REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING JULY 11, 1914.

DOES NEW JERSEY WELCOME ITS NEW INDUSTRY? Since the enactment of the Boylan anti-narcotic law, New York has ceased to be a center for the sale of narcotic drugs. What New York has lost has apparently been gained by neighboring States.

The Health Department is in receipt of a communication from the Health Officer

Appointed-Edward J. Moran, 401 East of Savannah, Georgia, enclosing a letter from a New York physician to a Savannah

"July 3rd, 1914. "Dear Sir—Your order received and will state that under the new law that went into effect July first it will be impossible to fill your prescriptions in New York State. I have, therefore, arranged to have your prescription filled at Red Bank, N. J.

"Kindly send all future orders to Dr. — "Kindly send all future orders to Dr. ———, Red Bank, N. J., who will give you the same treatment you have been receiving in the past. I will be in Red Bank myself and will see that your orders are properly compounded.

The writer of this communication is a graduate of New York University, licensed to practice medicine in this State. He is not a member of the County Medical Society. This letter indicates that he is engaged in the reprehensible practice of distributing "dope" to unfortunates in distant States, and that he is seeking to avoid any nearer acquaintance with the New York police force. What does New Jersey think of him, and of his Red Bank associate?

STIMULATING OTHERS TO EMULATE

In order to extend the influence of the Greater New York Baby Week, the New York Milk Committee is sending a post card to Health officers all over the country, telling how this City recently advertised for Better Babies.

"Are You Satisfied With the Infant Death Rate in Your City?

"New York wasn't, although within seven years she has cut her infant death rate down over thirty per cent., and is actually a safer city for babies to be born in than any other of the ten largest cities of the country. Last year her rate per thousand births was 101.9. But New York realized that no city with an infant death rate around the hundred mark can afford to be satisfied. She realized that although she had learned how to save babies, she wasn't saving all the babies that it was possible to save, nor reaching all the mothers who needed to be taught. She realized that unless immediate steps were taken she would lose 3,500 baby lives within the next three months, and suffer an economic loss before the year was over of \$40,000,000. Two doughty allies needed to be enlisted: the business men who could give enough financial support to extend the work, and the mothers of the City, who in the last analysis must do the work. Traditional methods of appeal were becoming outworn, they weren't big enough for the really big business in hand. Wholesale methods were needed on a wholesale scale.

New York determined to advertise for her babies!

"And so came the GREATER NEW YORK BABY WEEK, which applied all the approved and up-to-date methods of advertising to the business of spreading abroad throughout the City what was being done and what was needed to be done to save babies. The slogan adopted was 'Better Babies, Better Mothers, Better City.' And it 'took.' Newspapers, billboards, car ads., window posters, movies, a baby parade, a 'Better Mothers' contest, exercises in all public schools and parks, the distribution of 2,000,000 pieces of educational literature, department store ads., tags on milk bottles, all made sure that it 'took.' Thousands of business men fell in line who had never helped before, thousands of mothers got the message for the first time, and new support was gained in hitherto neglected parts of town. Indeed so great was the response and so big was the impetus given the movement that it seems likely that every week hereafter in New York will be a Better Baby Week.

"What Is Your City Doing to Advertise Better Babies'?"
THE HOUSEWIFE'S ORGANOLEPTIC TEST FOR CHOPPED MEAT

INADEQUATE. In an interesting study published in the American Journal of Public Health, Weinzirl and Newton, of the University of Washington, describe the results of an investigation to determine the sanitary quality of chopped meat as ordinarily sold in butcher stores. These investigators find that the organoleptic test, applied daily by almost every housewife throughout the land, and consisting in testing by the senses of sight, smell, feeling and perhaps taste, is too liberal, for the meat is actually putrid and teeming with millions of bacteria per gram before this test recognizes the condition. All the samples taken in summer showed upward of 100,000,000 bacteria per gram, while all those taken in winter were below this figure. The authors suggest that 10,000,000 bacteria per gram might be fixed as a proper limit, and express their belief that chopped meat made from wholesome meat in the first place, prepared with clean utensils and kept properly iced, can readily be held within that

While agreeing with the authors in their conclusions we cannot help wondering

why anyone should buy meat already chopped when a pure product is so easily prepared at home.

SYPHILITIC INFECTION THROUGH EATING AND DRINKING UTENSILS,

AND THROUGH COMMON TOWELS.

Important, because of its relation to syphilitic infection of the innocent, is the recent study by Zinsser and Hopkins of the viability of the syphilis organism, spirochaeta pallida, in diffuse light at room temperature. The results obtained bear directly on the question of danger from common drinking and eating utensils and from common roller towels, and afford abundant scientific support for the ban put upon these articles by health authorities.

