Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Wednesday, July 17, 1912.

The minutes of the meeting held June 26, 1912, were approved as printed.

A communication having been received from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for approval amended plan for the improvement of the water-front between West 23d and West 24th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law June 27, 1912, the

Deputy and Acting Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, September 18, 1912, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the amended plan for the improvement of the water-front between West 23d and West 24th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law June 27, 1912, and submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$425,000, the proceeds to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the payment of salaries and wages of the employees of the Department engaged in work of construction and improvements, or the preparation of plans therefor:

Gentlemen—In his 1912 corporate stock estimate, the Commissioner of Docks

The request for \$1,379,323.53 was based on the assumption that large amounts of corporate stock would be authorized for certain requested improvements, and that the salary and wage schedules of the Department would be correspondingly large. The Corporate Stock Budget for the Department of Docks and Ferries has not yet been acted upon, and it is unlikely that all of the requested authorizations will be granted when action is taken. However, it is urgent that some provision be made now to provide salaries for the force necessary to carry on the work for which authorizations have already been made. The present salary and wage appro-

made now to provide salaries for the force necessary to carry on the work for which authorizations have already been made. The present salary and wage appropriation is sufficient to last to about the first of September. In my opinion, \$425,000 will be a sufficient additional appropriation to carry the salary and wage schedules to July 1, 1913. Respectfully, WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding four hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$425,000), the proceeds to the amount of the par value thereof to be applied by the Department of Docks and Ferries for payment of the salaries and wages of the employees of the Department engaged in work of construction and improvements, or the preparation of plans therefor.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks recommending: 1. The establishment of a ferry from and to a point at or near the foot of Bay Ridge avenue (69th street), Borough of Brooklyn, to and from a point at or near South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond.

2. A lease by private agreement of a franchise to operate the above mentioned ferry to Frank G. Montag, or a corporation to be organized for the purpose, for a term of ten years, with the privilege of one renewal of ten years.

Mr. Charles J. Farley, representing the Commissioner of Docks, appeared before the Board and stated that the Commissioner of Docks desired to withdraw his recommendation for a lease of the franchise by private agreement.

The following resolution to authorize the establishment of the ferry was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 818 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the establishment by the Commissioner of Docks of a ferry from and to a point at or near the foot of Bay Ridge avenue (69th street), Borough of Brooklyn, over and across the waters of New York Bay to and from a point at or near the foot of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the granting of free transportation to indigent women and children over the Stapleton Ferry:

July 11, 1912.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: Gentlemen—On July 2, 1912, the Commissioner of Docks suggested the adoption of a resolution authorizing free transportation on hot days to indigent mothers and children on the ferry to Stapleton, Borough of Richmond. In connection therewith report as follows:

It is proposed to limit the privilege to the trip 12:15 p. m. to 1:15 p. m., on the Stapleton ferry, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays excepted. It is stated that general traffic is very light on that trip and the experiment of offering women and children relief from the heat of the City for an hour may be tried without inconvenience to scheduled travel. It is a worthy cause and I believe the experiment should be given a fair trial.

By arrangement with the Commissioner of Public Charities, the Interborough Rapid Transit Company carries indigent women and children free of charge on all its lines between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. It will, therefore, be possible for persons living far from the ferry to enjoy the privilege without expense. The statement that the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company is offering free transportation is an error.

In any undertaking of this character, where the demand is likely to exceed the capacity for accommodation, suitable regulations should be made to avoid confusion and save the trouble and disappointment that will attend having at the pier a crowd greater than the boat can accommodate. That, however, is a matter of administration, which will doubtless receive the necessary attention by the Commissioner of Docks.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the free transportation of indigent women and children on the 12:15 to 1:15 p. m. trip on the Municipal Ferry to Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, on all days except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, provided children are accompanied by suitable guardians.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: Gentlemen-On May 21, 1912, the request of the Commissioner of Docks for the appointment of one Appraiser to assist the Commissioner of Docks and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in determining the location of the land to be acquired for filling purposes in Jamaica Bay was referred to me. At a meeting

held on May 22, 1912, the report submitted was referred back for reconsideration. Upon further examination, I report as follows On February 9, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution appropriating \$950,000 for the purposes and uses of the Department of Docks. Paragraph 3 of the resolution: For the acquisition of lands located in or on Jamaica Bay needed for filling purposes, the precise location of such lands to

be determined upon in the future by the Commissioner of Docks acting co-ordinately with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. The Commissioner states that in order to ascertain the best location to be acquired by the City needed for filling in purposes, it will be necessary to appoint

an Appraiser or Appraisers for the purposes of ascertaining the respective values of the different pieces of property.

