

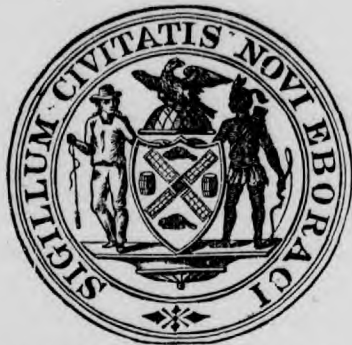

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, August 24, 1878.

MEETING HELD AUGUST 21, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, and Lane.
The following proposals were received and publicly opened, viz.:

Proposals for constructing sewers and appurtenances in Third avenue, from Southern Boulevard to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Third avenue to the summits east of Willis avenue, with branches in Lincoln, Alexander, and Willis avenues.

A plan for the restoration of Tompkins square having been submitted by the Superintending Architect, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the report of the Superintending Architect, and the plan for Tompkins square submitted by him, be received and laid over;

That the Mayor and Common Council be and they are hereby respectfully invited to inspect the same; and

That the Superintending Architect be and he is hereby directed to engage some suitable and convenient hall near Tompkins square on some evening during the coming week, and submit and explain said plan to the public, of which due notice shall be given beforehand.

Specifications for the mason and granite work, and for the iron work for eight of the parks on Fourth avenue, between Sixty-seventh street and Seventy-first street, and between Ninetieth street and Ninety-fourth street, were approved, and directions given for the publication of advertisements for proposals.

The Superintending Architect was authorized and directed to employ skilled mechanics for the purpose of repairing the roof of the Museum of Art whenever necessary.

Plans and specifications for the following additional works in the basement under the main hall of the Museum of Art Building, namely:

Plasterers' work; estimated cost.....	\$4,250 00
Carpenters' work;	650 00
Plumbers' work;	300 00

—were approved; the Treasurer was authorized to issue orders for the carpenters' and plumbers' work, and advertisements for proposals for the plasterers' work were ordered to be published.

The Treasurer reported that he had received from Mr. Lyman Tiffany, agent for Mary L. Tiffany, the sum of \$2,250, to be applied to the cost of monumenting that portion of the Hunt's Point District known as the "Fox Estate;" and, on his motion, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Topographical Engineer be and he hereby is directed to proceed immediately with the work of monumenting and preparing the grade maps for filling of that portion of the Hunt's Point District known as the "Fox Estate;" that the cost of said work be kept separate, charged to and paid from the fund of \$2,250 deposited with the Treasurer by Mr. Lyman Tiffany for that purpose; and that the employment of Mr. S. S. Haight, Assistant Engineer, and the two chainmen, as authorized by the Board on the 26th day of June and 31st day of July, 1878, be continued from the termination of the time for which they were so authorized to be employed, until said work, hereby directed, is completed, or until the sooner order of the Board.

The following resolutions were also adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, profiles, and specifications for regulating and grading Third avenue, from Harlem river to One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, this day submitted, be and hereby are approved; that the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to prepare and publish advertisements for proposals for said work; and that Mr. Eugene E. McLean be and he hereby is appointed City Surveyor on said work without any additional compensation.

Resolved, That the plans, profiles, and specifications, for the construction of a sewer in One Hundred and Fortieth street, from Alexander avenue to Brook avenue, with branches in Alexander avenue and Willis avenue, submitted by the Engineer of Construction, be and they hereby are approved; that the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to prepare and publish advertisements for proposals for said work; and that Mr. Eugene E. McLean be and he hereby is appointed City Surveyor on said work without any additional compensation.

Resolved, That the plan and specifications for laying a crosswalk on Fordham avenue, near Eleventh street, in central Morrisania, Twenty-third Ward, this day submitted be and hereby are approved; that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to invite private proposals for the work; and that Mr. Eugene E. McLean be and he hereby is appointed City Surveyor on said work without any additional compensation.

Resolved, That the resolution of this Board, adopted on the 12th day of June, 1878, authorizing the President to instruct the Counsel to the Corporation to acquire the title to Concord avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, from Boston road to the south side of Denman place, be and hereby is amended to read as follows, viz.:

"Resolved, That in the opinion of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, the interests of the public demand the opening of Concord avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, from the south side of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to the south side of Denman place, and that the President be and he hereby is authorized and directed to instruct the Counsel to the Corporation to commence and prosecute proceedings to acquire the title, for the use of the public, wherever the same has not been heretofore legally opened."

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he hereby is requested to discontinue all proceedings to acquire the title to that portion of Concord avenue, north of the south side of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, in the Twenty-third Ward.

MEETING HELD AUGUST 24, 1878.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That respectful application be and is hereby made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer from any unexpended balances of appropriations which are not required for the purposes for which the same were made, to the following appropriations for this Department for 1878, and to the following amounts, viz.:

Maintenance and Government of Parks and Places—For all supplies and for wages of foremen, gardeners, mechanics and laborers employed on works of maintenance, and including the maintenance of the Meteorological Observatory.....	\$30,000 00
Harlem River Bridge—Repairs, improvement and maintenance.....	3,000 00

Resolved, That the proposal of Mr. John H. McCabe, for the construction of sewers in Third avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, with branches in Lincoln, Alexander, and Willis avenues, be and hereby is rejected, on the ground that he has omitted to state therein the time required for the completion of the work.

Resolved, That the proposal (No. 5) of Mr. John B. Devlin, for the construction of sewers in Third avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, with branches in Lincoln, Alexander, and Willis avenues, be accepted as the lowest bid; that the contract be and hereby is awarded to Mr. John B. Devlin, and the President be and hereby is authorized to execute the same for and on behalf of this Department.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to issue orders for the following, viz.:

To replace in all the Backcock Fire Extinguishers in use in the Department the present lead acid holder with a patent glass bottle acid holder, at a cost not to exceed \$5.50 each.

