GENTLEMEN—From January 1, 1905, to the close of the winter season there was expended in the Borough of Richmond by the Bureau of Street Cleaning the sum of \$8,648.88 for snow removal.

No specific appropriation was made in the Budget for 1905 to the President of the Borough of Richmond for snow removal purposes, though same had been asked for at time of considering the Budget in October, 1904. Payment for the work in question, therefore, had to be made from other appropriations in the Bureau, namely, for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies and Final Disposition.

SIR—In the matter of the request of the President of the Borough of Richmond for the authorization of an issue of Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$8,648.88 for snow removal, to replenish the appropriation of his office entitled Labor, Maintenance and Supplies and Final Disposition for the year 1905, I beg to report as follows:

President Cromwell states that said appropriation for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies and Final Disposition is now practically exhausted, and that he desires to execute a contract for the purchase of broken stone for use in repair of the highways of the borough, the work under which contract should be commenced at the earliest possible date.

The Borough President, as stated in his letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, depleted his appropriation to the amount previously noted in snow removal work after January 1, 1905, and has delayed asking for this amount until convinced that he could not complete his year's work without it.

A copy of a letter addressed to a representative of this Department by President Cromwell is attached hereto.

I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize an issue of Revenue Bonds, as provided by section 546 of the Charter, to the amount requested by the Borough President of Richmond, namely, \$8,648.88, the proceeds of which bonds shall be applied to replenishing the appropriation for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies and Final Disposition in the Borough President's office of the Borough of Richmond.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held February 24, 1905, authorized the institution of condemnation proceedings, pursuant to the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter, of the block bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, Borough of Manhattan, for park purposes. The resolution contained the following clause:

"Nothing in this resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the above described property at private sale, subject to the approval of this Board."

Mr. Julius J. SIR—The Board of Education at a meeting held September 27, 1905, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Education hereby selects and determines as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Concord street and Nutria alley, adjoining Public School 1, in Local School Board District No. 27, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$4,000:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Concord street with the easterly line of the lands of Public School 1, which point is distant 75 feet westerly from the westerly line of Pearl street, and running thence southerly along the said easterly line of the lands of Public School 1, 100 feet to the northerly line of Nutria alley; thence easterly along the northerly line of Nutria alley 22 feet; thence northerly and parallel with the said easterly line of the lands of Public School 1 100 feet to the southerly line of Concord street; thence westerly along the southerly line of Concord street 22 feet to the easterly line of said lands of Public School 1, the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

In the report of the Committee on Sites to the Board of Education, recommendation was made by the committee for the acquisition of the land as an addition to the present site of Public School 1, and further that it was the intention of the Board of Education to improve said property for school purposes as soon as title thereto shall have been obtained by The City of New York, provided sufficient funds are available therefor. This is the usual recommendation made by the Committee on Sites to the Board of Education.

Public School 1 is located on the southeasterly corner of Adams and Concord streets, and at the present time occupies a plot 100 by 130 feet, which is covered by the school building. The plot desired to be acquired adjoins the school to the east and is 22 feet in width front and rear by 100 feet in depth. The distance from the easterly line of the plot to be acquired to the corner of Pearl street is 53 feet, so that if the Board of Education desired to add an addition to Public School 1, for school purposes, they would be making two bites to the cherry, because after acquiring the 22-foot site, they will have to acquire the 53-foot site down on the corner.

An investigation, however, shows that they do not intend to improve this strip of land to be acquired, and the only reason for its acquisition is that somebody has made a threat that unless they buy the 22-foot strip, that person will erect a manufacturing building of some kind or nature. Any one who is familiar with the location of Public School 1, the incessant noise of the elevated railroad, the dangerous street car traffic, there being a transfer station on the corner, would know that the erection of a boiler shop in the rear of this school would not injure it a particle.

The Board of Education is acquiring a school site 200 by 200 feet on Lawrence, Bridge and Tillary streets, upon which is to be erected a new school to take the place of No. 5, part of which school site is in the line of the extension of Flatbush avenue. They are also erecting a large school house on Hicks, Middagh and Poplar streets, both of which schools when completed will, with the other schools now already established, provide all the class-room facilities necessary, and, in my opinion, and in the opinion of the people who are familiar with school work and school necessities, will make the retention of School 1 as a school house unnecessary.

I am of the opinion that the request for the selection of this piece of property is a waste of the public money and is a plan to unload on the City a piece of property that cannot be utilized in any other way, and I respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment decline to act on the acquisition of this site, and rec-

ommend to the Board of Education the rescinding of the resolution of September 27, 1905, and await the erection of the two public schools in question, in order to see whether No. 1 should be abandoned entirely and a new site selected elsewhere or not.

To the Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

DEAR SIR—Having had ample proof of your confidence in my judgment and knowledge of my art, I address this communication for the purpose of laying before you a matter which I regard as of paramount importance, and which has dominated my thoughts and feelings so long and so persistently that I feel I can no longer delay in speaking my views concerning it.

I believe that the administration of City parks in a systematic, scientific and in the truest sense economic manner is a feature of municipal government that has been much underrated in importance, and, inasmuch as I am constantly in need of reliable information of both statistical and current nature touching the history and working conditions which attach to the opening, maintenance and operation of parks, in order not only to satisfy legitimate inquiries by officials of this and other cities, but also by experts in park matters writing me from abroad, I am subject to the constant humiliation and mortification of finding myself destitute of any truly scientific accounts from which to draw such information.

In place of such facility there exists to-day only a confusing mass of disorganized data, accidental in form and developed merely to satisfy the most primitive and urgent necessities of finance. An examination of the current park reports will show that even though a great deal of time and patient labor has been devoted to their preparation they are wanting in initial design and are materially lacking in structural coherency regarding the records from which they are compiled, and fail therefore to contain a degree of intelligence such as I believe to be indispensable to the achievement of the best results.

The parks of a city may not seem of such vital importance as its water supply and sewerage, for instance, yet, regarded from an aesthetic standpoint, they are the city's principal asset, and exercise a powerful influence over the spirits, inhabitative instincts and civic pride of the commonwealth, to say nothing of the enhancement of taxable land values. A city to be loved by its inhabitants must be beautiful, and the beautifying of a city rests largely with its Department of Parks. This is an immutable principle which all European cities are acutely conscious of, and results in any expert of reputation in such matters being constantly appealed to for scientific advice.

As the character of the relief which I desire and seek can be had only at the hands of a professional accountant of marked skill and attainments, and sufficiently enthusiastic in his own art to be actuated not alone by mercenary considerations, and of such personality as to conceive a sympathy for any peculiar needs and wishes, I ask the indulgence of being permitted to retain and engage a practising certified public accountant of my own selection, one which I assure you would not only stand high in his profession, but who has a sufficient appreciation of the technique of landscape architecture and its allied arts to mould and accommodate accounting expedites to the peculiar physical records I would seek to establish as auxiliary to the indispensable business and financial ones.

In short I would wish to install not only an effective classification of income and outgo from a money standpoint, but also statistics which would serve as a guide for future action in an artistic and scientific field. I would, of course, be most willing to have another accountant appointed by yourself or the Comptroller, familiar with the City archives, to collaborate with my appointee in such review of the past and current records of the Comptroller's office as would be indispensable in the preparation of the truly financial details, but in order for this matter to meet its object I feel I must have such appointee of my own with whom I can associate myself intimately, and my choice in this appointment having already been made I take the liberty of inclosing herewith a communication by Theo. Koehler, certified public accountant, addressed to me at my own solicitation.

SAMUEL PARSONS, JR., Esq., President of the Park Board of The City of New York:

MY DEAR SIR—As you have on several occasions expressed your intention to take the necessary steps to have the accounts and records of the Department of Parks of The City of New York revised and reorganized in a manner compatible with their importance, and have asked me to outline such features of the contemplated system of financial and physical accounts and statistics deducible therefrom as would enable you to intelligently answer numerous inquiries on the part of both City officials as well as experts in different parts of the world, I offer for your consideration the following memoranda of the primary facts which the records of the Park Department should clearly reflect and concerning which trustworthy information should be readily obtained.

Park Openings.

Acquisition of sites, with location and acreage thereof; the cost thereof as reflected in awards or consideration; the assessments levied and bonds issued therefor.

Initial construction, comprehending the character and cost of designing, grading, paving, planting, ornamenting, inclosing, monumenting and extending, and showing the debt and interest thereon as contrasted, where practicable, with the surrounding increase of taxable realty values.

These considerations to attach not only to the future undertakings, but to include also a review, collation and tabulation of the corresponding facts relating to all present parks.

Maintenance and Operation.

(1) A scientific classification of all income, comprehending appropriations and Special Revenue Bonds, and specific application thereof.

Revenue from rents, privileges and licenses, as well as sale of product and other fees derivable from scientific functions.

(2) A scientific classification of expenditure under the broad headings of:

Engineering—Roads and walks.

Artistic—Landscape gardening.

Botanical—Trees, shrubs and flowers, with such sub-classifications as are suggested by the purposes of irrigation and drainage.

Sanitation—Public comfort and removal of snow, etc.

Forestry—Fertilization and extermination of pests.

Experimental work and the scientific results attained, Music, skating, boating and other entertainments.

Materials and Service.

Classified as to kinds and contemplated use and distinguished as between such as are purchased upon contract and such as are purchased in the open market, together with public or private service by way of lighting, water, sewer construction or other services furnished by City departments or private corporations.

Salaries and Wages.

A classification of the administrative staff and clerical force as also the workman and attendance with assignment of duties and articulation with or apportionment among the various operating accounts of revenue and expenditure so that all material, labor and service will be classified not only according to its kind but also according to the specific park functions with respect to either construction or maintenance to which it may apply.

Physical Statistics.

Relating to such subjects as forestry, botany, scientific experiments, measurements of construction work, attendance, at park institutions, musical or other entertainments, accidents, arrests or other casualties, in short all such matters as a tabulated record thereof would facilitate park administration and indicate the effectiveness of its several provisions.

The foregoing outline is offered as a mere suggestion of the matters toward which review and systematization would be directed, it being obvious that the practical prosecution of the work would disclose many details requiring specific treatment, would measure the relative value of various considerations and the necessity of emphasizing some more than others, with an ultimate view, however, of rendering the system homogeneous in its entirety.

SIR—Under date of November 10, 1905, Samuel Parsons, Jr., Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, addressed to the Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, a communication suggesting that, inasmuch as he was "constantly in need of reliable information of both statistical and current nature touching the history and working conditions which attach to the opening, maintenance and operation of parks," * * * he be permitted to retain a certified public accountant "to mould and accommodate accounting expedients to the peculiar physical records I would seek to establish as auxiliary to the indispensable business and financial ones." Attached to the communication from the Commissioner of Parks was a letter from Mr. Theodore Koehler, certified public accountant, No. 1135 Broadway, New York, containing a memorandum outline of a system of financial and physical accounts which would enable the Commissioner of Parks to collect and collate the information desired.