Under date of June 14, 1911, the Corporation Counsel advised the Commissioner of Docks, as follows:

"* * There is no power vested in the Commissioner of Docks to appoint Appraisers and bind the City for the payment of their services. "Application should be made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund

for the appointment of such appraisers."
On July 11, 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the position of Real Estate Investigator, at \$3,000 per annum, for the Department of Docks and Ferries. The incumbent in the position is to do the work proposed for the Appraiser.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request, in conformity with the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller. Respectfully,

The Health Officer, who is a State official, attends meetings of the Board of Health at least once a week. He uses the Staten Island ferry at a cost of about sixty cents each way

On June 26, 1908, the Acting Corporation Counsel, in answer to a communication relative to free transportation of pupils of public schools in lower Manhattan, over the Staten Island ferry, advised as follows:

"Although I am aware of no specific authority bearing upon the question, it is my opinion that a municipal corporation, as an incident to its existence, has such power, and that the proper municipal agents to act in the premises are the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Dock Commissioner." In view of the foregoing, I recommend that the request be granted by the

These wells have long since been abandoned and this Department has under consideration the extensive improvement of the Coney Island Repair Yard, which now uses a section of 14th street for the storage of pipes and fittings. The improvements of the repair yard to be undertaken by this Department provide for the construction of a new building and the entire rearrangement of the grounds.

I believe that the opening of East 14th street, as contemplated by the Borough President, will greatly improve the appearance of this Department's property and, as the section of 14th street now temporarily occupied by it is no longer required, I hereby transfer same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The total rent of the building is \$240 a year. The rent is therefore 12 per cent. on the assessed value, and 10 per cent. on the appraised value by the Division of Real Estate.

For comparison, a store 12 by 25 feet, with cellar same size, at No. 147 Flush-

ing avenue, around the corner, is offered for rent at \$240 a year.

He also states that the proposed lease of temporary quarters for this Company at No. 677 Bay street, Stapleton, has fallen through, as the owner refused to sign the lease. There is no other similar building in the neighborhood with which comparison

may justly be made. I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just under the circumstances, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of premises No. 78 Broad street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Fire Department, for a term of one year from August 15, 1912, with the privilege of remaining in possession from month to month thereafter until the completion of the new fire house, at a rental of \$480 a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, and make outside repairs, including repairs to the roof; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service, and make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Charles J. D. Noble, No. 661 Bay street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond.

I further recommend that the resolution adopted by your honorable Board on May 22, 1912, authorizing a lease of premises No. 677 Bay street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for use of the Fire Department, at an annual rental of \$1,500, be rescinded. The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions relative to removal of old buildings at No. 533 Hicks street, Borough of Brooklyn, under the jurisdiction of the Fire Department:

July 12, 1912. To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: Gentlemen—On June 12, 1912, the Deputy and Acting Fire Commissioner requested that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund permit him to issue an order to the contractor for the proposed new fire house at No. 533 Hicks street, to wreck and destroy the old house located on that site. In connection therewith I report as follows:

The Fire Commissioner has entered into contract for the erection of a new engine house to replace the present quarters of Engine Company 103, at No. 533 Hicks street, Borough of Brooklyn.

In awarding the contract it was anticipated that the usual procedure of sale and wrecking of the old building, in accordance with a resolution of the Sinking Fund Commission, would be followed.

Section 724 of the Greater New York Charter provides that whenever any property in the control of the Fire Department becomes unnecessary to the service it shall be surrendered to the City.

Subsequent to the award of the contract it was ascertained that the owner of the adjoining buildings possessed a "beam right" which requires protection during the course of the work of wrecking the old and erecting the new building. It appears of Richmond, for a term of one year from August 1, 1912, at an annual rental of that a portion of the old building will not cease to be necessary until the erection of a new wall. For that reason it appears that section 724 of the Charter is not operative in this case.

I am of the opinion that the best interests of the City would be served by the wrecking of the old building under the direct jurisdiction of the Fire Commissioner. therefore recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions. Respectfully, WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises at No. 221 East 26th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals: July 11, 1912,

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:
Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of June 10, 1912, states that the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals requests that a lease be secured of the two apartments on the second floor of No. 221 East 26th street, Borough of Manhattan, adjoining the Maternity Hospital and School for Midwives, for a term of two years, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly.

