

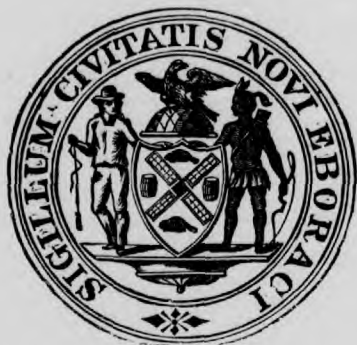

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 4, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 28, 1882.

SIR—There were 579 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 4, 1882, which is a decrease of 17, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 94 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending October 28, 1882, was 583, which is 69.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.47 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,291,624.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to report to you, pursuant to the resolution of the Board of Trustees, the following work done on the Bridge during the last week, viz.:

700 truss diagonals, 342 knee-braces, 205 main truss-pins, 100 posts, 40 top chords, 30 bent suspender-rods, 24 promenade floor-beams, 15 over floor stay-bars, 13 bridging-trusses, and 13 intermediate floor-beams, have been erected; and 29 over-floor stay bars connected.

On the New York approach, the paving of one of the roadways has been completed to Chatham street, and of the other as far as William street; and the foundations of the station building are ready for the erection of the iron columns.

On the Brooklyn approach, the work is progressing satisfactorily on the foundations of the columns for the station building, and the promenade is being finished with asphalt.
