MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held Tuesday, September 22, 1903, at 9:45 a. m.

Present—Commissioners Charlton, Eaton and McKenna, Commissioner Eaton acting as Chairman.

Upon motion, the reading of minutes of meeting held September 21 was dispensed with.

The Commission discussed the matter of a public hearing to be given on the proposed regulations governing the storage, sale, use, etc., of volatile and inflammable oils, as embodied in Part VII. of the regulations of this Commission, and it was decided that the date for said public hearing be not determined until after the Commission has had further opportunity of inquiring into the legal status of certain features that have been suggested.

The Acting Chairman reported that he had given further careful consideration to certain suggestions relative to inflammable and combustible substances, as to the section or chapter in which they should be embodied, and it was his opinion they should be included under Part VII., and not in the miscellaneous section, in which opinion the Commission concurred.

The subject of proposed regulations governing acetylene and compressed gases was considered and discussed at considerable length.

Commissioner McKenna reported with respect to tentative form of regulations which he had prepared, treating of chemical manufactories and technical establishments.

Upon motion, the Commission adjourned until Wednesday, September 23.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held Wednesday, September 23, 1903, at 9:45 a. m.

Present—Commissioners Charlton, Eaton and McKenna, Commissioner Eaton acting as Chairman.

Minutes of meetings held September 21 and 22 were read and approved.

Commissioner McKenna brought to the attention of the Commission the manner in which a certain brand of matches for household use is placed on the market without compliance with the match regulations. After discussion, the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That the Fire Commissioner be informed that a certain licensed match is found on the market in this City, which is distributed in boxes containing more than 500 matches, and the box is weak, flimsy, easily bent, easily broken, the matches easily spilled therefrom without opening, and the whole is not in accord with regulations of Part IX., paragraph 2, section (b); and that the sample thus found be forwarded to the Fire Commissioner.

The Commission took up for consideration the tentative report submitted by Commissioner McKenna, embodying regulations for chemical manufactories and technical establishments, and, after discussion, several new paragraphs were added.

Upon motion, the Commission adjourned until Wednesday, the 30th instant.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held on Wednesday, September 30, 1903, at 4 p. m.

Present—Fire Commissioner Thomas Sturgis and Commissioners Charlton, Eaton and McKenna, the Fire Commissioner presiding.

Upon motion the reading of the minutes of meeting held September 23 was dispensed with.

Communication was read from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment relative to hearings on departmental estimates for the year 1904 before that body. The Chairman stated that proper action would be taken in the matter, and the communication was ordered on file.

The matter of non-compliance with regulations governing the sale of matches by certain manufacturers and the matter of the application or request of Messrs. Dodge and Olcott for a supplementary permit to carry large stocks of certain drugs in excess of the maximum amounts prescribed in the drug regulations were considered, and the Inspector of Combustibles appeared before the Commission in regard to both matters. He stated that he had notified the manufacturer of the particular brand of matches under consideration that if the boxes containing the matches were not in conformity with the regulations on and after October 1, 1903, steps would be taken to revoke their license. He added that this concession had been extended to certain manufacturers in order to allow them to dispose of certain stocks of matches which they had on hand at the time the match regulations went into effect. After discussion of the subject the Inspector of Combustibles was requested to make an investigation and to advise the Fire Commissioner, for his action, of such manufacturers who were not complying with the match regulations.

With regard to the request of Messrs. Dodge and Olcott for a supplementary permit, the Inspector of Combustibles stated they had not made any application, but since his attention had been called to the matter he had sent them the necessary blanks, but up to the present they had not been returned. The Inspector was requested to have one of his force call upon the firm named and ascertain their wishes in the matter.

Communication was received from the City Solicitor of the City of Cleveland, Ohio, acknowledging receipt of copies of regulations recently forwarded. Filed.

Report was read from Commissioner Haskell concerning the methods of handling, storage and sale of gasoline and similar products in France, and was ordered on file.

Commissioner Eaton brought up the question as to the mode of procedure to be followed in the public hearings to be given the different interests affected by the proposed regulations as embodied in Part VII. After discussion Commissioner Eaton was appointed a committee of one to hold preliminary conference with the representative of the Board of Fire Underwriters.

The Commission resumed further consideration of the tentative regulations dealing with chemical manufactories and technical establishments, as prepared by Commissioner McKenna. The method of establishing minimum and maximum amounts, and provisions for supplementary permits for amounts in excess of the standard maximum, were discussed, and the matter referred back to Commissioner McKenna for further report.