In the adjoining building, No. 223 East 26th street, is located the Maternity Hospital and School for Midwives established a year ago, which has outgrown the capacity of that building, and the two apartments in question are now necessary for the purpose of furnishing sleeping quarters for the student midwives.. The average births in this City per year are about 100,000, of which 52,000 are under the charge of midwives. The necessity that these women should be thoroughly instructed therefor is apparent.

The two apartments proposed to be leased are five-room, cold water flats each in the six-story and basement tenement building. It is the intention of the hospital authorities to cut two doorways connecting the two apartments, and another doorway connecting both with the present hospital building.

For comparison, the two flats on the floor above in the same building rent for \$44 a month to private tenants, and the two on the next floor above at \$40 a month.

The lessor is to pay taxes and water rates and to put and keep the rented premises in good and tenantable condition. The City is to put in the connecting doorways at its own expense, and remove the same and restore the walls to their former condition upon the expiration of the lease or any renewal thereof.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, and there being an urgent necessity for additional accommodations for this institution, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the two tive-room apartments on the second floor of the six-story and basement tenement building at No. 221 East 26th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, for a period of two years from August 1. 1912, with the privilege of renewal for an additional two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, do necessary cleaning and painting, and put and keep the premises in good and tenantable codition; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service, and to have the privilege of placing three connecting doors between these apartments and the adjoining hospital building, said doors to be removed and walls restored to their former condition upon the expiration of this lease or any renewal thereof. Yutkowitz, of the corner store on the ground floor of premises No. 184 4th avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health as an infants' milk station, for a term of one year, from January 15, 1912, at an annual rental of \$420. The name of the lessor should have been Samuel Yutkowitz.

July 12, 1912. To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Accounts in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of July 1, 1912, amended by a subsequent letter of July 9, 1912, requested that additional space be obtained in the Barron Building, Nos. 127 and 129 Franklin street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Standard Testing Laboratory of his office, which space he states is urgently needed.

For this purpose it was proposed to lease room 3 on the sixth floor, containing a floor space of 666 square feet. This room formerly rented for \$750 a year, and the owners demanded a rental of \$700 from the City. As a result of negotiations by the Division of Real Estate of this Department, this rent has been reduced to \$600 a year, or at the rate of 90 cents a square foot, which rate is somewhat higher than the City is paying for the entire eighth floor in this building for the Commis-

sioner of Accounts, but it is lower than the average rentals in the building. The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions relative to a lease of premises at No. 153 Pierreport street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Corporation Counsel, and the assignment of rooms now occupied by the Corporation Counsel in the Borough Hall, Borough of Brooklyn, to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, Second Department: July 11, 1912.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—The President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication to your Board under date of April 24, 1912, states that the Justices of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, Second Department, located in the Borough Hall, Borough of Brooklyn, have made application for larger accommodations, as the present quarters are wholly inadequate for the uses of the Appellate Division, requesting that half of the third floor in the Borough Hall, now occupied by the Corporation Counsel, be assigned to them.

This question has been taken up with the Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of the Borough of Brooklyn, who is agreeable to the assignment of these quarters to the Appellate Division, and he requests that new quarters be secured for his Department outside of the Borough Hall. The Borough President requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund give the matter their attention, and obtain for the Corporation Counsel suitable quarters at some other location, and assign the space now occupied by that Department in the Borough Hall to the Justices of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, Second Department.

In connection therewith I have made a personal examination of the offices now occupied by the Appellate Division and am of the opinion that the space now occupied by the Corporation Counsel's office should be assigned to the Appellate Division to provide adequate space for the proper conduct of the business of the Court.

The Corporation Counsel has approved of the leasing of the premises known as the Assembly Building, located at 153 Pierrepont street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which building is to be reconstructed along the lines suggested by the Corporation Counsel, and the alterations and repairs to be paid by the owner of the premises.

The five floors included within this structure contain approximately 14,000 square feet of space, which may be leased for a period of five years, with the privilege of renewal for five years additional upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$8,500, which is equivalent to 61 cents plus per square foot; the owner to pay taxes and water rates, supply steam heat, light, elevator and janitor service, and make inside and outside repairs during the term of the lease or any renewal thereof.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Com-

Gentlemen—In a communication to the Sinking Fund Commission the City of Yonkers applies for a surface easement over damage parcel No. 16 on a map showing the parcels to be taken by the City of Yonkers for the widening of Swain street. The Croton Aqueduct now passes under Swain street and beneath the property in which the City of Yonkers desires an easement.

The Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, states that he has no objection to the use of this parcel for street purposes, and he requests that in granting this easement it should be definitely and clearly stated that The City of New York does not release its right to enter upon the land at any time for the purpose of constructing additional works or for repairing the existing aqueduct, and the City should reserve for the purposes of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity absolute and unrestricted rights over this section of its property for subsurface structures.

The City of Yonkers has agreed to pay \$100 for this easement, and further agreed that the assessment to be levied upon The City of New York on assessment parcel 961 which covers The New York City pipe line shall not be more than the sum of \$100. This to my mind is a fair and reasonable agreement, inasmuch as The City of New York is merely granting the surface easement, and is practically receiving in return

an exemption from any assessment in the proceeding.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller:

Sir-I have received Deputy Comptroller Mathewson's communication of June 15, 1912. transmitting petition of Harry Silverstone and Samuel Thomas for a conveyance of the interest of the City in a section of old New Lots road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and I am asked for an opinion as to whether this road at the locality described has been closed by lawful authority within the meaning of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter and whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City to the petitioners.

The property in the old road as described in the petition is designated on the tax maps of the Borough of Brooklyn as lot 31, block 3638, section 12, and the abutting

property is designated as lot 29, in the same block and section.

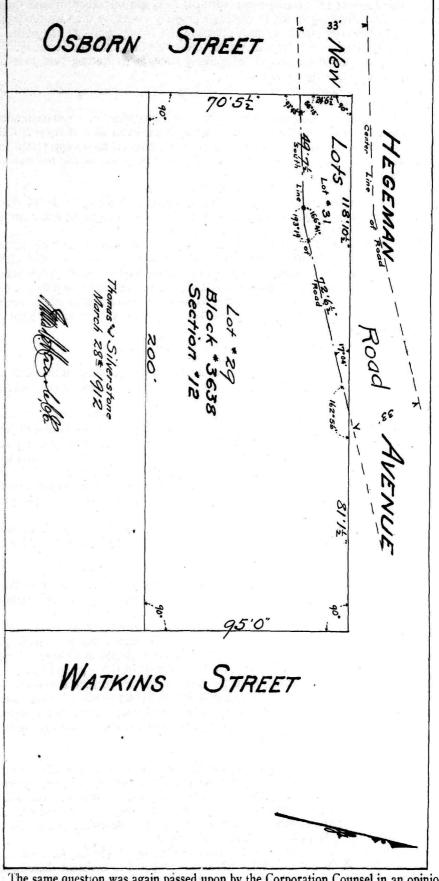
It is stated in the communication of Deputy Comptroller Mathewson that "no proceedings have been taken to close New Lots road at this point. It is abandoned as a highway. No trace of the road, as such, remains and the land is several feet below the grade of Hegeman avenue. Hegeman avenue is opened, graded, gutters and sidewalks are laid and a line of cars runs through it. Although not paved, the roadway is improved. It is an open traveled highway. Title is vested in the City.

The land in old New Lots road at this locality is to a large extent included in Hegeman avenue. The portion of the road, a conveyance of which is asked for, extends 118 feet 101/2 inches on Hegeman avenue and 24 feet 61/2 inches on Osborn street. Proceedings have been initiated to acquire title for Osborn street, but title is not yet vested in the City, and the street has no physical existence. The block in which the property is situated is bounded on the east by Watkins street. Proceedings have been initiated to acquire title to this street, also, but title has not yet vested.

The relation of this old road to Hegeman avenue, of which it now forms a part, is precisely similar to that between Church avenue and old Broadway, which was passed upon in an opinion delivered to the Comptroller on October 16, 1904, in the matter of the Flatbush Volunteer Firemen's Association. It was stated in that

opinion: "It appears from the report of the Appraiser in charge of the Bureau of Real Estate in the Finance Department that the Board of Public Improvements in the year 1899 instituted proceedings for the opening and extending of Church avenue between Flatbush and Brooklyn avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment directed that fifty-five per cent. of the cost and expense of such proceeding be paid for by the City. Commissioners were duly appointed and their report was confirmed on April 28, 1903. By this

opening a large part of the old road was included in the new avenue, while a part of it was left outside thereof. This amounted in law to a discontinuance of this old road as a highway, but left portions of it between the property of private owners and the new avenue. The present application is for a release of the City's interests in a portion of the old road to the owner of property adjoining thereon and separated thereby from Church avenue."



