SANITARY BUREAU.

Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 20,082; the number of causes of complaint was 6,520, as follows:

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 607 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 741 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 51 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 10 permits to transport manure; and 4 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the past quarter inspections have been made along the line of the several railroads with a view of preventing the importation of skim milk into the city. The Erie railroad furnishes the passes for the purpose of permitting inspectors to travel at any time and inspect the milk at the train's stations along the route or in transit. There seems to be no doubt that much good has been accomplished by these inspectors. Inspectors Martin and Munsell have been very energetic and assiduous in this particular, and they have, under the auspices of the State Board of Health of New York, caused the arrest of several offenders against the law, whose trials respectively are pending in the counties in which they reside.

During the three months ending March 31, 1883, eight thousand five hundred and sixty-one (8,561) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and six (206) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and nine (709) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and twenty-two (922) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand two hundred and sixty-seven (1,267) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and six hundred and sixty-one (661) transcripts of the records of deaths, ninety-two (92) of marriages and eighty-four (84) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand two hundred and twenty (5,220) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand three hundred and three (7,303) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1883, the number of notices issued by the Board was 6,642. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents as to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1883.

CHAPTER 237.

AN ACT to amend an act entitled "An act for the protection of corporations organized for generating and distributing steam for heating and other purposes," passed May twelfth, eighteen hundred and eighty.

Passed April 16, 1883.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 1. Section two of an act entitled "An act for the protection of corporations organized for generating and distributing steam for heating and other purposes," passed May twelfth, eighteen hundred and eighty, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2. Any person who, with intent to injure or defraud any corporation organized under the laws of this state for the purposes aforesaid, shall connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe, tube or other instrument or contrivance with any main, service pipe or other pipe for conducting or supplying steam, or shall open, or cause to be opened, any valve or other contrivance in any such main, service pipe or other pipe in such manner as to connect with and be calculated to supply steam for heating, for moving machinery, or for any other purpose or use, or with like intent shall make, or cause to be made, any such connection or opening in such manner as to connect with or be calculated to supply steam as aforesaid, without such steam passing through the meter or other device provided for the measuring and registering the quantity of steam consumed, or the quantity of water resulting from condensation of such steam consumed, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by fine not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. Section five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 5. If any person or persons, corporation or association, supplied with steam by such corporation organized under the laws of this state for the purposes aforesaid, shall neglect or refuse to pay the rent or remuneration for such steam, or for the meter, device, pipes, fittings or appliances, let by such corporation for supplying steam, or for ascertaining the quantity of steam consumed, or the quantity of water resulting from the condensation of the steam consumed, agreed upon or due for the same, as required by his, their or its contract with such corporation, the latter may thereupon stop and prevent the steam from entering the premises of such person or persons, corporation or association so neglecting or refusing to pay such rent or remuneration. The said corporation may also in any of the cases enumerated in this act in which a person is liable to pay a forfeiture, or is liable to fine or imprisonment, or both such fine and imprisonment, stop and prevent the steam from entering the premises of the person so liable; or if such person be an officer or agent of any corporation or association, stop and prevent the steam from entering the premises of the corporation or association of which the person so liable is an officer or agent. In all cases in which such corporation is authorized to stop and prevent the steam from entering any premises, it may, by its officers, agents, or workmen, enter into or on such premises between the hours of eight o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon, and cut off, disconnect, separate and carry away any meter, device, pipe, fitting or other property of the said corporation; and may cut off, disconnect, and separate any meter, device, pipe or fitting, whether the property of the corporation or not, from

the mains or pipes of said corporation. Any person who, without the consent of such corporation, shall open, or cause to be opened any valve closed under the provisions of this section by any corporation organized under the laws of this state for the purposes aforesaid, or reconnect, or cause to be reconnected, any connection disconnected by any such corporation under such provisions, or turn on steam, or cause the same to be turned on, or to re-enter any premises when the same has been stopped and prevented from entering them by such corporation as provided in this section, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by fine not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 340.

AN ACT to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors in cities having a population of over three hundred thousand inhabitants.

Passed April 30, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The boards of commissioners of excise in the cities of this state, having a population of over three hundred thousand inhabitants, shall, if all other requirements of the law have been complied with, have power to grant license to sell strong or spirituous liquors, ale, wine or beer, to be drank on the premises, to be named in the application for such license, to any person or persons having a good moral character, whether or not they propose to keep an inn, tavern or hotel, provided that no such license shall be granted unless the said commissioners shall be satisfied, upon examination, that the applicant therefor is a person of good moral character, and that a license may properly be granted for such sale in the place proposed.

