Subject: Annual report of examination of Comptroller's and Chamberlain's accounts for the year 1903.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—Section 195 of the Charter reads in part as follows:

"* * * The accounts of the Chamberlain shall be annually closed on the last day of December, and shall be examined in the month of January in each year by the Commissioners of Accounts. Such Commissioners shall examine the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury during the year ending on the last day of December next preceding such examination, and shall certify and report to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen in the following month of February the amount of moneys received into the Treasury during such year, the amount of moneys paid out during the same period by virtue of warrants drawn on the Treasury by the Comptroller, the amount of moneys received by the Chamberlain who shall be in office at the time of such examination, if he entered upon the execution of his duties since the last preceding report, the balance in the Treasury on the last day of December preceding such examination, the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the City during such year, and the amount of the bonds of the City issued during such year, with the purposes for which and the authority under which such bonds were issued. Such Commissioners shall also compare the warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Treasury during the year ending on the last day of December preceding such examination, with the several laws and ordinances under which the same shall purport to have been drawn, and shall in like manner certify and report whether the Comptroller had power to draw such warrants; and if any shall be found which, in their opinion, he had no power to draw they shall specify the same in their report, with their reasons for such opinion."

The magnitude of the work involved in this mandatory provision of the Charter is much greater than was appreciated by the framers thereof, and it has not been found feasible to await the end of the year before making the examination and comparison of vouchers and warrants demanded. As a matter of practice and to fully comply with the requirements of the law, the Commissioners of Accounts employ six accountants on their staff to perform this duty and their work is continuous from the beginning to the end of the year.

Certification.

The Commissioners of Accounts do hereby certify that they have complied with the law as quoted above, and that for the year 1903 they have examined 117,251 vouchers paid by the Comptroller, and have examined and compared 117,251 warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Treasury in payment thereof, making a total of 234,502 papers examined; they do further certify and report that, in their opinion, the Comptroller was duly authorized by the several laws and ordinances to draw the warrants examined and that none were found which were improperly drawn; and finally, they do certify and report that they have made from the books of account of the City Chamberlain a compilation of the moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury, from which the following condensed statement is prepared:

Communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated February 17, 1904, in relation to contract of Williams & Gerstle for building Muscote Dam, and submitting forms of notice to be served on the contractors and on the sureties, was received, and in connection therewith Report No. 889 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 27, 1904, in relation to communication from the Comptroller, dated January 20, 1904, transmitting report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance on the progress of the work at Muscote Dam, was considered.

Whereupon said communications and reports were ordered filed and a copy of the communication of the Corporation Counsel, with form of notices, was ordered transmitted to the Chief Engineer for his information.

GENTLEMEN—I, J. Waldo Smith, Engineer to the Aqueduct Commissioners, am of opinion and do certify as follows:

The contract or agreement made between The City of New York, acting by and through the Aqueduct Commissioners, and John Williams and Robert J. Gerstle, composing the firm of Williams & Gerstle, dated May 10, 1901, for the building of the Muscote Dam on Croton river at Muscote Mountain, and the work thereof, is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed and the contractors are violating the conditions or covenants of the contract and executing the same in bad faith, and the work done under the contract is not fully and entirely completed within the time therein specified in the said contract for its completion.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Whereas, The Chief Engineer, in his Report No. 889, dated January 27, 1904, has stated that the contractors for the construction of the Muscote Dam cannot

finish the work under their contract at its present rate of progress within the time required by the contract, and have unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed said work, and the Chief Engineer has made the certificate required in Clause P of said contract; therefore

Resolved, That the necessary steps be taken by the Commissioners, in accordance with the advice of the Corporation Counsel, to require the contractors to discontinue all work under said contract, and that they forthwith execute the notices required in the premises, and that the President transmit them to the Corporation Counsel for service.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Chief Engineer was verbally instructed to take the necessary steps to prepare to let the work of completing the Muscote Dam.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York, on Wednesday, February 24, 1904, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis. The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners Report No. 901 of the Chief Engineer, dated February 10, 1904, submitting bill of W. B. Fuller, dated February 1, 1904, for \$700, for services as expert in charge of special tests of concrete at Jerome Park Reservoir, from November 25, 1903, to February 1, 1904, with the recommendation that the report be filed and the Secretary directed to prepare voucher for payment of said bill.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The President verbally reported that, according to appointment, the Commissioners met Assistant Corporation Counsel Sterling at this office on February 23, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., in the matter of the Muscote Dam contract of Messrs. Williams & Gerstle, and after examination of the papers and discussion, Mr. Sterling stated that, in accordance with the formal action of the Commissioners taken on February 19, 1904, he would proceed to serve the necessary notices already prepared under the advice of the Corporation Counsel, as contained in his communication of February 17, 1904, for the discontinuance of the work by said contractors.

The President verbally reported that on February 18, 1904, he had transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a statement of the bond issue required for the year 1904, to properly conduct the work of the Aqueduct Commissioners, under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 and the amendments thereto, which action was approved.

The President also verbally reported that on February 10, 1904, he had inquired of the Comptroller the date of the payment to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company of the consideration of \$478,341.12 for substituted route of the New York and Harlem Railroad, Mahopac branch; the date of the delivery of the agreement therefor and the conveyance of the right of way mentioned therein; also of the date of the payment to H. NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board of Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