The same question was again passed upon by the Corporation Counsel in an opinion delivered to the Comptroller April 28, 1909, in the matter of the application of Sarah A. Bergin. After referring to an opinion delivered to the Comptroller on January 21, 1909, relating to the status of old East Clarkson street, the Corporation Counsel

"In the case now under consideration a precisely similar course of action has been followed. The lines of Church avenue have been so fixed and laid out by lawful authority as to exclude a portion of the old road or lane which formerly constituted the highway. If an abutting property owner was damaged by this action the law provided a way to ascertain and to recover the amount of such damage. It could not have been the intention of the law that in laying out a new street containing a large portion of an existing highway that such new street within the lines lawfully established might be improved by grading, paving and otherwise, and that there should exist an uneven strip on its side which was also an opened highway subject to improvement in different proceedings and with different results. In my opinion it is plain that the opening of a new highway necessarily excludes the existence of such a strip as a public highway.'

Referring you to each of these opinions for a full discussion of the question involved I now advise you in relation to the case now under consideration that New Lots road, in block 3638, Borough of Brooklyn, has been closed by lawful authority within the meaning of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City therein to the present petitioners. In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

July 11, 1912

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen-In a petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Harry Silverstone, residing at 131 Bristol street, Borough of Brooklyn, and Samuel Thomas, residing in the Town of Fallsburgh, Sullivan County, State of New York, pray for a conveyance of the interest of the City in a section of old New Lots road. The property is designated on the tax maps of the Borough of Brooklyn as Lot 31. Block 3638, Section 12.

The petition is filed under section 205 of the Greater New York Charter. Three questions must be determined.

First-Has the road been closed by lawful authority? The opening and improvement of Hegeman avenue operated as a closing of New Lots road within the meaning of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter (Opinion of C. C., June 25, 1912). Second—Is the property required for any public use? Sixteen City departments have stated in writing that it is not required by them.

Third—What is the nature of the City's interest? Evidence indicates that this

was a Dutch road, with fee vested in the sovereign power.

The property has been appraised at \$1,250. Under the rule the charge will be \$625, plus \$12.50 to cover the cost of drawing deeds, making a total of \$637.50. The petitioners have agreed in writing to pay that sum and accept a conveyance subject to the usual conditions imposed by the Commission.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing a conveyance to WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller. these petitioners. Respectfully, Whereas, Harry Silverstone and Samuel Thomas, in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, request a conveyance of the interest of the City in a section of old New Lots road, designated on the tax maps of the Borough of Brooklyn as Lot 31, Block 3638, section 12; therefore, be it Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby determine that

the land, described as follows, is not required for any public use:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Osborn street with the southerly side of Hegeman avenue, running thence easterly along the southerly side of Hegeman avenue one hundred and eighteen feet ten and one-half inches (118 feet 10½ inches) to the southerly side or line of which was formerly known as New Lots road; running thence southwesterly along the southerly side or line of New Lots road seventy-two feet six and one-half inches (72 feet 6½ inches) to an angie point; thence in a westerly direction and still along the southerly side or line of New Lots road forty-nine feet seven and one-half inches (49 feet 7½ inches) to the easterly side of Osborn street, and thence northerly along the easterly side of Osborn street twenty-four feet six and one-half inches (24 feet 6½ inches) to the point or place of beginning; be the said several dimensions more or less.

—and be it further

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater
New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize a conveyance to Harry Silverstone, residing at 131 Bristol street, Borough of Brooklyn,
County of Kings, City and State of New York, and Samuel Thomas, residing in the
Town of Fallsburgh, Sullivan County, State of New York, of all the right, title and
interest of The City of New York in and to that portion of old New Lots road hereinabove described, it being the intention to convey all that part of the road lying
within the lines of Lot 31, Block 3638, Section 12, as designated on the tax maps of

The conveyance to be made is subject to the following conditions:

That the petitioners waive any and all claim for damages arising out of the closing of the road

That the said conveyance be made in such form as shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel; and be it further

Resolved, That the interest of The City of New York in and to the same is hereby appraised at the sum of six hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$625), plus twelve dollars and fifty cents (\$12.50) to cover the cost of drawing deeds, to be paid by the petitioners, and evidence produced that all taxes, assessments and liens due the City which appear against the land in the road and the petitioners' abutting property have

been paid before the execution and delivery of the deed.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following petition was received from Richard Schnibbe for a conveyance of the City's interest in a section of the old Woodpoint road designated on the tax map of the Borough of Brooklyn as Lot 24, Block 2352, Section 8:

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York: The petition of Richard Schnibbe respectfully shows:

1. That your petitioner resides at No. 4463 Greene avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

2. That your petitioner is the owner in fee simple and seized and in possession of the parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, City and State of New York, in Block 2352, in Section 8, of the land map of the County of Kings, and which is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue seventy-one (71) feet six (6) inches northeasterly from the northerly corner formed by the intersection of the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue with the northeasterly side of Metropolitan avenue; running thence northwesterly at right angles to Driggs avenue one hundred (100) feet; thence northeasterly parallel to Driggs avenue twenty-five (25) feet; thence southeasterly again at right angles to Driggs avenue one hundred (100) feet to the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue; thence southwesterly along the said northwesterly side of Driggs avenue twenty-five (25) feet to the point or place of beginning.

