Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—Section 1085 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 1085. The Board of Education shall, between the first day of August and the thirtieth day of November in each year, make and transmit to the Mayor of The City of New York a report in writing, bearing date on the thirty-first day of July next preceding, stating the whole number of schools within their jurisdiction, especially designating the schools for colored children; the schools or societies from which reports shall have been made to the Board of Education, within the time limited for that purpose; the length of time such school shall have been kept open; the amount of public money apportioned or appropriated to said school or society, the number taught in each school, the whole amount of money drawn from the City Chamberlain for the purposes of public education during the year ending at the date of their report, distinguishing the amount received from the general fund of the State and from all other sources; the manner in which such moneys shall have been expended," etc.

In accordance with the provisions of the foregoing section, the Board of Education has the honor to present its Third Annual Report, showing the operations of the Department of Education for the school year 1899-1900.

### SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

In the report presented by the Board a year ago, attention was called to the great progress made during the year then ending in supplying school accommodations for all children of school age residing in the city. The statements made were justified by the facts, as they appeared at that time. Nevertheless, the work of completing the new school buildings and additions for which contracts had been let has not been so rapid as was hoped and expected; and the same is true as respects contracts awarded in the year now closing.

During the past year nine new school-houses and three additions to old buildings have been completed and opened in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, containing 329 classrooms, and, with an average of 45 pupils to the class, affording 14,895 sittings; one additional building (Eastern District Library building remodeled for high school purposes) and four additions in the Borough of Brooklyn, with 46 classrooms and 2,070 sittings; five new buildings and five additions in the Borough of Queens, with 79 classrooms and 3,165 sittings; and one addition in the Borough of Richmond, containing 2 rooms and seats for 90 pupils. The total number of classrooms provided in the city this year is therefore 456, and the total number of sittings 20,220.

The first contract for a new school building given out after the consolidation of the Greater City was awarded by the Board of Education on the 20th of February, 1899; and between that time and the date of our last annual report, July 31, 1899, contracts were let for eleven other new school-houses and twelve additions. Seven of the additions have been completed and opened.

Unfortunately, the Board of Education has experienced great difficulty in securing the completion of sundry contracts made by the former school authorities prior to consolidation, owing to financial stringency, legal complications, inability of contractors to procure necessary materials and other obstacles, although every effort has been put forth to finish the buildings. Especially has this been the case as respects some half dozen school-houses in the Borough of Queens; but new contracts have been let and there is at present an excellent prospect of their early completion.

The present status of all uncompleted contracts awarded previous to August 1, 1899, is shown in the tabulated statement which follows:

From the foregoing tables it appears that on the completion of work already well under way, the Board of Education will increase the existing accommodations in the city to the extent of 1084 classrooms, with an aggregate of 47,605 sittings. The Board is determined to accomplish this result as speedily as possible.

## SITES.

Lack of funds has been responsible for slowness and delay in the acquisition of sites required for much-needed school buildings. In fact, during the past year not a single site for school purposes has been acquired in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx; and the funds at its disposal have not justified the Board of Education in taking steps toward the acquisition of additional sites in these boroughs, with the single exception of a site on One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Tinton and Union avenues, The Bronx.

As stated in our last report, the Board was constrained in April, 1899, owing to the then existing financial exigencies, to adopt a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to suspend, as far as possible, all proceedings for the acquisition of sites in the boroughs mentioned, in order that all available funds might be used in the erection of buildings on sites already owned by the City. Unfortunately, the Board has not been in a position during the last year to rescind the resolution referred to. The ordinance approved by your Honor on the 9th day of this month authorizes the expenditure of the proceeds of bonds to the amount of \$300,000 for sites in Manhattan and The Bronx; but that sum will go but a very little way toward meeting the needs of the school system in this respect.

The Board of Education is firmly of the opinion that none of the sites selected for school purposes prior to consolidation in the former City of New York ought to be abandoned. Undoubtedly serious hardships have been imposed upon some—perhaps many—of the owners of the property proposed to be taken, and it is the plain duty of the proper authorities to provide means as soon as possible to enable all condemnation proceedings heretofore instituted to be prosecuted to an early conclusion.

