HEARINGS

Case 1134

CONEY ISLAND AND BROOKLYN RAILROAD COMPANY—FIVE-CENT FARE TO CONEY ISLAND ON WEEK-DAYS

An adjourned hearing was held at 2:30 P. M., Commissioner Bassett presiding, upon the complaint of Jonas Monheimer against the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company in regard to a five-cent fare from New York to Coney Island on week-days. Appearances: Grosvenor H. Backus for the Commission; Dykman, Oeland and Kuhn, by William N. Dykman, for the company. Elmer M. White, Auditor of the company, testified for the Commission as to the points of collecting second fares on the company's lines prior to August 31, 1908, and the time schedule of the trip to Coney Island on the company's lines. G. P. Watkins, a statistician of the Commission, recalled, testified for it as to, and gave in evidence, certain data compiled by him as to the company's car operations across the Brooklyn and Williamsburg Bridges, and further testified as to the preparation by him of data in connection with the subject matter of the proceeding. Mr. Backus placed in evidence the cross-examination of Frank R. Ford in Cases Nos. 350 and 352 upon the complaints of Jonas Monheimer and Scott MacReynolds, respectively, against the company in regard to the fare to Coney Island, and also certain exhibits introduced in those proceedings in regard to the company's operating expenses and income accounts. TROLLER AS TO DISPOSITION—OPINION OF COUNSEL The Secretary presented a communication dated February 2, 1910, from Edmund D. Fisher, Deputy Comptroller, Department of Finance of the City of New York, stating that the Rapid Transit Subwav Construction Company had made application for the return of the balance of \$150,000.00 remaining from the deposit of \$1,000,000.00 made by it with the Comptroller of the City of New York as security for the completion of Contract No. 2, and asking if it would be proper to return such balance to the company at the present time; also a communication dated February 7, 1910, from the Counsel to the Commission, giving his opinion in the matter, from which the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Department of Finance the following extract:

"I think, in view of the possible liability on the part of the contractor for the damages which have occurred in constructing the subway under Joralemen Street. that it would be inadvisable at this time to make any further reduction in the security furnished by the contractor and held by the city. Under the agreement, dated Septemher 22, 1908, provision was made for returning \$850,000.00 of the \$1,000,000.00, leaving \$150,000.00, that being the amount certified by the Chief Engineer as sufficient to cover the physical damage. In addition, the city holds various liens which furnish additional security. I think it would be advisable to send a copy of this agreement to the Department of Finance and inform it that in view of the Joralemon Street litigation it would, in the opinion of the Commission, be inadvisable to make any further reduction in the security held by the city.'

Now, pursuant to the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act, being Chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, and pursuant also to the provisions of the Contract, the Commission hereby approves the application of the Contractor for permission to lay upon the Flatbush Avenue Extension and property acquired for bridge purposes in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, a temporary double track tramway as indicated on the blue-print hereto annexed entitled "Proposed Temporary railroad track on Manhattan Bridge property for use of Fourth Avenue Subway contractors' to be used only for the removal of excavated material and for the transportation of materials for use in the construction of the said Manhattan Bridge Extension One, provided, however, that this approval is granted only upon the following terms and

(1) The Contractor, in advance of constructing such temporary tramway, shall make arrangements with the Bridge Department of The City for the tise of property belonging to the Department of Bridges and shall at all times whether in construction, maintenance or operation of such tramway comply with the requirements of the Department of Bridges in so far as such construction, maintenance or operation shall affect property acquired for bridge purposes.

(2) As the work of subway excavation proceeds the Contractor may extend such tramway along its section but the position of the tracks and the manner of constructing, maintaining and operating them shall at all times be subject to the directions

of the Chief Engineer to the Commission.

(3) The Contractor shall use special care in laying such tramway at all street crossings where the streets are or may be open to traffic and shall take up the stone blocks and pavement for the width of the tracks in order to permit the tracks to be laid flush with the pavement with planking between the tracks also laid flush with the tracks so that vehicular or other traffic can cross the tracks without noise or inconvenience, and upon the removal of the temporary tramway the Contractor shall restore the street pavement and sidewalks to a good condition and shall at all times during the operation of such tramway make all such repairs to the pavement or sidewalks as may be necessary to maintain the same in a good state of repair.

