#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR RESUMED.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, January 27, 1887.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of the provisions of section 1 of chapter 78 of the Laws of 1885, I transmit herewith a report of the examination of the office of the City Chamberlain made by the Commissioners of Accounts for the year ending November 30, 1886.

Pursuant to the provisions of section 164 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by section 1 of chapter 78 of the Laws of 1885, the Commissioners of Accounts do hereby certify and report to the Mayor and Common Council, that they have examined the accounts and vouchers of the Chamberlain's Office for the year ended November 30, 1886, and find therefrom as follows:

The balance in the Treasury to the credit of City Treasury accounts at the close of business on the 30th day of November, 1885, was \$9,819,822.12.

The amount of money received into the Treasury to the credit of City Treasury accounts during the year ended November 30, 1886, is \$59,216,505.77.

The amount of money paid out of the Treasury to the debit of City Treasury accounts during the like period is \$61,647,205.56.

The balance that remained in the Treasury to the credit of City Treasury accounts at the close of business on the 30th day of November, 1886, is \$7,389,122.33; the particulars of all which are contained in statements marked "A," hereto annexed.

The aggregate amount of money that was borrowed for, or on the credit of the City, and the amounts of the bonds of the City that were issued during said year ended November 30, 1886, is \$5,535,845.47 (exclusive of revenue bonds).

The purposes for which, and the authority under which such bonds were issued are as follows: Additional Water, chapters 56 and 328, Laws of 1871, and chapter 490, Laws of 1883; Indebtedness under contracts made prior to January 1, 1885, for works of local improvement, chapter 420, Laws of 1886; Construction of Bridge over Harlem River, chapter 487, Laws of 1885; Gansevoort Market, chapter 525, Laws of 1884; Docks, chapter 574, Laws of 1871; School-houses, chapter 458, Laws of 1884; the respective amounts whereof are contained in statement marked "B," herewith.

And the said Commissioners do hereby further certify and report that all said payments out of the Treasury by the Chamberlain hereinbefore mentioned were so paid upon the authority of warrants drawn in due form by the Comptroller and countersigned by the Mayor, and that such warrants were so signed and countersigned upon the authority of vouchers for the expenditure of the amounts named therein, examined and allowed by the Auditor, approved by the Comptroller, and filed in the Department of Finance.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

Second—That the abstract of the said estimate and assessment, together with our maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents which were used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the office of the Department of Public Works, in the City of New York, there to remain until the twenty-first day of February, 1887.

Third—That the limits embraced by the assessment aforesaid are as follows, to wit: All those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the southerly side of the Southern Boulevard; westerly by the centre line of the block between Lincoln avenue and North Third avenue; southerly by the bulkhead line of the Harlem river and easterly by the centre line of the blocks between Lincoln avenue and Alexander avenue; excepting from said area all the streets and avenues heretofore opened, and all the unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues, roads, public squares or places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to the provisions of chapter six hundred and four of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and the Laws amendatory thereof, or of chapter four hundred and ten of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the eighteenth day of March, 1887, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
