Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Friday, May 26, 1916, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

Upon the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner in a report dated May 26, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Attendant, Grade 2, Male, be and the same hereby is promulgated, subject to future investigation.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Wednesday, May 31, 1916, at 10:30 o'clock, a. m.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, May 31, 1916, at 10:30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

The minutes of the meeting held May 17 were approved.

Louis Swasey, Esq., Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Edward F. Cadley, Chief Clerk, and Charles E. Sackman, Attendant in that department, appeared in connection with the request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for authority to employ John J. McMonigle, Philip E. Breen and Albert E. Frey as Life Savers at the Municipal Baths during the bathing season of 1916, under the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the following named persons be and they hereby are excepted from examination to be employed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn as Life Savers at the Municipal Bath at Coney Island during the bathing season of 1916, with compensation at the rate of \$3 per day in each case; provided, however, that in no one instance shall the total compensation exceed the sum of \$750: John J. McMonigle, 452 Neptune ave., Coney Island; Philip Breen, 2712 W. 3rd st., Coney Island; Albert E. Frey, 417 Eleventh st., Brooklyn.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

Resolved, That the name of Harry A. Meyer, of 475 9th st., Brooklyn, be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list of Proofreader, under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII, and placed upon the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City service.

Resolved, That the following names be and they hereby are removed from the eligible list of Fireman, the said candidates having violated a regulation of the examination in affixing their names to the papers containing the Memory test: Thomas J. Gaffney, 182 Baltic st., Brooklyn; William F. Gardner, 79 Douglass st., Brooklyn.

Resolved, That certification of the name of Frank J. Zielinski, of 23 Fisk ave., Maspeth, L. I., to the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, from the eligible list of Climber and Pruner, be and the same hereby is revoked, and his name be and the same hereby is removed from said list, it appearing that he had been under the minimum age of twenty-one at the time of filing his application for that position.

Resolved, That the request of Frank Elsis, of 150 Fourteenth st., Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the eligible list of Patrolman be and the same hereby is denied.

The Secretary presented a communication from Geneva H. Fuhrmann, of 875 W. 180th st., Manhattan, whose name had been removed from the eligible list of Social Investigator at a previous meeting of the Commission. The Commission took no further action in the matter.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers the following transfers

Kyle, Laborer, from the Department of Street Cleaning to the office of the President, Borough of Manhattan, effective May 11. Timothy F. Donovan, Laborer, from the office of the President, Borough of Brooklyn, to the office of the President, Borough of Queens. James F. Martin from Watchman at \$600 per annum in the office of the President, Borough of Manhattan, to Attendant at \$750 per annum in the office of the President, Borough of Brooklyn. William Cunningham, from Wireman at \$4.80 per day to Laborer at \$3 per day in the Department of Plant and Structures, he having consented in writing to such demotion. Anthony A. Demarest and August Schneider, from Watchman at \$780 per annum, to Attendant at \$780 per annum, in the office of the President, Borough of Manhattan. Stephen Eich, Clerk, from the Tenement House Department at \$480 per annum, to the office of the President, Borough of Manhattan, at \$540 per annum. Frank Kelly, from Fireman to Oiler in the Department of Public Charities. Bernard J. Cummings, Laborer, from the Department of Street Cleaning to the Department of Plant and Structures. Arvid D. Anderson from Registrar at \$2,500 per annum to Clerk at \$1,200 per annum in the College of The City of New York, he having consented in writing to such demotion.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers the Commission disapproved the transfer of Richard Timmins, Laborer, from the office of the President, Borough of Queens, to the office of the President, Borough of Manhattan, a preferred list existing for Laborer, Borough of Manhattan.

The Commission approved the action of the Committee on Special and Temporary Appointments in adopting the recommendations contained in the following reports: Report (Q-235), dated May 29, from Mr. Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, recommending that Michael J. Byrne and Michael J. Higgins be marked "Qualified" for employment as Watershed Inspectors in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII, pending the promulgation of the promotion list for that position.

Report of the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation recommending that William J. D. Lynch of 705 W. 170th st., Manhattan, be marked "Qualified" for employment as Superintendent of Asphalt Plant in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, pending the promulgation of the eligible list for that position.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the appeals of the following named candidates in the examinations specified for reratings of certain of their papers, or for re-examinations, were denied: Fireman: Michael Markey, 881 Pacific st., Brooklyn; Louis Clarke, 559 Sixth ave., College Point, L. Director, Sea View Hospital and Farm Colony: William Golden, Blackwell's Island, N. Y.; Charles Samson, 300 Mulberry st., Manhattan. Promotion to Clerk, Second Grade, Department of Finance: William A. Meany, 949 E. 5th st., Brooklyn.