Mr. Koehler, the accountant whom the Commissioner of Parks desires to retain, discussed the matter in an interview with the Park Commissioner and a representative of the Investigations Division. Mr. Koehler has submitted a statement, attached hereto, setting forth the facts as to his experience as a public accountant and giving further details regarding the plan which he proposes to set up. It would appear from this statement, as well as the one made in the communication of the Commissioner to the Mayor, that it is also proposed to undertake a review of past records and a compilation of certain data therefrom.

The question as to whether the services of an outside expert may be employed in the manner proposed by the Park Commissioner was referred by this Division to President William Baker of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. President Baker referred to section 6 of Rule XII. of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, which is as follows:

"Section 6. The Commission may, by resolution, except from competitive examination any person engaged in private business who shall render any professional, scientific, technical or expert service of an occasional and exceptional character to any city officer, and the amount of whose compensation in any one year shall not exceed \$250; provided that such limitation of compensation shall not apply to any person so employed by the Mayor or Corporation Counsel; and provided further, that the Commission may, by resolution, approved by the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, suspend such limitation in other cases."

In the event, therefore, of the employment of an expert accountant in compliance with the desires of the Park Commissioner, it would appear necessary that there be created in the Department of Parks an exempt position of expert accountant, the salary of which, to conform with the ideas of Mr. Koehler, would need to be on a per diem basis at the rate of \$25 per day for seven hours' work.

While there is no doubt that the statistical plant of the Park Department is deficient, and that the Department certainly does not collate financial statistics of any material value, it would appear that the present clerical and engineering force of the Park Department, a number of whom have for many years devoted their entire time to park matters, should be able to devise an adequate system of statistics relating to park development and the details of park management, without calling upon outside talent for this purpose.

So far as devising bookkeeping methods for adequately reflecting the financial statistics of the Park Department, it would seem that this, under the Charter, is a duty of the Comptroller.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the request of the Park Commissioner for the employment of an expert accountant be not granted.

SIR—Mr. Bernard Downing, Secretary to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, in communication under date of December 11, 1905, transmits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval, contract and specifications, for decorative mosaic ceilings in the Chambers, Centre and New street vestibules, and such other places as outlined on the plans for the new Hall of Records Building. I would report:

At meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 25, 1905, the President of the Borough of Manhattan was authorized to direct the architects, Messrs. Hogan & Slattery, to prepare plans and specifications for this mosaic work to cost not more than \$40,000 (including all fees).

I have made a careful examination of the plans and specifications, and would advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In communication of the 11th inst., Hon. John T. Oakley, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, addresses the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, asking approval of a proposed agreement with Mr. Silas W. Titus for the improvement and development of the Jameco pumping station on Long Island, designed to increase the immediate water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn. The agreement proposed may involve an expenditure of \$60,000, which is to be applied from the Water Revenue Fund, without further appropriation.

In attached opinion of the Corporation Counsel of the 11th inst., the Commissioner is advised that, in view of the large sum involved, this proposition should not only be approved by the Board of Aldermen, as the Charter provides (section 419), but that it should also be laid before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

I note that chapter 242 of the Charter gives the Board of Estimate and Apportionment special power to appropriate moneys from the Water Revenue Fund for the several purposes of the Department of Water Supply.

Request is made for immediate action in this matter on account of the shortage of available water supply of Brooklyn at the present time.

The proposition on which the proposed agreement is to be based is embodied in communication of November 24, from Mr. Titus, under which he is to largely increase the flow from twenty-one deep wells at Jameco station, now said to deliver 1,500,000 gallons per day. The contractor is to install a complete plant on the air-lift system and furnish all labor and material required for that purpose, expecting to increase the output from 8,000,000 to 10,000,000 gallons per day. The City is to be obligated to make payment for such increased supply at the rate of \$40 per million gallons of water, in each twenty-four hours, delivered into the conduit during a period of four months, such amount to be determined as the surplus over and above the present delivery from the twenty-one deep wells now driven at Jameco station.

At the expiration of the four-month period mentioned, the City is to have the option to make a contract to continue the supply for a period of two years at the rate of \$30 per million gallons.

Other conditions of the proposition are, in my judgment, favorable to the City, and, although the price proposed is much greater than the cost of water from the infiltration galleries and some other sources of supply in the City plant, such conditions cannot be reasonably considered in time of emergency, and where further development of existing deep wells by the application of the air lift or other system of pumping, should be of advantage in determining the future policy for water supply extensions on Long Island.

I recommend that the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subject to authorization by the Board of Aldermen for the purpose of entering into this agreement without public letting for the necessary development and increase in the water supply at Jameco pumping station up to the amount of \$60,000, this amount to be paid from the Water Revenue Fund, such procedure being deemed necessary on account of the emergency conditions in the Borough of Brooklyn.

DEAR SIR—I am forwarding to you herewith for the immediate consideration of your Honorable Board a proposition submitted by Mr. Silas W. Titus, an expert in sinking deep wells and operating the air lift system. It relates to the immediate development of the water supply in the Borough of Brooklyn.

I transmitted the matter to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether it should be considered as an improvement and development of the Jameco pumping station or one for the purchase of water. Mr. Theodore Connolly, Acting Corporation Counsel, has this day returned the document with opinion. He advises me that the matter should be treated as one for the extension of the water supply system and not for the purchase of water, but suggests that in view of the amount of money involved the proposition be presented to your Board for approval.

Mr. I. M. DE VARONA, Chief Engineer, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

DEAR SIR—Referring to the several interviews I have had with you during the past months in regard to the development of the deep water supply at the Jameco station, I beg to record here the proposition finally framed at our conversation yesterday, which is as follows:

I agree to take charge of the twenty-one (21) eight-inch deep wells now at the Jameco pumping station and to clean and remodel these wells according to my patented system, furnishing all the labor and necessary material for this purpose; also to furnish and install my patent air lift system to pump these wells, furnishing the temporary compressors, the wells to be developed and the plant installed so as to obtain the greatest amount of water possible therefrom, and to deliver this water

into the conduit through a measuring weir to be furnished and erected by you, the furnishing and laying of the necessary pipe and connections to be done by me and work to begin at once.

I agree also to furnish all the necessary steam, exhaust, air and water piping for the complete installation and operation of the plant as aforesaid.

As payment for developing the wells, installing the temporary machinery and appurtenances, pipe, connections, etc., already stated, and furnishing also the men, coal and supplies necessary to run the plant, I shall be paid at the rate of forty dollars (\$40) per million gallons of water delivered at the conduit over and above the amount now being pumped from the twenty-one (21) deep wells already mentioned, in twenty-four (24) hours; that is to say, from the total amount daily delivered and measured at the weir there shall be subtracted the amount now obtained from the twenty-one (21) deep wells, and for the remainder payment shall be made at the above specified rate of forty dollars (\$40) per million gallons.

This contract is to be in force for a period of not less than four (4) months from the completion of the installation. A daily record shall be kept of the water delivered and payments shall be made monthly for the quantity delivered up to the first of every month as shown by said records. This payment shall be made in accordance with the above as soon as possible after the first day of the month.

It would decrease the expense to the City and help to expedite the work if you furnished me with all the steam you can spare from your present plant—say one boiler—and in that case I would furnish such additional boiler power as might be needed. If this arrangement proves practicable the City shall deduct from the payments made to me per million gallons of water delivered the actual cost of steam supplied to me.

The City is to furnish me such coal as I may require to operate my boiler plant at actual cost to the City.

It is specifically agreed that at the expiration of the period above mentioned, i. e., four (4) months from the date of the completion of the temporary plant, the City shall have the option to make a contract with me to continue to supply the water for a period of two (2) years, in which case payment shall be made to me at the rate of thirty dollars (\$30) per million gallons from and after the expiration of the first period of four (4) months from the date of the completion of the temporary pumping plant up to the expiration of two (2) years from said date of completion of the temporary pumping plant. I am able to make this reduction because, owing to the extension of the contract, I would be able to install a permanent plant of much higher efficiency.

Should the City choose to terminate this contract at the expiration of four (4) months from the date of completion of the plant I shall have the privilege of removing the complete plant, including all strainers and patent appliances in the wells, all of which shall remain my property during the period of operation, but shall leave enough of my apparatus to enable the City to pump the well by suction and obtain one million (1,000,000) gallons per day of twenty-four (24) hours more than they are obtaining at present.

Should the City continue the contract for the term of two (2) years from the date at which the installation of the plant as aforesaid is completed, the permanent plant of high efficiency to be installed by me at the expiration of the period of four (4) months and already referred to shall remain the property of the City without any additional payment.

I hereby agree, upon the acceptance of this proposition, to start immediately to deliver the boilers, compressors, piping and all necessary materials, and to put sufficient men on to increase as soon as possible the yield from these wells. As fast as each well is completed I will turn the supply therefrom into the conduit through the weirs.

The completion of this work would be expedited if you were to allow me the use of some old pipe and fittings which are on the grounds at that station and not at present in use. This material would, of course, not be damaged by me, and I would either return it to the City at the expiration of the four (4) months' period specified above, or, in the event of installing the permanent plant, would agree to purchase it from the City at a fair price to be determined hereafter.

It is expressly understood that during the periods covered by this contract I shall have full and complete control of the wells that I am pumping.

It is specifically understood and agreed to by me that the quality of the water that I am to furnish under this proposition and for which I am to be paid shall be good and wholesome water, and especially that the amount of chlorine in the water shall not exceed at any time 100 parts per million, and shall not average more than 25 parts per million and show no indications of sewage pollution.

Hon. JOHN T. OAKLEY, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

SIR—I am in due receipt of a communication, bearing date December 7, from Frank J. Goodwin, Esq., Deputy and Acting Commissioner, which is as follows:

"Chief Engineer I. M. de Varona has been in consultation for some months past with Mr. Silas W. Titus, a recognized expert in sinking deep wells and operating with the air lift process, for which he has several patents. The matter discussed was the development of an additional supply of water for the Borough of Brooklyn.

"As a result of the interviews Mr. Titus has agreed to undertake the work in accordance with the terms of the proposed agreement. The expense to be incurred will not exceed \$60,000, the same to be applied in carrying out the agreement, and the balance for installing and operating emergency plants for a temporary supply under consideration.

"To relieve the present conditions existing in Brooklyn in respect to its water supply and to obtain as rapidly as possible an increased supply of water, the Chief Engineer strongly recommends the adoption of this agreement. It is classified as an improvement and development of the Jameco pumping station.

"If it is held that the contract is one for buying water it will be necessary, according to the terms of the Charter, to submit the matter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to obtain in addition the individual approval of the Mayor and the Comptroller.

