DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1891.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor :

SIR—In conformity with the requirements of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending September 30, 1891 :

The organization of the Board governing the Department remains unchanged.

Aside from the ordinary transaction of business in the administration of the Department, several matters of importance have received the attention and careful consideration of the Board of Parks, among them the proposed removal of the tracks of the elevated railroads from the Battery Park, and the proposed closing of the draws of the bridges over the Harlem river during certain hours of the day. On the latter proposition a number of hearings have been afforded to the numerous parties interested and petitions for and against the proposed regulations have been received, signed by many thousands, those in favor urging the great annoyance of the frequent interruption to passengers and mails crossing the river during the summer season, and those opposed remonstrating against interference with the free navigation of the river at all hours.

It has been decided not to adopt the regulations requiring the bridges to be closed, the Board being evenly divided on the question.

The hearing in the matter of the elevated railway at the Battery has been continued from time to time, and finally closed on the 23d of September. The matter is still under consideration.

An estimate of the amount of moneys required for the transaction of the business of the Department for the coming year (amounting to \$1,074,545), has been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The matter of the proposed new bridge over Harlem river, to replace the present McComb's Dam Bridge, has been steadily progressed.

It has been determined that the point at which the bridge is to be built on the southerly side of the river, is the most practicable for the proper construction of the same, and detailed drawings and specifications have been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, pursuant to chapter 207 of the Laws of 1890. A map, showing the plan and location of the bridge, has been sent to the Secretary of War for approval, and the Department has accepted the conditions under which the approval asked will be given.

The Harlem River Bridge Commission has turned over to the care and control of this Department the bridge over Harlem river at One Hundred and Eighty-first street, known as Washington Bridge, and the Board of Parks, on the 9th of September, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, accepted the said bridge and its approaches. There being a balance of \$786 only available for the maintenance of the bridge during the remainder of the year, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been requested to authorize the transfer of the sum of eight hundred dollars from the appropriation for Telephonic Service for the current year (for which it is not required), to the appropriation for Harlem River Bridges, in order to provide for the proper maintenance of Washington Bridge.

The weekly concerts in the Central and several City parks have been continued during the quarter and enjoyed by many thousands. Castle Garden has been opened as a free concert hall, and the demonstration was pronounced a success. Nearly three thousand people attended the first concert. The Mayor was present, and expressed the hope that Castle Garden would continue to be devoted to public amusements. It is proposed to give as many more free concerts as the subscriptions from which the expense is defrayed will justify.

A new small park, which has been given the name of Rutgers Park, has been laid out at Rutgers's Slip. Plans for its improvement are in course of preparation.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art has been opened by the Trustees for the free use of the public on Sunday afternoons, and, according to a letter from the Director, it appears that the number of persons who have visited the Museum on Sundays since the Sunday opening commenced has been recorded by the turnstiles as follows :

There has been discovered in the Pelham Bay Park what is believed to be a glacial furrow. The attention of the Department was called to it by the Rev. George Lansing Taylor, and a careful study of the locality has strengthened the belief that the furrow, which is distinctly marked upon a rock in that part of the park known as Pelham Neck, is the work of the great ice glacier of whose passage over the continent science teaches. The furrow has been indicated on the park map, with a view to its preservation as a valuable scientific object of great interest to students of geology and one of the park attractions.

Permission has been given to the Pell family to make repairs by way of restoration or preservation of an ancient burial plot in the Pelham Bay Park, as the same now exists, and a similar permission has been granted to the representatives of the Van Cortlandt and Bayley families, with respect to their family burial plot and vault in the same inclosure in Van Cortlandt Park. Both permits are revocable without notice.

The fruit on the New Parks north of the Harlem river has been disposed of at public auction, as it ripened from time to time during the season.

A license to occupy the building known as the Mahoney House in Pelham Bay Park, and to sell refreshments therein, has been issued to William Ward ; for the privilege he pays a fee of fifteen per cent. of his gross receipts.

A license to sell refreshments and let boats at the Skate-house in Van Cortlandt Park has been given to Daniel Sullivan, who agrees to pay a fee of five per cent. of his gross receipts for the privilege.

Permission to maintain a refreshment stand at Castle Garden has been given to Dennis Rooney.

The amount to be paid to the Department by Gabriel Case, under his license for conducting the sale of refreshments at McGowan's Pass Tavern, in Central Park, has been fixed at five per cent. of his gross receipts.

