#### Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1893.

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1892, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1893:

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1893, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and Probationary employees, was 3,713.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns from the station-houses and the felony report from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

## BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Electrical Control, held at the office of the Mayor in the City of New York, on Thursday, November 23, 1893, at 11 o'clock A.M.

Present—Mayor Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioners Theodore Moss, Walton Storm, Jacob Hess.

Commissioner Moss moved that Mayor Gilroy, of the City of New York, be elected President of the Board for the ensuing year. Carried.

Commissioner Storm moved that Commissioner Moss be elected Secretary for the ensuing year. Carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.  
Commissioner Moss submitted the following report:

NEW YORK, November 22, 1893.

To the Honorable the Board of Electrical Control:

GENTLEMEN—The following applications for the construction of subways have been received since the last meeting:

- From Edison Electric Illuminating Company of New York (for low tension service):  
On Park avenue, west side, from north side of Fifty-third street to south side of Fifty-fifth street.
- From New York Heat, Light and Power Company (for high tension service):  
On William street, from Maiden lane to Spruce street.  
On Nassau street, from Maiden lane to Spruce street.  
On Dutch street, from John to Fulton street.  
On Old Slip, from Pearl to Water street.

William street and Nassau street have both been repaved, and previous applications of this kind have been denied.

The applications for Park avenue and Dutch street and Old Slip, respectively, I recommend be granted; also, application of Mount Morris Company to reconstruct and put pole line in condition.

The Board, after consideration of the report, on motion of his Honor the Mayor, unanimously adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the report of Commissioner Moss be filed and entered at length in the minutes.  
Resolved, That the application of the New York Heat, Light and Power Company for high tension subways on William street, from Maiden lane to Spruce street, and Nassau street, from Maiden lane to Spruce street, be denied, on the ground that the streets have been newly paved and there seems to be no good reason for disturbing them at this time of the year.

Resolved, That the application of the New York Heat, Light and Power Company for the construction of subways for the accommodation of its electrical conductors, dated November 12, 1893, as to Dutch street, from John to Fulton street, and Old slip, from Pearl to Water street, be and is hereby granted.

Resolved, That the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company be and it is hereby authorized and directed to construct subways for the accommodation of high tension electrical conductors, as follows:

On Dutch street, from John to Fulton street.

On Old slip, from Pearl to Water street.

Provided, however, that this resolution shall not take effect until the corporations and individuals making application for the construction of said subways shall have first furnished to said Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company security for the occupation of said subways and the payment of rentals therefor in advance, as provided by chapter 263 of the Laws of 1892.

Resolved, That the application of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company for the construction of subways for the accommodation of its electrical conductors, dated November 21, 1893, be and is hereby granted.

Resolved, That the Empire City Subway Company (Limited) be and it is hereby authorized and directed to construct subways for the accommodation of low tension electrical conductors, as follows:

On Park avenue, west side, from north side of Fifty-third street to south side of Fifty-fifth street.

Provided, however, that this resolution shall not take effect until the corporations and individuals making application for the construction of said subways shall have first furnished to said Empire City Subway Company security for the occupation of said subways and the payment of rentals therefor in advance, as provided by chapter 263 of the Laws of 1892.

Resolved, That the Board of Electrical Control does hereby authorize and direct the Mount Morris Electric Light Company to reconstruct its pole line on West street, remove all dangerous poles, and put said line in proper and safe condition.

The following report of the Electrical Expert was read, directed to be filed and spread on the minutes:

NEW YORK, November 6, 1893.

Hon. THEODORE MOSS, Secretary of the Board of Electrical Control:

DEAR SIR—The following is a list of poles and wires that are ready for removal, with memorandum of the circumstances attending each case. Some action should be taken by the Board to effect these removals.

On the east side of Jerome avenue, from McComb's Dam Bridge road to the entrance to Jerome Park race course, sixteen poles carrying wires of the French Cable Company and the Fire Department. These should be transferred to the west side of Jerome avenue, so as to leave the east side clear for the electric-light line, all other poles and wires on the east side having already been disposed of.

Ninth avenue, from Fourteenth to Fifty-ninth streets, principally on the west side, a line of poles and wires. These were for some time occupied by the Fire Department, but they have removed their wires. The Bureau of Incumbrances has been notified to remove these poles, but is unable to do so on account of the lack of funds. The line is dangerous.

On Tenth avenue, from Fourteenth to Fifty-ninth streets, on the west side, a line of poles occupied by the Western Union Telegraph Company and the Postal Telegraph Company and the Fire and Police Departments. This line is in the Fourth Proscribed District, and the time for its removal has elapsed.

A line of poles on Girard avenue, from One Hundred and Fiftieth to One Hundred and Sixty-first streets, and on Sedgwick avenue, from McComb's Dam Bridge to Fordham Landing road, carrying Western Union wires. These wires on Girard avenue should be transferred to the new postal poles, and those on Sedgwick avenue should be transferred to the Western Union pole line following the Hudson River Railroad track. When a permit was given to the Postal Company to erect a pole line over this route, it was with the understanding that they were to secure the removal of the existing wires, as indicated.

A Western Union pole line on Second avenue, from Houston to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street. These Western Union wires should be removed to the Elevated Railroad, and then the poles could be removed. We have been notified that the Fire and Police wires have either already been removed or will be at once.

