Resolved, That, pursuant to the recommendation of the Committee on Armories, adopted at a meeting held October 17, 1911, the sum of one million one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,150,000) be and is hereby appropriated for the erection of a completed armory building for the Eighth Artillery District, on the site heretofore selected at the southerly end of Jerome Park Reservoir, in the Borough of The Bronx (including architect's fees), in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by Pilcher & Tachau; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and to authorize the Comptroller to issue corporate stock to provide for the payment thereof; and that the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids or proposals for the erection of said armory when the plans and specifications have been finally approved by the Armory Board and the Municipal Art Commission;—therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in said resolution in so far as it relates to the authorization and issue of corporate stock to the amount of one million one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,150,000), and that, for the purpose of providing means for the payment therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 41 of the Laws of 1909, to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, to the amount of one million one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$1,150,000), the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be used for the purpose of erecting a completed armory building for the Eighth Artillery District (including architect's fees), on the site heretofore selected at the southerly end of Jerome Park Reservoir, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Secretary brought up the matter of the resolution offered at the last meeting and laid over, to determine that it will be necessary to take the property described below selected by the Justices in Kings County for a court house, by condemnation proceedings.

1. The block bounded on the north by Livingston street, on the south by Schermerhorn street, on the east by Court street and on the west by Clinton street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

2. The block adjoining the above block on the south, bounded on the north by Schermerhorn street, on the south by State street, on the east by Court street, on the west by Clinton street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Mr. George R. Roberts, Chairman of a Committee of Five of the Brooklyn League, Mr. F. E. Pratt, and Mr. Willis L. Ogden, representing the committee appointed by citizens for the Brooklyn Beautiful Movement, and Mr. Woodruff Leming, President of the Brooklyn Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, appeared before the Board and asked for postponement of action.

Discussion followed.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller moved that the matter be laid on the table, to be taken up by the Corporate Stock Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment when the corporate stock disbursements for next year are being considered.

Ayes—Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, Deputy and Acting Comptroller and The Chamberlain.

Present and not voting—Chairman of Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

Motion carried.

The Secretary brought up the matter of the report of the Committee to which was referred the matter of the proposed resumption of the ferry service from Grand street, Manhattan, to Broadway, Brooklyn, concerning two offers for operation by private enterprise, which was presented and read at the last meeting and laid over.

Mr. Niles, representing Mr. Daniel J. Reilly, who put in a bid for the lease; Alderman Smith, Captain St. John, representing the 19th Ward Improvement Association; Mr. Alfred Talley, representing the Merchants' Association of Grand Street, and the Hon. Julius M. Mayer, representing the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company, were heard in regard to the matter.

Discussion followed.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller moved that the matter be referred back to the Select Committee, with directions to consider the general question of subsidizing ferries and of the ferry service on the East River; that if it be decided to recommend an agreement for the operation of the particular ferry in question, specifications be prepared for the operation in the alternative, either upon the basis of payment of a flat subsidy or upon the basis of profit sharing by the operating company with the City; that bids be obtained by public advertisement; and that such bids be obtained for the operation of ferries both between Broadway, Brooklyn, and Grand street, New York, and between Grand street, New York, and Grand street Brooklyn, with the suggestion that the specifications mentioned be prepared by the Dock Commissioner, and that the advertising for bids be done in his name.

Ayes—The Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Nays—The Acting President, Board of Aldermen; the Chamberlain and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

Ayes—1; nays—3; motion lost.

The Acting Comptroller called attention to the fact that the Commissioner of Docks had not recommended the proposed lease.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen then moved that the report of the select committee be adopted. (See report printed in Minutes of December 13, 1911.)

Ayes—The Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the Chamberlain and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen—3.

Nays—The Deputy and Acting Comptroller—1.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller then called attention to section 826 of the Charter, which reads in part as follows:

"Whenever it may be determined by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of a ferry at public auction it shall be lawful for said Commissioner of Docks and said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted by such unanimous votes to lease such franchises by private agreement."

—and stated that the resolution, not having received a unanimous vote, was lost. The Chair then stated that he would take the matter under consideration and give a ruling later.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to an application of the Westchester Lighting Company for the privilege of laying a 12-inch cast iron pipe under and across the aqueduct property on Mosholu avenue near Grand avenue in the Borough of The Bronx:

December 11, 1911.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On November 16, 1911, Charles Otten, Jr., Superintendent of the Westchester Lighting Company, requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to grant the privilege to lay a twelve-inch cast iron pipe under and across the aqueduct property, at Mosholu avenue, near Grand avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

I am advised by the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that the top of the proposed pipe will be three feet below the surface of the aqueduct land and will occupy a space about two feet wide and eighty-five feet across the aqueduct.

The privilege asked for is so trivial and the possibility of damage to the City's aqueduct so remote, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request, and fixing a nominal compensation of \$10 per annum to be paid the City for the privilege.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Bridges turning over as no longer required, property laid out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as a public park at the southeasterly corner of Willis avenue and Southern boulevard, adjoining the approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge, in the Borough of The Bronx:

The Health Department says the rent is reasonable and just.

For comparison, a similar store at 248 Mulberry street rents for \$420 a year without heat.

"The first of said blocks is bounded on the north by Livingston street, on the south by Schermerhorn street, on the east by Court street, and on the west by Clinton street, more particularly described as follows, to wit: Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Livingston street with the westerly side of Court street and running thence westerly along the southerly side of Livingston street five hundred and fourteen (514) feet eight (8) inches, more or less to the easterly side of Clinton street; thence southerly along the easterly side of Clinton street one hundred and eighty-six (186) feet ten (10) inches, more or less, to the northerly side of Schermerhorn street; thence easterly along the northerly side of Schermerhorn street five hundred and fourteen (514) feet six (6) inches, more or less, to the westerly side of Court street; thence northerly along the westerly side of Court street one hundred and ninety-one (191) feet six (6) inches, more or less, to the southerly side of Livingston street at the point or place of beginning. 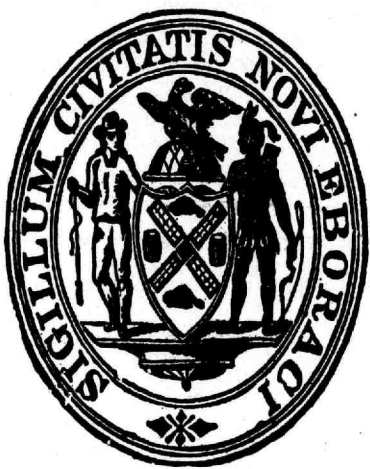

The amended route hereby authorized is more particularly shown upon a map entitled:

"N. Y. W. & B. Ry. Map showing proposed change of route from the intersection of Willis avenue and 132d street to a point between 134th street and 135th street East of Willow avenue, Borough of The Bronx, to accompany petition dated October 11, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

—and signed by L. S. Miller, President, and J. L. Crider, Chief Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