3. That your petitioner annexes hereto a survey of said premises made by Mestrole City Surveying Company, dated March 12, 1912, and makes the same a part of

his petition.

4 That your petitioner became the owner and seized in fee simple of said premises by a deed, a certified copy of which is annexed and made a part of this petition, dated February 26, 1912, made and executed by Simeon B. Chittenden, referee to your petitioner, and recorded in the office of the Register of the County of Kings, in Liber 3341, page 247 of conveyances, in Section 8, Block 2352, on the 8th day of March, 1912.

5. That the portion of said parcel of land hereinbefore described and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue seventy-one (71) feet six (6) inches northeasterly from the northerly corner formed by the intersection of the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue with the northeasterly side of Metropolitan avenue; running thence northwesterly at right angles to Driggs avenue sixty (60) feet; thence easterly along the northerly side of the "Old Road" sixty-five (65) feet to the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue; thence southwesterly along the northwesterly side of Driggs avenue twenty-five (25) feet to the point or place of beginning, consists of a part of the Old Road to which The City of New York claims to have some title and which works as a mere cloud upon the title of your petitioner to said parcel of land first herein described.

6. That your petitioner has no knowledge or information as to when or under what lawful authority the said Old Road was closed, but on information and belief that the surrounding streets, namely Driggs avenue, Metropolitan avenue, Bedford avenue and North 4th street are now open and improved and being used as public

highways and have been for many years so improved and used.

7. Upon information and belief that the premises first above described were enclosed and the building now upon said premises, was erected thereon more than forty years since, and that subsequent to that time the said Old Road has never been used, or open for use as a public highway over said premises, or in any manner whatever.

Wherefore, Your petitioner prays that The City of New York may execute and deliver to your petitioner a deed that shall convey to him, that portion of the Old Road

hereinbefore described.

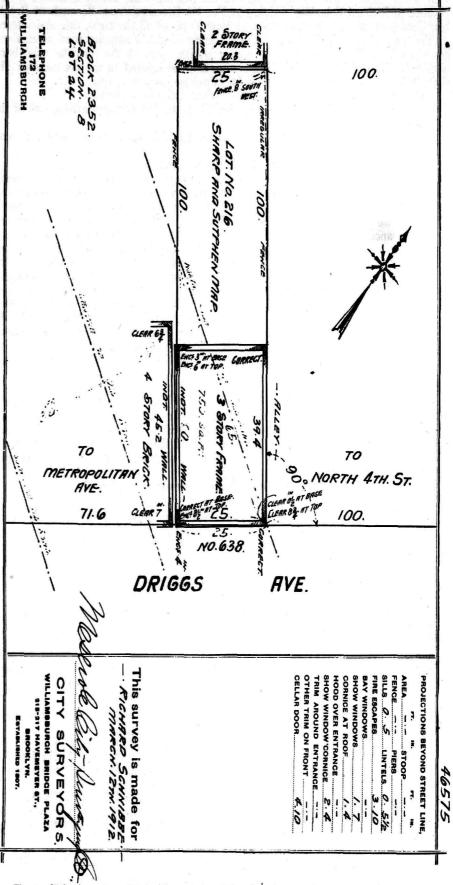

Sir—I have received Deputy Comptroller Mathewson's communication of June
7, 1912, transmitting petition of Richard Schnibbe, for a release of the interest of
the City in a section of old Woodpoint road, designated on the tax maps as Lot No.
24, Block 2352. Section 8, Borough of Brooklyn, and known as No. 638 Driggs avenue.

I am asked to advise you whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City in this property to the petitioner; whether the petitioner has acquired a good title by adverse possession, and whether the interest of the City is material or nominal.

The verified petition shows that the petitioner is the record owner of premises which he describes, which include in their limits a portion of the old Woodpoint road, in the County of Kings, and states that the said premises were enclosed and the building thereon was erected more than forty years ago, and that subsequent to that time the said old road has never been used or opened for use as a public highway over said premises, or in any manner whatever.



