

#### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held September 2d, 1885.

Present—Commissioners Koch and Stark.

Absent—Commissioner Matthews.

The minutes of the meetings held August 26th and 27th, 1885, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, laid on the table, to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Comptroller of the City—Requesting the Board to send to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate of the amount required by the Department for the year 1886. Secretary and Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make an estimate and submit it to the Board.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting that the pavement on the newly-made ground on West street, had settled at the locations stated, as follows:

1st. North of the north crosswalk leading to Pier, new 38, North river.

From Brown & Lucius—Requesting that the time for the erection of building on Pier A, be extended. The action of the President in replying thereto, that the Board will expect to have the said contract fully completed at the time stated in said contract, and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the same, approved.

From Thomas E. Crimmins—Requesting permission to place a temporary floating-dump at Pier foot of Forty-third street, North river. The action of the President in advising Mr. Crimmins that the said pier is used and occupied by the Knickerbocker Ice Company, and that if the said company permit him to use the said pier for such purposes, this Department has no objections, was approved. approved.

From James L. Miller, lessee—In reference to payment of rent for bulkhead at Thirty-ninth street, East river. Referred to the Treasurer.

Permission granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Commissioner Matthews, the Treasurer of the Board, presented the monthly balance sheet of the Department for the month of August, 1885, which was received and read, and the President was directed to transmit the same to the Comptroller of the city.

His action was approved.
