## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING AUGUST 8, 1914.

THE ACCURACY OF THE DEPARTMENT'S SPUTUM EXAMINATIONS. The question has now and then been raised as to how accurate are the results

of sputum examinations made by the Department of Health's Diagnosis Laboratory. Two years ago sputa examined by the Diagnosis Laboratory were, for a time, regularly sent to the Research Laboratory, where they were re-examined by refined laboratory methods too time-consuming to be employed in the routine examination at the Diagnosis Laboratory. Only about five per cent. more positive results were

obtained by the use of the more elaborate technique. A similar comparative test was carried on this year. Up to date, a total of 151 specimens of sputum have been re-examined by the Research Laboratory, and only an additional 2 per cent. of positive results have been obtained.

In this connection the following gratifying letter, which speaks for itself, may be

of interest: "Dr. HAVEN EMERSON.

"My dear Dr. Emerson—In response to Dr. Goldwater's request transmitted to me by you, I have investigated the method of dealing with the specimens of sputum sent to the Board of Health Laboratory for examination for tubercle

showing somewhat higher figures for diphtheria than 1912, was still distinctly below the average for the past seven years. Moreover, a careful study of the figures reveals that the second quarter of 1913, i. e., directly after the change in procedure mentioned by our critic, had a smaller number of cases than the first quarter. In 1912 the reverse was true. Altogether it will be seen that the figures contradict Dr. Observer's opinion as to the influence of the discontinuance of antitoxin administration by Health Department inspectors.

The discontinuance, by Department of Health inspectors, of antitoxin administration to patients ill with diphtheria in no way affected the free distribution of antitoxin for administration by private physicians. Moreover, with this change in procedure, the Department at once established antitoxin stations in several all-night drug stores in the city, so that the remedy could be obtained at all hours of the night. That the present procedure is meeting with the approval of the physicians of this city is indicated by the fact that Dr. Observer's criticism is practically the only one received since it was inaugurated.

It may not be amiss to point out that the statement criticized by Dr. Observer appeared in a number of the Weekly Bulletin which asked all correspondents please to sign their names and not to make anonymous complaints.

## A LESSON IN "COMPULSORY" PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS

A carefully matured plan for the periodic examination of employees of the Department of Health, adopted in the belief that such examinations would prevent the development of disease, promote health, add to the sense of well-being of those examined and, perhaps, ultimately reduce the total period of absences from the department on sick leave, was put into operation in May, as announced in a previous number of the Bulletin.

Among the first three hundred employees of the department to be examined, there were found:

Six errors of nutrition, based on decided variations from normal weight in

proportion to height. Seven decided defects of hearing, and one instance of suppurating otitis.

Six instances of uncorrected defects of vision. Ten instances of marked disorders of digestion, chiefly such as affect sedentary

Thirteen instances of defective teeth needing dental care.

Fifteen minor defects of the tonsils, throat and upper respiratory tract. Twenty instances of appreciable defects of heart action, among which appeared

five needing particular precautions in regard to their manner of living. Fourteen instances of pulmonary defect of which three were healed lesions

resulting from previous tuberculosis, two were instances of early processes put under medical care, and the remainder were minor and temporary affections.

Two instances of anemia needing medical care.

Two cases of high blood pressure needing medical treatment or alteration in manner of living or personal habits, and associated therewith errors in kidney functions. The following minor variations from normal were found, which did not appear to affect the health of the individual, namely:

Palpable spleen, three cases: palpable kidney, one case; enlarged thyroid, one case; subacute skin affection, one instance.

Alimentary glycosuria was found in one case, but on re-examination had dis-

A moderate albuminuria was found in a number of cases but not to an extent to indicate pathological condition except in the two cases above referred to, which were associated with arterial hypertension.

One severe disorder of the nervous system was found, which should respond to

appropriate medical treatment and be permanently relieved. At the outset, employees were assured that these physical examinations were intended, primarily, for their benefit, and the Commissioner gave his pledge that the health records of employees would be treated with strict professional reserve, would not be made accessible to Directors of Bureaus, and would not be used in any way to affect injuriously the efficiency ratings of employees.

While these examinations were officially instituted, and while the Commissioner set an example to the employees of the department by promptly applying for examination in the regular way, the examinations were declared to be entirely voluntary, and employees have been permitted to follow their own preferences in deciding

whether to submit to examination or not. It is hoped that the summary here presented of the items of interest which appeared on reviewing the records of the first three hundred physical examinations made, will convince those who have been doubtful of the feasibility of carrying out a plan of this kind, or fearful of its depressing mental effect on the subjects, that science and art of medicine find in this work a proper and a fruitful field. The experience of the department, if typical, shows that, among any group of active workers in average health, there is likely to be found a considerable proportion who, without being cognizant of the fact, are in need of, and can be materially benefited by, medical advice and aid. To present this advice and to offer this aid, in a manner befitting the need and the occasion, is a task which may well be entrusted to physicians of proper professional training, keen personal sympathies and enlightened social understanding.

