Dear Sir-In January, 1910, Mr. E. E. Fisher, a citizen of New York, submitted specimens of sputum to the Department of Health, was declared a victim of tuberculosis and admitted to the municipal sanatorium at Otisville, in Orange County, as

While no complaint can be made of the medical superintendence of Dr. Mac-Sweeney, the other conditions proved so menacing to health that Mr. Fisher felt impelled to request his discharge from the institution and is at present in Saranac Lake as a patient.

The sanitation, instead of being modern, is crude and unhealthful; baths were difficult to obtain, and only after repeated requests and protests; toilet facilities were barbarous, in view of the condition of the inmates. The food supply was in sufficient and improperly cooked, providing no nourishment; tainted meat was utilized occasionally; vegetables not in quantity sufficient for all; milk not served daily, and eggs when distributed were of an uncertain quality. In fact, The City of New York is evidently not getting its money's worth at Otisville, and the matter will bear investigation of a thorough and impartial character.

It will not be difficult to secure testimony once the inmates are assured of its sincerity by the investigators, and I assume that the Board of Aldermen, of which you have the honor to be presiding officer, has authority in the premises and juris

diction over the sanatorium at Otisville. Accordingly, I request a formal investigation, and the testimony of Mr. E. E. Fisher can be furnished in the form of an affidavit and with supporting evidence from competent sources.

and in making new sewerage and district plans and maps, particularly for the outlying districts preparatory to the construction of new sewers.

It will be seen from the foregoing that there has been an average expenditure of a little over \$10,000 per year for this class of work.

Of the amount authorized for the year 1909, viz., \$10,600, I have been informed by Mr. Charles H. Graham, Engineer in Charge of Sewers of the said Borough of The Bronx, there remains barely sufficient to defray the necessary expenses for the balance of the year.

It will be observed that the amount asked for is considerably in excess of the average yearly amount provided during the past few years. This increase is due to the rapid growth of the large section east of the Bronx River, where extensive sewer construction is necessary. Topographical work in this section is now so far advanced that the work of sewer construction can be proceeded with much more rapidly than it has been in the past; and, in order to complete the necessary surveys and studies required in the filing of sewerage systems, a larger force is now needed than has hitherto been employed. The numerous changes of street grades and layouts of new streets constantly being made also in the section west of The Bronx tend largely to increase the work necessary in preparing plans for new sewerage and drainage systems.

. In the statement furnished by Engineer Graham, there is an item of instruments and supplies. I have been informed at the office of the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, that this item includes the purchase of a new transit, rain and tide gauges, flow gauges and office supplies, etc.

The amount of money now being expended in sewer construction in the Borough of The Bronx aggregates, approximately, \$1,000,000 yearly, and it is to provide a fund to cover the cost of preparing plans, maps, etc, for the drainage system for this large amount of work that the sum of \$15,000 is now asked.

In view of the extensive building operations now being carried on, which necessitate the immediate construction of sewers, I am of the opinion that the amount asked for is reasonable and should be provided for carrying on the work during the year 1910.

therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to issue corporate stock in the sum of \$15,000 for Draining and Sewerage District Plans for the Borough of The Bronx for the year 1910.

There does not appear to be sufficient funds to provide for the new force in the Budget allowances for the District Attorney's office for the present year, and I am informed that application has been made to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds under the provisions of subdivision 8, of section 188 of the Charter to meet the salary cost for the remainder of the year.

I am further informed by the Examiners of the Finance Department who have investigated the matter that positions of Deputy Assistant District Attorneys at rates of compensation of \$4,000 and \$3,000 already exist in the office of the District Attorney of New York County under the provision of law which continued all positions legally in existence on January 1, 1902, unless abolished or new positions created under section 56 of the Charter, as amended by chapter 455, of the Laws of 1902.

It appears, however, that no position of Deputy Assistant District Attorney at the rate of \$1,500 now exists in the office, and in order to provide for the establishment of said grade I recommend the adoption of the resolution attached hereto.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall: Dear Sir-About September of last year the Aqueduct Commission formally transferred to this Department, for care and maintenance, certain properties which they had improved in the following towns of Westchester County:

Cortlandt, North Salem, Yorktown, Bedford, New Castle, Poundridge, Lewisboro,

About the same time they transmitted certain bills for county and town taxes. As there were no funds appropriated to this Department for the payment of the bills, they were returned, although the Department, anticipating the transfer of these properties, had included in its 1909 estimate for departmental expenses the money necessary for the payment of the taxes, but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment did not allow it. Provision was also made in the estimate for 1910 for the necessary funds for the payment of the taxes and \$10,000 for maintenance. The application was again denied by the Board.

I am advised that the tax bills for 1910 will be rendered by the several towns above mentioned on the 17th inst. If payment is not made within thirty (30) days a penalty of 4 per cent. is added.

