BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
TUESDAY, December 30, 1884—5 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

The minutes of the meeting held December 29, 1884, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, December 30, 1884.

Hon. EDWARD V. LOEW, Comptroller:

SIR—I have received your letter of the 29th instant, by which I am informed of the following facts:

1. That, by resolution passed December 5, 1884, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized the sum of \$600,000 to be expended for the erection of armories for the Eighth and Twenty-second Regiments "when the money is raised from the sale of bonds for that purpose."

2. That the Eighth and Twenty-second Regiments and the Armory Board request the Comptroller and the Board of Apportionment to include said sum in the Final Estimate and tax levy for 1885.

You then inquire :

1. "Can the Comptroller and Board of Apportionment do anything to raise all of said sum by immediate taxation?"

2. "If yes, can this still be done by them in the Final Estimate now being made for 1885, no mention of such an item having been made in the late Comptroller's Departmental Provisional Estimate for said year, or in the Provisional Estimate considered by the Board of Aldermen for 1885?"

By section 3 of chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, it is provided that if the Armory Board approve the demands of commandants of regiments, etc., that Board shall make their recommendation to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and, if said Commissioners concur in such recommendation they shall specify the sum to be appropriated, which sum shall be inserted by the Comptroller in his Departmental Estimate; and the Board of Aldermen is authorized and directed to include such sum in the Final Estimate for the tax levy for the next ensuing year, or the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may, in their discretion, direct the Comptroller to issue bonds redeemable within a specified period, in such amounts as shall be necessary to provide such sums, or any part thereof.

It is evident by these provisions the Legislature intended to vest in the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a discretion to determine whether the expenditure authorized by the act should be an immediate burden upon the taxpayers of the city, or whether such burden should be postponed by means of borrowing money upon the bonds authorized by the act.

In the present instance it seems that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have, in their discretion, determined that the expenditure ought not to be added to the tax levy of the year 1885, and their approval of the purpose to erect the armories in question is qualified by the limitation that the expenditure shall be made when the money is raised from the sale of bonds.

It seems to me, therefore, that it is only necessary that I should answer the first of the questions propounded.

I am of the opinion that, since the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have limited their approval to the expenditure proposed, by the condition that the money shall be raised from the sale of bonds, the amount thereof cannot be legally included in the tax levy of 1885.

The Honorable the Board of Apportionment :

GENTLEMEN—On behalf of the Memorial Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, representing the forty-five posts of that order within the limits of the City of New York, I respectfully petition your Honorable Body to appropriate for the ensuing year the sum of \$671 for the purpose of supplying a deficiency in previous appropriations. These appropriations were made to defray the expenses of the reviewing stand on Memorial Day, the 30th of May. Last year the appropriation of \$500 was included in the Contingencies of the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, but upon application made by the proper officers of the Memorial Committee, the Aldermanic Contingencies were so far exhausted that but \$329 were received by the Memorial Committee. In the year just ending the Board of Aldermen were good enough to pass a resolution requesting the Board of Apportionment to transfer from unexpended balances, if any, the sum of \$500 to defray the expenses of erecting stands, etc., connected with the public celebration of Memorial Day. There were no unexpended balances available, and therefore the Memorial Committee have been obliged to pay certain expenses which ought reasonably to be a public charge, out of the funds which they would otherwise devote to the relief of destitute soldiers. The money devoted to this purpose by the Memorial Committee relieves the city from the care and maintenance of destitute and disabled soldiers who drift here from all directions, and who, upon application to the Relief Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, are furnished the means to return to their homes. I earnestly request that this appropriation may be made by your Honorable Body and added to the appropriation for Contingencies of the Honorable Board of Aldermen or specially appropriated for the express purpose indicated.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following :

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York :

The petition of the undersigned respectfully shows to your Honorable Body :

That they are owners of a large portion of the property on Avenue B, between Fourteenth and Twentieth streets.

That said street and the entire neighborhood are very poorly lighted.

That by a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, taking effect December 13, 1884, the Commission for lighting the city were requested to cause Avenue B, from Fourteenth to Twentieth street, to be lighted with electric lights.