Bits of towel, moistened with a culture of syphilis organisms and kept exposed to daylight at room temperature, were examined from hour to hour, and found to be still infective at the end of eleven and a half hours; even when allowed to evaporate on glass slides, infectivity could still be demonstrated at the end of an hour, provided the film still appeared slightly moist. The conditions here provided are probably often enough present in nature; in fact there is reason to believe that natural conditions are often much less severe; certainly it would seem that organisms deposited fresh from a patient might often be more thoroughly protected because of the slow drying of the mucous discharges in which they are contained.

A CAMPAIGN FOR LODGING HOUSE SANITATION.

On March 19, 1914, the following note was sent by the Commissioner of Health to the Sanitary Bureau:

"The Department has not been active enough in enforcing the sanitation of lodging houses. If possible, detail a second Inspector to this work and cover the whole city systematically before the end of the Spring. Issue peremptory orders to lodging house keepers who are not conforming to the rules and regulations of the Department and follow these up with reinspections, and then, if necessary, prosecute. Upon completion of this campaign, prepare a statement showing what has been done and what results have been obtained."

The work has been vigorously prosecuted, and the following report is now presented in order to show the sanitary improvement effected.

Manhattan.

There are in the Borough of Manhattan 104 lodging houses operating under permits which allow a total of 16,462 lodgers. During this campaign 2,034 inspections were made, 1,023 at various hours of the day by Sanitary Inspectors, and 1,011 after half past ten at night by Patrolmen of the Health Squad. The result of their inspections is shown in the following table: Inspections 2,034

As indicated in the summary, 144 notices had to be issued. These referred to nuisances caused by unclean urinals, water closets, cuspidors, bedding, walls, ceilings and floors, and defective wash-basins and baths. In only five of these 144 cases was it found necessary to issue summonses to court, and in these the nuisances were abated before the cases were called in court.

The Patrolmen of the Health Squad issued 12 summonses; 3 for violation of the law regarding common drinking cups and 9 for violation of the law regarding common towels; in ten cases fines were imposed and in two cases sentence was suspended.

As a result of this campaign, the proprietors of lodging houses are now complying with the rules and regulations of the Department of Health in a more satisfactory manner and on recent inspections only a very few violations (and these of a minor character) could be found.

In the early part of April an investigation of the Manhattan lodging houses was begun to ascertain:

(1) How often the baths were used by the lodgers.

(2) What proportion of the lodgers were cleanly.

(3) About how many had the itch, head lice or bedbug bites. The Department has in its possession a chart giving the answers to these ques-

In the Borough of Brooklyn, there are 30 lodging houses operating under permits from this department, which allow a total of 3,800 lodgers.

Five hundred and sixty-three inspections were made, 203 at various hours of the day by Sanitary Inspectors, and 360 inspections after half past ten at night, by Patrolmen of the Health Squad.

The frequent inspections of the lodging houses in the Borough of Brooklyn at all hours of the day and night revealed comparatively few nuisances and violations, and many of these were abated by personal effort. In only 3 of the 30 lodging houses were conditions found that required the service of a Board notice, and these 3 notices were subsequently complied with without resort to the courts.

Bronx. There is only one lodging house in the Borough of The Bronx and the Department of Health permit allows 159 lodgers. The owner of this house was visited and the

requirements of the department relative to the rules and regulations for maintaining a lodging house were explained in detail, with the result that a general and thorough cleaning up of the premises was commenced within forty-eight hours. Alterations having been completed, a thorough inspection of premises was made on April 11, as a new owner had made application for a lodging house permit. The premises were found in a clean and sanitary condition and all rules and regulations of this department relating to lodging houses were being complied with. PROTECTING NEW YORK'S YOUNGEST BOARDERS.

Through its Bureau of Child Hygiene the Department of Health exercises supervision over infants and children boarded out for home care. It is a violation of the law to keep children in board without a permit from the Department of Health. Such permits are good for one year, and may at any time be revoked for cause. They are granted with the understanding that the holder will comply with the following conditions:

"1. This permit is issued to you with the understanding that you will give your personal attention to the proper feeding, care and hygiene of the child or

children entrusted to you,

"2. This child must never be left without an attendant, "3. All rooms must be kept orderly, clean, neat, well-ventilated and thor-

oughly aired daily. "4." The child or children should be fed regularly and properly, as prescribed by a private physician, hospital, dispensary, or the nearest infants' milk

station. If the child is taken ill, immediate word should be sent to the parent or the institution from which the child was obtained. It should be treated by a private physician, hospital, dispensary, or notice may be sent to the Department

"6. You must not have in board any more children than this permit allows. "7. In the event of removal to another address, or to another apartment

at the same address, notify the Department of Health at once. "8. If at any time the child's eyes become sore, notify a private physician, or take the child to a hospital or dispensary, or notify the Department of Health. "9. At the time of the regular visit of the inspector or nurse, you will be advised in all matters relating to the care and health of the child.