"Will you kindly advise me, as soon as possible, if I can legally enter into this contract without submitting the same for approval to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

The question presented is whether or not the work referred to in the communication is an improvement and development of the Jameco pumping station or one for the purchase of water.

Upon the facts as stated to me and partly contained in the communication referred to it would seem that the work is one for the improvement of the plant for procuring water rather than the purchase of water.

Under the contract attached to the letter a somewhat complicated state of facts is shown, but I think in taking it altogether the conclusion I have reached is a correct one, and that the question is to be treated as one for the extension of the facilities of the City for obtaining water, not for the purchase of the water itself.

But I also think that whether or not the matter is one strictly to be passed upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in view of the large sum involved, it should be laid before that body with a request to act immediately.

DEAR SIR—During the past months I have had frequent interviews with Mr. Silas W. Titus, who is considered an expert in sinking deep wells and operating with the air lift process, for which he has several patents, with a view to develop the deep underground sources of supply at our Jameco Pumping Station and determine experimentally the probable yield at that station from these deep sources and the results to be expected from the air lift process. As the result of these interviews, Mr. Titus has agreed to

undertake the work in accordance with the terms of the proposition of which I annex copy hereto.

I think that to enable us to make the determinations above referred to, and particularly to obtain rapidly an increased supply to aid in relieving present conditions, it would be advisable for the City's interests to enter into this agreement, and I hereby recommend its adoption.

In order to carry it out, it will be necessary to obtain authorization from the Board of Aldermen to spend not to exceed sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000), of which amount the necessary funds would be applied to carry out this contract and the balance to the installation or operation of the emergency plants for a temporary supply, under construction.

This recommendation is made on the assumption that the work proposed by Mr. Titus will be classified as the improvement and development of the Jameco Station. If it be held, however, that the contract is one for buying water, since the payment is made on the basis of water pumped, it would be necessary to obtain the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make such contract, and the Mayor and the Comptroller.

In either case the money could be paid now possibly from the Water Revenue Account Budget for the remainder of this year, and if this is not entirely practicable, the balance might be made up from available Bond issues. For next year the expense would be paid from the Water Revenue Budget.

SIR—In the matter of a request of Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, for the establishment of a grade of Stenographer and Typewriter in his office at the salary of \$1,800 per annum, I beg to report as follows:

According to the Civil List there are now three Stenographers employed in the Borough President's office, two at \$1,500 each per annum, and one at \$1,050 per annum. One of the two employees receiving \$1,500 per annum, to whom the Borough President desires to grant promotion, is William F. Oderwald, who furnishes me with the following reasons as to why the request in his case is justifiable:

First—I am the Stenographer to the Local Boards in the Borough of The Bronx, having held this position continuously since January 1, 1898, when they were first organized under the Greater New York Charter.

Second—I have been employed in President Haffen's office for the past twelve years as Stenographer and Typewriter.

Third—A favorable report has always been made on requests of Stenographers to Local Boards in other boroughs for promotion to the \$2,100 grade.

Fourth—I have been doing stenographic work for the City longer than any of the other Stenographers to the Local Boards.

Fifth—I think it has been proved by my long service that I am thoroughly capable, accurate and faithful. In this connection I should state that I have multifarious duties to perform other than those covered by the title of my position.

Sixth—I passed an examination nearly four years ago and I am, therefore, still eligible for promotion to the grade of \$2,100 per annum, if grade be established. I was in the same examination with several of the other Stenographers to the Local Boards in the other boroughs, who are now receiving \$2,100 per annum. In fact, the one in the Borough of Richmond receives \$2,400 a year.

In view of the fact that the compensation of Stenographer and Typewriter is considerably lower in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx than in the other Borough Presidents' offices, it would seem that the request for the creation of a grade of \$1,800 in this office is reasonable, and I would respectfully recommend the approval of the same.

SIR—Examination has been made in the Investigations Division in relation to the facts connected with an application of Samuel Parsons, Jr., Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated November 15, 1905, asking that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment establish the positions or grades of Rodmen at a compensation of \$1,080 and \$1,200 per year respectively.

In the communication of the Commissioner of Parks, attached hereto, it is stated that these grades have never been established, and the further statement is made that it is necessary they should be so established to enable a proper compliance with the Civil Service laws.

On May 1, 1902, there was one Chairman on the pay-rolls at \$90 a month, or \$1,080 per annum, and under a ruling of the Civil Service Commission it was held that the duties of Rodmen and Chairmen were the same. The one Chairman or Rodman died since 1902, and several men since assigned to the work of Rodmen have been graded and paid \$75 per month, which the Commissioner says is the regular compensa-

tion of Axemen. There is said to have been a large increase in the amount of work required of these men in connection with opening and development of new parks and park improvements, and the Commissioner states it is only fair that the men doing the work of Rodmen should be paid as such.

The three men affected by the request of the Commissioner are Phillip J. McKenna, Christopher A. Farrell and Harry De Venoge. All three of these men are receiving \$75 a month, which is the same compensation as paid them when on the pay-roll as Axemen. They passed on examination in 1904 for promotion to the positions of Rodmen and their names now appear on the rolls of the Department as Rodmen, they doing the work of such. Commissioner Parsons says that no extra appropriation will be required to make the proposed increases in the salaries of these three men. The salary grades for Rodmen employed in several of the City departments are found to be as follows:

Park Department, Brooklyn, \$4.11 per diem.
Park Department, The Bronx, \$75 per month and \$1,050 per annum.
Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, \$660 per annum.
Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity (on Croton aqueduct), \$1,000, \$1,050, \$1,200 and \$1,500 per annum.

It would appear that there is no uniformity in the matter of salary grades for Rodmen employed in the several departments of the City government. From a general knowledge, however, of the character of the work required to be done by Rodmen, it would seem that the duties of Rodmen employed on the Croton Aqueduct under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity are more onerous than those performed by men in the Park Department or the Rapid Transit Commission.

As a result of the facts disclosed in this examination it is hereby recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution establishing one grade of Rodmen in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, at a compensation of \$1,050 per annum.

As the work of the Department, especially in the chemical laboratory, is increasing at a great rate, it will be necessary to employ the services of additional chemists and this will naturally be followed by designating one of the present chemists an assistant to the Chemist in charge of the chemical laboratory. I deem it essential, in order that such person may exercise the authority coincident with his position, to establish a grade with salary at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, and I therefore request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Charter of The City of New York, the creation of the position of Chemist in the Department of Health with salary at the rate of \$1,800 per annum.

SIR—In the matter of the request of Commissioner Darlington, of the Department of Health, for the establishment of the grade of Chemist at \$1,800 per annum, I beg to report as follows:

There are eight Chemists now employed in said Department at the following salaries: One at \$2,100, who is in charge of the chemical laboratory; two at \$1,500 and five at \$1,200 per annum. The Commissioner desires to appoint additional chemists to perform the extra work devolving upon the Department by reason of new laboratories with valuable equipments.

In his communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the Commissioner requests that the position of Chemist be created at \$1,800 per annum. It is his intention to appoint to such position Mr. Halsey Durand, a Chemist who has been in the Department since July 25, 1893, a period of over twelve years, and who is now receiving \$1,500 per annum. Mr. Durand is a graduate of Princeton University.

The principal reason for such promotion is to make Mr. Durand assistant in charge of laboratory work, in order that the ideas, methods, system and discipline of such division may be more effectively carried out in the absence of the regular chief and to locate responsibility in the handling of the valuable apparatus owned by the Department.

It is furthermore intended to place Mr. Durand in charge of the researches connected with impure foods and similar materials, a work that has greatly developed of late in the Department of Health, and, as stated by Commissioner Darlington and Dr. Atkinson, the latter in charge of the Chemical Laboratory, Mr. Durand is fully qualified to perform the onerous duties connected with such position.

In view of the foregoing facts I would respectfully recommend that the grade asked for be established.

SIR—In the matter of the request of the Department of Health for the creation of the position of Attending Physician at the tuberculosis clinic of that Department, with salaries at \$600 per annum for seniors and \$300 per annum for assistants, I beg to report as follows:

On March 1, 1904, a clinic for the treatment of pulmonary diseases, such as consumption, etc., was opened by the Board of Health in a new one-story building adjoining the headquarters of the Department on Sixth avenue, near Fifty-fifth street. This building was constructed especially for the purpose mentioned and was fitted up and equipped at great expense. The annual rental paid is \$4,735. The building contains a registration room, drug room, two waiting rooms, X-ray room, throat department and two clinics for male and female patients, respectively, each with an examination room, each room being lighted by a skylight. Trained nurses are always in attendance.

It is generally admitted by medical men that tuberculosis, taken in its incipient stages under favorable conditions, may be cured, but to insure recovery the diagnosis must be made at the earliest possible moment.

These clinics of the Department of Health are open from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. every week day, and from 8 p. m. to 9 p. m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. They are at present attended and patients examined by a corps of twelve physicians, whose work is voluntary and without compensation of any character. These physicians devote two hours per day, three days per week, to examinations and treatment.

In the first ten months of 1905, after the clinics were properly started, there were 3,230 cases examined and 1,126 of these were found to have tuberculosis. Fifty per cent. of the latter continued to receive treatment, which resulted in 15,795 additional visits being made to the clinics. Twenty-five per cent. of the infected cases were sent to the various City and State pulmonary institutions and to private hospitals.

Dr. John S. Billings, Jr., Associate Director in charge of this division of the Department of Health, informed your representative that the work expected to be performed by the attending physicians was especially hazardous to them. It has assumed unexpected proportions and is of such an onerous character that many of the skilled practitioners heretofore engaged in it have refused to continue to give their services gratuitously, and many now engaged have signified their intention of abandoning the work.

Commissioner Darlington desires to re-employ the experts who have left, and retain those at present engaged, and to do this it is his purpose to pay the present force, or those first employed, at the rate of \$300 per annum for the first six months and not more than \$600 per annum thereafter. He has also planned to engage three junior Assistant Physicians at \$300 per annum.

The Commissioner, as well as the Attending Physician in charge, informed your representative that if these physicians were paid the stipends mentioned, it would insure better system and discipline than now prevails at the clinics, and the Visiting Physicians could be held to a stricter accountability as regards punctuality, attendance and obedience to instructions.

The only other clinic in the Department is for the examination and treatment of trachoma and other eye diseases among school children. The physicians in attendance at this clinic are drawn from the regular staff of Medical Inspectors, who devote their whole time to the service and are paid from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum.

On September 14 last the State Civil Service Commission placed in the non-competitive class "Attending Physicians at the Tuberculosis Clinic of the Department of Health of New York City."

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the request of the Department of Health be granted.