The Commission granted the request of James C. Kinnier, of 2460 Tiebout ave., The Bronx, that the disqualification placed against him in the examination for Fireman for writing his memory test on a paper, in addition to the regular examination paper, be removed, it appearing that the candidate had written the same after the reading of the memory test, for the purpose of comparing his answer with the answers of other candidates after the completion of the examination.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals the Commission directed that a special examination for promotion to Lieutenant, Fire Department, be given Francis Hoey of Engine Co. 248, it appearing that the candidate had been absent on sick leave on the date of the regular mental examination.

A report dated May 23 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner relative to the examination for Chief Probation Officer, Male, City Magistrates' Courts. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the examination for Chief Probation Officer, Male, City Magistrates' Courts, ordered Dec. 29, 1915, be and the same hereby is cancelled; and

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with another open competitive examination for the position of Chief Probation Officer, Male, City Magistrates' Courts.

In connection with the foregoing resolutions, the Secretary was instructed to spread the following upon the minutes:

"This action was taken because it was learned that one of the examiners had personal knowledge of the work of certain of the candidates in the examination. It was felt that this knowledge of their work might be thought by some to operate to the disadvantage of the candidates concerning whose work he had no knowledge. The rating of the papers was begun, however, before the matter was brought to the attention of the Commission. In reviewing the marks it appeared that there had been errors made in the rating of these papers."

"The Commission desires to make it clear that in taking this action it does not wish to imply unfairness on the part of any of its examiners, or lack of integrity. The action was taken solely because the Commission insists that no shadow of suspicion whatsoever shall surround its examinations."

A report, dated April 19, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner relative to the requisition of the Department of Public Charities for an eligible list from which to appoint one General Mechanic (with knowledge of steam fitting). The Secretary was instructed to certify the preferred list of Steamfitter.

A report, dated May 26, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Secretary of the Department of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, for an eligible list from which to appoint a Foreman of Riveters at \$5.50 per diem for about three months. The Commission ruled that it would be impracticable to hold a promotion examination to fill one vacancy for the period specified, and that a Riveter might be assigned in charge for a period of approximately three months.

The following reports were presented from the Acting Chief Examiner:

Report, dated May 22, recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to Attendant, Grade 1, in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of The Bronx, to be open to all Laborers eligible under clause 17 of Rule XV, and that promotions to the position of Watchman be made from the resulting eligible list.

Report, dated May 24, recommending that as the First and Second Divisions of the City Magistrates' Courts had been abolished by an act of the Legislature, all future eligible lists resulting from promotion examinations therein be made up as one list for the City Magistrates' Courts.

Report, dated May 26, recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Chief Inspector of Electrical Conductors and Wiring, Grade 3, Bureau of Gas and Electricity (Bureau of Lamps and Lighting), Borough of Manhattan, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, to be open to all Third Grade Inspectors of Electrical Conductors and Wiring, and to all Third Grade Inspectors of Gas and Electricity eligible under clause 10 of Rule XV.

The recommendations were adopted.

The following reports were presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation:

Report, dated May 22, recommending that Arthur J. Gerosa, of 1220 53d st., Brooklyn, be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Court Attendant.

Report, dated May 24, recommending that the disqualification appearing against the name of Robert P. Macauley, of 211 Greenpoint ave., Brooklyn, on the eligible list of Fireman be continued pending his appearance at the Bureau of Investigation.

Report, dated May 24, recommending that the disqualification appearing against the name of Morris Metz, of 938 Longwood ave., The Bronx, on the eligible list of Inspector of Licenses be removed.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report, dated May 25, was presented from James A. Higgins, Examiner, who was assigned to prepare the advertisement for the examination for Instructor (Kindergarten), for the Department of Public Charities, calling the attention of the Commission to section 1092 of the Charter providing that "Teachers hereafter appointed in schools or classes maintained in the institutions controlled by the Department of Public Charities or by the Department of Correction, shall be appointed by the Commissioner of the appropriate department upon the nomination of the City Superintendent of Schools, and shall be licensed by the Board of Examiners of the Department of Education." On motion, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission on May 17, 1916, in ordering an open competitive examination for the position of Instructor (Kindergarten) be and the same hereby is rescinded and the Secretary is hereby directed to instruct the Commissioner of Public Charities to terminate the services of persons serving as Instructors (Kindergarten) under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII.