Upon motion the Commission adjourned till October 6, 1903.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, September 22, 1903, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis.

Minutes of meetings of September 8, 10 and 15, 1903, were read and approved. The Construction or Executive Committee referred to the Commissioners Report No. 715 of the Acting Chief Engineer, dated August 31, 1903, together with a letter of Professor William H. Burr thereon, dated September 3, 1903, relating to a change in the character of the masonry to be used in the construction of the New Croton Dam at the southerly end thereof, and recommended that it was advisable that said change be authorized.

Which was received and ordered filed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the form of letter reported by the Construction or Executive Committee for transmission to the Corporation Counsel asking his opinion as to what would be the status of the operations for the work of building the Muscoot Dam if the Commissioners allow the contractors to proceed after the first of November without granting to them any formal extension of time, be approved and ordered transmitted by the President.

The President verbally reported that on September 18, 1903, he had transmitted to the Mayor the following report in regard to the work on the New Croton Dam and Jerome Park Reservoir for the week ending September 10, 1903.

NEW YORK, September 15, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam and Jerome Park Reservoir Divisions for the week ending Thursday, September 10, 1903, I would report as follows:

NEW CROTON DAM DIVISION.

Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, Contractors.

The river flow has been moderate during the week.

Dam—Rock excavation for the extension foundation has continued with a small force on the bottom work between Station 2-1-75 and Station 3-1-50, which work is nearly completed from the core wall line to the downstream toe. From Station 2-1-75 toward Gate House No. 1, rock excavation is in progress over most of the area, and particularly south of Station 1-1-75.

Some earth excavation on the berms located for supply tracks has been done. Sheet work in connection with the deep excavation on the upstream side at Station 3-1-50 continues, with better progress than was reported last week.

Masonry work has continued with three gangs on the main dam and spillway or overflow.

1 gang on main dam extending top above Elevation 206.

1 gang on Gate House No. 2.

One gang on overflow.

The steam shovel has stopped work, as the sinking now in progress in the main cut does not afford it good working room, and additional derricks have been placed to move the excavated rock material. This rock at the south end of the cut shows some improvement in quality as compared with that which lay at a higher elevation, but the granular seams continue to show in the bottom.

The coring machine has started on the second hole, and has reached a depth of about 18 feet in the rock. This hole is at Station 8-1-40.

On Friday, September 4, pursuant to an engagement previously made, I met Professor Kemp, Geologist, and Professor Burr, Consulting Engineer, at the New Croton Dam excavation for the extension, for the purpose of deciding the question as to whether the bottom was in proper condition to begin the construction of the masonry. We found after consultation that over an area of about 20 per cent., with a slight cleaning up of the sand and some loose portions of rock on the westerly edge near the Main Dam, together with inferior rock beneath the south end of the core wall, the excavation is properly in condition to proceed with the construction. Orders were given to take out rock that was in the opinion of the Geologist and ourselves necessary to be taken out, just south of the section referred to above, and the work of construction will be proceeded with at once.

Reconstruction of Old Aqueduct—Concrete work is in progress at Purdy's brook and McCord's loop; refilling at Spring brook loop; excavation at New Croton Gate House inlets, at Bailey's brook and McCord's loop, and over the arch at stations

for Gate House No. 7, earth; excavation for aqueduct division wall, 35 20—36 80, rock; excavation for face wall, trench 55 50—56 25.

Masonry—In aqueduct division wall, 10 80—11 70 and 33 80—34 20, brick and rubble; in face wall, 48 50—48 75 and 54 75—55 25, rubble; in shaft No. 21 Connection, rubble and granite in piers; in wall along purchase line, east Gate House No. 2, no work; in wall along purchase line at Sedgwick avenue, no work; pointing back of face wall, south of Gate House No. 3, in places, for 250 feet.

AFTER RECESS.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis. The committee appointed July 14, 1903, to select and recommend a candidate for Chief Engineer reported the following minute to be entered upon the records, according to the terms of the resolution accepting the resignation of Mr. William R. Hill as Chief Engineer of the Commissioners.

William R. Hill was appointed Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commissioners December 26, 1899, to succeed Alphonse Fteley, who had resigned on account of ill health, and the appointment took effect January 1, 1900. He resigned the position of Chief Engineer and Superintendent of the Syracuse Water Works in order to accept this place.

Mr. Hill from the first day worked with great application and energy. Although frequently warned that the hard work was undermining his health, he continued to give the strictest attention to his duties until April 15, 1902, when he was taken ill and for a time his life hung in the balance. He resumed his work much sooner than advised to do by his physician. Although about this time he was subjected to severe criticism, which added greatly to his burdens, he courageously continued his work.

