#### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

#### Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, March 31, 1915, at 10.30 o'Clock A. M.

Present-Commissioners Darwin R. James, Junior, and Alexander Keogh. Commissioner James presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Commissioner of Accounts," the title "Director, Standard Testing Laboratory," and by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment," the following: "Director of Laboratory." James McGinley, Chief of Staff, office of the Commissioners of Accounts, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed adoption of a special resolution allowing a special examination for promotion to Lieutenant to Seneca Larke, an Engineer of Steamer in the Fire Department, who as the result of injuries sustained at the fire in the Equitable Building, New York City, on January 9, 1912, was unable to do himself justice in the regular examination and failed therein. Henry H. Curran, Alderman, appeared in favor of the adoption of the resolution. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The public hearing on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Public Charities," 10 Deputy Superintendents of Training School and 6 Superintendents of Training School was postponed for one week at the request of Deputy Commissioner Wright of the Department of Public Charities.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held March 5 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Commissioner of Accounts," the title "Director, Standard Testing Laboratory," and by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment," the following: "Director of Laboratory."

The following special resolution was adopted:

Whereas, Engineer of Steamer Seneca Larke of Engine Company 20, Fire Department of the City of New York, while on duty at the Equitable Building fire in the City of New York on January 9, 1912, saved the lives of two men who were imprisoned in the vaults of the Mercantile Safe Deposit Company in the northwest corner of the building on the ground floor, under highly dangerous and almost impossible conditions, constituting one of the most heroic acts ever performed in the history of the Fire

Whereas, as a result thereof, said Engineer of Steamer Seneca Larke suffered almost total mental and physical breakdown, from which he did not fully recover for

fully eight months; and,

Whereas, on February 28, 1912, a few weeks after this experience, said Engineer of Steamer Seneca Larke took the examination for promotion to Lieutenant of the Fire Department, held by the Municipal Civil Service Commission of the City of New York, and in said examination attained a rating of 65.60 per cent., resulting in his failure in said examination; and

Whereas, it appears that his failure was without doubt due to his physical con-

Whereas, said Seneca Larke, in spite of these circumstances, could not be granted a special examination under the provisions of Rule VII, paragraph 11, which provides that "No candidate shall be granted a second or special examination or any second or special trial or test \* \* \* \* unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the Commission that his failure to appear for or to gain admission to or to complete such examination or test was due to a manifest error or mistake for which the Commission is responsible, the nature of which shall be set forth in its minutes, or that such failure was due to compulsory attendance before any Court or other public

authority having the power to compel such attendance," and Whereas, under the decision of Tormay vs. Polk, 134 App. Div. 939, had said Seneca Larke made application to a Medical Officer of the Fire Department for leave of absence due to illness, caused by his experience at the above mentioned fire, he would have been entitled to an examination when he recovered his health and returned

Whereas, Señeca Larke failed to avail himself of the opportunity accorded him

by this decision, therefore, be it

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of Rule VII, paragraph 11, of the Municipal Civil Service Rules be waived in the case of Seneca Larke, and that he be given a special examination for promotion to the position of Lieutenant, Fire Department; provided, however, that this action shall in no wise constitute a precedent for waiving the said rule."

George L. Bergen, Deputy Chamberlain, appeared in connection with the request of the Commission on Pensions for authority to continue the employment of Robert von Reutlinger as Pension Expert; George B. 

#### Amendments to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 6, 1915, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 13. Tuberculin test of cows: certificate.—No milch cow or cow intended for any purpose other than slaughter, shall be admitted to the City of New York unless accompanied by a certificate stating that the said cow is free from tuberculosis so far as may be ascertained by physical examination and the application of the tuberculin test. Said certificate shall contain a physical description of the cow sufficiently accurate for the purpose of identification and must be signed by a legally licensed veterinarian, who shall state the date and place of his registration. The certificate shall also bear a number which must correspond with a tag that shall have been securely attached to and be on the ear of the cow. The certificate shall also contain the date of the examination, which examination shall have been made not more than sixty days prior to the time the cow indicated therein is brought into the city; it must also contain the place of examination, the temperature of the cow for twelve hours prior to the injection of tuberculin, the name, quality, and character of the preparation of tuberculin used, the location of the injection, the quantity injected, and the temperatures from the sixth to the twentyfourth hours after the injection, or until the reaction is completed.

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as con-tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the adver-tisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the prooosals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

in excess of 5 per cent. The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who

is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the

interest of the City so to do. Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon applica-tion therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and draw-ings of construction work may also be seen there.
