TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Year Ending December 31, 1909.

Tenement House Department, City of New York, No. 44 East Twenty-third Street, New York, December 31, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir-During the year 1909 many important changes in the organization and procedure of the Tenement House Department were made possible by amendments to the Tenement House Law, increased appropriation, and a thorough and complete census showing tenement house conditions throughout the entire city.

The amendments to the law were the result of a series of conferences between the Tenement House Commissioner, representatives of property owners' associations, and the Tenement House Committee, a body composed almost entirely of the members of the Tenement House Commission of 1900. By these amendments many of the harsh features of the law as it had existed were eradicated without in any way impairing its effectiveness. Thousands of pending violations in reference to old buildings were affected by these amendments. In fact, almost every old building violation on file in the department contained at least one minor item affected. A vast amount of work was therefore entailed by the department in order that the violations should be modified to meet the changes made in the law. The task was extremely difficult and complicated, owing to the tremendous amount of detail involved. The entire violation in each case, and all correspondence in connection with same, had to be reviewed in order to ascertain its exact status. Inspections had to be made in thousands of cases involved, and many conferences with the Corporation Counsel's office were necessary, and new notices had to be forwarded to the owners. Time was necessary to accomplish all this, but the work is now well in hand, and it is hoped to complete the work of modification by February 1, 1910.

The completion of this work will be a distinct step forward in the progress of the department, and should have far reaching consequences. Hitherto the department has been seriously hampered by a vast amount of petty detail incident upon the enforcement of minor items in the violations. It was impossible to omit these items from the violations because the law did not permit it, even though the items did not materially affect the character of the work performed. It was, moreover, frequently difficult to effect a compliance in these matters as owners strongly objected to making technical changes when they believed the work as done to be a substantial compliance. The friction thus caused between tenement house owners and the department was a serious source of delay to the department, resulting as it did in numerous reinspections in

thousands of cases.

The increased appropriation provided for by the budget of 1909 was intended to provide for a more aggressive prosecution of the violations in regard to old law tenements and to make possible a more adequate inspection of tenement houses where the average rental is less than \$25 per month. By means of the increased appropriation it was hoped to provide a sufficient force to render it possible for the department to inspect all such houses at least twice a year, and thus keep the department in closer touch with serious conditions which had had to be neglected. The volume of work to be accomplished in this respect, however, has been seriously lessened through the long delay occasioned in training the force of new inspectors and in procuring typewriting machines, and by the lack of Civil Service lists of clerks available for the use of the department. As a consequence of these obstacles not all of the employees provided for could be profitably employed, and it was deemed advisable to withhold appointments until services of employees could be fully utilized. The result will be that about \$30,000 of the salary appropriation of the department will be turned into the

Unquestionably the most important achievement of the department, because of its important bearing upon future work, was the complete tenement house census conducted during the present year. Reference has been made to the increased appropriation granted for the prosecution of structural and sanitary violations in old law houses. It was felt, however, that in order to obtain the greatest amount of good from this appropriation, the work must be prosecuted in a systematic manner. The necessary information available to the department was extremely lacking and inaccurate. No complete tenement house census had ever been made before in this city, and consequently it was not even known how many tenements there were; much less how many dark rooms and nails there were and where they existed. The policy of the department was, therefore, first, to locate the bad conditions; second, to grade these so as to immediately reveal the worst conditions, and third, to attack the worst conditions first. An incomplete canvass of the city in 1902 showed 361,661 rooms with light and ventilation below the standard required by the law. Since the organization of the department to January 1, 1909, 39,051 of these rooms have been provided with windows—the greater part of them, to be exact, 34,460, during the administration of the present Commissioner, in the years 1906, 1907 and 1908.

Early in the year 1909, during the months of February and March, a complete canvass of the tenements of the greater city (including all boroughs) was made,

which showed 364,367 rooms below the standard required by law.

Critics of the department's work had been accustomed to say that the definition of the "dark rooms" adopted by the department, as all rooms falling below the standard required by law even in trifling respects, misrepresented actual conditions, and that the majority of the so-called "dark rooms" merely had windows of a few inches below the legal size, or opening upon courts slightly smaller than the law permitted, or showing some other minor defect.

To meet this criticism a distinction was made, in taking the census of tenements, between rooms having windows of illegal size opening upon an adjoining room, those having windows opening upon a court or shaft of inadequate size, those opening upon a covered shaft, and those with absolutely no windows at all, and no light or ventilation except through the doorway to the adjoining room, which latter class must, in

the strictest sense, be termed "dark rooms." As a result of the canvass made according to this classification, it was found that of the total of 364,367 rooms below the legal standard, 101,207 were entirely without windows, showing that notwithstanding the large number of changes already effected

there remained before the department a serious and important task.

Of the 101,207 totally dark rooms then existing, 16,656 were at that date covered by orders of the department requiring the removal of the unlawful condition. From the date of the enumeration to December 31 orders were issued to cover 29.255 more. Meanwhile 804 of these dark rooms, on which orders had not been issued, were taken from the jurisdiction of the department by removal from the tenement class, or were disposed of entirely by the demolition of the house, leaving 54,492 on December 31, 1909, to be attended to by the department, only a little over one-half of the total number found in February.

