## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Wednesday, November 29, 1893, at 12 o'clock M.

Present—President Cram.  
" Commissioner Phelan.  
" " White.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 23d inst. were read and approved.

The following communications were referred to Commissioner Phelan:

From the Department of Public Parks—Transmitting resolution relating to the proposed extension of Riverside Park.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting additional filling in required in rear of bulkhead-wall between Twenty-ninth and Twenty-sixth streets, North river, and at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river.

The communication from the Houston, West Street and Pavonia Ferry Railroad Company, requesting permission to make repairs to the pavement on the new made land between the railroad tracks foot of Chambers street, for a period of one year, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

The application of Wood & Robinson for permission to pile lumber temporarily on the Pier foot of One Hundred and Fortieth street, Harlem river, was referred to the Dock Master.

The following permits were granted, the work to be kept within existing lines and to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey—To repair ferry-racks and drive piles at Piers, old 14 and 15, North river.

Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting permission to fill in the space between the railroad track and the new bulkhead at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, said permit to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

William J. Peck—To drive fifty fender piles at the bulkhead between Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth streets, East river.

New York Mutual Gas-light Company—To drive eight piles and repair the north side of the Pier foot of East Thirteenth street.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board:

Carl Smith's Sons—Tally-house on the bulkhead between Piers 58 and 59, East river.

James Van Valkenburgh—Tally-house on Pier 48, East river.

Silas W. Driggs—Tally-house on Pier 47, East river.

New York and Norwalk Steamboat Company—Two tally-houses on Pier 23, East river.

Requa & Duell—Tally-house on the Pier foot of Jane street, North river.

George Morton—Tally-house on the Pier foot of Jane street, North river.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Requesting to be informed whether there is sufficient evidence in possession of the Department to justify the prosecution of the following suits:

The Mayor, etc., vs. John J. Hicks.

The Mayor, etc., vs. Charles V. Kent and William A. Wheeler.

The Mayor, etc., vs. John J. Hicks and James L. Johnson.

The Secretary directed to reply.

2d. Submitting a list of expenses incurred in the examination of the title to Piers, old 33 and 34, North river, together with the bulkhead between. The Chief Clerk directed to draw requisition for \$552.08.

3d. Transmitting quadruplicate copies of agreement for the purchase of the bulkhead between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river, from the Old Colony Steamboat Company. The officers of the Board authorized to execute said agreement.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Stating that the proposed new dump on Pier, old 42, North river, should be located on the south side of said pier. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the change if possible.

From the Police Department—Requesting the Board to erect and furnish a structure on Pier "A," North river, for the use of the Harbor Police. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make said alterations.

From the International Navigation Company, Lessee—Respecting the lease of the Washington Pier.

From John D. and Thomas E. Crimmins—Withdrawing their offer of August 30, 1893, to sell to the City the bulkhead property between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river.

From Thomas Payne—Requesting permission to retain a stand on the bulkhead north of Pier 55, East river. Application denied.

From James B. Lyon—Offering to furnish legislative documents during the ensuing session. The Secretary directed to order two copies of the Senate and Assembly Journals and two copies of the Session Laws in slips, when signed by the Governor.

From the National Steamship Company, Lessee—Requesting the taking up and relaying of the pavement on the new-made land to allow repairs to the water-pipe connecting with Pier, new 39, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do said work and report cost for collection.

From Dock Master Woods—Reporting a sunken canal-boat in the slip between Pier "A" and Pier, new 1, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove.

From Dock Master Abel—Reporting an obstruction of timber on the bulkhead north of Pier, new 42, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove.

From Commissioner White—Recommending that a permit be granted John Anton, to erect a dump on the upper side of the Pier foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that no change be made in the compensation to be paid by Trapp & Bussing for a steam hoisting derrick on the bulkhead foot of West Ninety-sixth street. Recommendation adopted.