That the neighborhood is now very dark and lonely at night and as a result an extraordinary amount of licentiousness, immorality and crime is there committed. It is well known that there is no better remedy for such a state of affairs than to thoroughly light the streets. After such a change, crime and immorality immediately decrease to a surprising extent, and the small cost of a few lights saves the much greater cost of many policemen. In addition, there is a very large shipping interest at the foot of East Nineteenth street which requires protection and which this measure will assist in protecting.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that your Honorable Body will include a sufficient sum of money for this purpose in the Final Estimate, and cause the same to be raised by taxation in the year 1885.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved that the sum of \$131,500 be allowed for "Repairs and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.,"—Department of Public Works, under one general head of account.

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$7,681,999.69 be inserted in the Final Estimate for "Interest on the City Debt."

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$776,571.39 be inserted in the Final Estimate for "Redemption of the Principal of the City Debt."

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller presented the following statement :

The Chairman stated that on the 16th day of December, 1884, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Heads of Departments, the Board of Education, and all officers who have annual appropriations made to them by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and are hereby requested to furnish to this Board, on or before the 26th day of December, 1884, a statement of all unexpended balances of appropriations to them for the year 1883, and any year prior thereto, together with a statement of all unsettled claims and liabilities that may exist against any such unexpended balance of appropriation, giving in detail the name of the claimant, the amount of the claim or liability, and nature of any such claim or liability.

That all of the Departments referred to therein have responded thereto, except the Department of Public Works, and that he learns from the Comptroller that the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works refuses to respond to the request contained in the said resolution.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$150,000 be allowed under the head of "Extra Street Cleaning in the Tenement-house Districts, and other densely populated portions of the City, to be expended under the direction of the Mayor, Board of Health, and Commissioner of Street Cleaning."

The Comptroller presented the following:

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, at a meeting held November 19, 1884, made certain objections to, and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1885, which were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1884; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have duly considered said objections and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for 1885 made by the Board of Aldermen, as provided by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making the Final Estimate for the year 1885, at a meeting held December 30, 1884, have overruled some of the rectifications of said Provisional Estimate for 1885 made by the Board of Aldermen, and approved or modified others, therefore,

Resolved, That the reasons for the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in overruling the objections or suggestions made by the Board of Aldermen, in respect to certain items in the said Provisional Estimate, are as follows:

COMMON COUNCIL.

Increase—City Contingencies, from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

The increase of this item to \$10,000 is overruled, as more than is necessary, but the amount is increased to \$6,000 by a special appropriation of \$5,000 for expenses of a public reception of the Bartholdi Statue.

Increase—Salaries, Clerks and Officers, from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The increase of this item is overruled as unnecessary.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Increase—Lamps, Gas and Electric Lighting, from \$680,000 to \$800,000.

The increase in this item made by the Board of Aldermen is overruled as more than is necessary, but the amount of the appropriation is increased to \$716,700, as sufficient for the purpose.

Increase—Laying Water-pipes, from \$190,000 to \$200,000.

Increase overruled as not necessary.

Increase—Repaving Streets (chapter 476, Laws of 1875), from \$342,000 to \$492,000.

The increase of this item to \$492,000 is overruled as unnecessary, but the amount is increased to \$350,000, of which the sum of \$200,000 is appropriated for repaving streets generally, the sum of \$100,000 for repaving Fifth avenue, below the south side of Fifty-ninth street, and the sum of \$50,000 for repaving Fifth avenue, northerly and continuously, from the south side of Fifty-ninth street.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

Increase—Distribution of Coal to Out-door Poor, from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

The increase of this item is approved and the amount allowed in the Final Estimate.

Increase—Salaries, from \$393,558 to \$393,828, to be applied to increase of salary of Keeper of the City Prison.

The increase of this item is overruled for the purpose mentioned, but the appropriation is increased by adding \$1,200 for Salaries of Trained Nurses.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Increase—Salaries of Commissioners, etc., from \$191,382 to \$194,442, so as to increase the salary of Thomas J. Nealis to \$3,000 per annum, and each of eight Inspectors of the Sixth Division, to \$1,500 per annum.

The increase of this item made by the Board of Aldermen is overruled, but the amount of the appropriation is increased to \$205,258, that sum being deemed necessary for the purpose.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Increase—Repair Shops Pay-roll, from \$50,000 to \$58,000.