In the Borough of Brooklyn title to sixteen sites has been vested in the City in the course of the year, and contracts for erecting new buildings upon eight of them have been awarded. When completed, these buildings will contain 204 classrooms and, with 45 children to the classroom, will provide accommodations for 9,180 pupils. Proceedings have also been instituted for acquiring three additional sites in this borough, and a number of other school sites are in contemplation.

In the Borough of Queens two sites have been secured during the year, one at College Point, adjacent to Public School 27, having been acquired by purchase, and one at Winfield having been conveyed to the City by Hon. F. De Hass Simonson, formerly President of the School Board for the Borough of Queens. On the last-named site a school-house is now in process of erection. Proceedings have been taken for acquiring not less than ten additional sites in Queens, and new buildings for the relief of overcrowded schools will be provided as rapidly as circumstances will permit.

In the Borough of Richmond two sites (one for a new building and one for an addition) have been obtained by purchase, and proceedings for the condemnation of two other needed sites have been commenced and are now well advanced toward completion. In another neighborhood it is proposed to purchase a school site if a reasonable price can be agreed on.

## HALF-DAY CLASSES.

The necessity for additional school accommodations, especially in Manhattan and The Bronx and in Brooklyn, is strikingly indicated by the large number of children unable to obtain the full day's schooling to which they are entitled both in law and equity. The number of children obliged to attend part-time and half-time classes during the year in Manhattan and The Bronx was 15,889, and in Brooklyn 39,410. To keep children in school three hours or four hours per day is, indeed, vastly better than to permit them to roam the streets in idleness or worse; but it is far from creditable to this great and wealthy city that sufficient school-houses are not provided to meet all demands. The educational authorities have been and are more than willing to do their part; it rests with the officials in control of the City's finances to furnish the means for obtaining sites and erecting buildings not only to provide for present necessities but in anticipation of the needs of the future. Of special importance is it to select and reserve sites in sections where the next few years are certain to witness a vast increase of population, as in The Bronx, certain parts of Brooklyn, and the more readily accessible regions in the other outlying boroughs.

We would again call attention to the fact that the construction of new school-houses will cause a substantial reduction in the amount which the City is compelled to pay for premises leased for school purposes. The amount allowed for rents in the Budget for the year 1900 was \$123,745, which represents the interest at 3 per cent. on more than \$4,000,000.

## HIGH SCHOOLS.

A significant feature of the educational development of The City of New York is the great and growing demand for admission to the high schools. In Manhattan and The Bronx the first high schools were established less than three years ago—in the autumn of 1897—but it has been found necessary to provide annexes for all of the schools then established in old and inadequate buildings. Sites for four high school buildings in the boroughs mentioned were acquired by the City in 1898, but thus far the contract for only one building has been let and the necessary bond issue has not yet been approved by the Municipal Assembly. In Brooklyn and the other boroughs high schools have been longer established, but there is pressing need for additional buildings, for some of which sites are in possession of the City or in process of being acquired.

Worthy of special notice is the fact that in the Borough of Brooklyn the pressure on the high schools this year has been so great that 662 pupils were able to secure instruction only in part-time classes, that is, two classes under two teachers occupy the same room, one class attending in the forenoon and the other in the afternoon. Such an arrangement is unfortunate in the case of the boys and girls who are preparing themselves to become teachers in our schools and who should be entitled to the very best advantages in pursuing their high school course.

In this connection attention may properly be called to the requirements of law in the matter of high schools, etc.

Section 1096 of The Greater New York Charter provides that "all training schools and all high schools heretofore established and maintained by the public school authorities and registered as high schools by the regents of the state of New York shall be maintained in full efficiency."

Chapter 1031 of the Laws of 1895, entitled "An act to encourage and to promote the professional training of teachers," provides, in section 4, that "no person shall be employed or licensed to teach in the primary or grammar schools of any city authorized by law to employ a superintendent of schools who has not had successful experience in teaching for at least three years or, in lieu thereof, has not completed a three years' course in and graduated from a high school or academy having a course of study of not less than three years, approved by the state superintendent of public instruction, or from some institution of learning of equal or higher rank, approved by the same authority, and who, subsequently to such graduation, has not graduated from a school or class for the professional training of teachers, having a course of study of not less than thirty-eight weeks, approved by the state superintendent of public instruction."

It is thus evident that no discretion is lodged with the educational authorities as to the maintenance of high schools, which appear to be indispensable in furnishing the teachers required in the public schools of the City, and no further argument is needed in favor of liberal appropriations for necessary buildings for high school purposes in the several boroughs.