A report, dated May 24, was presented from Charles S. Shaughnessy, Engineering Examiner, relative to his investigation into the assignments of various employees of the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan. The Examiner stated that the investigation showed that John C. Heney, Mason; Bernard J. McLaughlin, Foreman; Peter Osborne, Foreman, and Michael F. Dalton, Inspector of Pipe Making, were inappropriately assigned to the inspection of sewers; that the duties of Daniel J. Curtin, Transmittan; Frank C. Seward, Leveler, and Joseph Tonyman, Rodman, included partly appropriate and partly inappropriate assignments; and that A. I. Ostrander, L. Thompson, W. B. Osterhout, Assistant Engineers; Daniel S. Melville and Charles F. Kelly, Inspectors of Sewer Construction; L. W. Hagerty, Rodman, and John A. Ginley, Axeman, were performing work strictly in accordance with their titles. The Secretary was instructed to arrange a conference with a representative of the Borough President in the matter of the assignment of Messrs. Curtin, Seward and Tonyman, and to request the President of the Borough of Manhattan to take action to adjust the irregular assignments of Messrs. Heney, McLaughlin, Osborne and Dalton.

The following reports were presented from the Certification Clerk:

Report, dated May 24, requesting approval of his action in certifying from the eligible lists of Oilier and Machinist names of candidates not reported upon by the Bureau of Investigation.

Report, dated May 22, requesting approval of his action in certifying from the eligible list of Inspector of Foods (Milk), Grade 2, the names of three candidates not reported upon by the Bureau of Investigation.

The action of the Certification Clerk was approved.

A communication, dated May 27, was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, stating that at a meeting of that Board, held May 24, 1916, the resolution of the Municipal Commission striking from the Non-Competitive Class for the Board of Inebriety the position of Farmer and Caretaker, at \$720 per annum, with maintenance, had been annulled. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication, dated May 27, was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, stating that at a meeting of that Board held May 24, 1916, the following resolutions of the Municipal Commission had been approved:

Waiving the requirement of competitive examination in the case of George B. Ford, to be employed as Consultant on City Planning by the Committee on City Plan of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Including in the Labor Class, Part II, the title "General Mechanic."

Including in the Exempt Class "City Magistrates' Courts, Interpreter (Chinese)."

Amending the Non-Competitive Class of the Department of Public Charities:

1. By striking therefrom, under the sub-heading "With Maintenance," the following: Tailor, \$720 per annum, and Housekeeper, \$900 per annum. 2. By including therein, under the sub-heading "With Maintenance," the following: Matron, \$780 per annum; Head Overseer, \$960 per annum. 3. By including therein, under the sub-heading "Without Maintenance," the following: Overseer, \$780 per annum.

The communication was ordered filed.

The Secretary was instructed to note on the records the following reassignments to duty in accordance with communications from the departments concerned under the dates specified: President of the Borough of Brooklyn; May 22, John Sullivan, Rammer, and Giles Anderson, Laborer. Communications (5), dated May 22, were presented from the Police Commissioner, notifying the Commission of the reassignment to duty to their former positions of various persons who had been assigned to act as Caretakers pending the promulgation of the promotion list for that position, and who had failed to qualify in the promotion examination. The Secretary was instructed to inform the Police Commissioner that the Commission was without power to authorize the employment of Felimeno Capra, Augustus L. A communication, dated May 19, was presented from the Police Department, stating that in compliance with an order of the Supreme Court and an opinion of the Corporation Counsel a payroll had been prepared in the amount of \$1,536 for the salary of William H. Flynn, deceased Patrolman, covering the period of his suspension from March 12, 1914, to April 20, 1915. The Secretary was instructed to approve the payroll.

A communication dated May 24, was presented from the Director of the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requesting approval of the restoration of salary of Amos F. Smith, Mechanical Engineer, from \$2,100 to \$2,400 per annum. The restoration of salary was approved under clause 24 of Rule XV.

A communication dated May 19 was presented from the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, transmitting vouchers in favor of Rose Mafera, Margaret McHug, Emily L. Sutton, Edna Hoag, B. Crammer, Rose Gilbert, Elizabeth Jamison, Grace Martin, Georgia Thomas, Mamie O'Brien and Lillian Stafford, for services as Special Nurses, and Alexander H. Schmitt and Mrs. M. The request was granted and the Secretary was instructed to certify vouchers in payment of Mr. Berg, when presented, under the provisions of clause 8 of Rule XII.

A communication dated May 15, was presented from the Board of Water Supply, renewing its request for certification of promotion lists of Clerk, Second Grade, from which to make various promotions to a salary of \$600 per annum, which request had been denied at a previous meeting of the Commission, and certifying that the proposed promotions would not involve a change in duties, would not be made to fill vacancies caused by the suspension of previous incumbents and that the number of employees under the same title in the same division would not be increased. Duties: The duties of a Stenotypist are to take notes of dictations, hearings and examinations on the stenotype machine and to transcribe these notes on the typewriter.

The examination will be held on two days. On the first day the candidates will be given a test in spelling, consisting of twenty words; a test in copying three hundred words from plain copy on the typewriter in five minutes, and a test in copying three hundred words on the typewriter from stenotype notes furnished to the candidate by the Commission.