The increase of this item made by the Board of Aldermen is overruled as unnecessary, but the amount of the appropriation is increased to \$55,000.

Increase—Bureau of Combustibles Pay-roll, from \$10,000 to \$13,300.

The increase of this item is overruled, for the reason that the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is deemed sufficient for the purpose.

Increase—Bureau of Inspection Pay-roll, from \$74,000 to \$78,700.

The increase of this item is overruled, for the reason that the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is considered sufficient for the purpose.

Increase—Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies Pay-roll, from \$1,080,908 to \$1,124,708.

The increase of this item is approved and allowed.

Increase—New Apparatus, Supplies, etc., from \$245,000 to \$275,000.

The increase of this item is overruled, for the reason that the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is deemed sufficient for the purpose.

Add for five New Houses, etc., \$100,000.

An appropriation of \$100,000, for new houses for engine and hook and ladder companies, was asked for in the Departmental Estimate of the Fire Department, but was not allowed in the Provisional Estimate. The amount added by the Board of Aldermen is overruled as more than is necessary for the purpose, and the sum of \$75,000 is appropriated in the Final Estimate as sufficient.

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

Increase—Preservation of Records, Register's Office, from \$36,720 to \$39,872.50.

The increase of this item, made by the Board of Aldermen, is overruled as more than is necessary for the purpose, and the sum of \$770 is added to the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate for new libers.

COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

Increase—Salaries, from \$50,000 to \$54,900.

The increase of this item is approved and allowed in the Final Estimate.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the portion of the resolution relating to the "Distribution of Coal to the Out-door Poor" be amended, and that the increase, from \$10,000 to \$20,000 for the purpose, as rectified by the Board of Aldermen, be approved.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—Under a resolution of this Board, adopted December 16, 1884, heads of departments and other officers were requested to furnish statements of all unexpended balances of appropriations made to them for the year 1883 and previous years, excepting for the Department of Public Works, and herewith I present a statement of such unexpended balances, after allowing sufficient to satisfy all claims payable therefrom, known to exist, amounting to the sum of one hundred and sixty thousand eight hundred and seventeen dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$160,817.69).

The transfer to the General Fund of balances of appropriations remaining unexpended from former years, is provided for by section 207 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows:

"Any balances of appropriations remaining unexpended, after allowing sufficient to satisfy all claims payable therefrom, may, at any time after the expiration of the year for which they are

made, be transferred by the Comptroller, with the approval of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the General Fund of the city, and applied to the reduction of taxation."

I, therefore, respectfully request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of a transfer to the General Fund of the City of New York of the amount of such balances of appropriations for the year 1883 and previous years now remaining unexpended, to be applied to the reduction of taxation in the year 1885, and I herewith submit a resolution for that purpose.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1884, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-five (1885), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; and also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks payable from taxation issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, made by the Board of Aldermen on the 19th day of November, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 20, 1884, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1884; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-five (1885), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—In pursuance of a resolution passed June 21, 1883, by the Board of Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, "That the proper authorities of each city be requested to cause an audit of the accounts of the Bridge to be made, Brooklyn to be called upon to audit two months out of every three, the results of said audit to be reported to the Mayors of both cities," and agreeably to your request that the Commissioners of Accounts should make such audit for the City of New York, we beg leave to hereby present a report of our examination of the receipts and disbursements of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge for the six months ending with November 30, 1884 (the authorities of the City of Brooklyn having performed such service for the twelve months ending with May 31, 1884), accompanied by detailed statements contained in Schedules "A," "B," "C," "D," "E," and "F," comprising receipts, disbursements, deposits and tabulated disbursements for each month, respectively, and Schedule "G," a tabulated statement of disbursements on the bridge-ways for the six months.

This examination embraces the scrutiny of every return slip made by the collectors, every voucher on which payments have been made, with the checks drawn therefor, the daily bank deposits and balances.

SIR—There were 664 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 27, 1884, which is an increase of 37, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 101 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending December 20, 1884, was 633, which is 16.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,376,112.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held December 17, 1884.

Present—The full Board.