## THE NAUTICAL SCHOOL.

There is only one educational institution in the city wholly under the control of the Board of Education, viz., the Nautical School, maintained on the ship "St. Mary's," which is loaned by the United States Government for the purpose. The "St. Mary's" returned from her trans-Atlantic voyage on September 11, 1899, and on October 3 the graduating exercises were held, 43 boys receiving diplomas. During the winter the regular exercises were held, the ship lying, as usual, at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street. In April last the "St. Mary's" proceeded to Glen Cove, L. I., and after a few weeks devoted to practical seamanship in the Sound the annual ocean cruise was begun. Commander W. H. Reeder's itinerary comprises brief visits at the Azores, Lisbon, Gibraltar, Tangiers and Madeira, returning to New York in October.

The appropriation for the support of the Nautical School for the calendar year 1900 is \$31,810.

## TRAINING SCHOOLS FOR TEACHERS.

By the provisions of section 1086 of the Charter, Training Schools for Teachers, while established and maintained by the School Boards, are placed "under the control of the board of education and of the city superintendent of schools in the extent that may be necessary to secure compliance with chapter 1031 of the Laws of 1895," and by the By-laws of the Board of Education the City Superintendent of Schools has supervision over the admission of pupil teachers to training schools and over their graduation therefrom.

There is a Training School in the Borough of Manhattan and one in the Borough of Brooklyn. Statistics regarding them for the year are presented in the table below:

## TEACHERS' RETIREMENT FUND.

According to section 1083 of the Charter, the Public School Teachers' Retirement Fund is administered by the Board of Education. Said fund is applicable to the entire city, except the Borough of Brooklyn, the School Board of which has full care and management of the Retirement Fund created for the former City of Brooklyn by chapter 656 of the Laws of 1895. No teachers have yet been retired in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond.

Under chapter 91 of the Laws of 1898 five per cent. of the excise moneys or license fees belonging to The City of New York is paid into the Teachers' Retirement Fund. Said amount is by the provisions of the chapter last named to be apportioned by the Board of Education among the several boroughs of the city in proportion to the number of teachers actually employed and the amount of salaries paid to them in each of said boroughs. The apportionment thus required has not yet been made, owing to doubt as to proper construction of the statute relating thereto.

## THE DAVIS LAW.

One of the most important events of the year as respects the administration of the Department of Education was the enactment of Chapter 751 of the Laws of 1900, commonly known as the Davis Law. This act authorized the Board of Education to adopt by-laws providing for uniform schedules of salaries for all members of the supervising and the teaching force throughout the city; fixed the minimum rates to be paid to teachers in elementary, high and training schools at various stages of experience, and provided for the ascertainment of the fitness and merit of teachers at specified intervals of time. It provided also that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall appropriate annually, for the General School Fund (comprising all moneys raised for the salaries of Borough and Associate Superintendents and all members of the supervising and teaching staff), "an amount equivalent to not less than four mills on every dollar of assessed valuation of the real and personal estate in The City of New York liable to taxation, inclusive of so much of the State school moneys apportioned by the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the payment of teachers' wages as is actually paid into the said general school fund."

Furthermore, the Davis Law made a very radical change in the charter by providing as follows (the words underscored being added to the former provisions of law): "The Board of Education shall have power to take and receive, and shall take and receive, all moneys appropriated or available for educational purposes in The City of New York, which moneys shall be paid over to said Board by the Comptroller on the request of said Board from time to time in



such sums as shall be required, and the Auditor of said Board shall transmit to the Department of Finance each month duplicate vouchers for the payment of all sums of money made on account of the Department of Education each month."

As is well known to your Honor, the Department of Education was opposed to the enactment of the Davis Bill, and made its position very clear both at the hearing on the measure held in the Mayor's Office and before the Governor, as well as during the pendency of the bill in the Legislature. In spite of the opposition of the men so intimately associated with the school system, and thus in a position to judge of the necessities of the Department, the Governor, on the 3d of May, signed the act, which threw a very serious burden upon the Board of Education, making it responsible for the handling and paying out of moneys amounting to nearly twenty millions of dollars annually.

To meet the emergency thus forced upon it the Board took prompt and effective action. It was necessary to organize a financial department in the briefest possible time, in order that contractors and other claimants, as well as teachers, officers and employees might not be embarrassed by failing to receive the moneys due them.

