

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET, (NEW YORK, December 5, 1876.

The Board of Health met this day.

Orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for penalties for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 19 cases, and for violation of the Sanitary Code in 4 cases.

Reports Received.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 2, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,207, as follows, viz.: I public bulding, 639 tenement-houses, 88 private dwellings, 27 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 4 stores and warehouses, 42 stables, 77 slaughter-houses, 2 fat-rendering establishments, I gas works, 2 distilleries and breweries, 7 manure dumps, I stock yard, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 27 yards, courts, and areas, 46 cellars and basements, 121 waste-pipes and drains, 62 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, I rag and bone house, I dangerous chimney, 7 other nuisances, together with 5 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

During the past week 39 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

27 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

35 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 34 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 23 houses, 23 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending December 2, 1876, there were issued from this Bureau 427 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies in transitu, and 38 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 427 deaths, 127 marriages, 435 births, 38 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 46 returns from Coroners. There were 14 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage, and 11 of death were issued from this Bureau. Bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, December 5, 1876.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register :

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, December 2, 1876, there were 427 deaths registered in this Bureau, being an increase of 4 as compared with the preceding week, and 57 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1875. The actual mortality for the week ending November 25, was 416, which is 55.8 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.25 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,c67,860.

There was a decrease of 6 deaths from zymotic diseases, 6 from constitutional diseases, and 1 leath term yieldness that the increases of 7 from level descrees, while the deaths from developmental

death from violence; and an increase of 7 from local diseases, while the deaths from developmental diseases were 25 for each week.

The deaths (88) reported from zymotic diseases, were the lowest number recorded this year. 56.81 per cent. of the total of this class were from contagious diseases. Membranous croup declined 3; scarlatina, 5; whooping cough 1; typhus fever 1; diarrhœal diseases, 1; typhoid fever, 4; cancer, 3; marasmus and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; while diphtheria increased 3; puerperal diseases, 1; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 15; diseases of the heart, 5; Bright's disease, 6. During the present compared with the preceding week, phthisis pul nonalis caused 83 deaths; pneumonia, 49, and bronchitis, 29, or 37.70 per cent. of the total deaths reported were from these 3 diseases.

Bright's disease caused 22 deaths, diseases of the brain and nervous system 42, puerperal diseases 6, diarrheal diseases 6, cancer 7, disease of the heart 21, marasmus and scrofula 4, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis 5, measles 1, scarlatina 18, diphtheria 26, membranous croup 8, whooping cough 3, malarial fevers 5, cerebo-spinal fever 2. The deaths from the 7 latter diseases were 63, or 14.75 per cent. of the total weekly mortality, of which 43 deaths occurred in houses containing 4 families and more, 18 in houses containing 3 families and less, 1 in a canal boat, and 1 in a hotel or boarding-house. Of the total mortality reported for the week, 218 were in houses containing 4 families and more, 138 in houses containing 3 families and less, 61 in institutions, and 4 in hotels and boarding-houses; 3 deaths were on the basement floor, 105 on the first, 144 on the second, 66 on the third, 22 on the fourth, 2 on the fifth, and 18 on the top. 39 deaths were of persons 70 years old or more, 88 under 1, 144 under 2, and 163 under 5 years. more, 88 under 1, 144 under 2, and 163 under 5 years.

The mean temperature for the week was 29 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.621 inches, the mean humidity was 93, saturation being represented by 100; the total amount of rain-fall was .24 inch, and the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,180.

The mortality for the week ending November 25 is distributed in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 0; Third, 1; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 3; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 16; Eighth, 17; Ninth, 19; Tenth, 17; Eleventh, 23; Twelfth, 31; Thirteenth, 13; Fourteenth, 10; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 19; Seventeenth, 22; Eighteenth, 20; Nineteenth, 65; Twentieth, 25; Twentyfirst, 26; Twenty-second, 43; Twenty-third, 6, and Twenty-fourth, 7.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living of the estimated or enumerated population' according to the most recent returns of Baltimore, was 19.48; Richmond, 12.19; Philadelphia, 18.59; Cleveland, 22.46; Cincinnati, 16.13; Boston, 18.39; Chicago, 22.09; San Francisco, 22.95; London, 28.2; Liverpool, 27.9; Glasgow, 28; Edingburgh, 23; Dublin, 29.7; Belfast, 28; Calcutta, 24.3; Bombay, 24.7; Madras, 31.8; Paris, 31.4; Brussels, 26.7; Amsterdam, 25.2; Rotterdam, 22.9; the Hague, 29.2; Copenhagen, 20.8; Stockholm, 23.1; Christiania, 21; Berlin, 26.2; Breslau, 23.9; Munich, 32.6; Vienna, 23.5; Buda Pesth, 33.6; Rome, 24.5; Naples, 24.2; Turin, 19.8; Alexandria, 46.8.

During the month of November 8 deaths were reported from measles, 71 from scarlatina, 101 from diphtheria, 41 from membranous croup, 22 from whooping cough, 17 from malarial lever, and 12 from cerebro-spinal fever. Of the total 161 were reported in tenement-houses, 98 in houses containing 3 families and less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, and 8 in institutions. The average age of those who died from measles was 6 years 2 months 22 days; scarlatina 3 years 8 months 27 days; diphtheria 4 years 11 months 22 days; membranous croup 3 years 3 months 29 days; whooping cough 1 year 2 months 8 days; malarial fevers 21 years 3 months 22 tlays; cerebro-spinal fever 10 years 7 months years 7 months.