From Commissioners Phelan and White—Respecting the offer of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of the 16th instant, to sell to the City the northerly half of Pier, old 14, and the southerly half of Pier, old 12, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That in pursuance of section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, an agreement be entered into between this Department and the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, for the purchase of the northerly half of Pier, old 14, and the southerly half of Pier, old 12, North river, together with about fifty-eight feet of bulkhead on the southerly side of said pier, old 12, North river, for the sum of four hundred thousand dollars. Provided, however, that a good and sufficient title in all respects to the said property, together with all rights, terms, easements and privileges appertaining thereto or connected therewith can be acquired by, conveyed to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, free from all encumbrances, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board and in pursuance with the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Department hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law for the use and occupation of a pier to be built at or near the foot of Albany street, to be known as Pier, new 10, North river, and a pier to be built at or near the foot of Cedar street, North river, to be known as Pier, new 11, North river; the dimensions and locations of said piers to be hereafter determined by the Board of Docks, together with the bulkhead extending from a point opposite the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets on the North river, northerly to a point about forty feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street extended, to the bulkhead line of 1871, a distance of about three hundred and forty-six feet, more or less, to be hereafter determined by the Board of Docks, for a term of ten years from the date when said piers and bulkheads are ready for occupation, at a yearly rental of seventy-eight thousand dollars (\$78,000), payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, with covenants for two renewals of ten years, at an annual rental of eighty-five thousand eight hundred dollars (\$85,800) for the first renewal term and ninety-four thousand three hundred and eighty dollars (\$94,380) for the second renewal term.

It being understood that the above resolution shall not be binding or of any force or effect unless the said Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this office its written acceptance of the terms and conditions thereof, and agree to execute a lease to contain the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in the lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey to extend the bulkhead line of the property owned by said company between Liberty and Cedar streets, now occupied by their ferry premises, about one hundred and seventy-three feet in length, and to build a sea-wall in conformity with the plan adopted by this Department at the cost and expense of said company under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, as provided for in section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 as amended by chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base blocks for the bulkhead or river-wall between a point opposite the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets, on the North river, northerly to a point about forty feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street extended to the bulkhead line of 1871, a distance of about three hundred and forty-six feet; and also with the construction of the bulkhead or river-wall, and with the improvement of the water-front between said points; and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidated Act of 1882; and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary for the above-mentioned work of the wall, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract as soon as the agreement for the purchase of said property is executed and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Phelan, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending November 29, 1893, amounting to \$44,459.88, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

Whereas, By section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department or Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire by purchase, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, what property in said city and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with such owners upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water front of said City; and

Whereas, The Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all riparian and wharfage rights and interests in or annexed to or appurtenant to the bulkhead on the North river, extending one hundred feet south of Perry street as extended; and

Whereas, It appears that the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, Trustees of the Estate of George S. Miller, deceased, are the owners in fee simple with all its hereditaments of the premises above named, including the riparian and wharfage rights.

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the said riparian and wharfage rights, with all its hereditaments, and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor, free from all incumbrances, the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450) per front foot, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, Trustees of the Estate of George S. Miller, deceased, and the said company be and hereby is requested within ten days from receipt hereof, to notify this Board in writing whether they will sell the said riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York for the price above mentioned; and in the event that they shall fail to notify this Board of their willingness to so convey their respective riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said rights and interests between the owners thereof and this Department.