In June, 1903, his health again failed, and he was granted a leave of absence for two weeks. His rest proved of no benefit to him, and therefore at the insistence of his family and physician he presented his resignation.

Shortly after the beginning of Mr. Hill's term he recommended certain changes in the plan of the new Croton Dam, which necessitated the taking down of a large part of the core wall and embankment at the south end of that portion of the dam already constructed and replacing it by a masonry structure similar to the main stone dam. His grounds for this recommendation were the alleged general insecurity of this structure for the purposes intended, and evidenced, among other things, by certain small cracks which he had observed in this core wall. The work was stopped on that portion of the dam, and a commission of expert engineers appointed by the Aqueduct Commissioners approved this recommendation after several months of investigation. This approval was also concurred in by Prof. W. H. Burr and Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who had been asked by the Mayor subsequently to examine the suggestion and report thereon. The removal of this core wall was partially completed in March of this year, and revealed the fact that it was erected upon an insecure foundation, thus confirming the necessity of such removal. It was fortunate that Mr. Hill discovered this condition, otherwise a great catastrophe might have been precipitated upon the community hereafter.

The records of the Aqueduct Commissioners will show the other recommendations of modifications which have been made by Mr. Hill in the plans as originally prepared for the construction of the new Croton Dam and the Jerome Park Reservoir, which required both courage and engineering skill.

The Commissioners, in spreading this statement upon the minutes, desire to express their high appreciation of the services rendered by Mr. Hill to The City of New York and to the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The Committee on Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of estimate contained in voucher No. 15,437, amounting to \$6,688.36 which was approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

NEW CROTON DAM DIVISION.

A considerable increase in the river flow occurred, owing to heavy showers on the 16th and 17th of September.

Dam—On rock excavation work a small force continued cleaning up the bottom immediately south of the main dam until flooded out by the rains above noted. A considerable amount of rock has been excavated in sinking to a well-defined bed seam between Stations 2 and 2+75±, and south of Station 2+00 sinking in the rock bottom has continued, developing some indications of improvement in the character of the rock in places. Further work has been done also in trimming the rock slope below Gate House No. 1. This work has been done with the aid of cables and derricks.

Earth excavation has continued on the track berms and in the pit on the upstream side near the junction of the main dam and core wall. The sheeting work has continued in preparation for the necessary deep excavation at this point.

Masonry work has continued with three gangs on the main dam, Gate House No. 2, and the adjoining spillway or overflow.

Parts of two days have been lost owing to rain.

Reconstruction of Old Aqueduct—This work has continued with a somewhat increased number of men over last week's report, and concrete work is in progress at Purdys brook, McCords and Baileys brook loops, and the work of stripping the aqueduct continues at numerous places between Station 25± and the New Croton Dam and on the section adjoining the Old Croton Dam. Riprap and embankment work also continue.

Road Lines, Etc.—On Road Line No. 6 a start has been made on excavating for the foundations of the 50-foot arch culvert. On Road Line No. 16 fencing work has continued, and on Road Line No. 18 concrete work on the foundations of Abutment No. 2 progressed.

A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated September 8, 1903, stating that the Comptroller's certificate had been indorsed upon the contract executed by the Aqueduct Commissioners with John Fox & Co., on August 19, 1903, for sluice gates at the new Gate House at the old Croton Dam.

CROTON-ON-HUDSON, N. Y., September 17, 1903.

To the Honorable Aqueduct Commissioners:

DEAR SIR—Your Mr. Cook, Acting Chief Engineer, has, on behalf of your Board, suggested that in the construction of the extension to the New Croton Dam, concrete 1-2-4, such as referred to in Clause O, item (ii), and dry rubble masonry, as referred to in same clause, item (i), using 50 per cent. of the first and 50 per cent. of the second, should be used instead of rubble masonry, as provided for by item (kkk). He represents that we will be able to work night and day, which could not be done properly using rubble masonry as heretofore.

The work will be expedited, he believes, and a more monolithic, impervious dam and stronger structure secured.

Acceding to the suggestion made, we are willing to do this work as suggested, and if allowed to do it, agree to accept payment therefor at the prices named in our amended contract of 1902, Clause O, items (ii) and (i), and to make no further claim because of the change from the rubble stone masonry, item (kkk).