(4) The Contractor shall construct and maintain the crossing of any street rail road tracks in accordance with the reasonable requirements of the railroad company

or companies operating such tracks.

(5) The Contractor shall install south of Sands Street derailing switches and bumpers or such other means of avoiding accident and affording protection to traffic at Sands Street as may be required by the Chief Engineer to the Commission.

(6) The Contractor shall keep a watchman at all times during the operation of the said tramway at or near the Sands Street crossing and such other crossings as may be required by the Chief Engineer to the Commission for the purpose of preventing accidents.

(7) If coal burning locomotives are used for operating the tramway such locomotives shall be fitted with proper spark arresters and only anthracite coal shall be used and every practicable precaution shall be taken to reduce to a minimum the smoke and noise incident to the use of steam motive power.

3) The Contractor shall indemnify and save harmless The City of New York and the Commission from any and all loss, damages, claims, costs or expenses of whatsoever character directly or indirectly caused by or resulting from or in consequence of or in any way connected with the construction, maintenance or operation of the said tramway.

(9) The Contractor shall operate cars and locomotives or other appliances over the said tracks at such times and in such manner as may be required by the Chief Engineer to the Commission and so as to cause the least possible annoyance or inconvenience to the public or adjacent property owners or to the Department of Bridges and shall construct, maintain and operate the said tramway in accordance with all valid and applicable ordinances and regulations of The City of New York or other-

(10) In the event that the right of the Contractor to construct, maintain or operate the said tramway shall for any reason be attacked they shall at their own cost and expense maintain, in so far as they deem necessary, any right claimed by them

(11) The permission hereby granted to install and temporarily maintain and operate the said tramway shall be revocable at any time by the Commission and the Contractor shall forthwith, upon notice of such revocation and upon the direction of the Commission, remove the said tramway and restore or cause to be restored the street and the pavement thereof and public places to a good condition to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer to the Commission. Notice of such revocation and such direction may be given in the manner prescribed in the Contract.

(1) The Contractors in advance of constructing such tramway shall make ar rangements to be approved by Counsel to the Commission with the person, firm or corporation having a contract or contracts with The City of New York or otherwise for the maintenance or repair of the pavement of Nineteenth Street or any part thereof affected by such construction, whereby any interference with or disturbance or removal or repair or replacing of said pavement under or in consequence of this approval shall not relieve such person, firm or corporation of any obligation any of them may be under to The City of New York or otherwise or entitle them to additional compensation from The City of New York or otherwise.

(2) The Contractors shall use special care in laying the tracks so that they shall be flush with the pavement, with planking between the tracks also laid flush with the pavement in order that vehicular or other traffic can cross said tracks with-

(7) The Contractors shall indemnify and save harmless The City of New York and the Commission from any and all loss, damages, claims, costs or expenses of whatsoever character, directly or indirectly, caused by or resulting from or in consequence of or in any way connected with the construction, maintenance or operation

of the said tramway.

Case 1200 MANHATTAN BRIDGE THREE-CENT LINE-APPLICATION FOR CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CON

VENIENCE AND A NECESSITY FOR RAILROAD OVER MANHATTAN BRIDGE An adjourned hearing was held at 2:55 P. M., Commissioner Bassett presiding. upon the application of the Manhattan Bridge Three-Cent Line for a certificate of public convenience and a necessity for a street railroad over the Manhattan Bridge and on certain streets in Manhattan and Brooklyn. Appearances: Albert H. Walker for the Commission; Frederick W. Rowe and Latson, Tamblyn and Picard, by Albert Reed Latson, for the applicant; George D. Yeomans and C. A. Collin for the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company; Dykman, Oeland and Kuhn, by William N. Dykman, for the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company, J. C. Brackenridge, recalled, testified for the applicant as to the proposed route and its intersections with other lines in Brooklyn and as to the routes of those other lines. Mr. Dykman, for all the other companies appearing, made a statement as to the steps taken by those companies with a view to obtaining the right to operate a line from the Flatbush Avenue station of the Long Island Railroad Company to the Manhattan terminal of the Manhattan Bridge at a three-cent fare and with transfer privileges to the lines of the Brooklyn companies at a five-cent fare, and as to the question whether the proposed line would serve public convenience and necessity. Mr. Latson replied to Mr. Dykman, making a statement as to the general intention of the applicant to use electricity as a motive power with gasoline as a possibility, but not to use the underground trolley in Brooklyn or the overhead trolley in Manhattan,

and, after a discussion between counsel for the applicant and for the opposing companies and Commissioner Bassett as to the necessary proof in the proceeding, the hearing was adjourned to February 23, 1910, at 2:30 P. M. [See Item No. 264.]

