### BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, November 13, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names:

The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Queens.

The Vice-President, Hon. John L. Shea, presided.

The minutes of the meetings of October 30, and November 7, 1901, were approved as printed.

OPENING PRESIDENT STREET, BROOKLYN.

OPENING CROWN STREET, BROOKLYN.

OPENING CARROLL STREET, BROOKLYN.

Hearing in the above matters, which was laid over on October 16, was opened.

After hearing Mr. Wells, representing the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company, the openings of President street and Crown street were laid over. In regard to Carroll street, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York deems it for the public interest that Carroll street be opened and extended across the tracks of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad, formerly the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York; and

Whereas, In pursuance of section 61 of the Amended Railroad Law, upon notice duly given, a hearing on such proposed railroad crossing was this day, November 13, 1901, had before this Board, representative of said railroad company being present;

Resolved, That this Board does hereby request the State Board of Railroad Commissioners to take such action that the said Carroll street may be extended across the tracks of the said Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad, formerly the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, in such manner as said State Board of Railroad Commissioners may direct.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to represent The City of New York before the said State Board of Railroad Commissioners in such said action.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Negative—None.

OPENING LIVONIA AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

Hearing in this matter, which was laid over on October 16, was opened.

After hearing Mr. Kelly, representing the Long Island Railroad, in opposition to the proposed opening, on motion of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the matter was referred back to the Local Board.

CHANGE OF GRADES IN THE THIRTIETH, THIRTY-FIRST AND THIRTY-SECOND WARDS, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed change of grades in the territory bounded by Foster avenue, Avenue G, East Seventeenth street, Avenue H and Coney Island avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed change of grades, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 23d day of October, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in territory bounded by Foster avenue, Ocean avenue, Avenue G, East Seventeenth street, Avenue H and Coney Island avenue, in the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 13th day of November, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed change of grades would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed change of grades would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 13th day of November, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 13th day of November, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of grades who have appeared, and such proposed change of grades was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in territory bounded by Foster avenue, Ocean avenue, Avenue G, East Seventeenth street, Avenue H and Coney Island avenue, in the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to change the grades in the aforesaid territory as follows:

#### 1. Irvington Place.

Beginning at the intersection of Irvington place and the eastern property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 27.4 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 25.28 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 2. DeKoven Court.

Beginning at the intersection of DeKoven court and East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 31.37 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of the western property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 27.34 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. The elevation at the eastern property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad to be 27.34 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 24.62 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 3. Avenue G.

Beginning at the intersection of Avenue G and Coney Island avenue, the elevation to be 38.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Twelfth street, the elevation to be 36.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Thirteenth street, the elevation to be 35.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 32.74 feet above mean high-water datum;

4th. Thence easterly to the intersection of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 27.33 feet above mean high-water datum;

5th. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 24.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

6th. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Eighteenth street, the elevation to be 23.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

#### 4. Waldorf Court.

Beginning at the intersection of Waldorf court and East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 34.13 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of the western property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 35.52 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. The elevation at the eastern property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad to be 33.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

3d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 27.88 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 5. Wellington Court.

Beginning at the intersection of Wellington court and East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 35.61 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of the western property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 37.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 6. East Twelfth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Twelfth street and Avenue H, the elevation to be 37.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 337.42 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue H, the elevation to be 38.42 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Avenue G, the elevation to be 36.5 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 7. East Thirteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Thirteenth street and Avenue H, the elevation to be 36.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 275.15 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue H, the elevation to be 37.17 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Avenue G, the elevation to be 35.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 8. East Eighteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Eighteenth street and Avenue G, the elevation to be 23.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 667.08 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue G, the elevation to be 25.42 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Foster avenue, the elevation to be 24.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

#### 9. East Nineteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Nineteenth street and Avenue G, the elevation to be 22.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 600.96 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue G, the elevation to be 24.17 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Foster avenue, the elevation to be 22.6 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established in the Borough of Brooklyn by the Department of Highways.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in the above-named territory, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in territory bounded by Foster avenue, Ocean avenue, Avenue G, East Seventeenth street, Avenue H and Coney Island avenue, in the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grades in the aforesaid territory as follows:

#### 1. Irvington Place.

Beginning at the intersection of Irvington place and the eastern property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 27.4 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 25.28 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 2. DeKoven Court.

Beginning at the intersection of DeKoven court and East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 31.37 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of the western property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 27.34 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. The elevation at the eastern property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad to be 27.34 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 24.62 feet above mean high-water datum.

#### 3. Avenue G.

Beginning at the intersection of Avenue G and Coney Island avenue, the elevation to be 38.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Twelfth street, the elevation to be 36.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Thirteenth street, the elevation to be 35.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 32.74 feet above mean high-water datum;

4th. Thence easterly to the intersection of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 27.33 feet above mean high-water datum;

5th. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 24.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

6th. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Eighteenth street, the elevation to be 23.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

#### 4—Waldorf Court.

Beginning at the intersection of Waldorf court and East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 34.13 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of the western property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 35.52 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. The elevation at the eastern property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad to be 33.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

3d. Thence easterly to the intersection of East Seventeenth street, the elevation to be 27.88 feet above mean high-water datum.

## 5—Wellington Court.

Beginning at the intersection of Wellington court and East Fourteenth street, the elevation to be 35.61 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
1st. Thence easterly to the intersection of the western property line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, the elevation to be 37.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

## 6—East Twelfth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Twelfth street and Avenue H, the elevation to be 37.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;  
1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 337.42 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue H, the elevation to be 38.42 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Avenue G, the elevation to be 36.5 feet above mean high-water datum.

## 7—East Thirteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Thirteenth street and Avenue H, the elevation to be 36.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;  
1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 275.15 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue H, the elevation to be 37.17 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Avenue G, the elevation to be 35.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

## 8—East Eighteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Eighteenth street and Avenue G, the elevation to be 23.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;  
1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 667.08 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue G, the elevation to be 25.42 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Foster avenue, the elevation to be 24.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;

## 9—East Nineteenth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of East Nineteenth street and Avenue G, the elevation to be 22.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;  
1st. Thence northerly to a point distant 600.96 feet from the northern side-line of Avenue G, the elevation to be 24.17 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
2d. Thence northerly to the intersection of Foster avenue, the elevation to be 22.6 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;  
All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established in the Borough of Brooklyn by the Department of Highways.

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 16th day of October, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the laying out a new street between Bridge street and Jay street, and of a public park, bounded by Bridge street, Tiffany street, Jay street and the northerly line of the said new street, and the closing and discontinuing of all streets, places and courts within the boundaries of the said park, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 13th day of November, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out and closing would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out and closing would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 13th day of November, 1901 ; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 13th day of November, 1901 ; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out and closing who have appeared, and such proposed laying out and closing was duly considered by this Board ; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the laying out of a new street between Bridge street and Jay street, and of a public park, bounded by Bridge street, Tiffany street, Jay street and the northerly line of the said new street, and the closing and discontinuing of all streets, places and courts within the boundaries of the said park, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out said new street and park and close the aforesaid streets, as follows :

## "A"—Locating and Laying Out "Street."

The northern side-line of street between Bridge street and Jay street is 130.5 ± feet southerly from and parallel to the southern side-line of Chapel street.

1st. Thence southerly along the western side-line of Bridge street to the northern side-line of Tillary street ;  
2d. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Tillary street to the eastern side-line of Jay street ;  
3d. Thence northerly along the eastern side-line of Jay street to a point distant 130.5 ± feet southerly from the southeastern side-line intersection of Chapel street and Jay street ;  
4th. Thence easterly along the northern side-line of street to the point of beginning.

Stryker's alley to be closed.  
Hennesey place to be closed its entire length.  
Harper's court to be closed its entire length.  
Lawrence street to be closed from Hennesey place to the northern side-line of Tillary street.  
Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by the laying out of a new street and park, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

M., at which meeting such proposed change of grades would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed change of grades would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 13th day of November, 1901 ; and

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, between Kingsbridge road and Bainbridge avenue ; in Valentine avenue, between East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street and East One Hundred and Ninety-sixth street, and in Briggs avenue, between East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street and East One Hundred and Ninety-sixth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grades in the aforesaid streets, as follows :

## "A"—East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Bainbridge avenue and East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, the elevation to be 97.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;

1st. Thence northwesterly to the intersection of the eastern side-line of Briggs avenue, the elevation to be 109.0 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
2d. Thence northwesterly to the western side-line of Briggs avenue, the elevation to be 111.0 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
3d. Thence northwesterly to the eastern side-line of Valentine avenue, the elevation to be 121.5 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
4th. Thence northwesterly to the southwesterly curb corner of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street and Valentine avenue, the elevation to be 125.0 feet above mean high-water datum ;  
5th. Thence northwesterly to the point of tangency in the northern side-line of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, the elevation to be 126.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

## "B"—Briggs Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of East One Hundred and Ninety-sixth street and Briggs avenue, the elevation to be 128 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;

1st. Thence southerly to a point distant 500 feet northerly from the northerly curb-line of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, the elevation to be 118.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore ;  
2d. Thence southerly to a point 100 feet from the northern curb-line of East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, the elevation to be 111.5 feet above mean high-water datum.

## "C"—Valentine Avenue.

#### OPENING FENNIMORE STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, November 11, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that proceedings be initiated to open Fennimore street, between Flatbush avenue and Ocean avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, I have to state that there is no legal obstacle against approving the recommendation.

Fennimore street, from Flatbush avenue to Ocean avenue, is shown on the Kings County Town Survey Map, filed in the Register's office of Kings County, in volume 2, on June 13, 1874. There are buildings on the land to be acquired.

Fennimore street crosses the tracks of the Brighton Beach Railroad, and it will be necessary therefore, under section 61 of the Laws of 1897, to notify the railroad company that the City intends to open Fennimore street, and to apply to the State Railroad Commissioners to approve the manner of crossing the railroad.

Papers in the matter are herewith returned.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, November 9, 1901.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—In pursuance of the provisions of section 486 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit herewith, for the approval of your Board, a map duly signed by the Engineer in charge of the Brooklyn Water Supply, the Engineer of Water Supply and the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply for that borough, showing lands in the Thirty-first Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, being part of the lands owned by John J. Morrissey, to be acquired for the purpose of maintaining, preserving and increasing the supply of pure and wholesome water for the City in the Borough of Brooklyn, and for the purpose of preventing and removing contamination and pollution of such supply, the acquisition of such land having been repeatedly and urgently recommended by the Deputy Commissioner and the Engineer of the Department in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a valuable adjunct to the present Brooklyn water system.

I further request that if the map be provisionally adopted or approved by your Board opportunity be given to all persons interested to be heard respecting the acquisition of the real estate shown thereon, and that such notice of public hearing be given in the CITY RECORD, the corporation papers and in two newspapers published in the County of Kings, in which the real estate is situated, as required by said section 486 of the City Charter.

I herewith transmit a copy of a certified report made to the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply for the Borough of Brooklyn, by Mr. Frank E. Johnson, Notary Public, giving by lot and block numbers the assessed valuation of the property or land in question, as taken from the record of the Department of Taxes and Assessments of the Borough of Brooklyn, the said valuation amounting to a total of \$24,800.

SIR—The Board of Public Improvements on April 24, 1901, passed a resolution to consider on May 15, 1901, the proposed laying out of streets in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, and referred the matter on said date to the Local Board of the Borough of Manhattan for report.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan returned this map to me, and a new map was prepared, embodying such suggestions which had been discussed at the different meetings of property-owners.

That section of the Twelfth Ward lying between the Harlem River Ship Canal and Spuyten Duyvil creek, known as Marble Hill, was taken out on account of the proposed New York Central and Hudson River Railroad changes.

The map herewith submitted for the consideration of the Board is entitled, "Map or plan showing the street system in that part of the Twelfth Ward lying between West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Harlem River Ship Canal, Borough of Manhattan, as modified and proposed by the Board of Public Improvements under authority of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897."

The submitted map or plan shows by yellow color avenues and streets which were found in

the records as having been legally laid out; the proposed additional avenues and streets and partial alterations of the same are tinted red.

The appended list is a description of the additions and alterations.

Attached hereto is a copy of a communication from the Secretary of the Fort Washington Bridge Association relating to the above-mentioned lay out.

## APPROACH TO NEW EAST RIVER BRIDGE.

The following report from the Commissioner of Bridges was read:

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES, October 22, 1901.

To the Honorable Board of Public Improvements, Manhattan, N. Y.

GENTLEMEN—On the 15th day of May, 1901, the matter of laying out an approach to the New East River Bridge at Delancey street was referred to me for a report (see Minutes of the Board, 1901, page 1,020), and in connection therewith I received from the Secretary of the Board a communication transmitting two maps showing a proposed approach by widening Delancey street and Spring street, and also an approach through Broome street, and the other showing the proposed diagonal approach near Cooper Union.

Since receiving said communication I have considered the matter and am of the opinion that the proposed diagonal approach from the bridge plaza through private property to East Sixth street and Third avenue is not advisable because of the great cost thereof, and that the proposed widening of Spring street from the Bowery to Marion street is not, in my judgment, feasible because of the width of Spring street.

I am of the opinion that the widening of Delancey street, as far as the Bowery, by 75 feet on the south side, and cutting an extension of Delancey street, through private property, as far as Elm street, as shown on the map or plan herewith submitted, will bring about the most direct avenue of approach to the East River bridge of any that has been suggested. Many of the lots on the south side of Delancey street are only 75 feet deep, and a widening of 75 feet, making Delancey street 125 feet wide, is ample for the purpose desired. The extension of Delancey street, through private property west of the Bowery, is made 100 feet wide, and parallel with the lot lines from the Bowery to Elm street; it diverges slightly to the south from the line of Delancey street produced.

The objection to the widening of Spring street as far as Elm street is that this street is not really in line with Delancey street, and that west of Elm street is only 60 feet wide, and is, moreover, occupied by a double-track street railway.

The objection to the widening of Broome street, from the plaza to the Bowery, is that Broome street, thus widened, would not be in a line with the bridge, and that the plaza would have to be crossed diagonally in order to reach it.

One of the main reasons for constructing a direct approach to the bridge is the aesthetic one of affording an unobstructed view of a large and imposing structure, and this would be satisfied by the Spring street plan as far as the Bowery, and to a greater extent by the plan now proposed. The direct extension of Delancey street to Elm street would afford a straighter and more convenient approach than either of the others from the bridge to Elm street. The new street would be unobstructed by present surface tracks through its entire length and through Broome street to West Broadway, and would in consequence afford greater convenience for carriages and trucks. At Centre street and at Elm street it would open into down-town streets 80 feet wide and to an up-town street of the same width, and should materially facilitate communication up and down, and by Broome and Canal streets to the west side of the city.

The estimated cost of property, assessed value, \$1,600,000, while greater than that of the Broome street plan, is considerably less than that of the Spring street plan. The direct extension of Delancey street would materially benefit property west of the Bowery by creating two new street fronts, which would inevitably develop into great value.

This direct approach would better satisfy the aesthetic requirements of the problem, be more convenient to the traveling public, be cheaper than the Spring street approach, and be of greater value to the property affected than either of the other plans.

AN ORDINANCE to lay out Northern avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 8th day of May, 1901, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Northern avenue, from West One Hundred and Eighty-first street to a point distant seven hundred and seventy-five feet northerly, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid avenue, as follows:

## "A"—Laying Out.

Beginning at a point on the northerly side-line of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street distant 469.62 feet easterly from the northeast corner of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street and Boulevard Lafayette;

1. Thence northerly deflecting 12 degrees 31 minutes 21 seconds to the right from the northern prolongation of the radius drawn through the point of beginning for 784.30 feet;

2. Thence easterly deflecting 105 degrees 10 minutes 43 seconds to the right for 62.17 feet;

3. Thence southerly deflecting 74 degrees 49 minutes 17 seconds to the right for 757.66 feet to the northern side-line of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street;

4. Thence westerly along the northerly side-line of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street for 60.91 feet to the point of beginning.

## "B"—Grades.

The grade of Northern avenue at a point distant 100 feet northerly from the north side-line of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street measured along the western side-line of Northern avenue to be 186.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

1. The roadway and sidewalks to be adjusted separately between this point and the northerly side-line of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street;

2. Thence 100 feet northerly of the previously proposed grade, the elevation to be 195 feet above mean high-water datum;

3. Thence at a point where the central line of Northern avenue intersects the northern limit of said avenue, the elevation to be 225.5 feet above mean high-water datum.

Adopted by the Council October 1, 1901, two-thirds of all the members elected voting in favor thereof, having been first advertised as required by law.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 29, 1901, two-thirds of all the members elected voting in favor thereof, having been first advertised as required by law.

DEAR SIR—With a letter dated September 27 from the Secretary of the Board I received for investigation and report a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between Robbins and Prospect avenues, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected where necessary.

Upon investigation I find that the City has acquired title to that section of East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, and that it is necessary to regulate and grade the roadway in order to make connection between the different avenues in that neighborhood.

The estimated cost of the proposed improvement, including six months' maintenance, is \$7,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$84,800. I recommend that the improvement be authorized.

DEAR SIR—The following is a statement of elapsed time, etc., on contract for the construction of the Willis Avenue Bridge, from date of Mr. Rodgers' taking hold of construction to August 21, 1901, the bridge being opened to travel on August 22, 1901.

In reference to this overtime I would state that it has been caused by various reasons, as follows :

Firstly—On account of the extra depth it was necessary to go to find suitable foundation for the caisson of Piers 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Secondly—The change in lighting from incandescent to arc system.

Thirdly—Change in end-lifting mechanism of draw span from screw arrangement as at Third Avenue Bridge, as per original contract, to toggle arrangement.

Fourthly—Additional amount in street improvements both on north and south sides of the river.

Fifthly—The placing of gate-houses on rest piers, not originally contemplated.

From the foregoing facts it appears to me that no overtime can be charged against the contractor.

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATIONS.

The following communication was referred to the Chief Topographical Engineer :

To the Board of Public Improvements, New York City :

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned, residents, property-owners and citizens in and of the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, petition your Honorable Board as follows :

That section of the city located where Broadway and Eighth avenue intersect Fifty-ninth street at the Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue entrance to Central Park, and commonly known as the "Circle," demands immediate attention from the municipal authorities.

The annoying and dangerous condition of the locality described, while constantly harassing the residents of the immediate neighborhood, is a matter of vital concern to the public. Three of the most busy thoroughfares in the city intersect the Circle, namely, Broadway, Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street. In addition to the ordinary traffic on them, there are double lines of electric surface railroads running over them, all converging in the Circle. The transfer of passengers between the various roads at this point during all hours makes the Circle the greatest passenger distributing point in this city. In the busy hours of the day it is thronged with passengers, who are in constant danger from electric cars, trucks and wagons passing through the Circle.

The Central Park entrance at the north side of the Circle is used by the multitudes who reach the park from Broadway, Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street. Aside from the thousands of passengers who either take the cars at the Circle or are transferred there, the great number of visitors to the park is enough to congest the Circle to the limit of danger on summer evenings and Sundays during the year.

The space afforded by the Circle, at no time adequate for its great use, has increased in danger to citizens since the change from horse to electric power in the running of cars through the Circle, so that at present it is absolutely unsafe to use it; and the near future promises increased difficulties and dangers arising from the construction of a Rapid Transit underground station beneath the Circle and on the north side of it. Certain methods of relief have been suggested which ought to be carried out; but no substantial remedy can be put into operation without widening the area of the locality in question, to compare somewhat with the area or plaza fronting the park entrance at Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue. With the immense space left to the public at the Fifth avenue entrance to the park, there is but one railway line passing at that point; whereas, at the Eighth avenue entrance to the park there are three railways, and thoroughfares over which there is no limit to the character of truck and wagon traffic, a monument taking up a considerable portion of the Circle, and now an under-ground station in course of completion.

To relieve the constantly congested condition of the Circle is a problem which has engaged the attention of citizens and local bodies interested in public improvements, but so far without practical results.

Your petitioners being impressed with the necessity of immediate action to meet the requirements for extended area in connection with the Circle, and believing that the best possible remedy at hand would be the acquisition by the City of the property south of the Circle, which property is generally bounded by Broadway on the easterly side, Fifty-eighth street on the southerly side, Eighth avenue on the westerly side, and on the northerly side by the said Circle, they respectfully petition your Honorable Board to acquire, in the name of the City, title to the above generally described property, that the same may be added to the area of the said Circle and placed under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks.
