City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Personal Service, September 28, 1917.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On August 31, 1917, representatives of Pipe Fitter's Helpers in the Department of Docks and Ferries requested an increase in rate from \$3.20 to \$3.40 per diem for those employees. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"On March 29, 1917, representatives of the Pipefitters' Helpers requested an increase in rate from \$3 to \$3.40 per diem for those employees. On May 4, 1917, the Board approved a rate of \$3.20 per diem, beginning April 1. This was without prejudice to consideration later by the Board of an application for the \$3.40 rate when the same had been enforced in private employ.

"The secretary of the Building Trades Employers Association stated that an agreement had been signed by the employers with the Progress Association of Steam, Hot water and General Pipefitters' Helpers to pay \$3.40 per diem from July 1, 1917, and that the rate of \$3.40 is now uniformly paid. Also that 60 to 70 per cent. of employers of Steamfitters' Helpers in Greater New York are in the association.

"Thirty prominent employers of the 90 members of the Master Steamfitters' Association, with 620 men, stated that they now pay the \$3.40 rate to Steamfitters' Helpers. There are probably 600 Helpers distributed among the remaining 60 employers, making a total of over 1,200 steamfitters' or Pipefitters' Helpers concededly now paid a rate of \$3.40 per diem. A number of other employers who have signed the agreement are outside the association, so that probably 80 per cent. of all the Steamfitters' Helpers in Greater New York are paid the rate agreed upon.

"The approximate annual cost for increase from \$3.20 to \$3.40 per diem for Pipefitters' and Steamfitters' Helpers in City departments, beginning July 1, 1917, would be as follows:

"In order to protect those men under the Civil Service title of Pipefitter's Helper, it is recommended that the Board of Aldermen be requested to establish the grades of position of Pipefitter's Helper and Steamfitter's Helper, which are synonyms, at \$3.40 per diem."

In view of the foregoing facts, we recommend that the attached resolutions approving the \$3.40 per diem rate for Steamfitters' Helpers and Pipefitters' Helpers, and requesting the heads of City departments to provide for the increase, be adopted.

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Personal Service, October 4, 1917.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On October 3, 1917, the Police Commissioner requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 65 of the Greater New York Charter, of various grades of positions in his department. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"The positions for which establishment is requested are:

- (1) Special Deputy Police Commissioner, 1 at \$6,000 per annum.
- (2) Secretary to Special Deputy Police Commissioner, 1 at \$2,100 per annum.
- (3) Stenographer to Special Deputy Police Commissioner, 1 at \$1,320 per annum.
- (4) Inspector, in charge of Boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx and Richmond, 1 at \$4,200 per annum.
- (5) Inspector, in charge of Training School, at \$4,200 per annum.
- (6) Inspector, 5 at \$3,900 per annum.

"(1—2—3) Authority to appoint an extra Deputy Commissioner is given the Police Commissioner by chapter 554 of the Laws of 1917. This law gives the Police Commissioner power to appoint citizens to perform duty in the Police Department during the state of war now existing, either without pay, or with such pay as the Board of Aldermen shall determine upon the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Such appointment has been made, and the incumbent has since the early part of the year been serving without pay. Establishment of the position at \$6,000 is requested, in order that the present incumbent, or such other as may be appointed, may receive compensation for his services. Establishment of the positions of Secretary and Stenographer is requested, in order that a proper staff may be employed in connection with work assigned to the Special Deputy.

"(4) The additional Borough Inspector is requested for supervision of routine police matters in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, such as the Borough Inspector in charge of Brooklyn and Queens performs now. This would relieve the Chief Inspector of the Department of a great amount of detail, so that he would have adequate time to give to questions relating to the distribution of the uniformed force, special investigations relating to the conduct of police officials or to the work of commanding officers and other important matters affecting police work.

"(5) The grade of Inspector, in charge of Training School, is requested in order that recognition may be given to the valuable work done and being done in this office. This position is one of exceptional difficulty and responsibility, as it has to do with the education and training of newly appointed Patrolmen, as well as improving the work being performed by the older men in the service and police work in general.