FOURTH AVENUE SUBWAY-ACQUISITION OF REAL ESTATE-REQUISITION ON BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT FOR \$200,000.00

The adoption of the following resolution was moved and duly seconded: RESOLVED: That the Public Service Commission for the First District make application upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York for the authorization of corporate stock of the City of New York, for the purpose of acquiring necessary real estate and rights, terms and easements therein for the construction of the various sections of the Fourth Avenue Subway now under construction, to the amount of \$200,000.00, and that the Chairman and Secretary be and they hereby are authorized to execute and transmit under the seal of the Commission a communication including such requisition herewith presented.

Ayes-Commissioners Willcox, McCarroll, Bassett, Maltbie, Eustis. Nays—None. Carried.

The form of the communication which the Chairman and Secretary were authorized by the above resolution to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was as follows: February , 1910

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York.

Sirs:-The Commission has duly entered into contracts for the construction of the Fourth Avenue Subway and the work is now proceeding, but while appropriations were made for the construction of the subway and for the construction of the pipe galleries no appropriation has yet been made for the acquisition of the necessary private property. Surveys have been made and condemnation maps are in process of preparation, and the Corporation Counsel will shortly be requested under the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act to institute condemnation proceedings. A large amount of real estate, probably not less than \$2,500,000.00 in value, will need to be acquired in this locality. In many cases, however, it is more economical and advantageous to the city to purchase property at private sale, and while the greater part of the property needed will have to be condemned it is probable that from time to time it will be possible to acquire parcels of property at advantageous terms which will not only result in a probable saving to the city in the case of the special piece of property purchased but may also establish some standard of valuation in the condemnation proceeding. From another standpoint it is also important in the opinion of the Commission that there he some machinery for purchases at private sale. There have be so many delays incident to condemnation proceedings in the past that while unduate Rapid Transit Act the award to be made carries interest at six per cent from

the title vests upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners, still the taking of the property and the payment for it several years after the property owner has lost possession of it has caused real suffering and hardship on the part of many property owners. For this reason in addition to the advantage to the city the Commission

thinks that where a property owner wishes to sell at a fair price he should be afforded an opportunity of making the sale and getting prompt payment.

The Commission has lately made a contract, subject to the appropriation of the necessary moneys, with the City House Moving Company for the purchase of a triangular piece of property situated on the westerly side of Flatbush Avenue extension near the corner of Nassau Street, having a frontage of one hundred and three feet four and one-half inches on the extension, a depth of forty-one feet and five inches and a length of ninety-four feet ten inches, for the sum of \$20,000.00, free and clear of all incumbrances. It will cost to procure a policy of title insurance upon this prop erty in the sum of \$20,000.00 the additional amount of \$71.82. The purchase price in this case was fixed after informal conferences between representatives of the office of Counsel to the Commission and the Law Department of the city, which will have to conduct the necessary condemnation proceedings, and is the price fixed by the real estate experts retained by the Commission and the Law Department.

The delay incident to making a separate requisition for each piece of property would in many cases greatly hinder if not defeat the attempts to purchase at private sale, and the Commission deems it advisable that a requisition be made for a blanket amount which can be applied for these purchases from time to time as the occasion arises. Under an amendment to the charter passed at the last session of the Legislature provision is made for the purchase of awards in condemnation proceedings after title vests, so that purchases at private sale need not cease with the institution of condemnation proceedings. These purchases will be made in the future, as in the past, in concert with the Law Department of the city, so that there may be no danger of prejudice to the city's rights in the condemnation proceedings.

The amount of \$200,000.00 which is now requested is sufficient for contracts of purchase now in hand or immediately contemplated. If it is possible to buy still more of the requisite land without condemnation it will be necessary to ask your Board for further similar appropriations.

