SIR—I have the honor to herewith submit two (2) similar maps for filing, and technical description of a public park on the grounds known as St. John's Cemetery, in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, which the Board of Street Opening and Improvement laid out and located at its meeting held the 1st of August, 1890. The discrepancy between the technical description furnished by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement and the one now submitted arises from the fact that the first description is made in accordance with the tax-maps, and the second in accordance with the area actually occupied by the burying-ground.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York deem it for the public interest to take and acquire certain pieces or parcels of land, located in the Ninth Ward of the City of New York, for the purpose of a public park, pursuant to chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, and to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out and opening said pieces or parcels of land, for the said purpose of a public park, the said pieces or parcels of land being bounded and described as follows:

1. Running westerly along the southern side of Leroy street, for 364.58 feet, to the eastern side of Hudson street;
2. Thence running southerly along the eastern side of Hudson street, for 208.0 feet, to the northern side of Clarkson street;
3. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Clarkson street, for 340.62 feet, to the northern side of Carmine street;
4. Thence running easterly along the northern side of Carmine street, for 20.41 feet;
5. Thence running northerly for 208.2 feet more or less, to the point of beginning.

This plot has been heretofore used in part as a burying-ground.

Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

The following petition to extend Sullivan street from West Third to West Fourth street was presented, and, on motion, was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for report thereon:

NEW YORK, September 6, 1890.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT:

DEAR SIR—I am informed that by virtue of your office as Mayor you have power to pass upon opening of streets.

I am owner of five houses on the east side of Sullivan street, between Bleecker and West Third streets. I have owned these houses for four or five years last past, and have carefully studied the neighborhood. In view of the fact that our Legislature has approved of opening public parks in our down-town districts, I respectfully request you, if possible, to have Sullivan street opened from West Third street to West Fourth street (South Washington Square). By doing this the public will be greatly benefited and the park will be opened to thousands of our citizens.

The traffic on South Fifth avenue will also be greatly relieved. All the lots opposite Sullivan street are now unimproved, excepting one. I am certain that all the lots can be purchased at a reasonable price, including the one lot which is improved, upon which there is a five-story double tenement, which has recently been sold for \$28,000.

I, as well as my neighbors, are very anxious to have the street opened, inasmuch as the opening will not only bring a pecuniary value to the owners of houses along Sullivan street, but will also be a great advantage to the public at large. I can get the consent of the majority of the owners along Sullivan street to the opening of the street, and that they be assessed proportionately for the cost of the improvement. By opening Sullivan street, four corner lots will be created, the owners of which will probably pay the larger part of the cost of the opening. You will favor me with an answer at your convenience.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Friday, September 12, 1890, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker and Scott.

On motion of the Comptroller, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with at this time.

The Construction or Executive Committee reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That the contract for building an auxiliary earth and masonry dam near Craft's Station, for Reservoir "D," Town of Carmel, Putnam County, New York, be and the same is hereby awarded to M. S. Coleman at his bid of eighty-three thousand and ninety-two dollars and fifty cents, it being the lowest bid received for doing said work and less than the estimate of the Chief Engineer ; provided that, simultaneously with the execution of said contract, the said M. S. Coleman execute a stipulation agreeing that in the event of any material being required by the Engineer to be hauled from outside of the boundaries fixed in the contract, and referred to in Item "c c" of said contract, the charge therefor shall not exceed two cents per cubic yard per one hundred feet of haul.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was adopted:

Commissioner Scott then moved that the following communication, addressed to the Counsel to the Corporation, and his reply thereto, be spread in full on the minutes and filed. Carried :

NEW YORK, September 10, 1890.

Hon. WILLIAM H. CLARK, Counsel to the Corporation :

SIR—On the opening of the bids for the auxiliary earth and masonry dam for Reservoir "D," Michael S. Coleman was the lowest bidder. The Committee on Construction have, however, hesitated to recommend the awarding of the bid to him, owing to the fact that his bid for Item "c c," being for earth hauled one hundred feet outside the limits, was five (5) cents per cubic yard, which was considered to be a high price, and three cents higher than that bidden by some other bidders.

It is represented to the Committee that it is possible that it may be found necessary to haul a very considerable amount of material under this item, and in that case it might be that the charge for so hauling would be excessive.

Mr. Coleman, by his Counsel, has appeared before the Committee, and has made the following proposition :

Mr. McClure, counsel for Mr. M. S. Coleman, at the request of the Committee on Construction of the Aqueduct Commissioners, stated that Mr. Coleman, without waiving any of his rights under the bid as made by him upon the contract, and his right to have the contract awarded to him, offers that upon the contract being awarded to him, to stipulate and to agree, by a special stipulation to be made and delivered at the time the contract is made, that in the event of any material being required by the Engineer to be hauled from outside of the boundaries fixed in the contract, and in any quantity whatsoever that may be found necessary for the construction of the auxiliary dam, that the charge shall not exceed the lowest bid therefor, namely, two cents per cubic yard per one hundred feet.

If there be no legal reason why this proposition should not be accepted, the Committee would be glad to award the contract to Mr. Coleman, as his other prices are deemed to be fair, and the aggregate cost of the dam under his bid would be less than the amount estimated by the Chief Engineer.

Will you kindly advise us as early as possible whether there will be any legal objection to the awarding of the contract to Mr. Coleman, and the concurrent acceptance of the proposition made by him.

As there are five bidders in all who have deposited with the Comptroller certified checks for \$1,500 each, which must be held by him until some decision is arrived at by the Aqueduct Board, we take the liberty to ask you to advise us on this subject as early as possible, in order that we may release the moneys of all the bidders whose bids are not accepted.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

**ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.**

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the

City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.