Two affidavits are submitted; one by John Lambert, who is upwards of seventy-four years of age and has for more than forty years had his place of business in the vicinity of the premises under consideration, and the other by Charles Cummings, who is upwards of sixty-nine years of age, who has likewise had his place of business near said premises. Each of these persons swears that the building known as 638 Driggs avenue has been standing upon said premises for a period of upwards of forty years, and that said premises, during all that time, have been enclosed.

It is provided by section 369 of the Code of Civil Procedure, that "where the occupant, or those under whom he claims, entered into the possession of the premises, under claim of title, exclusive of any other right, founding the claim upon a written instrument, as being a conveyance of the premises in question, * * * and there has been a continued occupation and possession of the premises, included in the instrument * * * for twenty years, under the same claim, the premises so included are deemed to have been held adversely":

By Section 370 it is provided that "for the purpose of constituting an adverse

By Section 370 it is provided that "for the purpose of constituting an adverse possession, by a person claiming a title, founded upon a written instrument, * * * land is deemed to have been possessed and occupied in either of the following cases:

"1. Where it has been usually cultivated or improved.

"2. Where it has been protected by a substantial inclosure." * * *

The facts as stated clearly bring the premises described within the purview of these provisions of the statute and in view thereof I advise you that the petitioner has acquired a good title by adverse possession; that the Sinking Fund Commissioners may lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City in this property, and that

Bergan and the property in question is shown on said blue print as Lot 6 also describing the southeast corner thereof as low meadow.

By the changing of waterway of Mill Creek and its course stopped to the east and causing a change in water lines, is the reason now for asking for said deed.

The survey of property in question and also blue print of T. G. Bergen Survey are herein and submitted for your consideration. Yours very truly,

FRANK L. ENTWISLE. In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report, with opinion of the Corporation Counsel, and offered the following reso-June 21, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller:

Sir-I am in receipt of a communication from Deputy and Acting Comptroller Fisher, dated July 27, 1911, relative to an application made by Frank L. Entwisle on behalf of the owner of certain property in the neighborhood of 59th street and Avenue T, 32d Ward, Borough of Brooklyn.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller states that the application is for a release from the City of its interest in what was formerly Mill Creek to the west of a red line shown upon a blue print transmitted; that the petitioner claims that the owners of Crook Island filled in Mill Creek to the east of said line; that the blue print transmitted is a copy of a survey made by Tunis G. Bergen in 1840 and that the property owned by the petitioner is shown thereon as Lot No. 6, the southeast corner thereof being designated "Low Meadow."

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller concludes his communication as follows: "I request you to inform me what interest the City has in such premises shown on the attached blue print as Lot No. 6 and if it be but a cloud upon the Petitioner's title, I wish you would so certify."

I am also in receipt of a communication from Deputy and Acting Comptroller Mathewson dated November 20, 1911, relative to the same matter.

Transmitted with the papers was also a copy of a "map of the property belonging to James D. Remsen in the 32d Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, surveyed by Fred E. Dennington May 2, 1907.

Several conferences were had with the representative of the Bureau of Real

No other information was furnished and no abstract of title was originally

Estate and Mr. Entwisle or his representative.

On June 3, 1912, a communication was received from Mr. Entwisle transmitting an abstract of title. He also transmitted a copy of the Bergen Survey and thereon marked the parcel for which a release is desired by his client as Part "A" of Parcel No. 6. being the southeast corner thereof.

From the two surveys it appears that no part of Parcel No. 6 was adjacent or contiguous to Mill Creek at the date of the surveys but was original upland.

Many changes in the creeks along the shore front of the Town of Flatlands have occurred and it appears from the Atlas that possibly Mill Creek has receded or widened out until it covers a small portion of Part "A" of Parcel No. "6," but the courts have held that where property, originally upland, is encroached upon by the water but is thereafter restored either by natural causes or by artificial means, the title of the owner to the premises so restored cannot be questioned.

The map of the property of Remsen shows East 59th street running through Parcel No. 6 of the Bergen map.

As near as I can judge by rough scaling, a portion of Part "A" of Parcel No. "6" lies within the lines of the proposed 59th street.

I understand, however, that said street is only a map street, no proceedings hav-

ing ever been taken to open the same at the locality in question. Furthermore, the filing of the map laying out 59th street in no way affects the title of private owners.

I therefore certify that any claim which the City may make to any portion of Parcel No. 6, as shown on the Bergen Map of 1840, constitutes a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner.