Sec. 2. Any such board shall have at all times, discretionary power to permit any person or persons to whom a license may have been granted in respect of any specified premises, to remove to any other place within jurisdiction of the same board during the period covered by such license, and there to continue the conduct of business under such license in the same manner as if no removal had been made, provided always that such discretionary power shall not be exercised until and unless all the requirements of law to be observed upon the granting of an original license shall, upon said application for removal, be complied with and fulfilled in every respect.

Sec. 3. No person or persons having a license under this act, nor any assistant, agent, employee, or servant of any such person or persons so licensed shall be arrested for any alleged violation of any provision of any excise law by any peace officer or other person, unless a warrant therefor, based on affidavit, shall have first duly issued according to law, except and provided that in case of any violation of any provision of any excise law between the hour of one o'clock Sunday morning and the hour of twelve o'clock Sunday night, in presence of any officer or person authorized to make arrests for violation of law, such officer or person may forthwith and without warrant make arrest of the person or persons so violating any provision of any excise law. Any officer or person authorized to make arrests for violation of law may arrest, without warrant, any person who, in the presence of such officer or other person authorized to make arrests, may be engaged in the sale of any intoxicating liquor without a license.

Sec. 4. No city of this state having a population of more than three hundred thousand inhabitants shall hereafter be subject to or be embraced within any provision of the sixth section of the act, chapter six hundred and twenty-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled "An act to suppress intemperance and to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors," passed April sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven.

Sec. 5. Any person who shall, without a license, sell or give away any strong or spirituous liquors, ale, wine or beer to be drank upon the premises, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. And nothing in this act contained shall alter or affect the provisions of existing laws touching the sale or giving away of intoxicating liquors to be drank upon the premises or the prohibition thereof in the cases mentioned in said laws, and the penalties prescribed therefor, except as provided in section four of this act. And such provisions of existing laws as are applicable to persons who might thereby be licensed to sell intoxicating liquors to be drank upon the premises shall be applicable to persons who may be licensed under this act, except as such laws are modified by the terms of this act.

Sec. 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 375.

AN ACT to limit the carrying and sale of pistols and other fire-arms in the cities of this state.

Passed May 10, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. No person under the age of eighteen years shall have, carry or have in his possession in any public street, highway or place in any of the cities of this state, any pistol or other fire-arms of any kind, and no person shall in such cities sell or give any pistol or other fire-arms to any person under such age.

Sec. 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and in all trials or examinations for said offense the appearance of the person so alleged or claimed to be under the age of eighteen years shall be evidence to the magistrate or jury as to the age of such person.

Sec. 3. Nothing herein contained shall apply to the regular and ordinary transportation of pistols or fire-arms as articles of merchandise in said cities, or to the carrying of a gun or rifle through a street or highway of any city, with the intent to use the same outside of said city; nor to any person under such age carrying any pistol or other fire-arms under a license given by the mayor of said cities; but no licenses so given shall be in force more than one year from its date, and all such licenses may be revoked at the pleasure of the mayor, and a full, complete and public record shall be kept by the mayor of said cities of all such licenses, and the terms and date thereof.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 380.

AN ACT to repeal sections eight and nine of chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to protect primary elections and conventions of political parties, and to punish offenses committed thereat."

Passed May 11, 1883.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section nine of chapter one hundred and fifty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to protect primary elections and conventions of political parties, and to punish offenses committed thereat," is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 415.

AN ACT to repeal chapter four hundred and fifty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, entitled "An act for the removal of the reservoir situated in the city of New York between Fortieth and Forty-second streets," and parts of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the local and special laws affecting the public interests in the city of New York."

Passed May 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Chapter four hundred and fifty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, entitled "An act for the removal of the reservoir situated in the city of New York between Fortieth and Forty-second streets," is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. Sections one hundred and thirty, three hundred and forty-nine, six hundred and eighty-five and eight hundred and ninety-six of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the local and special laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this act contained shall interfere with or prevent the payment by the comptroller of the city of New York of any expenditures heretofore incurred by the commissioner of public works of said city, in pursuance of said chapter four hundred and fifty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, and the unexpended balance of the appropriations heretofore made for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of said act shall be applicable to the payment of such expenditures as may become necessary in order to reconnect the said reservoir with the water pipes and to make the same useful and efficient for the purposes of the water supply of said city.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 419.

AN ACT to amend chapter four hundred and eighty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act for the relief of Warren S. Sillocks, Joshua S. Cooley and Thomas S. Kirkpatrick."