Hill, Jr., Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated September 17, 1903, in relation to the loan to said Department of a 48-inch sleeve at the Jerome Park Pumping Station, and stating that he would deliver a similar casting in repayment if the Commissioners would state where they desired such delivery to be made.

Resolved, That, for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, of the State of New York, and the acts amendatory thereof, we, the Aqueduct Commissioners, appointed to carry out the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, and as amended by chapter 196 of the Laws of 1887, do hereby certify that the adoption of these maps is made necessary in pursuance of an order of the Supreme Court, dated December 29, 1899, and amended January 6, 1900, showing the real estate owned or to be acquired by The City of New York, which it is proposed to substitute in place of other real estate now used for highway purposes, prepared in accordance with the requirements of said acts, and do hereby certify that the same has been adopted by us in the manner prescribed in said acts, and direct that the same be duly certified and filed and designated as Final Plan Sheet, Exhibit No. 7 of 1903, and that a copy thereof be certified and transmitted to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for filing in his office, as required by section 25 of the aforesaid act.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication dated September 23, 1903, has submitted six similar maps, described as Exhibit No. 8 of 1903, showing the necessary right of way to be acquired for Road 26½, in the Town of Bedford, Westchester County, New York, the condemnation of which land is made necessary by an order of the Supreme Court, dated December 29, 1899, and amended January 6, 1900, new highways in the environs of the new Croton Reservoir; therefore be it

Resolved, That the six similar maps received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, described as Exhibit No. 8 of 1903, showing the necessary right of way to be acquired for Road No. 26½, in the Town of Bedford, Westchester County, New York, the condemnation of which land is made necessary by an order of the Supreme Court, dated December 29, 1899, and amended January 6, 1900, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted and directed to be certified to the Corporation Counsel for filing and delivery to the Commissioners of Appraisal in accordance with the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York, and the acts amendatory thereof, and the Corporation Counsel is hereby requested to take the steps necessary to acquire for the City, under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York, the fee in perpetuity in the lands described on said maps and designated thereon, and the Secretary is hereby directed to furnish to the Corporation Counsel all maps, plans, etc., which he may require in the premises.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel dated September 22, 1903, acknowledging receipt of two communications of the 18th inst., transmitting for his approval the following blank forms of contract, etc.:

For furnishing, delivering, erecting and placing stop cock valves, special castings and ladders for the Jerome Park Reservoir.

For furnishing, delivering, erecting and placing sluice gates and drain valves, with the necessary lifting machinery, ladders, etc., required at the Jerome Park Reservoir, and stating that said contracts had been approved as to form.

Sir—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending June 30, 1903:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1903, the number of the Force of all grades (including those on probation) was 7,816.

Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 20,100 days, the sick time paid was 10,050 days, and the sick time unpaid was 10,050 days. Total days' time of the Force was 708,600. Per cent. of sick to full time 2.84, and for preceding quarter 3.92.

Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 40,061; females, 8,905; total, 48,966. Number arrested for principal felonies, 3,785; number discharged without trial, 1,620; number acquitted, 462; number convicted, 551; number sent to other authorities, 47; number died, 12; number pending, 1,093.

Lost Children.

Males, 781; females, 359; total, 1,140. Restored to parents or guardians, 1,110; other dispositions, 30. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 389.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made from the daily returns from the station houses, and the Felony Report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station house, at the time of arrest, is liable to be and often is changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

The steel structure of the carriageways has been extended in width to the northward and southerly boundary lines, respectively, of Bridge property, for a distance of about 300 feet each side; new tracks laid and the carriageways repaved; new interior galleries for the use of passengers to and from the bridge railway constructed and opened for service; the old side galleries removed, and the side walls of station building altered to permit the entrance of surface cars.

It is expected that the new loops will be ready for service at an early date.

Repairs and Betterments.

The routine maintenance, inspection and repair of the bridge structure, its approaches and terminal stations have been maintained daily during the quarter, and in addition, progress has been made in the work of reinforcing the lower chords in the cantilever portion of the outer and intermediate stiffening trusses on the river span. The roadways on the bridge have been replanked with 2½-inch by 10-inch spruce plank, and about 900 linear feet of extra fender guards or wearing plates have been laid on wheel guards of north and south roadways, Manhattan terminal. A new engine and generator have been erected in the bridge power house for the purpose of improving the lighting system on the bridge. The Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company have kept a force of trackmen at work on the repairs and renewals needed on the bridge railway tracks and surface car tracks.

A regular daily inspection of the structure, tracks and car equipment has been carefully maintained.

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.