To remedy the evils of the past by securing better protection from fire has been one of the greatest problems the department has had to contend with. One of the most prolific sources of tenement fires is the cellar bakery in which invariably fat boiling is carried on. As a result of a thorough inspection covering the entire city 1,954 tenement bakeries were found. Of these 1,164 are in the Borough of Manhattan, 564 in Brooklyn, 170 in The Bronx, 53 in Queens and 3 in Richmond. Many of these are now fireproofed as the result of the vigorous prosecution of such cases during the present year. The necessary violations have all been issued, and in many bakeries the and 612 not fireproofed in Manhattan; 283 fireproofed and 281 not fireproofed in same owing to changed financial conditions, such, for instance, as bankruptcy pro-Brooklyn; 93 fireproofed and 77 not fireproofed in The Bronx: 28 fireproofed and 25 ceedings. The decision referred to below is therefore important. not fireproofed in Queens; 1 fireproofed and 2 not fireproofed in Richmond.

Another danger which the department has attempted to combat during the present year is the encumbrance of fire escapes. It may be said here that no city department has ever been able to wage a successful war against this evil. Much of it is due to thoughtlessness upon the part of tenants who do not realize their danger, they never having experienced a tenement fire. The magistrates are loath to inflict a penalty for this offense, so that about all the department can hope for is to so educate the tenants | against the man who had erected said tenement house and who had committed the to a sense of their danger that they will hesitate to jeopardize not only themselves but alleged violation of illegal occupancy. as indicated by the census, and were then taken up for attention in the order of their condition, beginning with the lowest grade and taking up the higher grades, one after the other, in order. It is to be understood then that the number of houses against which orders were issued as a result of the block census, is of those which show the most serious structural defects, singly or in combination, such as interior rooms entirely without windows, or school sinks, or both together. Since the first of the year to December 31, 9,811 of such tenements have been inspected and the appropriate orders issued.

The sanitary work also has been carried on in accordance with the budget provisions, as two complete sanitary inspections of the 81,160 tenements in the city with

apartment rentals of \$25 or less have been made.

At the last session of the Legislature amendments not introduced by the Tenement House Department were passed affecting sections 121 and 122 of the Tenement House Law. The purpose of these amendments was to permanently protect certain tenement houses from the operation of these two sections, provided the department failed to take action against such houses on or before a certain date. The department felt, how ever, that it would not be doing its duty by assuming a passive attitude in regard to this matter. The application of the law was therefore secured by the department commencing action in regard to those houses before the expiration of the time limit specified in the amendments.

With regard to the current work of the department for the year 1009, the statistical tables show that 1,398 plans were filed covering the erection of 2,587 tenement houses at the estimated cost of \$112,645,700, and containing 38,670 apartments, or accommodation for 174,015 persons. The statistical table below also shows such data for the entire eight years that the department has been in existence. Another table shows the extent of the alteration work for the current and previous years. During the year 3,829 alteration plans were filed affecting 4,739 tenement houses, the estimated cost of the alterations being \$3,144,620.

The total number of violations filed during 1909 is also shown by a table. From this it will be seen that 11,267 new building violations were filed and 7,436 dismissed and canceled during the year. Also 9.893 alteration violations were filed, 4.952 dis missed and canceled; 77,845 old building violations were also filed, and 48,875 were

dismissed and canceled.

A brief review of the more important work of the department for the past four years is of interest for purposes of comparison of the volume of work in the various years, and also as showing the substantial progress made in improving tenement conditions during the years 1906 to 1909 inclusive, or, in other words, during the present administration.

Reference has also been made to the statistical tables below showing the number of new buildings for which plans were filed, and also the number of houses to be altered. During the years 1906 to 1909, also, 34,717 new building violations were filed and 25,187 dismissed and canceled. 27,681 alteration violations were fied, and 18,800 dismisses and canceled. 242,553 old building violations were filed, and 239,555 dismissed and canceled. Particular attention is also called to the large number of apartments provided by the new buildings for which plans were filed during the period in question, thus affording practically a million people with the benefits of light and air and superior fire protection arranged for by the new law.

A feature of the present year's work relative to the buildings built under the new law has been an inspection to ascertain whether they have been illegally altered or occupied since completion. The department found many serious violations as a result of this inspection, such, for instance, as the subdividing of apartments in such a manner as to cut off access to the fire escapes. In some instances also fire passages were found to be closed off and rented for store purposes, while in other cases inside stairs leading to the cellar had been installed thereby increasing the danger from tire The department immediately instituted a vigorous prosecution of all such cases.

During the year 1909 there have been many important litigations which have ractically been test cases involving various provisions of the Tenement House Law.

A large number of novel questions have been raised from time to time in the minor matters which have been tried before Police Magistrates and Justices of the Muni cipal Courts. In all of these, as well as in the Supreme Court litigations, the depart ment has been, with one or two small exceptions, uniformly successful. Of the more important cases, mention may be made of the following:

People ex rel. Realty Dealers vs. Edmond J. Butler, etc., Supreme Court, Second

This was an application for a mandamus to compel the department to permit tire escapes to be removed from the front of a new law tenement and placed in vard courts, the courts being 5½ feet wide and 64 feet 5 inches long. The fire escapes to be at the innermost part of the court, more than 60 feet back from the yard.

