Reports of Committees-The Building Committee reported that a meeting had been held, at which the consulting engineers and the General Medical Superintend ent were present, and that they had agreed to recommend that a fire alarm system be provided for the new Bellevue Hospital on a plan as follows:

Divide hospital into eight blocks or sections. Each floor of each section to be equipped with requisite number of stations and bells. Each block to have one large striking gong on outside of building. When alarm is sent in from any station a bell rings at central switchboard and a drop on the annunciator registers location. Operator then throws switch, ringing all bells in the section from which alarm is received. The bells strike a definite number of times, designating the location. This is only in the section where the fire is located. Another switch rings the large outside gongs which strike, designating the location of fire. One of these gongs is in the engine room, and when it strikes the engineer will blow the fire whistle. The central switchboard also provides that operator may ring bells in all sections or blocks one after the other or at the same time.

"On the ground floor in each section or block there shall be a city fire alarm box, providing for prompt notification to fire headquarters. Kevs

hands of responsible officials only.

It was resolved to approve of the installation of a fire alarm system in accordance with the plan recommended by the Building Committee, and that the specifications for Pavilions L and M should be amended in order to provide for a fire alarm system in accordance with the plan adopted above.

The President reported that following readvertisement the only bid received on November 1 for horses was that of the Fiss, Doerr and Carroll Horse Company

amounting to \$1.700. It was resolved to accept this bid.

The President reported that he had also opened bids on November 1 for the asterations to ward 31 of Bellevue Hospital, and that the lowest bid received was that of Hahn and O'Reilly, amounting to \$6,497, which was in excess of the appropriation available. It was reported that the lowest bid received for this work on lune 7 amounted to \$5,915, and that since then the specifications had been modified and it had been expected that the cost would be \$2,000 less. It was resolved to reject all bids received and to obtain a further modification of the specifications and to readvertise the work.

The Conference Committee of the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Arthur E. Hoag as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients. This report was approved and Dr. Hoag appointed accordingly

The Conference Committee of the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital reported upon the nominations of Dr. Slocum and Dr. Wyckoff, and it was resolved to appoint Dr. Arthur L. Slocum and Dr. John Henry Wyckoff, Jr., as Assistant Physicians to Out Patients on the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital.

The Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of the following as Clinical Assistants to Out Patients: Dr. Frank Friedman (female medical). Dr. Max K. Fladen (tuberculosis), Dr. Leonard K. Graves (nose and throat), and Dr. Benjamin Rosenthal (children). This report was approved and the appointments made accordingly.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee reported that at a meeting held on November 3 it had been resolved to recommend appointments at Harlem Hospital as follows: Dr. Henry G. Wincor, Clinical Assistant to Out Patients (eye and ear); Dr. Gabriel Hamburger, Clinical Assistant to Out Patients (surgery); Dr. George L. Rohdenburg, Clinical Assistant to Out Patients (general medicine), and Dr. L. H. Berliner, Assistant Pathologist. The Conference Committee further recommended that the place of Consulting Dermatologist to Harlem Hospital be created. and that Dr. Edmund L. Cocks be appointed to fill the place. It was resolved that this report be approved and the appointments made as recommended by the Con-

ference Committee. Communications-A communication dated October 31 was received from the John H. Parker Company, requesting an extension of time of a period of from six to eight months on their contract for the construction of the laundry building of the new Bellevue Hospital. It was resolved to refer this communication to the architects for recommendation, and to request the contractors to furnish detailed particulars of the causes of delay to which they refer.

The General Medical Superintendent reported that the Director of Laboratories had not been able to secure a competent man to fill the vacancy as pathologist at Harlem Hospital, and it was resolved to request the Medical Board to submit nomi-

A communication dated October 28 was received from McKim, Mead and White. stating that a temporary steam connection is being made between the boiler house and the pathological department and men's dormitory building, and requesting that arrangements be made to have one of the department engineers take charge of the

A communication dated October 29 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted on October 26 providing for the appointment of a committee of two with power to inquire into the present plans, organization, methods and equipment of the Department of Health, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and the Department of Public Charities, and in cluding an appropriation of \$25,100 in the budget for 1911 for this purpose.

A communication dated October 25 was received from Dr. F. A. Cleveland, congratulating the department as being the only one in The City of New York that had a complete accounting system, as was shown not only in the recent budget exhibit,

but in the estimates supporting the requests for appropriations.

A communication dated October 28 was received from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted on October 27 assigning to the Department of Health for antitoxin purposes two old horses at Fordham Hospital by the name of "Monk" and "Paddy." On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent to arrange for the transfer of the horses.

A communication dated October 19 was received from the Department of Finance relative to the delay in the completion of the contract of the Vacuum Cleaner Company for the construction of a vacuum dust sweeping and cleaner plant in the pathological department and men's dormitory building. The President reported that on receipt of this communication he had forwarded a copy of it to the architects for recommendation, and submitted a reply from McKim, Mead and White dated October 25, stating that the delay resulted from the receivership of the general contract for this building. The President further reported that he had informed the Department of Finance of this information. This action was approved

Three copies of an assignment by Clark and Appleman to Samuel Posner for the sum of \$1.615 were received, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the President was authorized to approve the assignment, provided the approval of the Depart-

ment of Finance and the Law Department is received.

A communication dated October 24 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a resolution adopted on October 21 directing all departments, before submitting plans and specifications involving electric light or power equipment, to first obtain approval thereof by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. It was resolved, to comply with this request, and the communication was referred to the Building Committee and the General Medical Superintendent for their

A communication dated October 31 was received from the Commission on standardization, enclosing a proposed standard form of instructions to bidders to be used with the standard form of contract for the purchase of supplies, and requesting the suggestions of the Board thereon. The communication was referred to the General

Medical Superintendent for recommendation.

The minutes of a meeting of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board held on November 1 were presented, and on motion the nominations of Dr. George L. Brodhead and Dr. Simon Marx as Attending Obstetricians to Gouverneur Hospital were referred to the Conference Committee, together with the resolution recommending the division of that service to cover two periods of six months each, and the Conference Committee was instructed to note that this recommendation is at variance with the resolution adopted by the Medical Board at the previous regular meeting that a continuous service be established; the nominations of Doctors Goldstein, Rosenberg, Mansky and Friedman as Clinical Assistants were also referred to the Conference Committee. The resignation of Dr. B. J. Beck as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients

New Business.

The President made a statement in regard to the height of the rails on the balconies and loggias of Pavilions A and B, and stated that a number of the physicians and surgeons had requested that these be made higher on all new sections of the hospital, in order to provide better protection and frustrate possible attempts at suicide. The President further stated that the protecting rail which had been constructed on the loggias of Pavilions A and B did not serve the purpose for which it was intended. It was resolved, to direct that the railings on all future sections of the new Bellevue Hospital be made five feet high, instead of four feet as on Pavilions A and B, and to instruct the architects and Dr. Goldwater accordingly.

It was resolved, to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the wording of the resolution providing \$100,000 for the equipment and furnishing of the pathological department and men's dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital in order to include the words "and painting."



### Proposed Form of Contract.

second part, witnesseth: In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property,

including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the district bounded and described as follows:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such

right and privilege. If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual re-

frigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

ERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, or shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occu-pancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of

the above conditions of sale.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolities that the allowed area is approximately the allowed area in the content of the dirt. tion shall be allowed to remain on the premises except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regu-lations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carclessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conbecome interested, directly or indirectly, as con-tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak-

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