Cables—Although the cables were practically completed at the end of the preceding quarter, there remained a little work to be done in connection with the repair of Cables A and B at the Manhattan tower. This work was completed early in July, and the contractor's plant and everything cleared away before the 25th of that month.

Brooklyn Approach—The work on the Brooklyn approach is completed, except putting in place bronze railings and a few small items awaiting completion of work on other contracts.

Manhattan Approach—The work on this approach is nearing completion. There still remains a small portion of riveting on the buckle plate flooring of the steel approach, and the application of a portion of the field coats of paint. The steel anchorage flooring is already in place and partly riveted. The riveting of this work is rapidly approaching completion, and will be followed by the painting and laying of brick arches, etc., to complete the flooring.

Suspended Structure—The riveting on the suspended structure is nearing completion; there still remain some bottom and top chord splices of the north truss and some of the diagonal web members to rivet, and a few top chord splices and some diagonal web members of the south truss. The painting of first and second field coats has followed very closely the completion of the riveting and is now at least 50 per cent completed.

The work on the suspended structure has been very much delayed on account of the large amount of reaming that was necessary to do in the bottom chord splices. In view of the difficult riveting on portions of this work, I think that the progress has been very satisfactory.

Brooklyn Anchorage—The contract for the Brooklyn anchorage is completed.

Manhattan Anchorage—The work on the Manhattan anchorage is completed and contractor's plant entirely removed, except the boiler house, the contents of which have been removed and the building is being torn down.

Main Towers and End Spans—The members of the end spans left out for cable building have been put in place and the riveting and painting of same nearly completed.

The repainting of the main towers and end spans, the work of which was begun by the Department Painters early in August, has progressed satisfactorily, considering the number of men employed and the amount of scraping to be done in order to put the work in proper condition to receive the first coat of paint.

The Brooklyn tower has received the priming coat and two final coats of paint from the top to the roadway level.

The roadways of both end spans and the footwalks of the Manhattan end span have been scraped and given the first coat of red lead.

Brooklyn Plaza—The removal of buildings on the Brooklyn Plaza property, contracts for which were let in July and August, has been completed, except three buildings partly removed, and one building the removal of which has not been commenced.

A number of the cellars have been filled with good material by responsible parties, who have been granted the privilege, and this work continues.

Steel Under-floorings and Creo-Resinate Wood Block Pavement for Roadways—The contracts for this work were let on June 8, and the contractor for the steel under-flooring notified to begin work July 15, and the contractor for the wood block pavement was notified July 30 to begin work.

The first material for the steel under-flooring was shipped from the mills to the enameling works on August 20, and the first finished material was delivered at the bridge on September 10. The contractor in the meanwhile had assembled his plant at the bridge site and had cut loose the seven-inch roadway channels ready for shimming up to required slope. Since the 10th of September about 600 tons of finished material have been delivered and assembled in place on the bridge, extending from the Brooklyn anchorage on the south roadway to a point near the Manhattan tower. The shims have been placed under the seven-inch channels over a large portion of the roadways.

The contractor furnishing the creo-resinate wood blocks has a large quantity treated and expects to ship very soon.

Kosmocrete Sidewalks and Asphalt Paving Under the Manhattan Approach—This contract was awarded July 22 and the contractor notified to begin work July 30. Work was begun on August 5 and good progress has been made since. The Kosmocrete sidewalks and curbs have been completed to within about three blocks of the anchorage, and the concrete base for the asphalt roadway south of the bridge is laid between Ridge and Columbia streets. The concrete base for the interior paving in the Pitt-Willett street block is completed. Sewer catch basins have been built, and fire hydrants, lampposts, etc., have been shifted. No asphalt paving has been laid as yet, and probably will not be until the concrete base is completed, so that this work can be carried uninterruptedly to completion.

Roadway Pavement, etc., on the Approaches and Anchorages—The contract for this work was awarded on the 14th of August. The contract was not approved until the 8th of September, but work was begun in August and good progress has been made since.

The concrete base for the roadway paving has been completed on the Brooklyn approach from Bedford avenue to the anchorage. The excavation to subgrade has been completed for the roadways over the masonry approach, but the rolling has not been done and the concrete base has not been laid. A considerable quantity of Medina sandstone blocks has been delivered, but none of the blocks have been laid.

On the Manhattan approach the excavation to subgrade and rolling have been completed over the masonry approach, the concrete base for roadway paving laid on the

north roadway, and a little paving has been done. The concreting on both roadways of the steel approach has been completed from Ridge street to Sheriff street, but no paving has been laid. Two shipments of Medina sandstone paving blocks have been received.