It is believed by the department that examinations of this kind represent an instrument for good and should be generally used. Those who have looked upon this experimental work with suspicion, dreading the day when physical examinations would be forced upon unwilling subjects, may quiet their fears. The department urges no compulsion in this matter, save the compulsion of common sense, but the time will surely come when every intelligent member of society, having been made aware of the value of periodic physical examination, will seek the protection of this beneficent procedure for his own benefit.

THE ADVISORY COUNCIL AT WORK.

As previously announced in the Weekly Bulletin, the Commissioner of Health commissioner's regime, when the Health Department abolished the custom of taking soon after taking office organized an Advisory Council in order to effect closer concultures and giving antitoxin, and not to the trial cultures as noted in the Bulletin tact with citizens of diverse views and interests, and secure well-informed criticism of June 20th," an investigation was begun to discover the influence of the factors and stimulating suggestions from experts in public health matters. Invitations to serve on the Advisory Council were extended to representative men and women Analyzing all the cases of diphtheria reported during the past seven years, and prominent in various phases of public health activity, and were in practically every remembering that the injection of antitoxin by Department inspectors in persons ill instance accepted. One or two declined with regret, owing to press of important

At the first general meeting of the Advisory Council request was made for suggestions as to new lines of work by the Department of Health, and free discussion and criticism were invited. Subsequently, seven committees were organized, as follows: Committee on Records, Committee on Laboratories, Committee on Child Hygiene, Committee on Infectious Diseases, Committee on Foods and Drugs, Committee on Sanitation and Committee on Public Health Education.

The first committee to organize was that on Foods and Drugs, under the chairmanship of Mr. Bailey B. Burritt, of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor. Several meetings have already been held and in a number of instances action of the Department of Health has been based on conclusions reached in the committee's discussions. Among these are: Regulations for the manufacture of ice cream and for the production, distribution and sale of milk; control of saccharin in food and drink; amendment of section 182 of the sanitary code with reference to the sale of habit-forming drugs; amendment of section 66a to strengthen the control over the sale of wood alcohol; amendment of section 66 regarding the sale of poisonous drugs when in medicinal compounds; amendment of section 59 regarding permits for the sale of soda water; amendment of section 45 to render the text complete; amendment of section 69a to make it conform with the state pharmacy law; regulations defining the scope of section 46 regarding the protection of food from dirt and flies. A subcommittee is at present studying the problem of disposal of milk bottles recovered from the public dump, and the question of publishing, by name of dealer, the bacterial count of milk supplies.

The Committee on Infectious Diseases under the chairmanship of Dr. John H. Huddleston has given valuable support to various measures and procedures which bring the Department into contact with the practicing physician. Among these has been the removal of tuberculosis cases from the active file; the attitude of the Department of Health toward glanders and rabies; the inclusion of epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis and poliomyelitis among diseases needing burial within twentyfour hours after death; the administration of Pasteur treatment for patients under the care of private physicians, etc.

The Committee on Records organized under the chairmanship of Dr. Louis I. Dublin and appointed a subcommittee to study and report on increasing the efficiency and scope of the work of the Bureau of Records. This report is now in the hands of the Commissioner, and in due course will reach the Mayor and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Committee on Public Health Education organized with Dr. Lee K. Frankel as chairman and Miss F. Elisabeth Crowell as Secretary. Valuable suggestions were made for increasing the value of the publicity and educational work of the Department. An editorial subcommittee is cooperating with the Director of the Bureau of Public Health Education in the preparation of leaflets, bulletins, etc.

The Committee on Sanitation under the chairmanship of Professor C. E. A. Winslow, held a number of conferences on river bathing, "Mikveh" pools, and bathing beaches. Other matters discussed were questions relating to smoke prosecutions; to the issuance of permits for keeping chickens; the control of dumps; the advisability of disinfecting rags and second-hand clothing, etc.

The Committee on Child Hygiene, under the chairmanship of Dr. Philip Van

Ingen, is to meet on August 11th to consider and assign to subcommittees for report a number of matters of considerable importance.

A Committee on Office Administration is now being formed to study problems connected with office routine. It is believed that the assistance thus afforded will do much to increase the efficiency of the office work of the department.



The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any tental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the pur-chase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the pur-chaser. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte-nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foun-dations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste re-sulting from demolition shall be allowed to re-main on the premises, except old mortar or plas-ter only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the ele-

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the

work has been properly performed.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurte-Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof. within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser. cause the same to be removed. to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and demands of every name and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the remova of said buildings,

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the ma-terials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

chasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a scaled envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the hid or estimate is made with his or their the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read. and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the

same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true. No bid or estimate will be considered unless,

as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three of the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not

be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separata envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