"(6) The grade for five additional Inspectors is required in order to provide an adequate supervising force. At the present time there are three Captains acting as Inspectors. These men should be replaced by men holding the rank of Inspector. There will also be another vacancy if the additional Borough Inspector is provided. The Commissioner also desires to use one or two additional Inspectors, who will be assigned to his office or to the office of a Deputy, on work consisting of confidential investigations and inspections relating to the police work in precincts and districts. In order that this work may be effective it is essential that the men assigned to this work hold the rank of

Inspector, as they will be called upon to perform duties affecting the work both of Captains and other Inspectors."

In view of the foregoing report, the Committee recommend the adoption of the attached resolution, recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the positions as requested. Respectfully,

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I submit herewith a proposed ordinance to prevent the waste of water, and recommend that it be adopted by the Board of Aldermen as an amendment to Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances. If adopted it will add a new section, prohibiting persons from opening faucets or tampering with water fixtures for the purpose of wasting water or interfering with the supply of water to other persons, or defrauding or injuring the city or any private water company or any person responsible for the payment of water rates charged for the water so wasted. This ordinance is the outgrowth of a condition, the existence of which has been frequently asserted by owners of multiple family dwellings, particularly in connection with the discussion of the extension of the meter system. Where meters are not installed the effect of the wilful waste of water for the purpose of depriving fellow tenants of a supply, or for any other purpose, is to injure and defraud the city. Where meters are installed the effect of such action is to injure and defraud the property owner, who is responsible for the payment of the water bills. In either case it is appropriate that the acts referred to should be made a punishable offense. The effect of the proposed ordinance as drafted would not be to curtail in any respect the use of water for legitimate purposes, but would merely reach those cases, if any, where persons cause water to be wasted with a wrongful intent.

I therefore recommend that the following ordinance be adopted by the Board of Aldermen:

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the waste of water.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto, as section 45 of article 3 thereof, the following:

Section 45. Wilful waste of water prohibited. No person shall open, hold open or fasten open, or damage or tamper with any piping or water fixtures connected with the municipal water supply or with the public water supply, within The City of New York, of any private water company, or cause any such piping or water fixtures to be opened, or held or fastened open, or damaged or tampered with, for the purpose of wasting water or interfering with the supply of water to other persons, or of defrauding or injuring the city or any private water company or any person responsible for the payment of water rates or water rents pertaining to the water so wasted.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$25, or by imprisonment for not exceeding 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York, N. Y.:

Sirs—On August 23, 1917, bids were received in this office providing for the general construction of a refuse destructor to be located at Rockaway in the Fifth Ward of this borough. Two bids were received, one for \$148,500, the low bidder, and a second bid at \$160,800.

Plans and specifications for this work had heretofore been approved by the Board of Estimate at an estimated cost of \$106,000. After the opening of bids, a request was submitted to the Board of Estimate looking to the award of the contract at an increased cost. Upon an examination of the plans and specifications made in connection with this request, it was the judgment of the Bureau of Contract Supervision that the plans called for some items which could be eliminated without sacrificing the efficiency of the plant. After conference with the successful low bidder, it was determined to eliminate certain items specified in the original contract, to the extent that the low bidder agreed to accept the work at \$133,000, provided the City made some arrangement whereby the transaction could be closed quickly, for the reason that a great uncertainty exists at this time in the markets for building materials and for metal construction such as is necessary in the plant, and that the price fluctuations could not be controlled and that in all likelihood upon a re-advertising the cost of the work would be materially increased.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate held on Friday, September 21, 1917, a resolution was adopted increasing the estimated cost to \$133,000, the amount of the low bid under the amended plan and specification, which amount represents the price at which the successful low bidder will accept the work previously bid upon in open competition.

It is my judgment that if the bids were re-advertised a considerable additional expense will be incurred by the City, and I therefore request, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Charter, that your Board authorize the award of this contract without public letting to the low bidder heretofore referred to.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to which was referred on September 25, 1917 (Minutes, page 217), the annexed request of the District Attorney of Kings County for the establishment of the position of Stenographer, respectfully

REPORTS:

That District Attorney Lewis of Kings County appeared before the Committee and explained the need of these positions, and according to the provisions of the County Law, Section 12, Sub-division 5, and Section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter the positions must be established by the Board of Aldermen. The Committee believing that the proper performance of work of the office of the District Attorney requires the additional stenographer, recommends the adoption of the said resolution.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 12, subdivision 5, of the County Law and of section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen hereby establishes the position of Stenographer, who shall also act as Private Secretary to the District Attorney and his Assistants, for three incumbents, at a salary to be fixed by the District Attorney, but not to exceed two thousand (\$2,000) dollars each per annum, in the office of the District Attorney of Kings County.