Concreting in Anchor Chain Tunnels, etc.—The contract for this work was awarded in September, and the contractor notified to begin work on September 28.

No work has been done as yet on this contract, but a plant at the Brooklyn anchorage is partly completed, and some material for the permanent work has been delivered.

At the Manhattan anchorage the contractor has made arrangements to use derricks of the Pennsylvania Steel Company already in place on the elevated structure, but no other plant or material for the permanent work has been delivered.

No. 3—Manhattan Bridge.

Plans—During the quarter the stress sheets have been completed and are being checked. The plans for the anchorages have been also worked up, and additional plans made for the foundations and concrete cores, with a view to letting this part of the work separately.

Caisson—The work of construction has progressed favorably. The caisson for the Manhattan tower foundation has been completed, and the work of sinking same at foot of Pike slip, begun in August, 1903. The caisson is resting level upon the bed of the river, at a depth of 41, and the discrepancy of location in any direction is about an inch. The work of excavating under air pressure has commenced, and will progress rapidly as soon as the rip-rap from the old docks occupying the site has been removed.

Pedestal—The pedestal on the Brooklyn tower foundation has been completed, and the top is being dressed to the proper elevation and surface required. The completion of this contract will enable the contractor to remove the cofferdam and temporary dock used in the construction of the foundation, and to dredge the bed of the river to its original depth at that point.

Contracts—For lack of funds the contracts for the anchorages and steel superstructure have been delayed, but the plans and specifications are in such shape that but little time will be required when the money becomes available before inviting bids on those portions of the work.

Real Estate—The property of the Brooklyn Brass and Copper Company, occupying the site of the Brooklyn anchorage, has been purchased for \$680,000, but title has not yet been closed.

The property at No. 191 Cherry street, Manhattan, has been purchased for \$23,000, and title closed August 10, 1903.

The property at No. 74 Monroe street was purchased for \$32,750, and title closed September 10, 1903.

On September 2 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the purchase of the property of Dodge & Alcott, on Adams street, Brooklyn, for \$180,000, and the property of the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company, on Pike slip, Manhattan, for \$625,000, titles to both parcels to close December 1, 1903.

The Board also authorized on September 9 the purchase of No. 196 Cherry street, Manhattan, for \$13,000.

On August 1, 1903, Mr. F. M. Sylvester, Assistant Engineer in charge of foundations, resigned, and Mr. J. A. Knighton was assigned to succeed him. Mr. A. I. Perry, Assistant Engineer, was assigned to assist Mr. Knighton.

No. 4—Blackwell's Island Bridge.

Plans—The plans for the steel superstructure were completed July 18 and proposals invited August 10. On September 24 one bid was received, that of the Pennsylvania Steel Company, which was rejected as unfavorable. Some modifications are being made in the contract and specifications, and the work will be readvertised in the near future.

Arbitration—On account of changes in the plans for the substructure, the contractors, Messrs. Ryan & Parker, presented a claim for extras amounting to about \$138,000; and as no agreement could be reached the matter was submitted on June 5, 1903, to a board of arbitrators, comprising Messrs. S. Whinery and John F. O'Rourke. The findings of the Board were embodied in a supplemental agreement (No. 5), by which the contractors will obtain an extra allowance of \$92,601, and the time of completion extended to March 1, 1904.

Construction—The work of construction has progressed steadily on the four main piers, and Piers 2 and 4 have been completed. Piers 1 and 3 are progressing favorably. The work on the two anchor piers was stopped during the arbitration of the contractors' claim, but was resumed promptly on the acceptance of the award by the two parties, and is progressing favorably.

Borings—Wash borings have been made along the line of the Queens approach at a cost of \$3,106.40, and the results have been plotted for reference.

Bridges over the Harlem River and in the Borough of Manhattan.

No. 1—Willis Avenue.

Construction—An appropriation of \$100,000 for the construction of the Southern Boulevard approach was approved by the Mayor September 14, 1903. The land necessary for this approach is now being acquired. Plans have been prepared, and work may be begun as soon as the City is in possession of the property.

No. 4—Madison Avenue.

An appropriation of \$150,000 for beginning work on a bridge to replace Madison Avenue Bridge (No. 4) was approved by the Mayor September 14, 1903. A general plan, including a temporary bridge to accommodate travel while the new bridge is building, has been prepared and submitted informally to the War Department for approval. Permission to erect a low level temporary bridge has been refused, and the possibility of a structure with 24 feet clear head room is now under consideration.