On motion, the reading of the minutes of the meetings held December 10th, 11th and 16th instants, was dispensed with.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit:

From his Excellency Grover Cleveland, Governor of the State of New York—Requesting the Board to furnish him with information concerning the operations of the Department during the past year, so far as they relate to the services heretofore performed by the Captain of the Port and Harbor Masters. The action of the Secretary in directing the Dock Masters to report in respect to the matter approved, and the Secretary directed to prepare and forward to the Governor the desired information.

From Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Inclosing copy of resolution adopted December 9th, instant, consenting to and approving of the alterations in the width of the proposed new piers to be built at the foot of West Thirty-fifth, Fortieth, Forty-fourth and Forty-sixth streets, North river, and inclosing map signed by them. The Secretary directed to file the map in the office of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Commissioners of Pilots—In reference to and stating that the wreck reported by them as being south of Grand Street Ferry slip is at the foot of Cherry street, instead of Houston street, East river.

From Police Department—Reporting a dangerous hole in Pier 57, East river, foot of Broome street. Engineer-in-Chief having been heretofore directed to examine and report, action approved.

From T. J. Irwin—Reporting that the Pier at the foot of East Thirty-sixth street, East river, is being used for the purpose of storing sand and preventing the use of the same for other commercial purposes. The Secretary to direct the Dock Master to report in respect thereto.

From S. A. Frost—In reference to repairing Pier 19, East river. The Secretary directed to advise that the Engineer-in-Chief has been directed as to the manner in which to have the repairs made to the said pier, and to request Mr. Frost to confer with him in respect to the matter.

From Henderson Brothers—Requesting permission to remove clerk's box from Pier, new 46, North river, to Pier, new 43, North river. The Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had issued a permit therefor, his action was approved.

From Thos. McLaughlin, owner of the lighter sunk in slip at Pier 55, East river—Stating that as he has not the means to remove the said lighter, he must therefore abandon her.

From John Murray—Requesting the Board to recompense him for injuries received while in the performance of his duty. The Secretary directed to advise that the Board do not consider that it has any power to grant any relief in the manner requested.

From Chas. F. Southmayd, attorney for J. J. Astor—In reference to the application heretofore made for permission to fill in on the south line of the channel of Cromwell's creek, north of the south line of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Harlem river. The Secretary directed to advise that the Board do not deem it advisable to grant the permission desired, for the reason that it would close up and totally destroy a natural water way, which it was practicable to utilize and make available for wharfage purposes, for the accommodation of the business community.

From Arnoux, Ritch & Woodford, attorneys for P. Lenane & Brother—In reference to and offering to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York certain bulkhead and wharf property on the North river, between Spring and Charlton streets, for the sum of \$600 per running foot, provided that the title be accepted, and the purchase completed on or before December 31, 1884. The Secretary directed to advise that the Board decline to entertain the proposition made by them.

From Ambrose Doo—Requesting permission to erect a temporary mast derrick on the Pier foot of West Ninety-sixth street, North river, for the purpose of discharging a cargo of coal. The Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had issued a permit therefor, the said derrick to be removed as soon as the vessel is discharged, his action was approved.

From Stephen H. Mills—In reference to dredging between Piers 23 and 24, East river, and requesting that the time to do the dredging thereat be extended until next spring, and inclosing communication from Mr. Warren Ray, the lessee of the upper berth at Pier 23, East river, in respect thereto. The action taken by the Board on December 10th, instant, amended by making the depth of water to be obtained at the said premises fifteen feet instead of twelve feet at mean low water, and the time extended for three months from date.

From Edward Dickel—Tendering his resignation as Clerk in the Department. Resignation accepted, to take effect on this date.

From Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Reporting the assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed. The Secretary directed to notify the Bookkeeper.

2d. Reporting the amount of material excavated by the Union Dredging Company with dredges belonging to the Department during the month of October, 1884. The Treasurer to make out bill therefor and collect the amount from the Union Dredging Company.

3d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending December 6, 1884.