Passed May 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Chapter four hundred and eighty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act for the relief of Warren S. Sillocks, Joshua S. Cooley and Thomas Kirkpatrick," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. The comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized to audit, and if in his judgment the said claims are just and proper, to pay the claims of Warren S. Sillocks, Joshua S. Cooley, and Thomas Kirkpatrick, against the city of New York, for merchandise furnished to the board of aldermen and the board of assistant aldermen of the city of New York, and the board of supervisors of the county of New York, prior to the year eighteen hundred and seventy-two, upon proof of the market value of the said merchandise at the time when furnished, and proof that the same was ordered by resolution of the said board of aldermen, assistant aldermen and supervisors respectively.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 420.

AN ACT to provide for the leasing of certain lands in the city of New York.

Passed May 16, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are authorized and empowered, in their discretion, to lease for a term of years with renewals to the West Washington Market Company, any unoccupied lands now owned by said city or any land which may be hereafter acquired by said city for market purposes, on such terms, conditions, and stipulations, and for such rent as the said commissioners of the sinking fund may fix and determine.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 425.

AN ACT to provide for the construction and maintenance of four free public baths in the city of New York.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, by the commissioner of public works of said city, are hereby authorized to construct and maintain four new free public floating baths in said city, and said additional baths shall be constructed on such plans as the commissioner of public works shall deem proper, but the materials and labor necessary for such construction shall be procured by contracts made at public letting with the lowest bidder, pursuant to the provisions of the general laws and ordinances which regulate the procurement of materials and labor for said city, and the said baths shall be and remain under the exclusive control and management of the department of public works of said city.

Sec. 2. The board of estimate and apportionment of said city is hereby authorized to appropriate such sum as will be necessary to pay for the construction of the said four floating baths, and the comptroller of said city shall certify the amount so appropriated to the board of aldermen, and such amount shall be included in the final estimate, and raised by taxation in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three. Said comptroller is hereby authorized to provide for the payment of the amount so appropriated, in anticipation of its collection by taxation, by the issue of revenue bonds, and such amount shall be paid, upon the certificate of the commissioner of public works, when the baths are completed.

Sec. 3. When the said four new public baths shall be completed and ready for public use, the commissioner of public works shall at once proceed to sell at public auction, after due advertisement, and in accordance with the provisions of law regulating the sale by auction of personal property of said city, the two oldest free public floating baths now owned by said city, and the proceeds of such sale shall be deposited with the chamberlain of said city, to the credit of the general fund.

Sec. 4. Such four new public floating baths shall be located at such available places along the water-front of said city as the commissioner of public works may deem most suitable for the accommodation and convenience of the public, and the department of docks of said city shall, upon the request of the commissioner of public works, forthwith provide and designate, free of charge, such locations, at which the baths herein authorized to be constructed shall be permanently located and maintained, except when in winter quarters, and which location shall afford accessible, convenient and safe berths for said baths.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 427.

AN ACT to authorize and direct the comptroller of the city of New York to pay the salary of James E. McVeany, as one of the assistant aldermen of the city of New York.

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby authorized to pay unto James E. McVeany, of the City of New York, the sum of two thousand dollars, the salary fixed by law, and belonging to the said McVeany, as assistant alderman of the ninth assembly and assistant aldermanic district of the city of New York, from the first day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, until the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, withheld from said McVeany, pending his contest for said office, and while it was wrongfully occupied by one Peter Culklin, who has since been adjudged by the courts to have usurped said office; and that said comptroller pay the lawful interest upon said claim from the said first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine.

Sec. 2. The said comptroller is authorized to pay the same out of any unexpended appropriation in his hands, and, if necessary, that the cause the same to be inserted in the tax levy for the following year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 435.

AN ACT to amend chapter two hundred and forty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to regulate the use of slips, wharves, and piers in the city of New York."

Passed May 17, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section three of chapter two hundred and forty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to regulate the use of slips, wharves, and piers in the city of New York," passed May sixth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 3. It shall not be lawful to interfere with the free public use as now enjoyed, or to permit the use as a dumping ground of any wharf, pier or slip, or bulkhead adjacent thereto, in the navigable waters of the East river, in the city of New York, which has heretofore been used for the loading and discharging of sailing vessels regularly employed in foreign commerce, and having a draft of more than eighteen feet of water, and the provisions of this act shall not apply to any such wharf, pier or slip; provided, however, that nothing in this section contained shall apply to any wharf, pier, slip, or bulkhead now covered by an existing shed permitted by said department of docks, or reserved for a special use by any existing law, or which has for a period of ten years prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five been used or occupied by any person, corporation, line or association engaged in the business of steam transportation between this state and any other of the United States.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