As it now becomes the duty of this Department to pay the land and school taxes on these properties, I respectfully request that the funds be provided for by an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$0,000. The county and town taxes on the lands transferred by the Aqueduct Commission last year were \$43,078.21. In addition to this amount there is a school tax which is not yet determined, and the total taxes, as estimated for 1910, will be \$60,000. For the proper care and maintenance of the lands \$10,000 will be required.

Dear Sir-During the month of September, 1909, it was found by the Mayor and the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges that it would be necessary to operate a shuttle car service over the Queensboro Bridge. This was an emergency matter and the Commissioner of Bridges applied to the Commissioner of this Department for power to operate the electric cars necessary for the service. It was found that the only company from whom we could obtain this service at once was the New York Edison Company, and a very reasonable arrangement as to price was made with them. The Bridge Department transferred funds to cover the expenditure to the end of

the year to this Department by consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. We would therefore request that we be permitted to order the New York Edison Company to furnish this service so long as it is necessary, up to and including December 31, 1909. The total expenditure necessary was estimated at about five thousand dollars (\$5,000), but it appears now that it may reach seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

As no other company could furnish the power, and the arrangement is one that was of benefit to the traveling public over the Queensboro Bridge, I would therefore request that your Board allow us to contract for this service to the amount of \$7,500 without public letting. I am,

The above estimate is based on a price of \$1.25 per square yard, and where the amount of revenue bonds required is not the same as would be obtained by multiplying the amount of \$1.25 by the number of square yards, it is due to the fact that these contracts have a retained percentage out of which a portion of the repairs can be paid.

In order to form some idea of the estimates upon which this request for an appropriation is based, the Chairman of this Committee selected a few of the streets listed and made a personal examination of same with a view to getting first hand information as to the urgency and necessity of the proposed work, with the following

Park street, from Centre to Mott, \$10,000. It is impossible to do this street at present, from Centre to Pearl, on account of new city building in course of erection. The one block from Pearl to Baxter needs new pavement, the block from Baxter to Mulberry needs repairs, but the block from Mulberry to Mott is in perfect repair. About 25 per cent. of the amount asked for would be ample.

Suffolk street, from Division to Houston, \$3,750; Lewis street, from Houston to

Third, \$1,250; Avenue D, from Houston to Eleventh, \$3,750. All need repairs.

Fourth street, from Lewis street to Second avenue, \$10,000. This street is at present in fair condition for a street which is used so little for vehicular traffic and compares favorably as to condition of pavement with many other City streets which receive much more use. This money could well be spent on other highways.

Fourth avenue, from Eighth to Twenty-fourth street, \$6,250; Fifth avenue, from Sixtieth to Eightieth street, \$3,000. These are thoroughfares in constant use by business and pleasure vehicles and, while the holes are small, should be kept in a high

Fifty-eighth street, from Third to Lexington avenue, \$2,150. Is suffering from a few holes which would probably entail an expenditure of about 25 per cent. of the

First avenue, from Sixtieth to Sixty-first street, etc., \$3,750; First avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Sixtieth street, etc., \$25,000. It is difficult to understand such a loose

statement as this. The two blocks on First avenue might at the highest estimate cost \$1,750 to put in perfect repair. This leaves \$27,000 for "etc."

These streets are selected as representing widely different sections and uses, and figure in the estimate over one-half of the amount asked. It would seem that at least 50 per cent, of this half is not warranted, and inasmuch as Borough President McAneny has stated that he does not know that the Corporation Counsel has been successful in collecting any portion of the \$50,000 allowed for this fund in January, 1909, when this system of repairs to be done by the City and afterward collected from the companies which did not live up to their contracts was inaugurated, it is recommended that the Committee proceed slowly in regard to this allowance. The investigation above recited being taken as a fair criterion, it would be unnecessary at this time to make the full allowance asked for, and the Chairman would suggest that the amount of \$50,000 be now recommended, feeling that this amount, properly applied, would go far toward remedying the defects reported.

You ask to be advised as to whether the resolution of the Board of Aldermen above mentioned increases the salary of the Detectives of the first grade from \$2,000 to \$2,250 per annum, the grade fixed by the Aldermen for the position of Lieutenant in the Police Department, and you state that as it is your intention to make the payrolls of the Lieutenants at the rate of \$2,250 per annum from December 8, you desire this advice in regard to the first grade Detectives, at the earliest possible

Replying to your inquiries, I think it was the intention of the Legislature that members of the Force detailed to the Detective Bureau as Detectives of the first grade, while performing duty in said Bureau and being designated as Detectives of the first grade, should be paid the salary paid to Lieutenants of Police. The resolution above mentioned establishes an additional grade of salary for the position of Lieutenant in your Department at the rate of \$2,250 a year, and as you state it is your intention to make up the payrolls of the Lieutenants at said rate of \$2,250 a vear from December 8, the date when his Honor the Mayor approved said resolution.