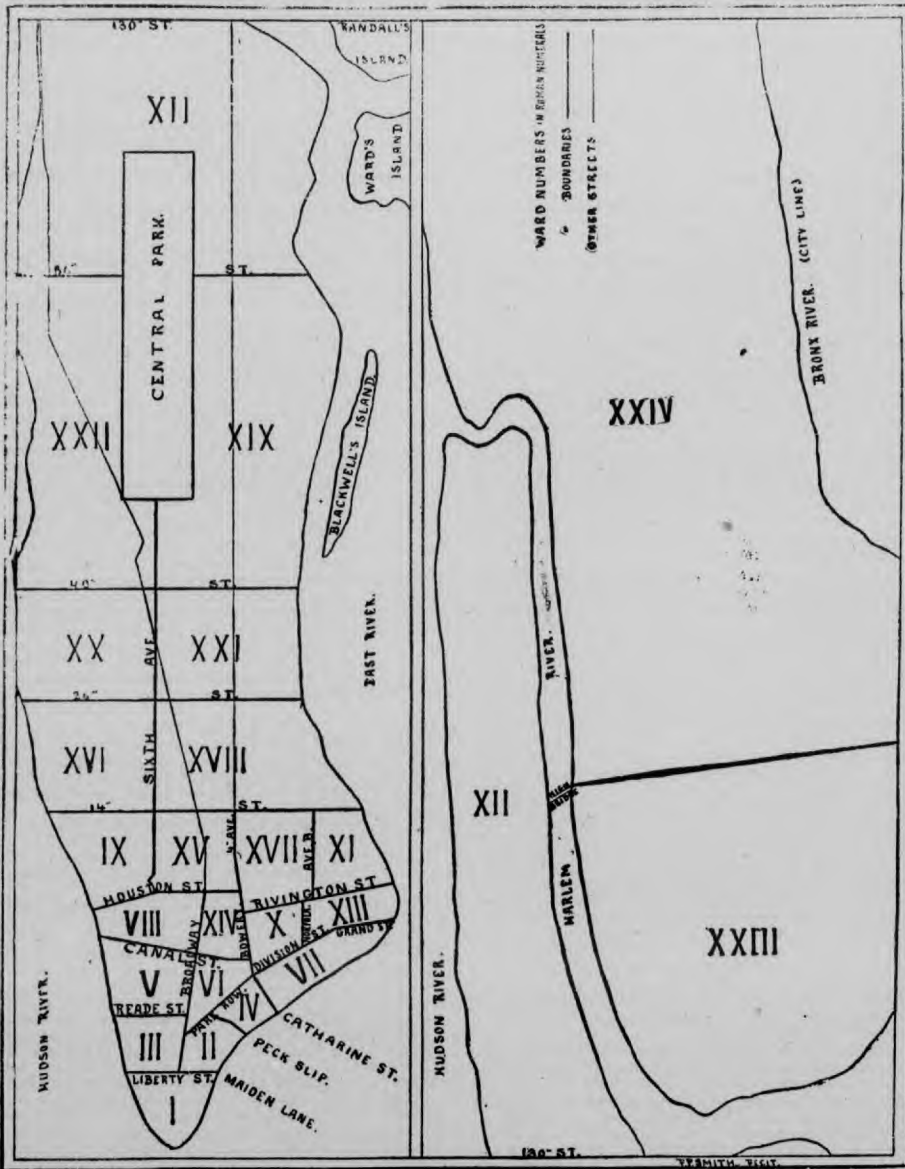

The 676 deaths represent a death-rate of 18.39 against 16.66 for the previous week, and 18.95 for the corresponding week of 1892. Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 138, 170, 70, 17 and 11, against 185, 182, 78, 22 and 10, for the previous week, a total of 406 against 477. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eighth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventh and Seventeenth Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth, Thirteenth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh, Tenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards. Six of the 17 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 9 of the remaining 11 were below Fourteenth street. The cases of small-pox were pretty well scattered, but 6 of the 11 were above Twenty-sixth street, and the remaining 5 were below Fourteenth street.

The regular daily tests, however, will be made with a burner that will obtain from the gas the greatest amount of light, and practicable for use by the consumer, and consuming at the rate of five cubic feet of gas per hour. The testing candle shall be of sperm of six to the pound, and consuming, as near as possible, one hundred and twenty grains of spermaceti per hour, and no candle shall be used for testing which consumes less than one hundred and four grains of spermaceti per hour. And as regards purity, the gas shall be free, within limits not injurious to the public health, from ammonia, sulphureted hydrogen, and other sulphur and noxious compounds.
