"The undersigned, Anthony McQuade, hereby certifies that he is the owner of four certain houses on the south side of Seventy-fifth street, beginning about 150 feet west of Third avenue; that he is at the present time enjoined from further proceedings in the construction and completion of the said houses, for the reason that the same are not constructed in accordance with the tenement-house acts. He hereby agrees that, if he be permitted by the Court to continue work upon the said houses, and complete them, he will construct in each house, between the two inner rooms, a light shaft, the dimensions of which shall be at least 6 feet by 2 feet, clear of all obstructions; that each room adjacent to said shafts shall communicate with the same by a window which shall be provided

with sashes sliding vertically and having an area of not less than twelve square feet; that each of said shafts shall be provided with a trunk or channel for the admission of fresh air from the street or yard of said house, of an unobstructed area or section of at least three square feet; and the lower level of said trunk shall not be lower than the lower level of the said shafts, so as to secure a free admission of fresh air; the top of the said shafts shall be covered with a glass roof of at least twelve square feet area; and to secure a free exit for air there will be provided at least two louvres, facing each other, and having each an area of not less than six square feet, exclusive of all obstruction; the bottom of the louvres shall be at least eighteen inches above the roof.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 15, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,070, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 1,024 tenement-houses, 139 private dwellings, 117 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, 16 slaughter-houses, 1 oil works, 6 lodging-houses, 1 stream, 11 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 1 railway, 1 bone house, 1 public sewer, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 70 cellars and basements, 123 waste-pipes and drains, 249 privies and water-closets, 37 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 3 cesspools, 1 piggery, 28 other nuisances, together with 68 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,137.

During the past week 111 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 90 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

150 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 55 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 51 houses, 51 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of measles was removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

## Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 494 births, 38 still-births, 261 marriages, and 503 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 15, 1879. This shows a decrease of 25 births, and an increase of 3 still-births, 65 marriages, and 11 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 1 birth, 3 still-births and 15 deaths, and an increase of 88 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 2; diphtheria, 9; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 1; malarial fevers, 1; inanition, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; heart diseases, 6; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles, 2; croup, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 22; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 5; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; apoplexy, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; surgical operations, 4; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from premature and preternatural births was the same as that reported for last week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 244 in tenement houses, 143 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 87 on the first, 135 on the second, 107 on the third, 44 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 500 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 78 were stated to be single, 137 married, 65 widowed, and the condition of 223 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 503; still-births, 38; bodies in transitu, 29. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 68 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 494 births, 261 marriages, 38 still-births, 503 deaths, 29 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 31 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 21 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 15, 1879, was 60.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.929, the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 924, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.46 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 487 deaths and still-births, or 90.02 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 217; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 64; Greenwood (undenominational), 40; Lutheran (undenominational), 68; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 39; Woodlawn (undenominational), 3; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 3; Machpelah, L. ## SUPREME COURT.

The People of the State of New York on the relations of Samuel D. Babcock et als., Trustees, against The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments.

The People of the State of New York to the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the City and County of New York:

Whereas, On the petition of Samuel D. Babcock, William H. Macy, and James M. Morrison, Trustees of the Queen Insurance Company of London, verified this 22d day of September, 1879, it appears to us—

I.—That the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the City and County of New York exist under section 302, Laws of 1859, and the statutes of this State in the premises made and provided, and are charged with the powers and duties in said statute enacted and specified.

II.—That said petitioners are the owners of premises Nos. 37 and 39 Wall street, in the City of New York, known and designated upon the tax and assessment maps of said city by the Ward No. 1430, in the First Ward of said city.

III.—That as appears by "The Annual Record of the Assessed Valuation of Real and Personal Estate," as the same was open to public inspection in the office of said Commissioners, pursuant to section 10 of said chapter 302, Laws of 1859, the said premises were valued, for the purpose of taxation, for the year 1879, at the sum of \$350,000.

IV.—That prior to the first day of May, 1879, an application in writing, on behalf of said petitioners as said owners of said premises, for the reduction of said valuation to the sum of \$175,200, was filed in the office of said Commissioners, pursuant to section 10, chapter 302, Laws of 1859.

V.—That verified proof in support of said application, in writing, was presented to said Commissioners prior to their final decision thereupon.

VI.—That the value of said premises "as in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor, being the sum for which such property, under ordinary circumstances, would sell," was appraised in said verified proof at \$290,842.46, but that said application prayed a reduction of the assessed valuation to \$175,200, for the reason that, as said petitioners are informed and believe, it has been the well established and invariable custom of said Commissioners in this city to assess only a ratable percentage of the full and actual value of real estate, and that said Commissioners were, prior to their decision thereon, notified in writing, on behalf of said petitioners, that such application was made for such reduction below said value as appraised in said verified proof, for the reason hereinbefore stated.

VII.—That the said Commissioners have considered said application and proof of value, but that said petitioners have no knowledge as to what proceedings were had by said Commissioners in respect thereto, but that the said Commissioners decided to confirm the valuation of said premises for the year 1879, at \$340,000, by which decision said petitioners are aggrieved.

VIII.—That in and by section 20, chapter 302, Laws of 1859, it is provided: "That a certiorari, to review on the merits any decision or action of the said Commissioners under sections 10 and 11 of this act, shall be allowed by the Supreme Court or any Judge thereof, directed to the said Commissioners, on the petition of the party aggrieved, and shall, with the return, be heard and decided forthwith by said Court, in preference to all other matters, actions and proceedings.

And we being willing, for certain reasons, that the said application of said petitioners, for a reduction of said assessed valuations of said premises, and the proof presented by said petitioners in support of said application, and all writings in relation thereto, and all the proceedings, proofs, and matters whereupon the said Commissioners decided to value said premises for the purpose of taxation, for the year 1879, at \$340,000, and all the proceedings thereto appertaining, should be certified and returned by you into our Supreme Court, before our Justices thereof, at a General Term of said Court, to be held at the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the 6th day of October next, at the opening of the Court on that day, do command you that you certify and return into our said Supreme Court, before our said Justices thereof, at a General Term of said Court, to be held at the place and on the day last aforesaid, at the opening of Court on that day, all the proceedings concerning the said application of said petitioners for a reduction of the said assessed valuation of said premises, and the proof presented by said petitioners in support of said application, and all the writings in relation thereto, and all the proceedings, proofs and matters whereupon the said Commissioners decided to value said premises for the purpose of taxation, for the year 1879, at \$340,000, which proofs, matters, proceedings and things were had and taken by and remaining before you, so that our said Court may further act therein as of right and according to law ought to be done, and have you there this writ.