The motion for mandamus in this case was denied by the Court.

The serious danger arising from moving picture shows in tenement houses had been brought forcibly to the attention of the department by serious ares not only in this city but in other cities as well, and orders had been issued by the Department compelling the removal of all moving picture plants from tenement houses. As a result of such an order against one Frank K. Bacci, an action was brought by him to compel the department to permit moving picture exhibitions in a tenement house of which he was the owner.

In the Court of Special Sessions the defendant, Bacci, was found guilty of vio lating section 40 of the Tenement House Act, in that he stored, kept and handled in a tenement house celluloid films which were combustible and dangerous to life. This was the celebrated moving picture case referred to in our last annual report. Hon. Matthew P. Breen, Police Magistrate, had held Bacci on the above charge for trial at Special Sessions. The Court of Special Sessions upheld the contention of the department in relation to the celluloid films which form an essential part of the moving picture machine.

This prosecution was the means of driving all of the moving picture shows out of the tenement houses in The City of New York.

The definition of a tenement house has frequently been a source of contention between the department and tenement house owners. Such a contention arose in the case of Otto Grimmer vs. Edmond J. Butler, etc., the point in question in this case being whether a certain building was an apartment house or a tenement house. The following, in reference to the decision, will therefore be of interest:

Otto Grimmer vs. Edmond J. Butler, etc.

This may be said to be the most important case that has come up since the Tenement House Law went into effect in 1901. It involves the question of the jurisdiction of the Tenement House Department over all buildings that have three or more families in them, as well as a full scope of the definition of a tenement house as contained in the Tenement House Act.

This was an action to enjoin the Tenement House Commissioner from vacating premises Nos. 120 and 122 East Thirty-first street. The vacating order had Leen issued by the department for the reason that the building in question was occupied without a certificate to the effect that the building conformed in all respects with the Tenement House Law. In the first instance the case was tried out before ex-Judge Edward W. Hatch as referee. He decided against the contentions of the department and held the building was an apartment hotel and that it was not a tenement house and was not within the jurisdiction of the Tenement House Department. An appeal was taken to the Appellate Division, which recently handed down a learned decision sustaining every contention made by the department and clearly defining the extent of the jurisdiction of the department over buildings occupied by three or more

The question has frequently arisen as to whether the department had the right to maintain violations on record against the premises where the ownership of the work of fireproofing is progressing. The actual figures to date show 552 fireproofed premises had changed or where different conditions had arisen in connection with

People ex rel. David Gordon vs. Edmond J. Butler, etc. This was an application for a writ of mandamus compelling the department to remove from the departmental records a certificate of a new building violation covering illegal occupation.

This motion was made in behalf of a former owner of the new law tenement in question, who had purchased said tenement house in foreclosure proceedings brought the relator, was not a party to the illegal occupation, that the certificate had been Immediately after the completion of the census, the directly practical work of subsequently issued permitting the occupation of the house, and that the record of

to deliver the same free and clear of all violations. It was further contended that the violation ought to be removed for the reason that a judgment had been taken against the former owner who had committed said violation,

This proceeding came up in the Supreme Court, First Department, and the motion was granted. An appeal was taken from the order granting the motion, and a unanimous decision has just been received from the Appellate Division, First Department,

reversing the order and denying the motion.

The Appellate Division sustained all of the department's contentions in reference to the right of the department to keep on record the occupancy violation. While the practical issue involved in this particular case was not of so grave importance, the principle involved is of vital interest to the department. It is the first time that the question has arisen in the courts and I am pleased to state that the contentions raised in behalf of the department have been sustained. It means much for the conservation of the official records of the Tenement House Department. Furthermore, it may have an important bearing in connection with many similar new building violations which are on file in Brooklyn.

Experience in handling the affairs of the department has shown the necessity for an immediate change in the procedure relative to cases for prosecution by the Corporation Counsel. Much confusion has arisen in the past due to having each office deal directly with the Corporation Counsel's office without the guidance of some central authority. It is therefore proposed to establish a new division of the department which will in effect be a clearing house for the handling of all cases forwarded to and returned from the Corporation Counsel. The effect of this will be to eliminate a number of petty cases which are too trivial in character to prosecute, which will permit more time in the Corporation Counsel's office for the prosecution of serious cases and thereby facilitate the work of the Corporation Counsel's office.

I am pleased to state also that the department is now in a better position than

ever to carry on its work in such a manner as will insure progress in all divisions, by reason of the increased force provided for structural and sanitary work during the present year and by the removal of many hampering clauses in the Tenement House Law which had previously been a serious obstacle to the work of the department.



herein are in all respects true, Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat-ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it he accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York. Charter. The certified check or money should not be in-

closed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally

ipon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract

awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in Bidders are requested to make their bids or

estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the hid, to-gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Cor-poration Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