Sirs—I respectfully request that, in pursuance of the County Law, section 12, subdivision 5, and of section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, you adopt the following resolution:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 12, subdivision 5 of the County Law, and of section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen hereby establishes the position of Stenographer, who shall also act as Private Secretary to the District Attorney and his Assistants, for three incumbents, at a salary to be fixed by the District Attorney but not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000) each per annum, in the office of the District Attorney of Kings County."

Under date of June 19, 1917, an application was duly made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that it adopt and recommend to the Board of Aldermen such a resolution. On July 9, 1917, the Committee on Salaries and Grades, consisting of Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchell, Mayor, and Lewis H. Pounds, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, made its report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon such application. That report is to the following effect:

"Finding—Chapter 187 of the Laws of 1916 authorizes the District Attorney to appoint six Stenographers and fix their salaries at a sum not exceeding \$2,000 per annum each. The present request is for three Stenographers in addition to those allowed by the statute. On June 22, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment denied the request of the District Attorney for establishment of additional positions of Assistant District Attorney in excess of those allowed by chapter 309 of the Laws of 1911, on the ground that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was without jurisdiction and that the positions should be established by the Board of Aldermen, under section 12, subdivision 5 of the County Law and section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter.

"Recommendation—The Committee recommends the denial of the request of the District Attorney of Kings County for the establishment of three additional positions of Stenographer, on the ground that the request should properly be made to the Board of Aldermen, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is without jurisdiction."

Under date of July 19, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby denies the request of the District Attorney of Kings County, dated June 19, 1917, for the establishment of the position of Stenographer for three incumbents, at a salary to be fixed by the District Attorney, but not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per annum each, for the reason that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is without jurisdiction in the matter."

The foregoing shows that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment denied the request for additional Stenographers because of its own precedent, had under date of June 22, 1917, denying the request of the District Attorney for the establishment of additional positions of Deputy Assistant District Attorney. Following the denial of the latter request the District Attorney, under date of June 22, 1917, communicated to your Honorable Body a full statement of the abdication of power by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and requested that your Board accordingly establish those positions of Deputy Assistant District Attorney. After hearing the District Attorney, such a resolution establishing those positions was adopted by your Honorable Board on July 17, 1917.

The present application for the establishment of additional places of Stenographer should follow the same course in this Board. The reasons for the adoption of the resolution requested are briefly as follows:

There are at present employed in the office of the District Attorney of Kings County but eight (8) Stenographers, including two (2) whose time is devoted exclusively to Grand Jury work, and known as Grand Jury Stenographers. At least one of the remaining male Stenographers is necessary for exclusive service in connection with the Homicide Bureau. The assignment of a Stenographer to that bureau requires his services at any hour of the day or night. It is the practice of this office, in response to the telephonic communications of the Police Department, to send an Assistant and a Stenographer, at any hour of the day or night, necessary to aid in the preparation of homicide cases. Experience has shown that such constant service and attention to homicide cases forthwith is necessary to the proper prosecution of this class of offenders. That work often keeps the Stenographer out late at night or all through the night and the morning. With those special exclusive assignments to the Grand Jury and the Homicide Bureau there are left but five (5) Stenographers available to the District Attorney, his thirteen (13) Assistants, the Chief Clerk and the clerical staff. In addition, there have been created three places of Deputy Assistant District Attorney. Those five Stenographers cannot properly care for all the work that is needed to be done by the office force, and unless this request is granted it will become necessary to constantly employ temporary Stenographers. For some months past the employment of an extra temporary Stenographer has been found indispensable and continues to this time. The need for additional stenographic services has been sharply emphasized by reason of the withdrawal of one of the Stenographers for military service. Because of this we are left with but four (4) available for the entire office force.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of September 1917, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, and the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board) and THE STATEN ISLAND RAPID TRANSIT RAILWAY COMPANY (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate five (5) standard gauge railroad tracks over and across Western Avenue, in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, the center line of the northerly four of said five tracks to be approximately one thousand five hundred and thirty (1,530) feet northerly from the center line of Washington Avenue; said five tracks to connect the terminal yard of the Company, located on either side of Western Avenue.

