BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 4, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending

October 28, 1882.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

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SIR—There were 579 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 4, 1882, which is a decrease of 17, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 94 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending October 28, 1882, was 583, which is 69.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.47 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,291,624.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office, on Friday, November 3, 1882, at 12.30 o'clock P. M.

Present-Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hon. Wm. C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corpora-tion; Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held July 11, 1882, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors, with communication of October 24, 1882, viz. :

I. One Hundred and Twelfth street-Paving with trap-block pavement, from Third to Fourth avenue

 One Hundred and Eighth street—Paving with granite-block pavement, from Third to Fifth avenue.

18. Twenty-third street—Alteration and improvement of sewer, between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, with branch in Thirteenth avenue, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets.
19. Fifth avenue—Receivng basins on west side of, opposite One Hundred and Second street.
20. One Hundred and Nineteenth street—Sewer, between Sixth avenue and summit east of Sixth

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative. The assessment list for tree-planting in Avenue St. Nicholas, from One Hundred and Tenth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, was also presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated October 25, 1882. The said assessment list being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative. The assessment list for regulating and grading Lexington avenue, from Ninety-sixth to Ninety-seventh street, with objections of Helen Knickerbocker, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors at meeting of May 4, 1882, for re-examination as to the distribution of the assessment for the improvement, etc., was presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated September 5, 1882. The Board of Assessors state, that they "have carefully examined into the question as to the principle adopted in levying the assessment; have heard the argument of Mr. Shaw in support of the objections filed by him as attorney, and they have unanimously arrived at the conclusion that the principle adopted is just and equitable, and that the amounts as originally assessed should remain unchanged. The objections, therefore, are overruled, and the list returned without alteration."

After hearing Mr. Shaw, on motion, the said assessment list was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, for examination as to the correctness of the principle adopted by the Board of Assessors

for the distribution of the assessment. The assessment list for flagging east side of Avenue D, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, and objections of John S. Schultz, executor, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of August 30, 1882. Mr. Schultz was heard by representative. After consideration, on motion, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the efformation.

Smith, attorney, and of Adam Stiehl, received from the Board of Assessors under date of August 30, 1882. Mr. Stiehl was represented by his son, who objected to the confirmation of the assessment. No others appearing in opposition, after due notice, on motion, the said objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed; all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative. The assessment list for sewer in One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, and objections of Mortimer C. Addoms, and John A. Mapes, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of August 30, 1882. After hearing Mr. Mapes, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over for further consid-eration. eration

On the New York approach, the paving of one of the roadways has been completed to Chatham street, and of the other as far as William street; and the foundations of the station building are ready for the erection of the iron columns.

On the Brooklyn approach, the work is pro-gressing satisfactorily on the foundations of the columns for the station building, and the prome-nade is being finished with apphalt.