Therefore, in accordance with the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act, being Chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, the Public Service Commission for the First District hereby makes requisition upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York for the authorization of corporate stock of the City of New York to be issued and sold by the Comptroller for the purpose of acquiring real estate and any rights, terms and interests therein, any and all rights, privileges, franchises and easements, whether of owners or abutters or others, to interfere with the construction or operation of the various sections of the Fourth Avenue Subway now under construction, or to cover damages therefor, which in the opinion of the Commission it shall be necessary to acquire or extinguish for the purpose of constructing and operating such road, free of interference or right of interference, to the amount

This necessity is increased by the decision of the Commission that future contracts for construction at municipal expense should be unit price contracts which makes it imperative that the rock and earth lines be determined beforehand as definitely as possible. to any necessary consent or approval of the local authorities.

(2) If at any time hereafter it is desired by the City of New York to use any portion of the west side of Broadway between 32nd and 33rd Streets occupied by said passage or approach or any portion of Greelev Square Park for a rapid transit rail road, the said passage or approach indicated in green on the said plan No. 3663 hereby approved extending under the said Greeley Square Park and under the westerly side walk of Broadway between 32nd and 33rd Streets and leading to the said Stairway No. 4, together with the said stairway indicated on the plan No. 3663 hereby approved in yellow and marked "Stairway No. 4," may be removed.

(3) If at any time in the future, and irrespective of the use of any portion of the westerly side of Broadway or of the said Greelev Square Park for other rapid transit purposes, the said stairway indicated in yellow on the plan No. 3663 hereby approved and marked "Stairway No. 4" shall, in the judgment of the Commission constitute an interference with traffic, the Commission may order such stairway, together with the said passage or approach leading thereto extending under the said Greeley Square Park and the westerly sidewalk of Broadway and indicated in green, removed, and in that case the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company or its successors or assigns shall, at its or their own expense, promptly remove such stairway and passage or approach and restore the said Park and the street to their original condition.

(4) If at any time hereafter the Commission or any Board or official acting for the City of New York or otherwise shall construct or cause to be constructed a rapid transit railroad under Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, with a station in Broadway at or near West 33rd Street, the wall and the stairway which are indicated on the plan No. 3663 hereby approved in yellow and marked "Wall A" and "Stairway No. 3" may be removed so that a continuous connection may be made between the concourse of the station hereby approved and the platform of such rapid transit railroad station in Broadway; but such stairway if and when removed shall be located at some other point to be approved by the Commission or such Board or official and shall be used jointly by the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company or its assigns and the city or its assigns.

(5) If at any time hereafter it is desired by the City of New York to use the portion of West 33rd Street at or near the intersection of Sixth Avenue for a rapid transit railroad, the passage or approach which is indicated in red on the said plan No. 3663 hereby approved, leading to Stairways Nos. 1 and 2 and extending under Sixth Avenue north of the south building line of West 33rd Street and under West 33rd Street, together with the said stairways indicated on the plan No. 3663 hereby approved in yellow and marked "Stairway No. 1" and "Stairway No. 2" may be removed.

(6) If at any time in the future and irrespective of the use of the said 33rd Street for other rapid transit purposes the stairways indicated in yellow on the plan No. 3663 hereby approved and marked "Stairway No. 1" and "Stairway No. 2" shall in the judgment of the Commission constitute an interference with traffic at those points. the Commission may order such stairways, together with the said passage or approach leading thereto and indicated in red on the said plan No. 3663 hereby approved. removed, and in that case the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company or its successors or assigns shall, at its or their own expense, promptly remove such stairways and passage or approach and restore the street to its original condition.

(7) Any and all such removals except the removals provided for in the paragraphs hereof designated "(3)" and "(6)" shall be made by and at the expense of the city. but the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall be entitled to no compensation for the parts so removed, and the rental payable by it to the city shall not be affected except in case where the exit upon the surface of the street is removed, and in that case the annual rental navable for such exit shall cease.

The Committee on By-Laws and Legislation respectfully reports that it has given careful consideration to the following resolutions offered by Mr. Somers, and adopted at the meeting of the Board of Education held on December 22, 1909 (see Journal, pages 2114-15):

"Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation to consider the advisability of amending the By-Laws as follows:

"That section 65 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education be amended so as to provide but one salary for one and the same position, except that the Teachers and Supervisors of boys may receive an additional salary or bonus not to exceed \$180.