A rule has been established whereby every stage or omnibus when driven or used at night in Central Park, after the city gas lamps are lighted, will be required to have fixed upon the inside of the front of it a sufficiently lighted lamp or candle, so that the same shall be plainly visible from the outside of such vehicle, and every coach or cab or carriage, public or private, excluding uncovered buggies, when driven or used at night in Central Park, after the city gas lamps are lighted, shall have fixed upon the outside of the driver's seat, upon or at each side of it, a sufficiently lighted lamp or candle so that the same shall be plainly visible from the outside of every such cab, coach or carriage.

The consent of the Department has been given to the erection of projections on certain houses, as follows :

On a dwelling to be erected by James A. Burden, at the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Seventy-second street, the projections not to extend more than five feet beyond the house line of Fifth avenue, nor more than four feet beyond the house line of Seventy-second street.

On a building to be erected by Gerald L. Schuyler, at the northwest corner of Eighty-third street and West End avenue, the projections not to extend more than one foot beyond the building line.

An assessment list for the work of regulating, grading, paving, etc., the avenue bounding the Morningside Park on the westerly side, from One Hundred and Tenth street to Tenth avenue, together with the amount and cost of the work, has been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been requested to authorize the issue of bonds or stock to the amount of twelve hundred dollars in addition to the amount heretofore provided under chapter 444 of the Laws of 1889, for the erection of bays and stairways on the westerly side of Morningside Park.

A request has also been made of the said Board for authority to expend the sum of six thousand dollars, from the amount of fifteen thousand dollars previously provided for the construction of a foundation wall around Mount Morris Park, for the purpose of constructing the superstructure to be placed on the said foundation wall.

The Department having been advised by the Counsel to the Corporation that the construction of a dock in Pelham Bay Park should not be commenced until title to the land below high-water mark shall have been acquired by the City from the State, and it being impossible to complete such proceedings during the current year, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been requested to transfer the sum of ten thousand dollars appropriated for the construction of a dock, to the appropriation for the care and maintenance of the New Parks north of the Harlem river.

The New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company having offered to place a number of their lamps in the Central Park, and maintain the same at their own expense, their proposition was accepted upon the condition that one year's trial be given without charge, the lamps to be placed at such locations and in such numbers as the Department may designate.

The Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company, who have heretofore obtained permission to maintain its tracks upon and across the bridge over Harlem river at Third avenue, and to run cars thereon operated by animal traction, have been given permission to run their cars by electric power and to construct the necessary wires and fixtures therefor.

Contracts for the following-named works have been entered into by the Department during the quarter :

For furnishing and delivering, where and when required, hay, straw, oats, corn and bran, amount \$5,445. Horace Ingersoll, Contractor ; Jacob D. Butler & Samuel Ingersoll, Sureties.

For repairing and repaving with rock asphalt the walks within the City Parks other than the Central Park, amount \$5,860. The Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company, Contractor ; Henry Bolze and Albert Smith, Sureties.

For regulating and grading for an entrance at One Hundred and Sixth street and Central Park, West, and about 150 feet of driveway connecting the same with the west drive in the park, amount \$8,311. Patrick McInerney, Contractor ; Charles McGuinness and Thomas Regan, Sureties.

For furnishing three wall cases for the American Museum of Natural History, amount \$1,900. D. S. Hess & Co., Contractors ; W. H. Stiner and M. S. Feckheimer, Sureties.

For constructing mason and granite work for seven parks in Park avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-seventh streets, amount \$12,600. Stephen Ruddy, Contractor ; Michael Giblin and Thomas Gearty, Sureties.

MAINTENANCE WORK.

The gardening force on the Central and City Parks has been engaged in the care and cultivation of the flower beds and in pruning and cultivating the herbaceous plants. At the greenhouses the usual work of propagating bedding plants has been attended to.

The shrubs and trees in the nursery were cultivated and cared for.

On the Central Park the usual routine work, consisting of the almost daily sprinkling of the drives, bridle paths, Transverse Roads Nos. 1 and 2, Fifth avenue and West Seventy-second street, together with the necessary rolling and scraping well attended to.

The lawns have been mowed from time to time, and the long grass carted to the animals at the Menagerie or sold. The short grass was carted to the dump, as well as hundreds of loads of refuse from sweepings.

The walks have been regularly swept, and the walk and road basins cleaned as required.

The wire fences were repaired from time to time.

Gravel was received and spread upon the drives.