No. 5—One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge.

This bridge is in practically the same condition as during the previous quarter, except that material for the draw span has been delivered and erection begun.

No. 9—Fordham Heights.

An appropriation of \$250,000 for beginning the construction of a bridge at Fordham Heights was approved by the Mayor August 26, 1903. Plans and specifications for a pivot-pier and the necessary dredging and fender are practically completed, and

bids for the work will be invited during October. One of the conditions on which a permit to erect Bridge No. 9 was granted by the Secretary of War is that a considerable amount of dredging—probably in excess of 30,000 cubic yards—shall be done by the City, to make the channel on the west side of the pivot-pier navigable. This work has been included in the plans and specifications mentioned above.

Maintenance.

The usual annual contract for supplying the bridges with coal was not let, on account of the disturbance in the market, until June 8 of this year, since which time all coal has been bought at the contract price of \$5.70 per ton. The coal is inspected and weighed at the yard Wednesday morning of each week, from 6 to 8 o'clock, and delivered at the bridges before 10 o'clock, the hour of opening for navigation.

A contract for repairs to asphalt roadways was entered into with the Barber Asphalt Paving Company July 6, 1903. Under it, repairs have been made as follows:

Further repairs will be necessary, notably to Third Avenue Bridge (No. 3) before the close of the year.

The railings of No. 6, Macomb's Dam Bridge, and the balustrades of No. 8, Washington Bridge, have been painted, and considerable painting has been done in The Bronx by the Harlem river men.

The painting force has recently been increased to fifteen men, and if this number can be employed next year a considerable amount of necessary work can be done.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

No. 2—Westchester Bridge.

Bridges Projected or Under Construction—This work has been delayed by its practical abandonment by the contractor. The unfinished sections have been taken in hand by one of the bondsmen on the contract and the job will shortly be completed. During the quarter the bridge has been painted, the machinery and electric equipment installed, the counterweight put in place and grouted, the double deck of creosoted timber covered with planks was laid, and the embankment approach at the east end was brought to grade. The amount of work yet to be done is small.

No. 4—New Pelham Bridge.

The plans of the foundations, piers, abutments and arches were prepared and a form of contract and specifications was drawn. Proposals were asked for this work on September 24 last, but only two bids were received, both of which were rejected because excessive.

No. 1—One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge.

Maintenance and Repairs—No repairs were required during the quarter. The bridge is working smoothly, and the traffic across it has been somewhat reduced during the last few weeks on account of the opening of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to travel.

No. 2-T—Westchester Avenue (Temporary) Bridge.

The roadways of the approaches were repaired, but on the east approach the pavement is poor. The difficulty of obtaining broken stone and the high price of this material have held back work of resurfacing. The upper deck or wearing surface on the draw span and the trestle approaches was renewed.

No. 3—Unionport Bridge.

The trusses of both draw span and fixed spans were strengthened by the introduction of vertical struts in the web system and by the addition of sway bracing. The bridge has received one coat of paint.

No. 4-T—Pelham Bridge.

The repairs to the draw span were finished early in the quarter. On the causeway approaches the sidewalk was replanked and the east retaining wall was repaired.

No. 5—City Island Bridge.

The end lifts were adjusted and a few small repairs were made. Arrangements were made with the Department of Parks for resurfacing the roadway of the west approach, but the work has not yet been started on account of continued activity of the Park Department in building roads in Pelham Bay Park. A gang of painters from the Harlem river division is at work on the railing of the west approach.

No. 6—Eastchester Bridge.

No repairs were necessary, but the deck will be renewed during the coming quarter.

No. 11—Farmers' Bridge.

Travel over this structure was resumed in August, after over a year's interruption due to the building of the Broadway trunk sewer. Repairs will be made at once to the retaining walls of the causeway approach. The road leading to the bridge from the Manhattan side is in bad order, and on this account vehicular travel is in a great measure deflected to the Broadway Bridge.

No. 13—Kingsbridge.

This old structure was maintained in good order, but as traffic was light it required small attention.

Bridges Over Newtown Creek and in the Borough of Queens.

No. 1—Vernon Avenue Bridge.

Construction—The foundation walls of the south approach have been concreted and are ready for limestone. The south abutment piling and the grillage at its connections with the east and west walls have been completed and excavation has been begun for the column foundations. Pier 10 West has been completed, and Pier 10 East founded and thirteen courses of limestone set. The pile and timber fenders of these piers are nearly completed. The caisson for Pier 11 West and the grillage for Pier 9 are nearly ready for launching. The column foundations for the viaduct on the north approach are partly completed, and about 1,500 tons of steel for the bridge have been delivered near the site. More progress has been made during the past quarter than at any period since construction began. The time limit on this contract will expire in fifteen working days after the 30th of September. Judging from the present condition of the work it will require at least eight months, and perhaps longer, in which to complete the bridge.

