The premises in question consist of the westerly store on the first floor of the six-story brick tenement, 326 East 11th street, Borough of Manhattan, size 30 feet To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: 9 inches by 9 feet, with one rear room, 11 feet 6 inches by 9 feet.

The lease is to be for one year from January 1, 1912, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions.

The rent is \$480 a year, payable quarterly, to which is to be added the sum of \$54 a year for heat and light, making a total rental of \$534 a year.

The lessor pays taxes and water rates, furnishes heat and light, puts in gas fixtures, as required, is to put toilet in hall in thorough repair, put the premises in good and tenantable condition, provide bin in cellar for storage purposes, and to grant to occupancy; the lessee to furnish janitor service and make such inside alterations and repairs as may be deemed necessary.

The Department of Health says the rent is reasonable and just.

For comparison, the adjoining store in the same building, which is similar, rents for \$480 a year without heat or light.