There are at present eight Chief Examiners of Accounts in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts, one at a salary of \$3,500, three at \$3,000, two at \$2,100, and two at \$2,000. As stated in the letter of the Commissioners, it will be seen that there is no grade between the salary of \$2,100 and \$3,000, which precludes promotion, under ordinary conditions, of an Examiner from the \$2,100 grade, as the increase would amount to \$900.

The request for the establishment of a grade at \$2,500 would seem to be reasonable, and I would respectfully recommend the approval of the same.

SIR—In regard to the request of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen fix the salary of the Engineer of the College at the rate of \$2,250 per annum, which matter was referred to the Investigations Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York informed a representative of the Department of Finance on December 13 that it is desired to place the Engineer, who has been for years employed at the old building, corner of Twenty-third street and Lexington avenue, in charge of the big plant connected with the group of five large new buildings of the college at Amsterdam avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; that the Engineer at present receives \$1,200 per annum, but is supplied with living apartments, fuel and light without charge; that the Engineer will have none of these perquisites in the future, as he will reside outside the college buildings.

The present Engineer will also have charge of the Electrical Engineer and plant installed in the new buildings. He is in addition a machinist by trade, has always made all ordinary repairs to boilers, etc., and is considered a valuable man by the Board of Trustees. The Engineer in charge must be within call at all times and is virtually constantly employed. Of the five new buildings one is already occupied and the heating plant is in operation. It is one of the largest plants in the City.

As the Engineer at the New York Stock Exchange receives \$3,000 per annum, it was at first proposed by the Trustees that their Engineer should receive a similar salary, but the desire being to promote a deserving and competent man, a compromise was arrived at recommending the salary to be \$2,250.

It is therefore recommended that the request of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York that the salary of Engineer be placed at \$2,250 per annum be granted.

This deficiency has been caused by the payment out of the appropriation for books from the City funds of the sum of five thousand dollars to the Maimonides Free Library for their support during the current year.

The payment of this money out of the limited funds granted to the New York Public Library in the Budget of 1905 has greatly crippled the library because the funds had to be taken from the appropriation for books. It is therefore hoped that an additional allowance of five thousand dollars be granted the New York Public Library by transfer or otherwise to make up this deficiency in our book supply.

DEAR SIR—I beg to present to your attention, and through you to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that there have been incurred certain expenses by the various library corporations, or their representatives, through their agent, in the matter of acquiring sites for libraries under the Carnegie gift.

These expenses have been incurred because of the requirement in the contracts relative to this gift, that the sites for libraries be selected and approved by the representatives of these various libraries. The selection and approval of sites for libraries has involved the preparation of maps and drawings, investigation of the sites, appraisals and preliminary surveys, and the expenses of the executive work of the agent.

In a communication to you by the New York Public Library, bearing date of January 12, 1903, your attention was called to the necessity of making some provision by which all the expenses incidental to the acquisition of sites should be paid by the City as a part of the cost of the sites, estimating the average cost at \$250 per site.

The total expenses involved in procuring forty-two sites at this date, costing \$1,247,929.41, have amounted to .007 per centum of the cost, and the average expenses per site has been \$213.22, or considerably less than the estimate of the trustees. These expenditures, made under authority of the various library corporations, or their representatives, are a necessary part of the expenses of the acquisition of the sites, which, under chapter 580 of the Laws of 1901, should be provided for by The City of New York.

Forty-two sites having been acquired and the work therefor having been satisfactorily completed, I have respectfully to request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the payment to the agent of the libraries of the sum of five thousand five hundred and eighty dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$5,580.39), being expenses incurred to date by the libraries in this work, through their agent, not as yet paid, as a part of the expenses for procuring the sites for Carnegie libraries.

The Secretary presented the following communication from Horgan & Slattery, architects for the new Hall of Records Building, and report of the Principal Assistant Engineer of the Department of Finance, relative to the articles published in the New York "Tribune" as to the excessive cost of the building, and the delay in completing the same.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of New York City:

SIR—The New York "Tribune," of the 26th ult., published an article on the Hall of Records, which purported to show that the cost of this building was excessive; that we, as architects, are responsible therefor; that we receive greater commissions than are usually paid other architects for work of a similar kind; that a great deal of unnecessary work is being contracted for, and that the work in general is not being pushed to completion as rapidly as it ought to be.

We desire to present to you a detailed statement of the facts, and in presenting them, we feel that they will refute the misrepresentations and false accusations of the press, who, in no instance, asked us for information on the subject.

The plans and specifications for the Hall of Records were prepared by the late Mr. Thomas, during Mayor Strong's administration, and the contract for the granite and steel work, known as Contract No. 1, was let during Mayor Strong's administration.

Plans and specifications for the interior marble, plaster, cabinet work, hardware, heating and ventilating system, electrical work and power plant, elevators, architectural iron and plumbing, known as Contract No. 2, was also prepared by the late Mr. Thomas, but, before being estimated upon, the Van Wyck regime, then in power, investigated, and found fault with the excessive elaboration and expensive marbles and bronzes proposed to be used. The plans and specifications were therefore amended by the late Mr. Thomas, and over five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) worth of marble and bronze work was eliminated, and, we think, without detriment to the artistic aspect of the scheme as a whole.

These were the two contracts under way when, at Mr. Thomas' death, we were appointed architects.

Contract No. 1 amounted to \$1,997,900, and Contract No. 2 amounted to \$1,959,172.35, and neither of these two contracts provided a completed building.

If the work contemplated by these two contracts is studied in conjunction with the plans it becomes apparent that the size and arrangement of the rooms (the average being 25 by 50 feet) are not adapted for office purposes. Therefore, when the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Register, the Surrogate and the Corporation Counsel were assigned floor space, they immediately demanded the subdivision of the various floors.

The changes involved the introduction of many new partitions and extension of the entire heating and ventilating system; also of the electrical work, the plumbing, cabinet work, marble work, plastering, etc. To make the changes harmonize with the existing work, in such manner as not to mar or destroy the building, or its decorative features in any way, we planned and have schemed, we think successfully and economically, and neither existing walls nor partitions on any floor have been removed, and the new work has been so arranged as to be in perfect accord with the building as a whole, and with the needs of the several departments.

It is further apparent that if previous contracts, over which we had no control, did not include such necessary items as electrical fixtures, painting and decorating, metallic and other furniture and fittings, necessary to make the building habitable, and of use to the occupants, these things must inevitably follow, and we have so provided in the contract recently awarded to the Remington & Sherman Company, known as Contract No. 5.

Our plans and specifications for this work were given the greatest study, and where changes were deemed necessary these changes harmonize and conform with the kinds

and quality of the materials now incorporated in the building. There was no option in the matter, and our specifications are so drawn as to meet these reasonable requirements and no more.

It is worthy of note when the question of "extravagance" is mooted by the press to refer to an appropriation of \$250,000 granted by Mayor Low's administration to replace some of the marble stricken out of Contract No. 2 by Mayor Van Wyck's previous administration; and while this extra marble undoubtedly enhanced the value of the building, we were not consulted in the matter and did not advocate its introduction. This contract, known as No. 3, proved, however, an important factor in retarding the completion of Mr. Peirce's contract.

We now bring to your attention the chief causes which have delayed the completion of the building.

Had Contract No. 3 been eliminated, we are prepared to state that at least one year's time could have been saved. The work under this contract not only held back the plaster and cabinet work, as well as other branches dependent upon these trades, but when the work was started it had to be done during the year 1904, remarkable in the building trades history, owing to the complete tie up of building industries. There was also labor trouble in June, July, August and September, 1903, involving bricklayers, laborers, marble setters, steam fitters and metal workers. It is a calm statement of facts when we say that at least a two years' loss of time can be attributed to the two factors mentioned above.

It was not until July 7, 1904, that we were instructed to proceed with the preparation of the plans for Contract No. 5. The work involved many consultations with heads of departments or their assistants, and much preliminary work in the way of tentative plans.

We cite one instance where a readjustment of several floors had to be made when our plans were practically completed, necessitating thereby new plans, through no fault of ours, but because of the late date on which the allotment of space was made for the Department of Taxes and Assessments. Notwithstanding this delay, and the fact that we did not receive final information from the Surrogates' Department until the 16th of November, 1904, our plans and specifications were completed and approved by the various heads of departments in February, 1905, and by the Municipal Art Commission in July, 1905. The contract was awarded to the Remington & Sherman Company

It is also well to keep in mind that extra orders for work not called for in Contracts Nos. 1 and 2 would, and did, materially delay the progress of Mr. Peirce's work, and we have several of such minor contracts or extras, as follows:

In explanation of the extra order for the reinforcement of the floor beams and girders in the basement, we wish to state that this reinforcement was necessary to support the loads of the filing stacks, for which no provision was made in the original plans prepared by the late Mr. Thomas.

We also wish to state that the extra order for \$30,000 for mosaic ceilings is explained in a copy of a letter appended hereto.

That we were not negligent at any time in doing all in our power to push the work will be apparent from the appended copies of correspondence which passed between us and Mr. John Peirce, the general contractor; as well as letters from us to several heads of departments, or their assistants, in relation to the work.

The "Tribune" attempted to make a comparison between the Congressional Library in Washington and the Hall of Records Building.

It is impossible to compare two buildings so radically different in type and requirements, and the criticism has therefore no value. The true comparison between any two buildings can only be made when the type of construction is similar, the material nearly so, and the land values and current rate of wages approximately equal. No comparison therefore can be made between these two buildings, because the factors are so dissimilar.

Then again, while the cost of marble and granite do not differ materially, the cost of tooling granite is greatly in excess of that of marble, and we have thus a radical difference at the outset.

There are several public buildings in this country which equal the cost of the Hall of Records, but few, we believe, which are superior in construction, equipment, beauty or detail.

Architects' Fees.

The fees we have been paid by the City are for work done, and our charges are based upon the same schedule as is used by architects of experience and ability throughout the country, viz.: 2½ per cent. for plans and specifications, or for supervision and details, and 5 per cent. for complete plans, specifications, supervision and detailing. It is customary to charge 10 per cent. for all decorative and interior cabinet work, for which we are only receiving 5 per cent.

The percentages we have been paid on this building are as follows:

Our reputation as architects is being constantly assassinated by the public press, yet we are and have been ready to give full and accurate information on any City work for which we are architects, and are prepared to show that buildings erected according to our plans cost no more than those of a similar type erected by other architects in New York City, and the fees we receive no higher.

Those familiar with the significance of the word "detail," as applied to architectural work, need no enlightenment as to the vast amount of labor it involves, and, if an examination be made of this building, we think any one conversant with such matters will not begrudge the legitimate fee of 2½ per cent. for our labor, nor 5 per cent. when such labor embraces in addition the preparation of plans, specifications, general administration work and constant supervision of such work in all its multifarious aspects.