4th. Reporting that Mr. Wheaton, the alleged owner of the property on the East river, between East Eighty-seventh and East Eighty-eighth streets, is dumping earth from the bank into the river north of East Eighty-seventh street without having obtained a permit from the Board. The Secretary directed to notify Mr. Wheaton that a penalty of \$250 had been imposed upon him for violation of Rule 1, for dumping earth into the river north of East Eighty-seventh street without obtaining a permit therefor, and to request him to call and pay the amount of the penalty imposed to the Treasurer of this Department within five days or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection. The Secretary directed to notify the Police Department that it has been reported to this Board that Mr. Wheaton has been dumping earth into the river north of East Eighty-seventh street, and to request them to cause the arrest of any person violating the law in this respect.

5th. Reporting the suspension of Laborer, acting Watchman, William H. Penny, for being found asleep while on duty on the night of Wednesday, the 10th instant, and recommending that he be not again assigned to duty as acting Watchman. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved and the recommendation adopted.

6th. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending December 13, 1884.

7th. Reporting that a mooring-post and part of the backing-log on the Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, has been carried away, leaving the pier in a dangerous condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3998, that he had superintended the repairing of Pier 13, North river, and the ferry racks at Piers 14 and 15, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4024, that he had superintended the placing of a 1½ inch water pipe under Pier 43, East river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4031, in reference to and reporting the condition of the bulkhead between West Eighteenth and West Nineteenth streets, North river, and north of West Nineteenth street, North river. The Secretary directed to notify the alleged owner or owners to repair the said premises within thirty days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be enforced.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4056, that he had repaired the deck and sheathing of the inshore end of Pier at foot of West Fortieth street, North river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4059, in reference to and reporting as to scow sunk south of Pier 55, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to report as to the best means to be taken to remove the vessel.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4028, that the replacing of seven oak fender piles on the south side of Pier 8, North river, and three oak fender piles on southwest corner of same, had been done under his supervision.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3996, that he had superintended the repairing of the bulkhead on north side of Fourth street, East river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4061, in reference to and reporting the condition of and repairs required to Pier 1, East river, and also reporting that on December 6th, instant, the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company drove four small fender piles on the westerly corner and five on the easterly corner of the said pier. The Secretary directed to notify the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company that a penalty of \$250 has been imposed upon them for violation of Rule 1, in driving piles at Pier 1, East river, without having obtained a permit from this Board, and to request them to call and pay the amount of the penalty imposed to the Treasurer within five days or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection. The Dock Master to be directed to notify the said Company to remove the piles within five days after receipt of notice or the penalty for violation of the rule, \$50 dollars per day for each and every day that may remain thereafter, will be imposed. The work of removal to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

3d. Reporting that a number of chocks on the Pier foot of West Forty-sixth street, North river, are displaced and require attention. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair.

4th. Reporting in reference to the berthing of vessels at the piers and bulkheads in his district.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City approving the sureties to the estimates of William P. Kelly, for repairing the Pier at Sixteenth street, North river, and for repairing the Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, was received, read and, together with the bids received and publicly opened on December 10th, instant, for doing the said work, which were taken from the table, was ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the contracts for repairing the Piers at West Sixteenth street and West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, be and hereby are awarded to William P. Kelly, his bid for doing the said work being the lowest under estimates publicly opened the 10th instant, and the Comptroller having approved of the sureties thereto the 10th instant.

A communication from Mary T. and Elizabeth V. Cockcroft, offering to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York certain bulkhead and wharf property on West street, between Spring and Charlton streets, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following preamble and resolutions, offered by Commissioner Voorhis in relation thereto, unanimously adopted:

Whereas, This Board has been negotiating with Mary T. and Elizabeth V. Cockcroft, alleged owners of the bulkhead property and wharf rights on West street, between Spring and Charlton streets, North river, for the purchase thereof; and

Whereas, Mary T. and Elizabeth V. Cockcroft have submitted in writing an offer to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York the bulkhead property and rights on the North river, commencing at a point two hundred and forty-two feet eleven inches south of the southerly line of Charlton street extended, and running thence southerly forty-five feet three inches to a point about one hundred and eighty-two feet one inch northerly from the north line of Spring street extended, for the sum of \$550 per lineal foot, and agreeing to release and discharge the Corporation of the City of New York of and from all claims for damages sustained by reason of the taking of the said premises for the work of the permanent improvement of the water front, and expressly waiving and releasing the Corporation of the City of New York from any liability for or by reason of the same, and the Board deeming it for the best interest of the City to accept the said offer; therefore be it