The tennis and croquet grounds were kept open during the past quarter, and thousands of people enjoyed their use. Base-ball and cricket playing has also been indulged in, and numerous children's picnic parties were held on the lawns.

The cottages were kept open, in charge of Attendants, from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M.

At Mount Morris Park the lawns have been mowed and the walks were regularly cleaned. Thousands of children have enjoyed the use of the lawns for croquet playing and picnic parties. The work of cleaning the lawns and walks after players and picnickers and the great crowds that attend the weekly concerts has been considerable. The work of reconstructing this park by the widening of the paths and erection of new fences has been undertaken.

The lawns and walks at East River Park, Manhattan Square, Triangle Junction of Ninth avenue and Boulevard, at Sixty-third and Seventy-second streets, and the Park Avenue Parks have been regularly mowed and cared for.

The walks and lawns in the City Parks below Central Park have been attended to. The cottages in these parks have been kept open, in charge of Attendants, from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M., except at Union Square, where the cottage has been kept open night and day.

A concert was given each week at Tompkins Square, Battery Park and Paradise Park, which involved considerable work in preparation for and cleaning up after the same.

The drinking-fountains have been kept in operation, when possible, and the trees and shrubs regularly watered.

The wire fences in these parks were repaired from time to time.

At Riverside Park the work has consisted of watering and rolling the drive, and repairing the same with gravel ; cleaning gutters and basins ; mowing the lawns.

At Morningside Park the lawns have been mowed and the basins and walks cleaned.

The force at the Eighty-fifth Street Stables has been engaged in caring for the horses, cleaning and repairing the harness, and making new parts of same.

The force on the New Parks north of the Harlem river has been engaged in surveying and monumenting boundaries of parks and parkways, and in repairing roads and bridges.

Considerable work was done in preparing the Van Cortlandt Parade Ground for the fall review.

The Carpenter force has been engaged on incidental repairs of cottages on the Central and City Parks, repairs of signs and settees, rolling stock, music stands, tools, etc.

The Painters were engaged in painting repairs made by Carpenters, lettering signs, glazing windows, etc.

The Masons were engaged in repairing basins and drains, and in some instances rebuilding same, and in painting brick and stonework ; also, in resetting, flagging and curbing in the City parks.

The Plumbing force has been engaged in repairing bursts in Croton-water pipes, and in the repair and improvement of the cottages on the Central and City Parks.

The mechanical force, other than that above named, consisting of Engineers, Skilled Laborers, etc., has been engaged in the operation and care of the boilers at the Workshops and Arsenal and in the repair of tools. The Horseshoers have attended to the shoeing of the Department horses as required.

The Engineers, Bridgetenders and force on the Harlem river bridges have been engaged in the operation of these bridges, which requires constant care and attention, as they have to be opened at all hours of the day and night.

CONSTRUCTION WORK.

CENTRAL PARK.

Regulating, Grading and Improving the Public Place or Plaza at Fifth Avenue and One Hundred and Tenth Street.

A contract for the work was executed on June 24 and the contractor was notified to commence work on July 6.

- The quantities of work done during the quarter are :
- 2,000 cubic yards of filling placed in embankment.
 - 200 cubic yards garden mould placed in tree plots.
 - 200 lineal feet straight 6-inch curb furnished and set.
 - 212 lineal feet curved 6-inch curb furnished and set.
 - 1 receiving-basin built complete.
 - 3 receiving-basins rebuilt.
 - 130 lineal feet of 12-inch vitrified pipe furnished and laid.
 - 1,500 square yards of new pavement for roadway laid.
 - 350 square yards of old pavement for roadway relaid.
 - 1,700 square feet of new bridge stone furnished and laid.
 - 260 cubic yards of concrete in place.

Regulating and Grading for Entrance at One Hundred and Sixth Street, and Central Park, West, and about 150 feet of Driveway Connecting same with the West Drive in Central Park.

The contract for this work was executed on September 2 and the work ordered to be commenced on September 10.

- The quantity of work done is :
- 1,500 cubic yards of earth excavated.

FIFTH AVENUE.

Repairing and Resurfacing the Macadamized Roadway and Trap-block Gutters of Fifth Avenue, from Ninetieth Street to One Hundred and Tenth Street.

The contract for this work was executed on June 9, and the contractor was notified to begin work on June 24, and the work was completed on September 26.

- The quantity of work done was :
- 18,750.41 square yards of macadamized and trap-block pavement repaired and resurfaced.

