Brooklyn Bridge.

During the quarter substantial progress was accomplished in Department contracts for widening roadways, Manhattan terminal; removing columns at corner of Sands and Washington streets, Brooklyn; installing train spacing signals on the Bridge Railway, and constructing, in Brooklyn, new railway approaches to the Bridge, whereon the railway companies may run surface cars above the grade of intervening streets north of Tillary street.

After the practicability of through elevated railway train service to Park row, Manhattan, in the busy hours of morning and evening, had been fully established, the old bridge local cars were sold at public auction, and all the hauling cables and equipment removed from the Bridge.

Department employees are re-enforcing the Bridge Railway floor by removing wooden stringers and erecting in their place new steel beam stringers.

The new local car service over the surface car tracks, between the terminals of the Bridge, has proved satisfactory. The total number of passengers carried was 1,353,527.

Williamsburgh Bridge.

The Manhattan Subway Station was opened to trolley cars on May 19, 1908, and the improvement in accommodations to passengers is marked.

The vehicular traffic across this Bridge was diverted from the north to the south roadway to permit of change of grade of tracks, and all vehicles to and from Brooklyn have used the south roadway.

All other work, including the elevated railway connection, is progressing satisfactorily.

On June 7, 1908, the Third Avenue road commenced operating a new line over this Bridge from the New York Post Office, giving a direct downtown connection between the Brooklyn Bridge and the Williamsburgh Bridge.

Manhattan Bridge.

The Manhattan tower was ready for the Contractor on cable erection about the 18th of May, and the Brooklyn tower one week later.

On the 1st of June, 1908, the first reels of wire rope for the footbridge cables were received, and work started immediately on their erection. The first wire rope was pulled up in place on June 15, 1908, and the last on June 25, 1908. All of the footbridge can now be pushed to completion.

The towers, with the exception of about 300 tons of steel, have now been erected, and the remaining portion cannot be erected until the completion of the permanent cables.

The approach sites are practically cleared of buildings, and the work of constructing the approach foundations is now under way.

Blackwells Island Bridge.

The erection of the main span superstructure was completed on June 15, 1908. The masonry of the anchor piers is practically finished, and the stone for the attics on the main piers has been cut, and is ready to be laid.

Work has been progressing rapidly on both the Manhattan and Queens approaches.

The contract for the roadway pavement and inside trolley tracks was awarded, and the work is in progress.

The contract for the footwalk flooring was also awarded, and the contractor has commenced construction.

The Department has made preparation for letting contracts for all the work necessary to complete the entire bridge.

Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge.

The designing and preparation of plans for this bridge has progressed in a satisfactory manner.

The detailed contract drawings are in course of preparation, and tests of materials used in concrete of the various grades are being made.

New Madison Avenue Bridge.

The construction of this bridge was actively begun on field work on May 11, 1908. The contractor has assembled considerable plant, and the manufacture of steel and preparation of timber for the river work is progressing satisfactorily.

The removal of the draw span to the new site of the temporary bridge was accomplished June 9, 1908, and the temporary structure accepted by the City.

The construction of the new bridge over Pelham Bay Narrows is progressing to completion.

The construction of the new bridge across Dutch Kills, at Borden Avenue, in the Borough of Queens, was completed and opened to traffic on May 25.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