No. 6—Borden Avenue Bridge.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has returned the plans for a new bridge, which were submitted by this Department, and requested that the local authorities change the line of Creek street in order that the bridge designed for this point may be legally constructed.

No. 7—Flushing Bridge.

The War Department has approved the plan for the proposed new bridge which has been authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, and the contract, specifications and drawings are being prepared.

No. 1-T—Vernon Avenue (Temporary) Bridge.

Maintenance and Repairs—Much trouble has been experienced in keeping the temporary bridge in repair, on account of the crowded traffic in the stream and the apparent carelessness of captains, who allow their vessels to collide with the bridge.

No. 2—Greenpoint Avenue Bridge.

The bridge is in good repair and working satisfactorily.

No. 3—Meeker Avenue Bridge.

The draw span of this bridge has been equipped with electricity, and the bridge is now receiving a new flooring and complete overhauling.

No. 4—Grand Street Bridge.

The bridge has worked satisfactorily, and no repairs of any kind have been required during the quarter.

No. 5—Metropolitan Avenue Bridge.

Since the 1st of January, 1902, no attention has been given to this wooden, low level bridge over Newtown creek, situated at an unnavigable part of the stream.

No. 8—Strong's Causeway Bridge.

In fair condition.

No. 9—Little Neck Bridge.

In fair condition. The draw span opened four times during the present quarter for the passage of one scow with a tug, up the creek and out again, the first opening since January, 1902.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

No. 1—Hamilton Avenue Bridge.

The motor bracing was overhauled and repairs made to a railing post and floor beam damaged by a vessel. The east approach pavement was repaired by the Bureau of Highways, and the railroad company also did some work on the pavements. The bridge seats have been adjusted, and later will be replaced by the adjustable bridge seats removed from the Metropolitan Avenue Bridge when the end lifts were installed. These bridge seats have been overhauled in the machine shop.

No. 2—Ninth Street Bridge.

That part of the bridge above the floor line was painted in July. The bare spots were "touched up" with red lead, and one coat of white lead and linseed oil (standard color) was applied. The railings were painted with Dixon's graphite. Repairs have been made to the bridge seat shoes, motor band, and floor beam connections. The end beams have been chipped to give clearance at the abutments. The railroad company made repairs to the planking.

No. 3—Third Street Bridge.

The Bureau of Highways repaved both approaches and brought them to grade.

No. 4—Carroll Street Bridge.

The corner railing, damaged by a vessel, was repaired.

No. 5—Union Street Bridge.

The railings have been repaired, new turning pole made, and the Bureau of Highways repaired the pavements on the approaches.

No. 6—Washington Avenue Bridge.

The towing capstan was used from June 9 to July 27 to operate the bridge while a new rope sheave foundation was put in. In consequence no towing could be done, and the average time for openings in July was nine minutes, while for August and September, when the towing of boats was resumed, the average per opening was less than three minutes. The time-saving features of the capstan are thus clearly shown. The engine house roof has been repaired and painted, and the pavement between the rails on the north approach has been repaired by the railroad company. The grassed areas have been kept in good shape by the Bridge Tenders and look very well. The three-inch wood block pavement laid last December on this bridge has stood the heavy traffic without signs of wear.

No. 7—Metropolitan Avenue Bridge.

The electrically operated end lifts were completed on August 4, and work smoothly and quickly, but fifteen seconds being required to raise or lower the rams. The current is supplied by the railroad company, as is also the current for the turning of the bridge. The new latch is in successful operation, the west latch base having been completed the last week of September. At one corner of the bridge repairs have been made to the channels supporting the toggle girders, which were damaged by a boat striking the girders. The under body was painted in August, and the railroad company repaired the approach pavements. A new roller has been put in the turntable, and the railings have been repaired. The three-inch wood block pavement on this bridge, laid last spring, is wearing well.

No. 8—Harway Avenue Bridge.

No repairs have been required at this bridge.

Opening Hours on Gowanus Canal.

The closed noon hour periods, which were done away with after the coal strike, to give greater freedom to the movement of vessels on the canal, were restored at Hamilton avenue and Ninth street bridges on August 12, and at Union Street Bridge on September 11.
