# BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY for the week ending December 16, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending December 9, 1882.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 598 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 16, 1882, which is an increase of 20, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 150 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending December 9, 1882, was 595, which is 59.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.87 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,295,884.