SECTION 2. The grant of this right and privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company.

First—The said right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate said railroad tracks shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until October 28, 1914, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The time within which such application for renewal must be made is of the essence of this contract, and a failure of the Company to present its application within the time fixed shall be considered as an election on the part of the Company not to take advantage of the renewal privi-

lege and as a relinquishment of its right to such renewal, in which event the franchise shall terminate on the last day of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day nine (9) months before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the parties hereby agree that the annual rate for the renewal term shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained and agreed to by any two of such appraisers shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. During the last term of five (5) years the annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The annual charges shall commence on the date upon which the Company obtains the permission and approval of the Public Service Commission, as required by Section 53 of the Public Service Commissions Law. The Company hereby agrees to file its application with the Public Service Commission for such permission and approval within ten (10) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

The annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding; provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date when the annual charges commence as hereinabove provided and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned or transferred, either in whole or in part, whether by consolidation, merger, reorganization or otherwise, or leased or sublet in any manner, either in whole or in part, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation, merger or reorganization of corporations or otherwise, unless, in addition to obtaining the above consent of the Board, the proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company shall file with the Board an instrument under seal, agreeing to assume and be bound by each and all of the terms and conditions of this contract and agreeing to waive any mon-

etary or other conditions created by its charter or any statute relating to the consolidation, merger, or reorganization of corporations or otherwise. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate theretofore prevailing over the previous annual rate. The entire expense of such appraisal shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Ninth—The bridge or viaduct to be constructed under this contract shall, subject to the approval of the President of the Borough of Richmond, be constructed in a single span from house-line to house-line, and there shall not be any supporting columns erected in the street. Such bridge or viaduct shall have a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the surface of said street at the center line thereof and shall have drip pans placed under the same for the entire width of the street. The said tracks and bridge or viaduct shall be constructed, maintained and operated at the expense of the Company, subject to the supervision, control and inspection of the proper authorities of the City who have jurisdiction over such matters under the Charter of the City or under this contract.

Tenth—Should the grade or lines of Western Avenue be changed at any time during the term of this contract, whether original or renewal, the Company shall, at its own cost and expense, change or reconstruct the said bridge or viaduct under the supervision of the proper authorities of the city so that there shall be at all times a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the surface of the street at the center line thereof, and that no portion of the piers or abutments of said bridge or viaduct shall encroach within the lines of said street as changed.

Should Western Avenue be widened, the Company shall make no claim for, nor shall it be entitled, as against the City, to any compensation or damages by reason of the taking of any portion of the piers or abutments of the bridge or viaduct in condemnation proceedings.

Eleventh—Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over Western Avenue shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and thereafter, unless otherwise directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and no cars shall be allowed to stand upon said railroad tracks within the limits of said street.

Twelfth—This right and privilege is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights and privileges hereby granted, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or securities to be approved by the Comptroller, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and for its compliance with all the orders of the Board and of the officials of the City acting under the powers herein reserved. From the said fund deductions may be made as hereinafter provided.

(a) Should the Company, within such time after notice as may be herein prescribed, or, where no time is prescribed, within such time as the Board or the proper official of the City may hereafter prescribe, fail to comply with the provisions of this contract or with the orders of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, relating to

Paving and repairing of the streets, Protecting the City's structures during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized,

Protecting the Company's tracks, appurtenances or other structures during the performance of any public work or as may be required on account of the changing of the lines or grades of the streets,

Or with any other provision of this contract which may affect the repair, protection and maintenance of the streets or of the City's structures within the streets, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done or the defect remedied and to reimburse itself for the cost of such work by deducting such cost, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(b) Should the Company, within ten (10) days after the demand has been made upon it, fail to pay to the City the cost of any alterations to the sewerage or drainage systems occasioned by the construction, maintenance or operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, or fail to repay to the City any damages caused to persons or property which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of the construction, maintenance or operation of the said tracks and bridge or viaduct, or by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company in connection therewith, the City shall have the right to collect such costs or damages, with interest, by deducting the amount of the same, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(c) Should the Company fail to pay to the City the annual charges required to be paid by this contract, within the time fixed for the payment thereof, the City shall have the right to collect the amount of such charges, with interest, by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon further or other direction.

