spread the following upon the minutes: "This action was taken because it was learned that one of the examiners had personal knowledge of the work of certain of the candidates in the examination. It was felt that this knowledge of their work might be thought by some to operate to the disadvantage of the candidates concerning whose work he had no knowledge. The rating of the papers was begun, however, before the matter was brought to the attention of the Commission. In reviewing the marks it appeared that there had been errors made in the rating of these papers.

"The Commission desires to make it clear that in taking this action it does not wish to imply unfairness on the part of any cf its examiners, or lack of integrity. The action was taken solely because the Commission insists that no shadow of suspicion whatsoever shall surround its examinations."

A report, dated April 19, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner relative to the requisition of the Department of Public Charities for an eligible list from which to appoint one General Mechanic (with knowledge of steam fitting). Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or

estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to-gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