We have erected several million dollars' worth of work for private individuals, and have received from such clients, at the completion of their work, unsolicited testimonials upon the merit of the work, the energy exhibited at all stages of its progress, and upon the justice of our decisions between client and contractor. In every case we have received 5 per cent. for our work.

The criticisms of a corrupt press we have allowed to pass unnoticed; we cannot, however, allow the "Tribune's" article of the 26th inst. to pass without presenting to your attention the true facts as they appertain to the Hall of Records, and as an illustration of how the "Tribune" deals out to its readers information purporting to be the truth, we quote from the article referred to, and allow you to draw your own inferences:

"They found, for example, that the Tiger's dearest ally, the Gas Trust, had not been reckoned with. Although the original plans provided for lighting the structure

by electricity, and an electric light plant had been installed at a cost of \$110,000, as may be seen by glancing at Contract No. 2, yet the gas pipes had to go in."

There are no gas pipes now in the building, none are contracted for, and it is not necessary to install any.

It will be a pleasure to furnish you with any other information which you may desire in relation to the work.

SIR—In compliance with your instructions I have carefully read the letter of Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, architects for the New Hall of Records Building, addressed to his Honor the Mayor, under date of December 1, 1905, in relation to a certain publication in the New York "Tribune" of November 26, 1905, claimed by the architects to show "That the cost of this building was excessive; that we as architects are responsible therefor; that we receive greater compensation than are usually paid other architects for work of a similar kind; that a great deal of unnecessary work is being contracted for, and the work in general is not being pushed to completion as rapidly as it should be."

I would report that, in my opinion, the cost of the building may be considered expensive for an office building, but for a monumental city building it should not be considered an excessively expensive building. The only item that may be considered as an unnecessary expenditure is the item for some of the plaster partitions, rearrangement of some of the plumbing, steam heating and ventilating.

In the preparation of the plans and specifications for the completion of the new Hall of Records Building, the late John R. Thomas, to my knowledge, did not have the information of the assignment of the building, or the requirements of each department, although he informed me that he had repeatedly tried to obtain it. Without this information Mr. Thomas drew his plans and specifications for a grand massive building, without subdivision for the respective offices of each department. The doing of this work at this time may possibly cost from \$30,000 to \$40,000 more than if it had been included in the contract of John Peirce, known as Contract No. 2.

Omitting this work the cost per cubic foot would be about \$1.12, against \$1 per cubic foot for the New York Public Library Building at Forty-second street and Fifth avenue. The figure, \$1.12 per cubic foot for the Hall of Records Building is definite, while the \$1 per cubic foot for the library building is only an estimate, and I am inclined to think that when it is finally equipped for books, etc., this estimate will be low. It also must be borne in mind that a granite building is more expensive than a marble building. The granite will cost at least 40 per cent. more per cubic foot than the marble per cubic foot.

Not considering the building excessive, the question of responsibility may not be considered, but I would add that as noted before, the building was originally planned and designed by the late John R. Thomas, and subsequent contracts prepared by Messrs. Horgan & Slattery only called for such work that is in harmony with the general design as planned by Mr. John R. Thomas.

As to the question of compensation or architects' fees paid to Messrs. Horgan & Slattery the contract dated December 26, 1901, gives the following fees:

(a) Two and one-half per cent. (2½%) of my sums of money due and unpaid under any contract already awarded and entered into and that have not been certified to be due to the contractor by the said John R. Thomas, architect, deceased, and which sums shall be certified to be due to the contractor (s) under said contracts by the said Horgan & Slattery.

(b) Five per cent. (5%) upon the actual cost of decorative work, furniture, book filing and classification cases, stacks or vaults, selected by Horgan & Slattery and executed and installed or placed under its direction and supervision, but not first designed by Horgan & Slattery for this particular work, and not wrought or built under its supervision and direction.

(c) Five per cent. (5%) upon the actual cost of all decorative work, furniture, book filing and classification cases, stacks or vaults, designed by the said Horgan & Slattery and wrought or built under the supervision and direction of the said Horgan & Slattery.

(d) That consulting engineers or specialists that may be employed by the said Board in any branch of the work shall be paid by the said party of the first part.

These fees are not in excess of fees paid by the City to architects for similar work, and in the case of furniture, decorative work, etc., are the same as allowed by the City, but less than stated in the schedule of prices allowed by the American Society of Architects, which is ten (10) per cent.

There has been a number of delays and without trying to place the responsibility, it is my opinion that the architects, Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, have always done all in their power to facilitate the work. As a matter of business policy, it would be to their advantage to hasten the completion of the building; the sooner the building is finished the earlier they will receive their fees.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Principal Assistant Engineer, Department of Finance, and other papers in the matter of the proposed new bridge over the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

SIR—At meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held December 18, 1905, the Board referred my report of December 13, 1905, in the matter of the proposed new bridge over the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx. In said report I recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment enter into an agreement with the railroad company to remove the present bridge crossing its right of way at Mott avenue, the railroad company doing all the work of excavating, building retaining walls and abutments for a new bridge about eighty (80) feet in width and building the superstructure of said bridge.

The railroad company to pay all expenses of said improvement, the said railroad company should also agree to maintain the superstructure of the bridge, except the flooring or wearing surface of said bridge, which shall be maintained by the City.

In communication under date of December 21, 1905, Mr. Ira A. Place, general counsel for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, states the company does not quite agree to the said report and submits the following proposition:

"The company will enter into an agreement with the City through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under which the company will construct the entire bridge including abutments, superstructure and roadway of the bridge to carry Mott avenue at its present width of eighty (80) feet over the right of way of the railroad company, the company to bear three-quarters (3/4) of the entire expense and the City to bear one-quarter (1/4). After construction, the bridge shall be maintained in accordance with section 64 of the Railroad Law, under which the railroad company will maintain and keep in repair the frame work of the bridge and its abutments, and the City will maintain and keep in repair the roadway over the same and the approaches thereto."

The first offer of the railroad company was that the company would build the abutments and the City the superstructure; by this arrangement it would cost the City about \$45,000.

Estimating the abutments at \$35,000, by the railroad's present proposition, it will cost the City about \$20,000, or one-quarter (1/4) of \$80,000. There is some merit in the present offer, and as a reasonable compromise, I would suggest that the railroad company's last proposition be accepted, and that the City, through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment enter into an agreement with the company, to permit of the removal of the present bridge crossing its right of way at Mott avenue, the railroad company doing all the work of excavating, building retaining walls and abutments for a new bridge about eighty (80) feet in width and build the superstructure of said

bridge, the company to bear the entire expense of excavating and back filling for the entire improvement, also the entire expense of the erection of the retaining walls and to bear three-quarters (3/4) of the cost of the masonry abutments, superstructure and roadway of a bridge to carry Mott avenue at its present width of eighty (80) feet over the right of way of the railroad company, the City to bear one-quarter (1/4) of the cost of the masonry abutments, superstructure and roadway of said bridge.

After construction, the bridge shall be maintained in accordance with section 64 of the Railroad Law, under which the railroad company will maintain and keep in repair the frame work of the bridge and abutments and the City will maintain and keep in repair the roadway over the same and the approaches thereto.

All plans and specifications for said improvement to be submitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx for his approval, and all work to be done under his supervision.

In order that the division of expense may be approved and certified to by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, he should be furnished by the railroad company with a certified copy of all contracts and vouchers in connection with the work.

DEAR SIR—I have been furnished with a copy of the report made by Mr. Chandler Withington, Principal Assistant Engineer, to you, under date of December 13, 1905, in regard to my communication of December 4, 1905, in the matter of proposed new bridge over the right of way of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad (the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessee) at Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, but we cannot quite agree with Mr. Withington's conclusion as to the respective obligations of the company and of the City in this matter. Our desire, however, is to treat this matter not only fairly but liberally, to the end not only that the improvements which the railroad company is making may proceed without interruption, but that when these improvements are made they shall be so made that the situation will be left absolutely satisfactory to the City.

For the purpose of reaching promptly some definite conclusion I beg to make this proposition, viz.:

The company will enter into an agreement with the City, through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under which the company will construct the entire bridge, including abutments, superstructure and roadway of a bridge to carry Mott avenue at its present width of 80 feet over the right of way of the railroad company, the company to bear three-fourths of the entire expense and the City to bear one-fourth. After construction the bridge shall be maintained in accordance with section 64 of the Railroad Law, under which the railroad company will maintain and keep in repair the frame work of the bridge and its abutments, and the City will maintain and keep in repair the roadway over the same and the approaches thereto.

I trust that this will be acceptable to the City authorities, for if so, the company will be glad to enter into any proper agreement to carry it out.

SIR—Ira A. Place, Esq., general counsel for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, in communication under date of December 4, 1905, in the matter of the proposed new bridge over the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, states that the railroad company will accept the suggestion contained in the report of Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that is:

"The railroad company will construct new and proper abutments suitable to support such bridge as the City deems necessary to accommodate the traffic on Mott avenue, the City on its part to construct the new bridge."

I would report that the railroad company proposes to widen their cut at Mott avenue from eighty (80) feet to about one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet, and a new bridge eighty (80) feet in width is suggested by the President of the Borough of The Bronx to take the place of the present thirty (30) foot bridge.

I agree with the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, who holds that inasmuch as the company built the old present bridge, any change necessary on account of the widening of the railroad at this point would also devolve upon the railroad company.

Mr. Briggs, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, informs me that the present bridge was erected just before annexation (1873), about thirty-five years ago. It is safe to assume that the present bridge at the time it was erected was sufficient to accommodate the traffic on Mott avenue, and the old town authorities of Morrisania at the time so decided and permitted the railroad company to build this narrow thirty (30) foot bridge.

The traffic at this point has naturally increased until the present bridge, which is greatly in need of repair, is entirely inadequate to accommodate this increased traffic.

Even if the railroad company did not propose to widen its right of way, it is my opinion that it should provide a new and substantial bridge of sufficient width to accommodate the present traffic requirements. In short, I think the railroad company should provide and maintain for all times ample and sufficient facilities over their cut at Mott avenue.

In conclusion I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment enter into an agreement with the railroad company to remove the present bridge crossing its right of way at Mott avenue, the railroad company doing all the work of excavating, building retaining walls and abutments for the new bridge about eighty (80) feet in width and build the superstructures of said bridge.

The railroad company to pay all the expense of said improvements; the said railroad company should also agree to maintain the superstructure of the bridge, except the flooring or wearing surface of said bridge, which shall be maintained by the City.

All plans and specifications for the said improvements to be submitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx for his approval and all work to be done under his supervision.