"10. Permits issued for wet-nursing will be revoked when the applicant has an insufficient amount or an improper quality of milk."

A WELCOME DONATION.

The Department of Health has received a check for one hundred dollars from a lady who does not wish to have her name made public. The money is to be used by the nurses of the Bureau of Child Hygiene in supplying urgent needs of the children during the summer months.

The need of such a contingent fund has long been felt, as the nurses continually encounter cases where vacations could be obtained for the children if there were a little money to buy clothes, or where simple outings could be arranged if a small amount were available for carfare. It has not been uncommon for the Health Department nurses to use their own money for these purposes.

The gift is highly appreciated and will mean added health and happiness to a large number of the less fortunate children of the city.

DELAY IN USING DIPHTHERIA ANTITOXIN.

Comparison of the antitoxin receipts with the records of the Department, show that in a number of instances physicians have failed to use the serum for the patient designated, retaining it in their possession and using it at a later date on another patient. In one instance recently coming to the attention of the Department, a physician secured antitoxin on February 21, and did not use it until late in March. Inasmuch as diphtheria antitoxin deteriorates rapidly when not kept on ice, such delays may lead to disastrous results.

Physicians are therefore requested, when they secure free antitoxin for the treatment of a poor patient, to use it for that patient only; if not so used they

should return it to the druggist and receive proper credit therefor.

An annual payment for the first five years, 5% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$750. An annual payment for the second five years, 6% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$1,000. An annual payment for the third five years, 7% of gross earnings with a minimum of \$1,300.

25 cts. per running foot of conduit laid. \$2 for each manhole. At the time this contract was made our Com-

pany had no way of ascertaining as to whether this contract would be favorable one or not other than the fact that it was the best that could be obtained from your Honorable Board on the recommendations of the Bureau of Fran-

The Bureau of Franchises undoubtedly at that time were not fully conversant with the value to the grantee of such a franchise and especially s applied to a scattered district.

Our Company installed machinery and equip-

ment at the expense of about \$100,000 and have given to the district in the territory covered by our franchise good service to all that have asked for it.

This operation has resulted in a loss to the Company in direct operation during the six years of over \$110,000, as shown by an audit made by Certified Public Accountants employed at the direction of a committee, independent of the officers, which was appointed by the stockholders to investigate the causes of the Com-pany's depressed financial condition. There is over and above this amount a considerable ad-ditional loss on depreciation of machinery and

Early this spring the stockholders and directors of the Company found themselves in

financial difficulties, their quick liabilities being several times more than their quick assets, and the fixed assets being fully covered by mortgage and their first mortgage bonds being sold as low as 50 cts. on the dollar.

The Company at that time was indebted to the City in Taxes on its real estate, and on this franchise to the extent of about \$13,000. While it was arranged by a great many that the

While it was argued by a great many that the Company should be liquidated, it was finally decided by men who were active in the welfare of Brooklyn and Wallabout Market to get together and pay off the indebtedness of the Company and endeaver to mut the business of the Company and endeaver to mut the business of a pany and endeavor to put the business on a paying business; such a Committee has been actively at work for the last three months, and on June 11, 1914, the committee turned over to the Honorable W. H. Prendergast, Controller, the last payment of the taxes on this franchise amounting to about \$3,600, covering 25 cts. per running foot for four years, from 1910 to 1914.

In consideration of the foregoing and in view of the terms under which other franchises are now being granted in more densely built up sections of New York City, we hereby request that your Honorable Board grant us a franchise for a term of fifteen (15) years, with the privi-

The basis of percentage on gross earnings noted above is in line with the franchises that are at present being given by the City in the densely populated section of lower Manhattan, and the minimum payments specified are greater than are provided for in those franchises.

The rate of 10c. per linear foot is asked for as equitable on account of the long distances of pipe which are required in this district as com-pared with the densely built up section of lower Manhattan; for instance, on one section of our line 1,300 feet long, there are only four customers, and on another section 700 feet long, there is only one customer. Many of these boxes are very small and the franchise tax per running foot of piping is entirely out of proportion to the returns

portion to the returns.

It will be necessary in the near future to replace the present pipe line system with a new brine pipe line of larger diameter, to overcome the friction consequent upon the long distances the pipe is carried; and a large amount will have

to be expended for new machinery.

It is generally admitted that the pipe line refrigeration which we have supplied to Wallabout Market is a public necessity, and it has been the most important single factor in the success of this Market, and if the service can be continued, it will still further aid in the growth of a very important public institution.

As before stated the men connected with this

reorganization are paying to the City the full amount agreed upon, and are making an endeavor to keep the Company a going concern in the belief that your Honorable Board will give relief from the burden of the onerous terms

of the franchise which has resulted in such great losses to the Company.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the

same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose. and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conbecome interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true, No bid or estimate will be considered unless,

as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not

be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separata envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract

awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