'Resolved, That it also be referred to said Committee to consider the advisability of amending said section in the following manner:

That such revised schedules be put into effect as soon as funds sufficient therefor are provided by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that pending full financial ability, the increases in women Teachers' salaries be paid in annual instalments which shall be not less than 20 per cent, of the difference between the maximum salaries now fixed for men and the maximum salaries now fixed for women occupying the same position, except that for the year 1910 there shall be a flat increase of not less than \$120 per annum for all women Teachers below the 7A grade, and not less than \$120 for all women Teachers of special subjects."

In regard to the first of the above quoted resolutions, the principle involved in the

women Teachers occupying the same position. As to that principle, your Committee submitted its views to this Board in a report presented on March 27, 1907, disapproving of Senate bill No. 893—the so-called "Equal Pay" or "White" bill—which report was unanimously approved (see Journal, 1907, pages 544-45). The reasons for the Committee's opposition to the bill referred to were set forth in detail in an appendix to a report submitted by it to the Board on June 12, 1907 (see Journal, pages 1006-30).

On May 6, 1909, your Committee presented a report in opposition to Senate bill No. 1210, known as the "Gledhill-Foley bill," which provided salaries for Teachers in various grades without regard to sex, which report was also approved by the Board of Education (see Journal, 1909, pages 660-64 and 790-93).

Your Committee is aware of no change in the situation up to the present time which would justify it in recommending that the Board reverse the action taken by it on the occasions above referred to. Moreover, your Committee would respectfully point out that it is out of the question to recommend at the present time the amendment to section 65 of the By-Laws proposed in the first resolution quoted above, for the reason that the Budget for the year 1910 would not afford sufficient money to justify any change in section 65 as now constituted. Past experience has shown the danger of taking any action of this character.

The reasons hereinbefore set forth for not recommending the proposed amendment to section 65 of the By-Laws are equally applicable to the propositions embodied in the second of the above quoted resolutions. When the By-Laws are amended they must necessarily go into effect, there can be no such thing as a non-operative by-law. Consequently the proposition that "pending full financial ability, the increases in women Teachers' salaries be paid in annual instalments which shall be not less than 20 per cent. of the difference between the maximum salaries now fixed for men and the maximum salaries now fixed for women occupying the same position," and the further proposition that "except that for the year 1910 there shall be a flat increase of not less than \$120 per annum for all women Teachers below the 7A grade, and not less than \$120 for all women Teachers of special subjects," are both illegal and impracticable, and your Committee is compelled to report against them. Furthermore, legislation would be necessary to provide the funds needed to put the proposed increases into

In connection with this matter your Committee would call attention to the fact that Special Committees were appointed by the Board of Education in the years 1907 and 1908 to revise the schedules of salaries applicable to the teaching and supervising staff, which Special Committees gave hearings to all persons interested and tentatively submitted to the Board revised schedules of salaries which excluded the idea of equal pay but provided for equitable increases of salary. The amounts necessary for placing these revised schedules in effect—totaling approximately \$3,000,000—were included in our estimates for the years 1908 and 1909 (see Journal, 1907, pages 1030, 1082 and 1386-1402, and Journal, 1908, pages 771, 780 and 1232-1250), but were not allowed. The amount of \$3,493,103.11 was included in the estimate for the present year, but was disallowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Your Committee would also call attention to the provisions of section 1542 of the Charter, to the effect that the expenditures for any purpose or object in any one year shall not exceed the amount appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such purpose or object; and any action by the Board of Education looking to the increase of Teachers' salaries when no funds for the same have been ap-

propriated would be a plain and flagrant violation of the statute. Your Committee would call attention to the further fact that, in accordance with a

preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Education on December 22, 1909 (see Journal, pages 2113-14), a Committee of Five has been appointed to appear before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to urge the appropriation of such additional funds as will enable the Board of Education to pay the proposed increased salaries of Teachers included in the estimate for the year 1910, and, if legislation be necessary, to request the co-operation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to effectuate | F. Titus, for 18 hours, from 8 a. m., March 24, 1910. the same. It is respectfully submitted that until said Committee of Five has made its report to the Board it would not be proper for the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation to take any action in the matter of increasing the salaries of Teachers.

In conclusion, your Committee, for the reasons above set forth, is of the opinion that it is not feasible or practicable to comply with the terms of the resolutions offered by Mr. Somers.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation be and it is hereby discharged from further consideration of the resolutions hereinbefore quoted.

The President put the question whether the Board would approve the report the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation and adopt the resolution attached thereto, and it was decided in the affirmative.