The act is now mentioned became a law, as noted above, on the 3d day of May. On the 12th day of May the Board elected a treasurer and took steps to organize the necessary disbursing bureau. The Comptroller and Municipal Civil Service Commission co-operated heartily with the Board of Education. The financial machinery was promptly put into operation and the salaries of teachers in Manhattan and The Bronx and Brooklyn for the month of April (those for Queens and Richmond having been paid prior to May 3d) were paid on May 23; all teachers' salaries for the month of May on June 15, and all teachers' salaries for June and July on June 28. Payments of other claims have been made as promptly as possible, notwithstanding the fact that all unpaid claims in the Finance Department on May 3 were returned to the Board of Education, and despite the additional work of preparing duplicates of all vouchers which are required by the Davis Law to be filed with the Comptroller.

It is confidently believed that the new system, which at the date of this report is working regularly and with little friction, will result in the payment of salaries and the liquidation of claims of all kinds more promptly than ever before.

#### NEW HALL OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Honor will note that this report is forwarded to you from the new Hall of the Board of Education on the southwest corner of Park Avenue and Fifty-ninth street. We take pride in recording the completion of a new and handsome building to replace the very inconvenient and inadequate headquarters so long occupied by the Educational Department at the corner of Grand and Elm streets. The old hall served a useful purpose and had a most honorable career extending over sixty years. It was erected by the Public School Society in 1839-40 and passed into the control of the Board of Education on the absorption by the Board of the Public School Society in 1853. The need of a larger and more modern building became apparent a dozen or fifteen years ago, and means for the erection of such a building were provided by chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889. The site on which the new hall stands was purchased in 1890 for \$130,000. The plans for the building were obtained as the result of a competition held in 1892, after which a long delay occurred owing to lack of funds. The contract for erecting the building was awarded on October 20, 1897, in the sum of \$244,900, and in July, 1899, a contract for the completion of the building, etc., was awarded in the sum of \$153,302.50. The old building was abandoned in February last, and on the 22d of that month the formal opening of the new hall took place in the commodious assembly room, on which occasion addresses were delivered by the Hon. William T. Harris, United States Commissioner of Education; Hon. Charles R. Skinner, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; Hon. Charles H. Knox, a former President of the Board of Education, and City Superintendent William H. Maxwell. The building was transferred to the Board of Education by Hon. Richard H. Adams, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings, and accepted on behalf of the Board by President Joseph J. Little. It was accepted on behalf of the City by the Hon. Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council.

#### BOROUGH SCHOOL BOARD REPORTS.

Under the provision of section 1701 of the Charter each School Board is required to make an annual report to the Board of Education "of such matters as the Board of Education may, by its laws or regulations, require."

In conformity with this section the Board of Education on October 26, 1898, adopted a by-law (section 72, subdivision 6) providing as follows:

"6. Each School Board shall, on or before the thirty-first day of July in each year, make and transmit to the Board of Education an annual report stating the whole number of schools within its jurisdiction during the school year then ending, specially designating the schools for colored children; the number of teachers, the number of pupils registered in each school and the average attendance; the number of high schools and of training schools for teachers, with the number of teachers, the total register and average attendance at each and the number graduated therefrom; the number of evening schools, with the register of pupils and average attendance, specially designating the evening high schools; the schools registered with the Regents of the University of the State of New York; the number of centres at which free lectures for workmen and workwomen were given, the number of such lectures and the total attendance at the same; the corporate schools from which reports have been made to the Board of Education through the School Board, the number of teachers and the attendance at each such school and the amount of money distributed to each; the amount of the General School Fund apportioned for use within the jurisdiction of the School Board, and the manner in which it was expended; and such recommendations, especially in respect to new school buildings and sites, as the School Board may see fit to make."

The information required by the terms of this by-law has been supplied by the several School Boards, the reports of which will be found after the financial statement and the schedules relating to buildings and sites attached to and made a part of this report.

In respect to new school buildings and sites this Board recommends that the proper authorities be requested to appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars for the erection of a high school building upon the site acquired for that purpose at Wall and Jay streets, St. George, and in which it is proposed to consolidate the present three high school departments now located in Public Schools 1, 14 and 20. No appropriation for new sites will be needed for the ensuing year.