(d) Should the Company fail to comply with the provisions of this contract, or with the orders

of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, then the Company may be required to pay to the City, as liquidated damages for each breach or violation, the following sums:

For failure to maintain the tracks and bridge or viaduct in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for each day during which the default or defect remains.

For failure to comply with any other provision of this contract as to which liquidated damages are not fixed herein, the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day during which such failure or default shall continue.

All of such sums may be collected by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

The procedure for the collection of such liquidated damages shall be as follows:

Whenever the Board shall have knowledge of any such breach or violation on the part of the Company, the Board shall give notice to the Company, specifying the nature of such breach or violation, and the amount of liquidated damages which it is proposed to collect therefor, and directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the service of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be required to pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, the Board shall forthwith direct the Comptroller to collect such liquidated damages by deducting the amount of the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

(e) In case of any deductions from the security fund pursuant to this contract, either for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company, or for the collection by the City of the annual charges herein provided, or of liquidated damages, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice by the Comptroller, deposit with the Comptroller a sum, either in money or securities, sufficient to restore such security fund to its original amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), and in default thereof, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by the City.

(f) Should the right and privilege hereby granted be forfeited pursuant to the provisions of this contract, or should such right and privilege be terminated upon the dissolution of the Company as herein provided, the security fund hereinabove provided for shall be forfeited to the City as liquidated damages for failure of the Company to perform this contract pursuant to the terms hereof.

(g) No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this subdivision shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

The provisions for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company or for the collection by the City of the annual charges, or of liquidated damages, are and shall be in addition to the City's right as herein reserved to forfeit the right and privilege hereby granted.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or any official of the City acting under the powers hereby granted, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by resolution of the Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the tracks and bridge or viaduct constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring this right and privilege forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Nothing herein contained shall affect in any way the right of the Company to apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for a review of any action of the Board forfeiting the right and privilege hereby granted.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the construction, maintenance and operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company shall repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any act or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract contained shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. Nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to limit in any way the police power now vested in or hereafter to be delegated or granted to the City by the State of New York.

Section 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

WHEREAS, By contract dated October 21, 1910, the City granted to the Company the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate conduits of a maximum outside diameter of twelve (12) inches in and under the surface of the streets in certain districts in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

WHEREAS, By resolution adopted April 24, 1913, approved by the Mayor April 28, 1913, and by contract dated May 15, 1913, said contract of October 21, 1910, was amended and modified by extending District No. 2, named and described in Section 1 thereof, and by increasing the annual payments and security deposit specified in Section 2, Subdivisions Second and Twenty-third thereof; and

In Washington street from the center line of Franklin street to a point about 20 feet south of the southerly line of North Moore street, with two connections to abutting buildings.

Section 2, Subdivision Second, Clause (b) is amended to read as follows:

(b) From October 21, 1910, to May 15, 1913, an annual sum which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than eight hundred dollars (\$800).

