BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 10, 1877, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 3, 1877.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 459 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 10, 1877, which is an increase of 12, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 46 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending November 3, 1877, was 440, which is 34.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.13 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,082,692.

The President presented the following proposed ordinances which, on motion, were tailed on the table until the next meeting:

That it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee, or tenant of any vacant, sunken, or excavated lot in the City of New York to keep the same at all times clean and inoffensive, and to provide around the same a proper tight board fence, not less than six (6) feet in height, so as to effectually prevent the throwing or depositing therein or thereupon of any garbage or offensive thing whatsoever, and also to prevent persons passing from falling into such excavation.

That no live geese, ducks, or other fowls shall be kept in any yard, area, cellar, coop, building, or other place within the built-up portion of the City of New York, excepting in the public markets, without a permit in writing from this Department.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 10, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,602, as follows, viz.: 6 public buildings, 771 tenement-houses, 130 private dwellings, 68 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 31 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, 1 market, 51 slaughterhouses, 1 dock, 6 milk inspections, 13 manure dumps, 2 fat rendering establishments, 1 brewery, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 3 dumping-grounds, 1 public drain, 33 yards, courts, and areas, 54 cellars and basements, 140 waste-pipes and drains, 94 privies and water-closets, 40 street gutters and sinks, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns, 1 piggery, 11 violations of the Code, 14 other nuisances, together with 40 visits to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 527.

During the past week 65 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits have been issued to the consignees of 61 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

46 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 40 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 39 houses, 39 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of diphtheria was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, November 10, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 459 burial permits for city deaths, 28 for bodies in transitu, and 33 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 459 deaths, 172 marriages, 440 births, 33 still-births, 28 applications for transit permits, and 61 returns from the coroners. There were 17 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 13 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, November 13, 1877.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—459 deaths were reported as having occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 10, 1877, this is an increase of 12 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 46 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending November 3, was 440, which is 34.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.13 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,082,692.

The principal increase during the past week has been in the developmental and violent classes, the former showing an increase of 12, and the latter 15, as compared with the preceding week; compared with the week ending November 3, this week shows an increase of 3 deaths from croup, 4 from typhoid fever, 5 from puerperal diseases, 3 from intemperance, 1 from cancer, 1 from phthisis, 6 from pneumonia, 7 from diseases of the heart, 9 from Bright's disease and nephritis, 3 by suicide, 5 by drowning, 3 from erysipelas, 3 from inanition, cyanosis and atelectasis 4; and premature and preternatural births, 1; and a decrease of 1 death from diphtheria, 1 from whooping cough, 4 from diarrhoeal diseases, 10 from bronchitis, 4 from marasmus and scrofula, 1 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4 from malarial fevers, 2 from aneurism, 1 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, and 4 from enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis. enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis.

There were 259 deaths from the following diseases during the week, which are 56.42 per cent. of the total number of deaths reported, viz.: Phthisis pulmonalis, 79; pneumonia, 40; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 40; Bright's disease, 30; diphtheria, 24; diarrhœal diseases, 23;

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 247 in tenement-houses, 105 in houses containing 3 families and less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 85 on the first, 125 on the second, 78 on the third, 49 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, and 2 on the sixth; 456 were residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents; 56 were stated to be single, 113 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 236 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 448 deaths and still-births, or 91.15 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 188; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 67; Greenwood (undenominational), 43; Lutheran (undenominational), 66; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 23; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 2; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 10, was 45.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.022, the mean humidity was 76, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,388, and the amount of rain-fall was 2.81 inches, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