DEAR SIR—Further referring to your favor of November 22 and to my reply of the same date, relating to the construction of new abutments for bridge over the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad (New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessee) at Mott avenue, there being attached to your letter copy of report of October 5 of Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I am informally advised that this correspondence is not in the form desired by the Comptroller. My understanding now is that he wishes the matter presented in the form of a proposition from this company rather than in the form of an acceptance on the part of this company of a proposition from the City.

My understanding of the matter is this:

The existing bridge does not extend over the full width of this company's right of way. The company now being about to utilize its entire right of way proposed to remove the existing abutments to its exterior lines and to lengthen the existing span. This, of course, would all be done at the company's expense.

Since, however, the existing bridge and abutments were built, Mott avenue has been materially widened by the City, and the company was informally advised by the local officers of the Borough of The Bronx that it was the desire of the City to substitute for the present bridge a bridge of the full width of Mott avenue as widened; and it was at the same time suggested that the company, instead of rebuilding the existing abutments at their present width, should build substantial abutments of the full width of the avenue, sufficient to support a bridge of the kind which the City desires; the City to build the superstructure of the bridge.

This being regarded by the company as a fair division of the expense between the City and the company as can practically be arrived at, indicated its willingness to carry out this arrangement.

If it is now desired that this be put in the form of a proposition by the company to the City, this letter may be regarded as a proposition by the company to build and maintain, at its expense, proper abutments to support a bridge of the full width of Mott avenue, the bridge to be erected and maintained by and at the expense of the City.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appportionment:

SIR—The accompanying communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated September 2, 1905, brings to the attention of the Board some correspondence recently had between the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx and the Engineering Department of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company concerning the rebuilding of the bridge across the railroad tracks on the line of Mott avenue.

The bridge now crossing these tracks is antiquated, and is fast becoming too narrow for the traffic which it is called upon to carry. This traffic is now rapidly increasing, and it will soon be necessary to provide a more adequate bridge. The present bridge appears to have been built by the railroad company at the time these tracks were originally laid. The company is now widening its line north of the Mott Haven station, and this widening will extend under the existing bridge, so that it will be necessary to take out the rock on each side of the tracks and put in permanent masonry foundations. The Chief Engineer of the Borough has held that, inasmuch as the company built the old bridge, any change necessary on account of the widening of the railroad at this point would also devolve upon the railroad company. This is undoubtedly the case. At the same time, I doubt if the railroad company could or should be obliged to substitute wholly at its own expense, not only a longer bridge of the same capacity as the present one, but also a wider bridge designed to carry the present and future traffic along Mott avenue. In other words, while the railroad company must meet the expense of such changes as are brought about by its own improvements and its own increase of business, the City should probably bear such expense as is caused by the increasing importance of the street which is carried across the railroad by this bridge, and must provide for the traffic which this added importance will bring. It would seem equitable, therefore, that the railroad company in making its improvements should provide the abutments for a new bridge spanning its tracks, which would cover the full width of Mott avenue, and that the City should provide a new bridge designed to meet the changed conditions and the increased traffic of the street. As the bridge is at a considerable height above the railroad grade, the building of the necessary abutments will doubtless be the most costly part of the new bridge, and I would recommend that such City officer as the Board determines be requested to negotiate with the railroad company for the building of new abutments to accommodate a new bridge of proper capacity, and that when the plans shall have been sufficiently developed an estimate of the cost of the superstructure be submitted to the Board, and that the necessary funds be provided to meet the cost of construction. It is probable that any such arrangement should be the subject of a contract between the City and the railroad company, which would be prepared by the Corporation Counsel.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities and resolution of the Board of Aldermen, relative to an appropriation of \$120,000 by the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to meet deficiency in various accounts of the Department of Public Charities:

In the Board of Aldermen.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES,
October 9, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the last administration in its allowance to this Department for the year 1904 reduced the departmental estimate of supplies \$135,650.41. This, of course, greatly crippled the Department, but by deferring action upon everything which would admit of delay without detriment to the service and by the exercise of the strictest economy the deficiency for the year was kept below \$25,000 which your Honorable Board subsequently voted for the relief of the Department. Now another year has passed away and the conditions are financially much worse. The effect of the past two winters, very unusual as they were for length and severity, has been to largely increase the cares and responsibilities of the Department. For instance: The departmental estimate of supplies for 1905 was based upon an approximate census of 9,755, when in fact, the average daily census for the first six months of 1905 was 10,127 or 372 persons more than the number approximated. On that basis and for that purpose the Department should receive \$38,313.46 more than it asked. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment had of course no reason to contemplate or anticipate the conditions which so largely increased the burdens of the Department and did, in fact, reduce the original amount asked for supplies \$121,318.69.

Increase in the census causes corresponding increase in other directions for supplies, salaries, equipments, etc.

No provision has been made for the board of New York City patients at the New York State Hospital for Incipient Tuberculosis at Raybrook, N. Y., established last year by authority of the Legislature, and the sum of \$12,000 is needed for that purpose.

The fund for donations to Grand Army Veterans was only \$18,000, while the actual expenditures amounted to \$23,164.64 for the year 1904, hence about \$6,000 is needed to make good the deficit.

Supplementary contracts for flour, provisions, vegetables, coffee and other supplies were opened August 4 to 21, but in the absence of funds applicable thereto, cannot be certified.

Your Honorable Body is therefore most urgently requested to appropriate the sum of \$120,000 and have the same added to the appropriations to this Department for the year 1905 as follows:

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held November 24, 1905, adopted a resolution approving of the selection of certain lands and premises on Fourth avenue, Garfield place and First street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for playground purposes.

The report presented to the Board at that meeting showed that the City was a holder of tax sales certificates on a large part of the land included within the area, and that the taxes due and accrued thereon with interest, amounted to more than the property was worth, against which the tax sale certificates were held.

There was also included within the area other lands in which the City had no interest, and the resolution adopted by the Board at that time described the property against which the City held tax sale certificates by the ward, block and lot and by the certificate numbers. The resolution also described the property in which the City had no interest by metes and bounds.

Inasmuch as condemnation proceedings were authorized to be had for the acquisition of this property, and the Comptroller was authorized to have three similar maps prepared, and as the three similar maps have been prepared and are now in this office, I think it would be better if the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be amended so as not only to describe the property by lot and block numbers, but also by metes and bounds. ART COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission Held at Its Office, Room 21, City Hall, on Tuesday, January 9, 1906, at 4 o'clock p. m.

On communications from Commissioners Healy, Cook and Morgan, explaining their absence, they were excused.

Minutes of meeting of December 26 were presented and approved.

The President's report was presented, stating that the following matters had been referred to committees since the last meeting, December 26:

Slocum Memorial Fountain—Commissioners Boyle (Chairman), Mansfield and Cook. Appointed January 5, 1906.

"In relation to the Slocum Memorial Fountain, Submission No. 390, the Chairman of the Committee begs to report that the site is not well chosen, because there is already a drinking fountain in close proximity, say 20 feet distance; also that the design would be more agreeable if placed on an axis, or at a right line to the square of the park, say as a substitute to the present square iron drinking fountain in the bisected walks close by.

"In relation to the sculptural parts of the design, I would suggest that the bronze panel in front be omitted entirely. As sculpture, it is inadequate; as an ornament or enrichment, it in no way helps the design. I would suggest that the ornamental branches or spandrels be omitted, and the ornamentation be concentrated on the dolphins and the shell, as in the present design they are much too joyous.

"The Chairman refers the matter back to the Commission without recommendation."

Appeal by plaintiff from final judgment dismissing complaint on demurrer on the ground that it does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action; also appeal from order of Special Term denying his motion for an injunction, and vacating a temporary injunction restraining defendants, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from taking any action on certain applications of the Board of Rapid Transit Railway Commissioners for their consent to the construction of rapid transit railways along the routes and under the plan referred to in said application.

Laughlin, J.:

The material allegations of the complaint show: (1) that the plaintiff is duly qualified to maintain this action as a taxpayer; (2) that the defendants, by virtue of their respective offices to which they were elected at the general election held in November, 1903, for terms of two years from the 1st day of January, 1904, constitute the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York; (3) that the members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York were elected at the same time and for the same period as the defendants; (4) that on the 26th day of May, 1905, chapters 629, 630 and 631 of the Laws of 1905, were enacted, to take effect immediately, transferring from the Board of Aldermen to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the authority theretofore vested in the Board of Aldermen to consent under section 18 of Article III. of the State Constitution and under statutes of the State to the use of the public streets by certain corporations authorized by the Legislature to use the streets upon obtaining the consent of the "local authorities" of the City; (5) that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has received an application from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for consent to the construction of underground railways in The City of New York along specified routes and according to certain plans presented, and has entertained said application and fixed a time and place for hearing the same, pursuant to the authority conferred by said chapters of the Laws of 1905, and will take action thereon and grant their consent unless restrained by the court; (6) that the plaintiff has no other remedy at law or in equity to prevent the contemplated action.

The plaintiff further alleges that the defendants are acting wholly without authority for the reason that the statutes thus transferring jurisdiction in the premises from the Board of Aldermen to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are unconstitutional and void on the grounds: First, that they violate the home rule principle secured to cities by section 2 of Article X. of the State Constitution; second, that they violate section 18 of Article III. of said Constitution. The learned counsel for the appellant concedes that the Legislature intended to transfer, and we deem it quite clear that it has transferred, if it had the constitutional right so to do, all the authority previously vested in the Board of Aldermen with respect to the control of the public streets, squares and places, at least, with the exception of the police power to regulate the use thereof, and to keep the same free from obstructions as distinguished from the authority to improve and the duty to keep in repair, and with respect to granting consent on such applications. Therefore it becomes unnecessary to consider in detail the various Charter provisions with respect to the power of the Board of Aldermen in the premises before such power was taken away; or with respect to the power conferred on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the premises by these several acts.

It is very clear that the Legislature intended to constitute the defendants, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the "local authorities" for the purpose of consenting in behalf of the City to the use of the public ways and places by corporations having a franchise from the State therefor, subject to the consent of the municipal or other local authorities, and sufficiently vested said Board with control of the streets and with such authority, provided it could do so constitutionally. The able review by the learned counsel for the respondent and by the learned counsel who took part in the argument and filed briefs by leave of the court, of statutory powers from time to time conferred on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by which its authority was deliberately greatly extended removes any doubt that might exist as to the good faith of this legislation; but as we have no jurisdiction to question the motives of the Legislature and may only inquire whether the legislation is constitutional and was duly enacted, that is immaterial.