MORNINGSIDE PARK.

The Erection of Granite and Blue-stone Steps, Platforms, etc., required on Morningside Park, at the Three Bays and Three Entrances adjoining the Avenue, on the Westerly Side of the Park, and the Entrance at One Hundred and Tenth Street and Manhattan Avenue.

A contract for the work was executed on July 16, 1890, and the work was commenced August 11, 1890.

- The work done during the quarter was :
- 751 cubic yards of rubble masonry built in walls for platforms and steps.
 - 316 cubic yards of ashlar masonry built in walls for platforms and steps.
 - 5 cubic yards of dry wall built to support rustic coping.
 - 30 cubic yards of brickwork built in arches over bays.
 - 29 cubic yards of concrete put in place.
 - 44 cubic yards of two and four faced ashlar furnished and set.
 - 10,800 pounds of iron beams furnished and set in bays.
 - 50 lineal feet of rustic coping set.
 - 208 lineal feet of blue-stone steps furnished and set.
 - 6,000 cubic feet of dressed granite furnished and set.

CITY PARKS.

Repairing and Repaving with Rock Asphalt the Walks within the City Parks, other than Central Park.

The contract for the above work was executed July 14, and the contractors notified to commence work on July 22.

MOUNT MORRIS PARK.

Constructing Foundation Walls for Inclosing Wall Around Mount Morris Park.

This work is being done under contract dated December 23, 1889, and was commenced April 15, 1890; was suspended for the season on December 6 and ordered to be resumed on April 15, 1891, but no work was done until May 19.

- 195 cubic yards of rubble foundation in cement mortar.
 - 145 cubic yards of one-faced wall above foundation.

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES—MADISON AVENUE BRIDGE.

The Construction of Wrought and Galvanized Iron Boiler and Engine-house over the Centre of the Draw-span of the Madison Avenue Bridge.

The contract for this work was executed on January 5, 1891. Work ordered to be commenced on March 23, and was completed on September 19.

METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORY.

During the past quarter monthly tables have been printed for distribution to home and foreign observatories and libraries; weekly reports have been issued to the CITY RECORD and newspapers; weekly and hourly reports to the Health Department and meteorological information has been supplied to the Counsel to the Corporation and also the law courts.

The annexed tables give an abstract of the mean, the maximum and minimum readings from the various self-recording instruments in this observatory, for the third quarter of the year 1891, and also comparisons with the observations for the same quarter for the past twenty years, taken at this observatory :

In view of the great necessity for increased Police supervision of the lower City Parks a sub-station has been established at the cottage in Union Square. A Sergeant has been detailed in charge of the down-town parks, and there are under him about fifty officers. The importance of their work is shown by the number of recent cases of assault and battery, highway robbery and attempted suicide in Battery Park alone during the past quarter. In every case the principal and witnesses were arrested and committed to jail or the House of Detention.

At the request of officers of the National Horse Show Association, the Mounted Park Police-men were permitted to compete for prizes at the recent horse show of the association at Madison Square Garden. The showing made was very creditable.

The 885 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.89, against 27.94 for the previous week, and 26.29 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The decrease of 34 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 9 in the deaths from scarlet fever, of 13 from cancer, of 11 from heart diseases, of 10 from bronchitis, of 9 from croup, and of 8 from pneumonia. There was an increase of 6 in the deaths from measles, of 10 from diarrhoeal diseases, and of 32 from phthisis.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and those from measles and scarlet fever in the Nineteenth Ward.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT
act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889),
which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in
the city, described in any grant of land under water,
from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing
covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to
pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets,
shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement,
the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the
same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the
expense thereof to be assessed on the property
benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed
shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving,
repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and
discharge such owner from any and every covenant and
obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, con-
tained in the water grant under which the premises are
held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on
such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or
avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority
of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners
of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of
the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such
lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in
writing, specifying the ward number and street number
of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and
assigns, to be released from the obligation of such
covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be
thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and
thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns
shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to
pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot
in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable
to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give
the following explanation of the operation of this act:
When notice, as above described, is given to the
Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or
lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are
forever released from all obligation under the grant in
respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in
front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assess-
ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Com-
mon Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made
thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants
can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is
authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and
when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be
paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their
desire and make their application to the Board of Alder-
men and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who
has no authority in the matter until directed by
ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the
pavement, repavement or repairs.
