding any building or filling in on the North river between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, is being violated. The action of the Secretary in advising Mr. Higgins that this Department has not authorized nor is engaged in filling in or dumping thereat, was approved.

From The Canal Lake and Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to remove two old derricks now on Pier 6, East river, and erect two new ones in place thereof.

On motion, permit was granted.

From Col. Henry L. Abbott, President Board of Engineers—Informing the Board that a public meeting of the New York Harbor Line Board has been called for the 18th proximo, at eleven A. M., in the Army Building this city, to consider the subject of the harbor lines around Manhattan Island. The action of President Post and Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department to attend said meeting was approved.

From A. Van Santvoord, President of the Hudson River Line—Desiring to be informed if the construction of the Pier foot of Vestry street, North river, cannot be expedited.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to advise Mr. Van Santvoord that the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department will see that the work progresses as expeditiously as possible.

From the Metropolitan Steamship Company—Requesting permission to place at the end of the extension to Pier 11, North river, a block of crib-work about forty-one feet square.

On motion, permit granted.

From Peck, Martin & Company—Protesting against the granting of a permit to Bernard Campbell to erect scales and tally-house on the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, Harlem river.

On motion, the application of Bernard Campbell was taken from the table and his request denied. The Secretary was directed to notify the Dock Master of that district, also Peck, Martin & Company, of the action of the Board.

From John J. Martin, Dock Master—Reporting that the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river, requires cleaning.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending March 5, 1890, amounting to \$33,821.45, which was received, and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows :

CLAIMS FOR EXEMPTION FROM JURY duty will be heard by me daily at my office, from 9 A. M. until 4 P. M.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, licensed pharmacists or pharmacists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible), and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, if unpaid, will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