The first point made by the appellant is that these statutes violate the provisions of section 2 of Article X. of the State Constitution, which are as follows:

"All county officers whose election or appointment is not provided for by this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of the respective counties or appointed by the Board of Supervisors, or other county authorities, as the Legislature shall direct. All city, town and village officers, whose election or appointment is not provided for by this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of such cities, towns and villages or of some division thereof, or appointed by such authorities thereof as the Legislature shall designate for that purpose. All other officers whose election or appointment is not provided for by this Constitution, and all officers whose offices may hereafter be created by law shall be elected by the people, or appointed, as the Legislature may direct." The precise ground of the attack made upon these statutes under section 2 of Article X. is that the Legislature has taken from one body of local elective officers before the expiration of their term of office certain powers and duties and transferred them to another board of local elective officers before the expiration of the terms of the incumbents who were not elected to exercise such powers or perform such duties. It is claimed that this constitutes a legislative appointment of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to office to perform the new functions. Even though this point should be well taken, doubtless its only effect would be to postpone the operation of the act until the next election of officials after the enactment of the law, who, it might be assumed, would be chosen with reference to the new duties (see Peo.

ex rel. Williamson vs. McKenney, 52 N. Y. 374; Peo. ex rel. Lovett vs. Randall, 151 N. Y. 497). This provision must be construed in the light of Article VIII., section 1, by which the Legislature is authorized to enact special laws for municipalities and to amend and repeal the same. Many authorities have been collated with great industry by the learned counsel for the appellant, upholding and enforcing these constitutional provisions designed to prevent the Legislature from itself appointing local officials and to preserve the home rule principle that local officers, whose election or appointment is not expressly provided for in the Constitution, shall be elected by the electors of the city, town or village, as the case may be, "or appointed by such authorities thereof as the Legislature shall designate for that purpose." No decision has been cited or found holding that it is a violation of the constitutional provision now under consideration for the Legislature to increase the power of one local official or diminish that of another during his term of office. The Legislature has always exercised this power, and bills by which this has been done have passed at nearly every session. Almost annually the legislative powers and duties of local officers and boards elected or appointed have been transferred to others, and often appointive officers have been substituted for others who were elected. Offices and boards have been wiped out and the functions devolved on other offices existing or newly created. In most, if not all, the cities the Legislature has taken from the Common Council or Board of Aldermen, which in the early days was vested with authority to enact all local legislation, important legislative powers, and vested them in boards of health and boards of park and fire commissioners and other like bodies. Its authority to enact such laws has never before been questioned upon this ground. In People ex rel. Board of Park Commissioners vs. Common Council (28 Mich. 243) the Legislature had appointed commissioners to recommend to the Common Council of the city of Detroit for lands for a city park, and the city had accepted the commissioners for such purpose, and thereafter the Legislature undertook, without the further consent of the city, to clothe the commissioners with final authority to purchase lands for the city for park purposes. On an application to compel the issue of bonds to pay for the lands, it was held that this was in contravention of a similar constitutional provision to ours, precluding the Legislature from itself appointing local officers. Judge Cooley, in his opinion, went beyond the facts of the case and discussed the authority of the Legislature to transfer the duties of one elected or appointed official to another who was not chosen with a view to the performance thereof. He, however, concedes the power of the Legislature to diminish or add to the duties of a municipal officer or board, but expresses the opinion that the duties added should be similar or germane to the functions with which the officer or board was clothed when elected or appointed. In Attorney-General vs. Cogshall (107 Mich. 181) a board of supervisors was abolished and their duties divided between aldermen and another board. It was held that this was not a legislative appointment of the new officers, but a transfer of functions from one set of officers to another, which was not uncommon and was valid. In Moreland vs. Killen (125 Mich. 381) it was held competent for the Legislature to abolish a board of public works consisting of three members previously appointed by the Mayor and Council and to vest the duties in a single commissioner to be appointed by the Mayor then in office. On the point decided in the Michigan case first cited, our Court of Appeals has held the contrary (Astor vs. Mayor, 62 N. Y., 567), and the obiter discussion is in conflict with the only authority in our own State precisely in point (Matter of Lester, 21 Hun., 130).

The tendency of the decisions of the courts of this State has not been to limit the authority of the Legislature in transferring the duties of one officer or body to another. These are all statutory offices. (Long vs. Mayor, 81 N. Y., 425). The power of the Legislature to abolish or change the duties of any statutory municipal office during the term of office of the incumbent has been frequently declared in unqualified terms, and neither Alderman nor the Board of Aldermen forms an exception to the rule (Matter of Lester, 21 Hun., 130; Long vs. Mayor, *supra*; People vs Koch, 152 N. Y., 72; Pearce vs. Stevens, 18 App. Div., 101; affd. 153 N. Y., 673; Demarest vs. Wickham, 67 Barb., 314; Matter of Allison vs. Welde, 172 N. Y., 421; Peo. ex. rel. Metropolitan St. Ry. Co. vs. Tax Comrs., 174 N. Y., 417; Peo. vs. Pinckney, 32 N. Y., 377; Matter of Zborowski, 68 N. Y., 88; Astor vs. Mayor, 62 N. Y., 567; Demarest vs. Mayor, 74 N. Y., 161; see also to same effect Shoemaker vs. U. S., 147 U. S., 282). There may be and doubtless is some limitation on the power of the Legislature to transfer the duties of one local office, not a constitutional office, to another; but it is not necessary to decide that now or to say whether the courts of this State will adopt the doctrine of the Michigan Park Commissioners case in the full extreme, because even under its doctrine this legislation can be sustained. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was created in 1873 by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of that year primarily for the purpose of protecting the City's property rights and interests, having reference to its finances and revenues. The Legislature has from time to time increased its power and functions. The revisers of the Greater New York Charter, in their official report of December 1, 1900, stated that the Board "has long and successfully stood the test of experience," and, concerning the extension of its powers, says: "The Commission has recommended a considerable extension of the powers now conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. With respect to what may be called the routine expenditures of the City, whether they are provided for by taxation or by use of the City's credit, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is given large powers. By reason of the possession of these new powers and of the increase of its freedom in exercising the powers which it has from the beginning of its history possessed, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under our draft Charter, will be the most important body in the City government. Whatever dissatisfaction may have been felt with any other municipal body, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has generally given satisfaction for its capacity, efficiency and integrity. Under the plan of the Commission it will be in reality the centre of all the legislative activity in relation to financial affairs, and of much of the administrative activity of the City. It will be in effect an upper house of the City Legislature and also a cabinet of the most important administrative officers."

The Commission to draft the Greater New York Charter decided to further curtail the powers of the Board of Aldermen and increase the powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and particularly with reference to the granting of so-called franchises (Ash's Greater New York Charter, 1st Ed., p. xxvii.), and in their report to the Legislature said:

"But it is a marked feature of the Charter now presented that it differentiates the powers relating to franchises, the creation of debt, the expenditures of money, the laying of taxes and assessments—these being the only powers liable to serious abuse—from the ordinary powers of a municipality embracing the countless subjects requiring municipal regulation. The former class of powers the Commission has protected against abuse by special and appropriate safeguards—safeguards which are in some respects unique, and which will in its judgment prove effective. Thus, as to franchises and their disposition, the Charter proposes a radical change of the highest importance and value. The streets of the City belong of right to the whole people. Their use for the public benefit and their control in the public interest ought never to be permanently parted with in favor of any private interests whatever. The Charter, therefore, declares that they are inalienable, and that no rights therein shall hereafter be granted by the Municipal Assembly except upon the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and then only for limited periods, and upon provision being made for periodical revaluations. Hereafter, therefore, no disposition of franchises, even for such limited period, can be made by the Municipal Assembly without the concurrent action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This Board is a body conservative in its nature and familiar with the extent of the City's debt, with its revenues, with its wants and with the amount that can be reasonably raised by taxation * * *."

The Legislature thereupon provided in the Greater New York Charter, pursuant to this recommendation, that no franchise should be granted "except on terms approved by vote or resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment" (section 74). The Commissioners further reported to the Legislature that grants of franchises had been unreasonably delayed by the Municipal Assembly, and to remedy this abuse they provided in section 48 that not only should the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prescribe the conditions upon which the consent should be granted and first passed thereon, but that the consent should become of force without action on the part of the Board of Aldermen, unless it disapproved the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment within six weeks. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment had succeeded to the duties of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement and had authority to acquire lands for new streets and public grounds, to widen and contract and abandon streets and to pave and repave them and otherwise improve them; leaving the police power vested in the Board of Aldermen. The Constitution does not refer to the authorities having the police or strict legislative power over streets, to regulate their use by the people, but to those who are authorized to make improvements and

have charge of the maintenance thereof (Town of Lysander vs. S. L. & B. Ry. Co., 31 Misc. 330; affd. 31 App. Div., 617; matter of Kings Co. El. Rd., 41 Hun. 425; matter of Rochester Elec. Rd. Co., 123 N. Y. 351).

This was the condition of statutory legislation at the time the present members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and Presidents of the five boroughs were elected to their respective offices. The legislation of 1905 indicates that the last scheme, requiring to some extent the co-operation of both the Board of Estimate and Board of Aldermen, was unsatisfactory; and it was determined to vest the exclusive control in one body. It was accordingly vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The property owners abutting upon a street through which it is proposed to construct a street railroad have a voice in the matter by the requirement of the Constitution with reference to obtaining their consents. The consent of the local authorities, required by the Constitution, has reference to the consent of authorities representing the entire City. The main considerations in determining whether such a consent should be given are the public convenience and securing a revenue to the City for the privileges granted, thus protecting the municipal interests as a whole. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was deemed by the Legislature better qualified to judge of the conditions to be imposed in granting such privileges that will bring the greatest revenue to the City. The duties added by these statutory amendments are germane to those with which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was vested when the defendants were elected. The existing authority was merely extended and enlarged. The objection, therefore, that this legislation violates the provisions of section 2 of Article X. of the Constitution is untenable.

We are of opinion that the objection that this legislation contravenes the provisions of section 18 of Article III. of the Constitution is likewise untenable. Important legislation has frequently been enacted on the assumption that the Legislature has authority to determine who shall have control of the streets and highways of a municipality and thereby is authorized to designate the local authorities whose consent is required. The courts have always recognized that the Legislature, through the exercise of its authority to designate the officials who shall have control over the streets, has the power to designate the local authorities whose consent is required (matter of Kings County Elevated R. R. Co., 41 Hun. 425; Town of Lysander vs. Syracuse L. & D. R. R. Co. 31 Misc. 335, affirmed 31 App. Div. 618; matter of R. R. Co., 123 N. Y. 351). But for this provision of the Constitution, adopted in 1874, the Legislature could grant a complete charter to a street railway as it always did prior to this time, because it represented the people in the control of the streets, and neither the Board of Aldermen nor property owners had any voice in the matter except through their representatives in the Legislature (Davis vs. Mayor, 14 N. Y. 506). It is manifest, therefore, that as to all consents for the use of the streets other than for street railroad purposes, the authority of the Legislature is supreme and it may make an unqualified grant or require the consent of any local official or body as it may deem expedient.

