

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, August 18, 1893.

To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement : GENTLEMEN-I return herewith copies of resolutions, recently adopted by your Board, request-ing me to take the necessary proceedings in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to acquire title to the lands required for the opening of the thirty-eight streets, avenues and places in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, named in said resolutions.