Entwisle, Attorney, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of July 10, 1911, makes application on behalf of his client, Jacob Schauf, for a release or quit claim of the City's interest in certain property in the neighborhood of East 59th street and Avenue T, 32d Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, and more particularly hereinafter described; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel in a communication addressed to the Comptroller under date of June 21, 1912, has certified that any claim which the City may make to any portion of Parcel 6, as shown on the Bergen Map of 1840, constitutes a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby determine that the land described as follows is not needed for any public use:

All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, of The City of New York, known and designated on a certain map or survey made by Tunis G. Bergen, as and by the Lot No. 6, and bounded as follows:

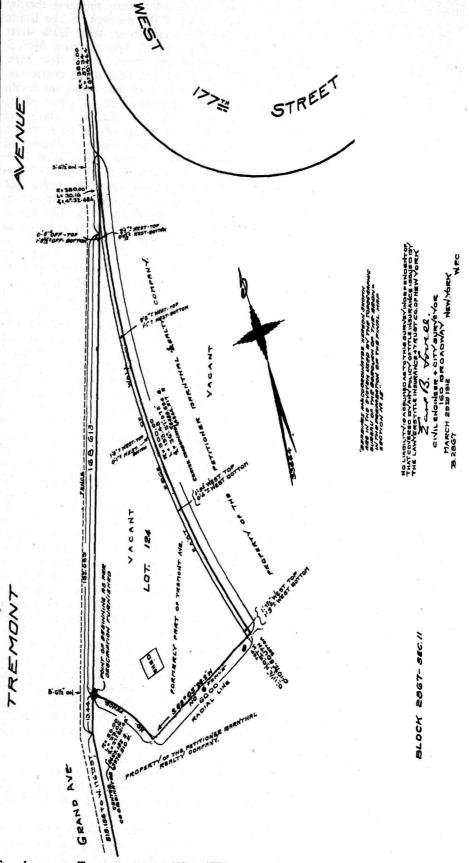

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: Gentlemen—In reference to the request of the Commissioner of Docks in his 1912 corporate stock estimate for \$265,000 for the acquisition of dock property adjacent to the westerly line of Conover street, Brooklyn, we report as follows:

The Commissioner states that the property is needed for the carrying out of the plan to improve the South Brooklyn water-front. The property lies between Reid street and the United States Sea wall line, from Conover street to the property of Divine Burtis, the area being about 231,370 square feet. It is desired to acquire the property at this time for the reason that W. R. Grace and Company have drawn plans for the construction of a pier and shed and other improvements on the property. The Commissioner states that if Grace and Company are permitted to go ahead with the improvements before the property is acquired by the City it will encumber the City with an additional expense of about \$250,000, as the improvements will be entirely useless and must be demolished in order to make the property adapt-

will be entirely useless and must be demolished in order to make the property adaptable to the general scheme proposed by the City.

Wharf structures now exist on the property and the Commissioner states that with a small outlay for repairs they can be used for open wharfage, until such time of New York, unless held by a leash or Painter, Vice-Property adaptable to the general scheme proposed by the City.

as the general plan or layout can be developed for the whole water-front. The layout submitted by the Commissioner shows that this immediate section has not been thoroughly developed, but that there are extensive private developments on either side. We are of the opinion, therefore, that the property covered by the Commissioner's request should be purchased before it is improved by private capital and the value thus enhanced.

The general policy established in 1873 that the City should own and control the entire water-front should always be adhered to; and the City should purchase waterfront property before it is improved by private capital, especially when the City is

apprised that the extensive improvements are about to be made. In view of the foregoing we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution

It shall be the duty of the Commissioners or managers or the principal, superintendent, or physician, of each and every hospital, public institution or dispensary, in this city, to report to the Department of Health, in writing, the full name, age and address of any person suffering from any one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

A-Communicable: Typhoid fever, influenza, lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer diarrhoeas of infants).

B-Parasitic diseases of the skin: Scabies, tinea tonsurans, impetigo (contagious), favus.

Note—In this list of diseases_reporting is required by the Department of Health in that data may be obtained for general and special investigation of the modes and sources of infection and as to the prevalence and distribution of these diseases. The Department of Health does not purpose to exercise a sanitary surveillance in these cases, but desires informa-tion with a view to the ultimate removal or improvement in the conditions which now foster them. Notification is required in certain of these diseases because of the liability to their extension among the children in schools.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for

the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read,

and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conpecome interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated bergin are in all respects true.

stated herein are in all respects true. Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York which porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

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The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same is

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