A dead pole line on the east side of Avenue A, from Houston to Fifth street, should be removed. The Fire and Police wires can be taken care of on housetops or other poles. The poles are dangerous.

On Clinton place, from University place to Broadway, a line of dead poles of the Fire Department, which is in the First Proscribed District, and the Fire Department should remove.

On First avenue and on Third avenue, from Fifty-ninth street to Harlem river, the lines of telephone poles which the Telephone Company have been for some time removing. These lines should all be removed.

His Honor the Mayor, in connection with the report of the Electrical Expert, moved the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Electrical Control immediately order the French Cable Company to transfer its poles and wires, as indicated by the Electrical Expert of this Board, and that the Fire Department be requested afterwards to transfer its wires.

Resolved, That the report of the Electrical Expert upon the line of poles and wires on Ninth avenue, from Fourteenth to Fifty-ninth street, be referred back to him, with directions to obtain information as to whom those poles and wires belong, and to report at the next meeting of the Board.

Resolved, That the report of the Electrical Expert upon the pole line occupied by the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies and the Fire and Police Departments, on the west side of Tenth avenue, from Fourteenth to Fifty-ninth streets, be referred back to him, with instructions to report at the next meeting as to the ownership of those poles.

Resolved, That, with reference to the Electrical Expert's report upon the line of poles on Girard avenue, from One Hundred and Fiftieth to One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and on Sedgwick avenue, from Macomb's Dam Bridge to Fordham Landing road, carrying Western Union wires, the Secretary of this Board be directed to communicate with the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies, and require the removal of those poles and wires, in accordance with the agreement entered into originally, at as early a day as practicable.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to communicate with the Western Union Telegraph Company, and demand the removal of its wires from the pole line on Second avenue, from Houston to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, as indicated in the report of the Electrical Expert.

Resolved, That the report of the Electrical Expert upon the pole line on the east side of Avenue A, from Houston to Fifth street, be referred back to him for more definite information.

Resolved, That the Fire Department be directed to remove its line of dead poles on Clinton place, from University place to Broadway, forthwith.

Mr. Charles F. Cutler, President of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company, stated with reference to the company's pole lines on First and Third avenues, between Fifty-ninth street and the Harlem river, reported upon by the Electrical Expert, that an order had been given for their removal, but that he did not know how far the work had progressed, and he promised that the lines should be removed as speedily as possible.

GENTLEMEN—This Department has under consideration the subject of lighting the Central Park, and it is proposed to light the driveway by incandescent lamps.

At a meeting of the Board of Parks, held on the 25th instant, it was

Resolved, That it is the opinion of the Board of Parks that the drives in Central Park should be lighted with incandescent lights, and that the Board of Electrical Control be requested to take such steps as may be in their power to further that end.

His Honor the Mayor stated, in reference to the communication of the Park Department, that the matter had been presented to the Gas Commission, and an exact copy of that resolution was before them, and that he did not see how this Board could act on that resolution; that this Board is not aware whether the Park Department would object to digging up the roads or would object to the erection of poles or wires thereon. He moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board be directed to communicate with the Park Department with a view to ascertaining what the Department desires in regard to lighting Central Park.

The following communication from the American District Telegraph Company was read, directed to be filed and spread on the minutes:

NEW YORK, October 5, 1893.

THEO. MOSS, Esq., Secretary, Board of Electrical Control, No. 1266 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—During the month of September underground cables have been laid at the following locations and overhead wires removed. One thirty-wire cable from cellar of No. 990 Sixth avenue northerly along Sixth avenue to Fifty-eighth street, easterly along Fifty-eighth street to cellar of No. 5 East Fifty-eighth street. This enables us to take down about twenty overhead wires which crossed Fifty-sixth, Fifty-seventh and Fifty-eighth streets, between Sixth and Fifth avenues.

Connected the new Herald Building at Thirty-fifth street and Sixth avenue with underground wires from No. 666 Sixth avenue.

Removed eight overhead wires crossing Fifth avenue, from No. 397 to corner of Thirty-sixth street.

Laid one thirty-wire cable underground from American District Telegraph Company's office at No. 1140 Broadway to cellar of Hoffman House, and one thirty-wire cable from latter point to our office, corner Fifth avenue and Twenty-third street. Our men are now working at the latter point, connecting cables and removing overhead wires.

Mr. McCormick, Superintendent of Gas and Lamps, laid before the Board a petition for lighting Manhattan street, from Ninth avenue to the river, and stated that there was no subway in that street.

His Honor the Mayor directed Mr. McCormick to have the company intending to light said street make application for the construction of a subway under the statute of 1892, which same would be ordered at the next meeting of this Board.

Commissioner Storm moved the adoption of the following as an amendment to the rules and regulations of the Board:

Rule 14a. When any pole shall be "dead" or abandoned, the Secretary shall notify the company owning said pole to remove the same within four days from the receipt of the notice. If said company refuses, fails or neglects to remove said pole, it shall be removed by the Board of Electrical Control, and the expense of removing same shall be a charge against the company owning the said pole. And no permits shall be granted to any company as long as it owes for the removal of any pole removed by the Board of Electrical Control or by the Department of Public Works after the receipt of the notice hereinbefore recited.

His Honor the Mayor moved to amend the rule by inserting the words "or wires" after the word "pole" wherever the same occurs.

The motion to amend was carried, and the rule so amended was adopted.

Whereupon the Board adjourned sine die.