The Board of Aldermen has no constitutional right, however, to retain control of the streets, even for the purposes of this constitutional provision. The exclusive authority to acquire, improve, regulate and control many public grounds, streets and avenues of municipalities has often been vested in a Board of Park Commissioners and other boards, and is to-day in many, if not almost every city of the State, and such legislation has often been sustained by the courts (Astor vs. Mayor, etc., 62 N. Y., 567). Aside from the question of transferring duties from one officer to another not germane to the duties of the incumbent of the latter when elected or appointed, which is elsewhere considered, it is clear that the Legislature may vest control of the streets in any local body or board (Rochester and L. O. W. Co. vs. City of Rochester, 176 N. Y., 36).

Sections 26 and 27 of Article III. of the Constitution have no bearing on the points presented. The first of these sections merely authorizes the transfer of the power of the Board of Supervisors in the counties comprising Greater New York to the "Municipal Assembly, Common Council, Board of Aldermen or other legislative body of the City;" and section 27 merely authorizes the Legislature to confer further local power of legislation and administration on boards of supervisors. The Board of Supervisors of New York County never had the control of the streets within the limits of the city. Moreover, while the Board of Supervisors is the authority whose consent is required for any abutting property owned by the county, it does not constitute the local authorities having charge of streets or highways within the county whose consent is required. It has generally been the custom in our municipalities to elect Aldermen by particular districts known as wards. When the people adopted this constitutional provision they were aware of the fact that, according to the custom prevailing, the local authorities having control of the streets of a municipality were not always elected by all of the electors thereof. There is no distinction in this regard between making up a board of local officials by election or appointment.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is quite like a small municipal assembly composed of two houses acting jointly. It consists of eight members, three, including the Comptroller, the financial head of the City, being elected at large, and the Presidents of the Boroughs by the electors of the respective boroughs. It was deemed wise, doubtless, to prevent a deadlock by the Presidents of four of the boroughs opposing an improvement in the other and to give the representatives of the boroughs a voice in proportion to the population and taxable property of the borough, and to prevent the local representatives from out-voting the officials elected at large, instead of adjusting the matter and approximating equality by adding to the number, to give each a voice in proportion to the constituency represented. Accordingly it was provided that the Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen should each have three votes, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn two each, and the Presidents of each of the other boroughs one each, making a total of sixteen votes. In the amendment to the Rapid Transit Act changing the designation of the local authorities in Greater New York Charter whose consent is required from the Common Council—the predecessor to the Board of Aldermen—to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it is provided in substance that the vote on the resolution granting the application for consent shall be taken as in the meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that a majority of the sixteen votes shall suffice. It is claimed on the authority of Rathbone vs. Worth (150 N. Y., 459) that this renders the amendments void. That case merely holds that where officers are required to be appointed locally it is not competent for the Legislature to limit the majority so that some of the appointments are made by the minority, which is not directly in point and is not decisive of the question at bar. If legislative or appointive authority were, as often has been the case, vested in a common council composed of two houses, twenty-seven, say, in one elected by wards, and nine in the other elected at large, could it be successfully maintained that this would be illegal because each member of the less numerous body was given a voting voice equal to three times that possessed by the member of the lower house? Moreover, this was evidently an inadvertence, because in the Charter amendments passed concurrently therewith a three-fourths vote is required, which ensures a majority of the members. If the vote authorized by the amendment to the Rapid Transit Act would render the amendment void, then for the purpose of sustaining the Legislature the courts could interpret as requiring a majority vote in the vote required by the amendments to the Charter. Any question in this regard and concerning the authority of the deputies to sit can only arise after a grant is made or declined.

It follows, therefore, that the judgment and order should be affirmed.

Appeals by plaintiff from a final judgment dismissing the complaint on demurrer on the ground that it does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action, and from an order denying his motion for a permanent injunction and vacating a temporary injunction restraining defendants, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from acting on certain petitions for franchises, so called, or on other like petitions that may be filed.

Laughlin, J.:

This is also a taxpayer's action, and it is brought to enjoin action upon the petitions of the Atlantic Telephone Company for consent to the use of certain streets for the construction of an overhead or underground telephone line, and by the New York and Port Chester railroad Company, the Nassau Electric Company, the Southern Boulevard Railroad Company and the Union Railway Company of New York City, for consent to the use and occupation of certain public streets of the city for the construction of street surface railways. The questions presented are the same as those presented in Wilcox vs. McClellan, as Mayor, etc., et al., argued and decided herewith, except that neither the Rapid Transit Act or the amendments thereto have any bearing on the application upon which action is sought to be enjoined herein, and of course the provisions of section 18 of Article III. of the Constitution, with respect to the consent of the local authorities to the construction and operation of street railways have no direct application to the petition of the telephone company. Neither, however, claims any distinction in principle or that the act can be upheld in part and both unite in asking a decision on the broad ground as to the jurisdiction of the Legislature to vest those powers in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the exclusion of the Board of Aldermen. Even if the amendments to the Rapid Transit Act (Ch. 631, L. 1905) should be void on account of the provision concerning the vote on the application by which a minority might grant the consent, yet, since the provision on that subject contained in the amendments to the City Charter (Chaps. 629 and 630, L. 1905) would in all cases require at least a majority vote, still power would exist in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to grant these applications. The decision in the Wilcox case adverse to the plaintiff is decisive of the questions presented by this appeal.

It follows that the judgment should be affirmed with costs to the respondents, and the order, so far as appealed from, should be affirmed with ten dollars costs and disbursements to the respondents.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIRS—I am in due receipt of a communication bearing date 16th inst., from Joseph Haag, your Secretary, acknowledging the receipt of a communication from me, inclosing the opinions of the Appellate Division affirming the judgments and orders in the actions instituted by Clermont H. Wilcox and Franklin Pettit against the Mayor and others.

Mr. Haag states that certain proceedings are pending before your Board in regard to the application of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company for a franchise, and requests that I advise you if you are now without restraint to proceed with the exercise of your powers and duties, in accordance with chapters 629, 630 and 631 of the Laws of 1905, and requests me further to submit such recommendations as I may deem pertinent to the question.

In answer to your communication I have to say that the orders of affirmance have been entered in the two actions and proceedings in question, which orders unanimously affirmed the orders and judgments of the Special Term refusing an injunction against your Board, asked for by plaintiff.

Upon the settlement of the orders before Hon. Morgan J. O'Brien, Presiding Justice of the Appellate Division, two different forms of orders were presented, one by Mr. L. Laflin Kellogg, counsel for plaintiffs, and the other by Mr. Theodore Connolly, First Assistant in this Department, on behalf of the defendants-respondents.

Mr. Kellogg sought for an order which should grant a stay against your Board pending an appeal by his clients to the Court of Appeals.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Justice O'Brien refused to sign the order presented by Mr. Kellogg, granting a stay, but expressed himself very clearly to the effect that it would be very imprudent on the part of any City authority to grant, or on the part of any private corporation to receive, a franchise from your Board, pending an appeal to the Court of Appeals by plaintiffs, provided, of course, plaintiffs should promptly bring said appeal on for hearing.

Judge O'Brien endorsed on the order which he signed the following memorandum:

"The order presented by the City has been signed for the reason that the one presented by the plaintiff contains a stay, which at the present time is unnecessary, believing as we do that neither the Board of Estimate and Apportionment nor private cor-

porations, in view of the likelihood of any early decision by the Court of Appeals, which will finally settle the question in dispute, will proceed until the rights are finally determined."

It is not my understanding of the memorandum filed by the Presiding Justice that he intends that your Board shall take no action whatever in the way of progressing the various applications now before your Board, but he expressed himself not only in the memorandum quoted, but orally, to the effect that your Board should at least take no final action until the decision of the matter by the Court of Appeals.

Therefore, while I see no objection to your Board proceeding by holding hearings, etc., to progress the various applications now before you, it would be very improper and very inexpedient for your Board to take any final action upon any application now pending until the determination by the Court of Appeals of the questions involved in these actions.

I may state that I shall endeavor very earnestly to have a hearing upon the appeals as promptly as possible, and hope to have them heard in the Court of Appeals on February 13. I will communicate with you very promptly as soon as any result is reached in that Court. Meanwhile, as I have already advised you, you should not take any final action upon the applications now before you.

The Comptroller moved that further action be adjourned until March 2, 1906, pending the decision of the Court of Appeals on the constitutionality of the law conferring upon the Board the power to grant franchises.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—There is now pending before your Honorable Board the application of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company for a street surface railroad franchise in Livingston street, between Flatbush avenue and Court street, this borough. The petition of the railroad company was filed with the Board on June 2, 1905, was the subject of a public hearing on June 30, 1905, and was then referred to the Comptroller, who later referred it to the Bureau of Franchises. My attention has just been called to it by the Engineer in charge of that Bureau.

As the matter lies wholly within the Borough of Brooklyn, I feel that the Board is entitled to my views as President of the Borough, and that those views in this matter should determine the action of the Board. Accordingly, I now submit to you that this office is absolutely opposed to the grant of the franchise now under consideration. The company seeking it is one of the subsidiary companies of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, a corporation whose service in the past has not been of the quality that would endear it to any community. I have no hesitation in declaring that the public sentiment of the borough is solidly against any extension of the powers of that corporation and that its hostility is neither unreasonable nor unjust.

By this I do not mean that Livingston street, recently widened from fifty to eighty feet, should not be used to relieve as much as may be the congestion in Fulton street. It is plain that trolley cars—and since, unfortunately, there are no other trolley cars in this part of Brooklyn but Brooklyn Rapid Transit trolley cars, they must be trolley cars of that company—should have tracks in that thoroughfare, but it does not follow necessarily that the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company should build or own the railroad. This should be done by the City itself, and the road, when constructed, should be leased for periods of one or two years to the Nassau Company or any other company which might find it possible and profitable to operate cars in Livingston street. The lease should be terminable at the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provision being made for a notification of its termination to the company a reasonable time in advance.

This plan, it seems to me, would serve the purpose which primarily caused the widening of the street and at the same time would give no more power into the hands of the railroad company. Therefore I recommend to the Board that the petition of the

Nassau Electric Railroad Company be denied and that the Bureau of Franchises be directed to prepare a report and a resolution to provide for the construction of a double-track street surface railroad in Livingston street, from Flatbush avenue to Court street. However, there may be some question arise as to whether or not this can be done under the present statutes, and I would suggest that the legal question involved be referred at once to the Corporation Counsel.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, paving, curbing and laying sidewalks on Rogers avenue, between Malbone street and Flatbush avenue, and objections filed by DeWitt V. D. Reiley, attorney, in behalf of Kingston Realty Company and others; by Joseph F. Keaney, attorney for Patrick McCanna and by Hugo Hirsh, attorney for Horatio S. 