Resolved, That the proposition made to this Board by Mary T. and Elizabeth V. Cockcroft, to sell and convey to the Corporation of the City of New York the bulkhead property and rights on the North river, commencing at a point two hundred and forty-two feet eleven inches south of the southerly line of Charlton street extended, and running thence southerly forty-five feet three inches to a point about one hundred and eighty-two feet one inch northerly from the north line of Spring street extended, together with all the riparian rights, titles, easements and privileges incident thereto, for the sum of \$24,887.50, being at the rate of \$550 per lineal foot, be and hereby is accepted, which amount shall likewise include a full and complete waiver and release of all claims for damages heretofore sustained by the taking of the said premises for the work of the permanent improvement of the water front, and for any and all liability on the part of the Corporation of the City of New York for the possession and occupation of said premises: this agreement, however, being made subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided in and by section 715, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, and that the title to the said premises is acceptable to and approved of by the Counsel to the Corporation, and provided that the amount agreed to be paid for said wharf property shall be in the City Treasury and applicable for that purpose,

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested at his earliest convenience to make an examination of the title to the foregoing premises, and to inform this Board as to the right of ownership in and to the same of the parties claiming the title thereto, and that Mary T. and Elizabeth V. Cockcroft be and hereby are requested to prepare and submit to the Counsel to the Corporation a proper form of contract, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the foregoing resolution for the purchase by the City of the said premises, for his approval as to form, and when so approved, the officers of this Board be and hereby are authorized and directed to execute the same and affix the seal of the Department thereto.

A communication from Edmund Coffin, Jr., attorney for D. Willis James, offering to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York certain bulkhead and wharf property on West street, between Spring and Charlton streets, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following preamble and resolutions, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer in relation thereto, unanimously adopted:

Whereas, This Board has been negotiating with Edmund Coffin, Jr., attorney for D. Willis James, alleged owner of the bulkhead property and wharf rights on West street, between Spring and Charlton streets, North river, for the purchase thereof; and

Whereas, Edmund Coffin, Jr., attorney for D. Willis James, has submitted in writing an offer to sell to the Corporation of the City of New York the bulkhead property and rights on the North river, commencing at a point one hundred and four feet two inches south of the southerly line of Charlton street extended, and running thence southerly fifty feet to a point about three hundred and sixteen feet one inch northerly from the north line of Spring street extended, for the sum of \$550 per lineal foot, and agreeing to release and discharge the Corporation of the City of New York of and from all claims for damages sustained by reason of the taking of the said premises for the work of the permanent improvement of the water front, and expressly waiving and releasing the Corporation of the City of New York from any liability for or by reason of the same, and the Board deeming it for the best interest of the City to accept the said offer; therefore be it

Commissioner Voorhis, to whom was referred the application of James Thom, the agent of the Beaver line of steamships, for the use of Pier, new 46, North river, reported thereon in favor of granting permission, during the pleasure of the Board, for the use of the southerly side of Pier, new 46, North river, and the deck thereof, provided that they pay therefor \$40 per day and legal wharfage for any vessels berthed at the north side of the said pier. On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted, and the Secretary directed to notify the parties, and also the Dock Master, of the action of the Board in respect thereto.

The Engineer-in-Chief having reported verbally as to the piers and bulkheads which could be used for the purpose of dumping clean snow and ice during the winter season, the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis in relation thereto, was unanimously adopted:

The dumping of material other than clean snow and ice is strictly forbidden.

The Police Department are hereby requested to enforce compliance with these regulations in every instance.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify in writing the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning and the Police Department of the adoption of the foregoing resolution, and the Secretary is further directed to have notice thereof prepared and five hundred copies of the same printed for general distribution.

The Board then took up for consideration the resolutions offered by Commissioner Voorhis on December 10th, instant, in relation to the issue of bonds by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the uses and purposes of this Department, and the substitute therefor offered by Commissioner Laimbeer.

The vote was taken on the substitute offered by Commissioner Laimbeer at the meeting of December 10th, instant, and was declared lost by the following vote:

The vote was then taken on the original resolution, which was also declared lost by the following vote:
