Randolph Guggenheimer, which occurred very suddenly on the 11th inst.

In announcing the death of Mr. Guggenheimer, the President said:

"It is my very sad duty to announce the death of our fellow Commissioner, Mr. Guggenheimer, which occurred very suddenly at his summer home, West End, N. J., on the evening of Wednesday last, the 11th inst. The funeral services will be held at Temple Emanu-El, Fifth avenue and Forty-third street, on Sunday, at 10.30 a. m. "Mr. Guggenheimer's active interest in our public school system is too well known to require any extended mention from me, and I will give only the briefest outline of his services in connection with this Department,

"He was appointed a member of the Board of Education of the former City of New York by Mayor Grace in 1886 for a term of three years, and served also under two successive appointments made by Mayor Grant in 1889 and 1892. His connection with the Board covered the years 1887 to 1895, inclusive. During that time he served as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Normal College, in the work of which he always took a most earnest interest, as Chairman of the Committee on Sites and New Buildings, as Chairman of the Committee on Nomination of Trustees, and as a member of these committees, and also of the Committee on Evening Schools, the Committee on Buildings, the Committee on By-Laws, the Committee, and other committees. For several years he was a member of a special Committee, and other committees. For several years he was a member of a special Committee on Legislation.

"After an interval of several years, during which his interest in the public schools did not wane, Mr. Guggenheimer was prevailed upon to re-enter the Board of Education. On the resignation of Mr. Warburg in March, 1906, he was reappointed for a full term of five years. Upon the resignation of ex-President Tifft, a year ago, Mr. Guggenheimer was appointed Chairman of the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools, and he also served as a member of the Executive Committee of the Normal College and of the Committee on Special Schools.

"It is perhaps needless for me to say that he took the deepest interest in the various activities of this Department, especially in the high schools. His loyalty to the best interests of the Department was unquestioned, and his experience and high character rendered his counsels of the utmost value. Apparently he had many years of useful service before him, and his untimely death makes a sad break in our ranks."

Mr. Greene addressed the Board as follows:

Mr. Greene addressed the Board as follows:

"Mr. President: Perhaps it may not be inappropriate that the suggestion of some formal action by the Board in regard to the death of our late esteemed associate should come from a member of the Committee of which, in the present Board, he happened to be Chairman. Those who, like myself, have sat under his Chairmanship learned to value in a high degree his gifts of native ability, of acquired experience, of courtesy and impartiality. We have always felt safer that the questions discussed in Committee should be dealt with in his presence, with the aid of his counsel and suggestion.

"He showed himself to be one of the public-spirited citizens of the community when, wealthy himself, he chose to act as a careful trustee of the finances of the school system, as was shown repeatedly by his action in Committee and in the Board. A system, as was shown repeatedly by his action in Committee and in the Board. A man most charitable in tendency, the poor, the wretched, the fatherless, without regard to race or creed, felt the impulse of his beneficence. He furnished to the City in his last years, unhappily too short, the spectacle of a man of great capacity, a man who had accumulated honor in his career in the City not only in his profession but as a public official, reaching the exalted position of President of the City's Council—he showed the spectacle of such a man placing at the service of the school system the unbought service, the unpurchasable service, that may be rendered by a man of approved capacity in the world, in the management of the affairs of this important and, as it was by him, beloved system.

"We who continue the work here will miss his advice, his suggestion, his careful scrutiny of measures; but it will be long before the memory will pass from us of that kindly wisdom which he always showed, and of the courtesy and dignity with which he managed his course as a member of the Board of Education.

"With the permission of the Board, Mr. President, I offer this resolution:

"Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed by the President to prepare appropriate resolutions in reference to the death of Hon. Randolph Guggenheimer, and present the same at the next stated meeting of the Board of Education."

In seconding the resolution offered by Mr. Greene, Mr. Barrett said: "I am one

of those who have had the privilege during the past year to sit in council on the Executive Committee of the Normal College with our late departed friend, Mr. Guggenheimer. I learned to love his many highly sterling qualties and to respect his unerring judgment on the many difficult problems that came before that Committee during the past year.

The resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote, and the President appointed Messrs. Greene, Barrett and Harrison as the Committee of three provided for therein.

The Board of Education here stays for the moment the discharge of its ordinary duties to record with sincere sorrow its deep sense of loss in the passing from his earthly activities of Commissioner Randolph Guggenheimer. Our dead colleague had not yet completed the sixth decade of his life, and his matured experience and ripened powers seemed to hold the promise of many active years in the service of his fellow-citizens. But if the measure of his life did not meet the hopes and wishes of his friends, he lived long enough to demonstrate in a striking way not only his ability and disposition to render influential and enduring service, but, even more, the purposes, at once high and kindly, that informed his public acts.

Evincing always a high degree of interest in the public school system, he began his labors as a member of the Board of Education twenty years ago. In his first period of service he devoted nine years to the work of the schools, namely, from 1887 to 1895, and he was reappointed in the spring of 1906. His committee service was varied and important. He was at different times Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Normal College, in the work of which he always displayed a most active

varied and important. He was at different times Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Normal College, in the work of which he always displayed a most active interest; of the Committee on Sites and New Buildings, and of the Committee on the Nomination of Trustees, of former boards, and at his death was Chairman of the Committee on High and Training Schools of the present Board. His service as a member of committees was naturally even wider in scope, and was at all times helpful and

It may not be amiss to note, as indicative of the position he attained in the general estimation of the community, that in the interval after his first retirement from the Board of Education he was chosen President of the Council of The City of New York. Of that service this is not the place to speak, nor, attractive though the theme would be, of the beneficences which his charitable nature gratified itself in dispensing, nor yet again of his home life, which faithful tradition represents as unusually sweet and

It is, however, fitting for the Board of Education to record, as it does here, its high appreciation of a public servant of sterling character and of approved and fruitful ability, who gave the best that was in him to the work of improving and uplifting the schools, and securing the widest distribution of their benefits. With his fellow workers who were privileged to know him most closely he has left the enduring memory of a man who to a rare resourcefulness and capability added a self-forgetting industry, and whose natural bearing of modest dignity was united with a courtesy, ever kindly and unfailing, which not alone earned for the dead Commissioner the esteem of his colleagues for an able and upright official, but tinged their feelings toward him, overpassing the boundaries of mere respect, with the unfading glow of personal affection. passing the boundaries of mere respect, with the unfading glow of personal affection.

I. In each school the boys of each class of the grades eligible to compete in athletic games shall, by ballot, in the first week of the term or as near thereto as may be practicable, elect six policemen, who shall hold office for that term and shall be

 The lieutenants of all the classes in any school shall elect a captain. In case the captain elected shall be a lieutenant, the vacancy shall be filled from the class

from which the lieutenant was elected.

4. Class elections shall be held under the direction of the teacher, who shall appoint three inspectors to take and canvass the ballots of the class.

5. The other elections shall be held under the direction of the principal or of a teacher to be designated by him, who shall appoint three inspectors for each election.

6. Each policeman, lieutenant and captain shall be furnished with an official badge inscribed: Police Lieutenant

The police force thus formed in each school shall, under the general direction

7. The police force thus formed in each school shall, under the general direction of the principal, enforce gentlemanly behavior among the boys in going to and from the games in which the school may participate, prevent any injury to the cars in which the boys may travel and any annovance to the other passengers, prevent any injury to the armories or fields in which the games may be held, preserve order during the games, and assist in the enforcement of the rules. They shall also possess such other powers in and out of school as may be prescribed by the principal.

8. Boys acting in an improper manner in going to and from the games or in the armories or on the fields shall be cautioned by the school police, and if the offense is continued, be notified that they are under arrest, and such arrest shall be at once reported by the officer to his lieutenant. So long as such arrest continues the offender shall not be permitted to participate in any of the athletic games. The lieutenant to whom the arrest is reported, if the offense is sufficiently serious, may, with the approval of the teacher in charge, or if no teacher is present, of his captain, debar the offender from participation in the games to be held on that day, and may expel him from the building or grounds in which the offense is committed.

9. All arrests and punishments shall be promptly reported to the teacher in charge or to the principal.
