## BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending March 27, 1880, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending March 20, 1880.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 543 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 27, 1880, which is an increase of 32, as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 14 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending March 20, 1880, was 527, which is 36.0 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,107,895.