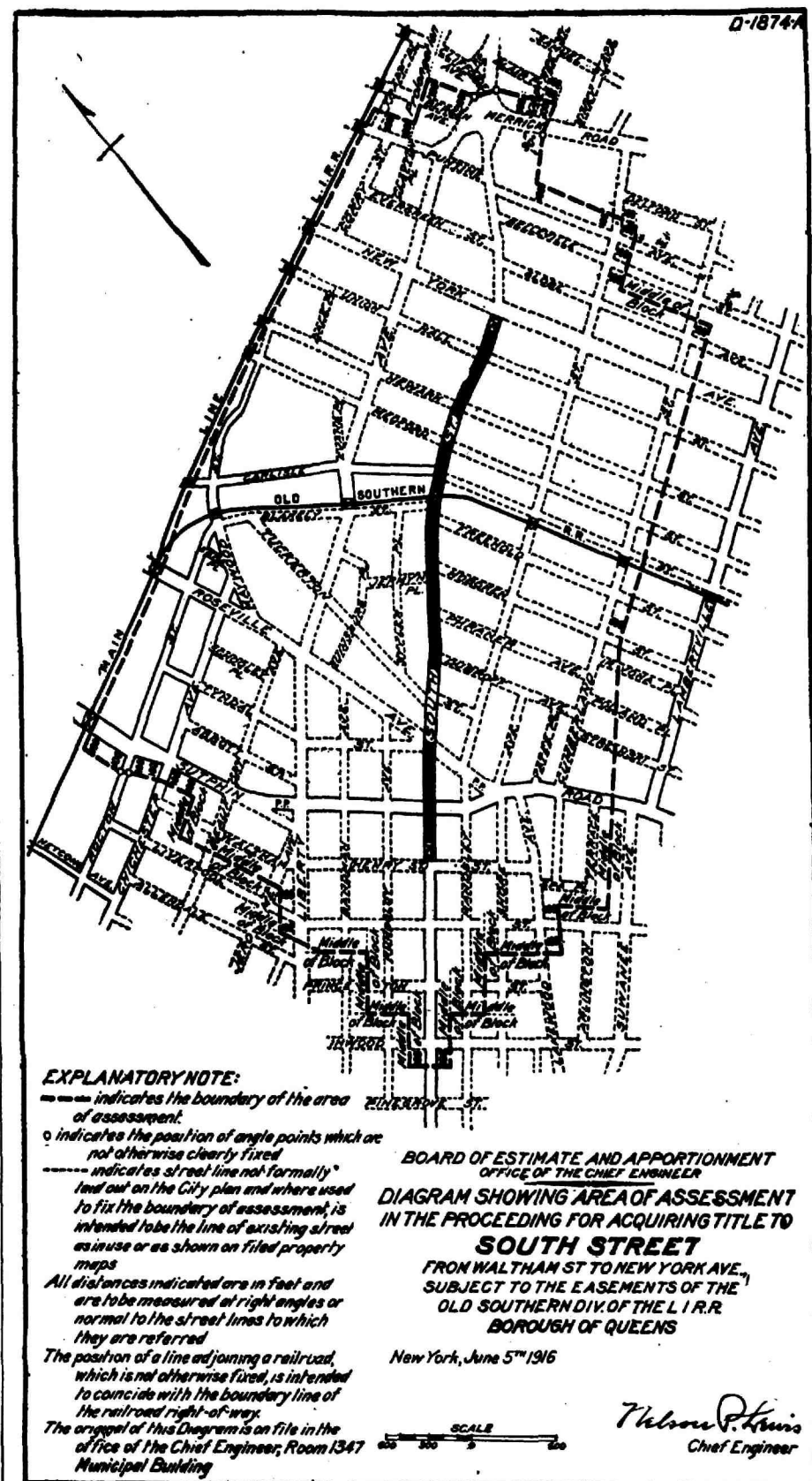

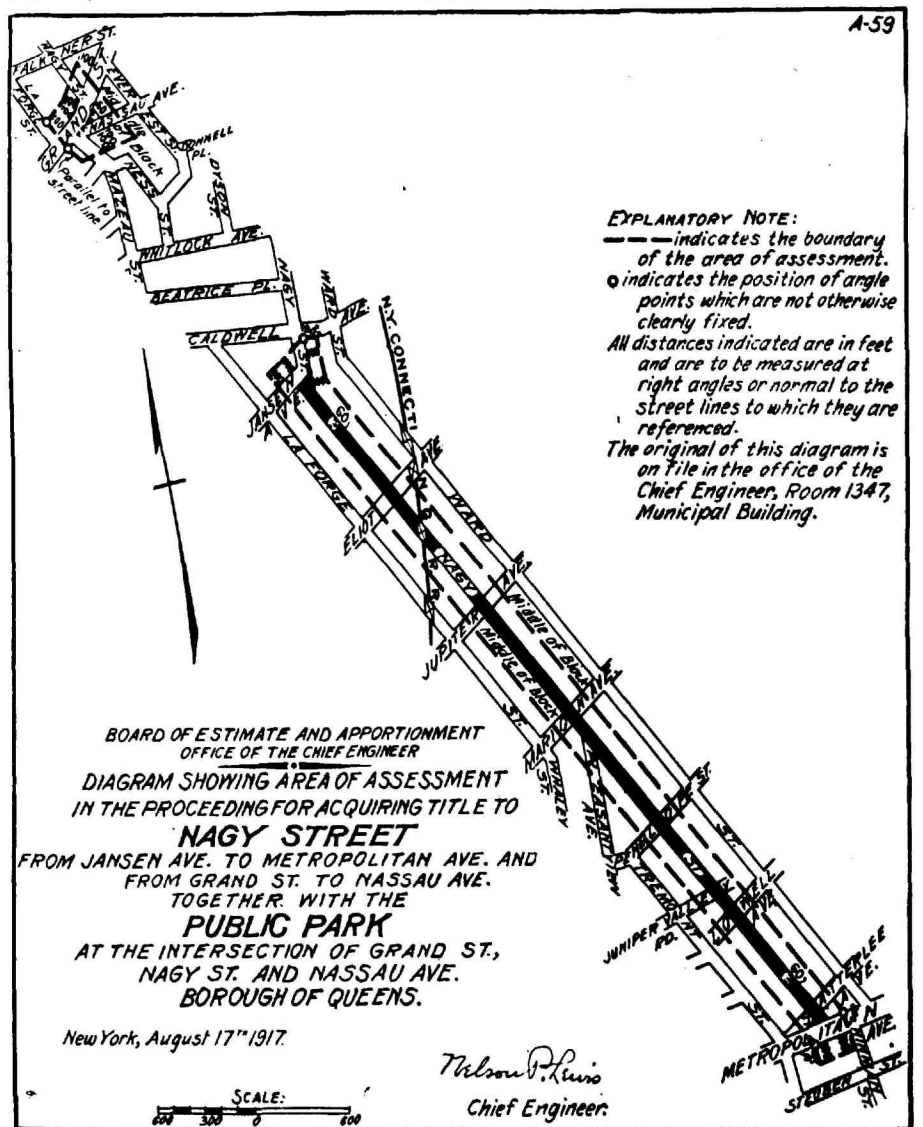

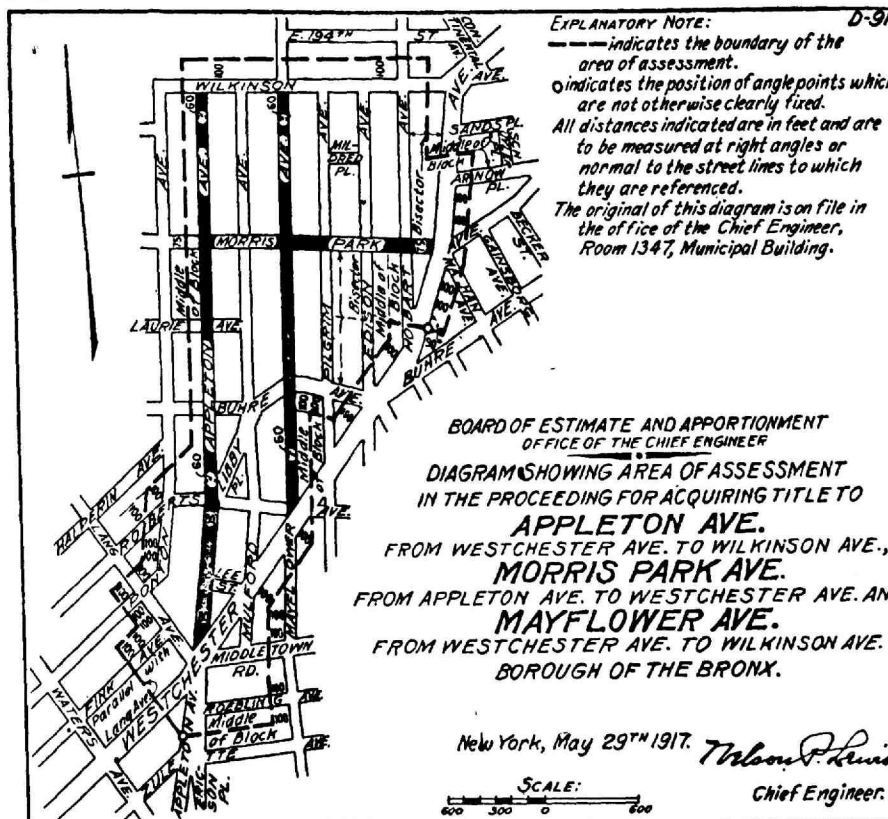

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either of any of the conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary workmen, or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, in contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, or the party or parties making the bid shall state the several matters stated therein in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
