"Further, that a supervisor of modern languages be appointed and that he shall hold his office on the same basis as the other supervisors of special branches. The present incumbent, Mr. John L. Hulshof, has the same duties and same responsibilities as all the other supervisors and directors, and it is only an act of justice that his remuneration be on a like basis. As it is at present, his position is a humiliating one, and his effectiveness is thereby greatly impaired,"