To supply from two to four calcium lights on the Battery Park, on each of the seven nights that concerts are given on the Park by Crook's Cornet Band, commencing August 19, 1878.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending, Saturday, August 31, 1878.

MEETING HELD AUGUST 28, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the plan presented by the Superintending Architect for the restoring of Tompkins square as a public park be approved and adopted, and that he be placed in charge of said work. That he be requested to prepare working plans for the same forthwith, and that the work be proceeded with immediately.

Resolved, That the Superintending Architect be and he hereby is requested to report to the Board how many foremen, mechanics and laborers are required for the work.

Resolved, That in organizing the working force for the work, no man will be put on the pay-roll who is not competent to perform a full day's work.

Resolved, That the action of the President in suspending the teams, carpenters, and painters, under date of August 17, for want of funds, be and the same is hereby approved; and that Thomas F. Roche, carpenter, be and he is hereby restored to duty, at the same rate of pay as he heretofore received.

Resolved, That Thomas F. Roche, in addition to his employment as a carpenter, be placed temporarily in charge of the carpenters, and that during such temporary duty his pay be increased fifty cents per day.

Resolved, That James J. McGovern, in addition to his employment as a painter, be placed temporarily in charge of the painters, and that during such temporary duty his pay be increased fifty cents per day.

Resolved, That Mr. Edwin B. Jennings be and he hereby is appointed as a draughtsman in the office of the Topographical Engineer during the time the work of monumenting and preparing the grade maps of the Fox estate is in progress, or until the sooner order of the Board; and that his salary be fixed at the rate of \$1,000 per annum while so employed.

Resolved, That the position of Foreman of Carpenters be and hereby is abolished, and that Mr. E. H. Treadwell be and he hereby is discharged and removed from the employment of the Department.

Resolved, That James Davis be and he hereby is appointed Steam Engineer, to take charge of the large covered engine and pump in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and to perform such other duty as may be assigned to him, and that his pay be fixed at \$2.50 per day. That Lawrence Kehoe be appointed Watchman to protect the engine and pump at night, at the pay of \$1.50 per day.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held September 3, 1878.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted a statement of claims for the refunding of moneys paid for lands, sold on account of non-payment of assessments; said sales having been vacated by order of the Court; when, on motion, the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain, against the "Sinking Fund for redemption of the City Debt"; and for deposit to credit of "Assessment Sales—Moneys refunded"; for refunding moneys paid on account of sales, vacated by order of the Court, and payable from assessments collected for account of Street Improvement Fund—in amount three thousand and ten dollars and fifty-two cents (\$3,010.52).

The Comptroller submitted order of the Marine Court, in the case of Leopold Garde vs. George Seiler, for return of fee for notice of issue; case discontinued upon consent of parties; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the sum of four dollars (\$4) be returned to Louis Cohen, attorney in the action of Leopold Garde against George Seiler, note of issue fee collected in such action and paid into the treasury by the clerk of the Marine Court on April 2, 1878.

The Comptroller submitted the report of J. M. Varian, Superintendent of Markets, in relation to the block of ground known as part of the "Fort Gansevoort" property, designated by resolution of the Common Council as a stand for farmers' wagons, for the sale of garden produce; which was accepted and placed on file.

Whereupon, the following resolutions, submitted by the Comptroller, were, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the Register of Deaths: Mary Fuhrken died May 3, 1878, instead of Mary Faughken, and Christian Reichart died June 13, 1878, instead of Charles Richards, the same being clerical errors.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized and directed to double the strength of the disinfecting solution used for street gutters.

Sanitary Bureau.

I have the honor to submit the following report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 31, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,771, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 819 tenement-houses, 118 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 48 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 1 public sewer, 1 roadway 2 garbage dumps, 3 manure dumps, 1 wool pulling establishment, 1 lime kiln, 35 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous bridge, 59 yards, courts, and areas, 43 cellars and basements, 66 waste pipes and drains, 197 privies and water-closets, 127 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 6 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 21 other nuisances, together with 57 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 800.

During the past week 211 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 93 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

108 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 34 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 32 houses, 32 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,575 privies and water-closets, 135 yards, courts and areas, 431 cellars and basements, 278 garbage boxes, and 120 3/4 miles of street gutters.

One case of typhoid fever was removed to hospital.

553 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending August 31, 1878; this is an increase of 34 compared with the number reported the preceding week, but is 91 less than the number of deaths reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending August 24, was 514, which is 131.8 below the average number of deaths of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.62 to each 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,085,469.

The increase of the deaths during the week was among the diseases peculiar to childhood, the excess of deaths of children under 5 years during the past compared with the previous week was 77; there was also an increase of 2 deaths from measles, 3 from scarlatina, 5 from croup, 7 from whooping cough, 1 from typhus fever, 12 from typhoid fever, 1 from cerebro-spinal fever, 3 from inanition, 1 from alcoholism, 1 from rheumatism and gout, 1 from cancer, 1 from bronchitis, 7 from diseases of the heart, 1 from aneurism, 10 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, and 3 from cyanosis and atelectasis; the deaths from diphtheria decreased 2; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; phthisis, 10; pneumonia, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; and premature and pretermatural births, 3.

During the month of August there were 2,200 births reported, 472 marriages, 192 still-births, and 2,447 deaths, showing a decrease of 100 births, 32 marriages, 19 still-births, and 489 deaths compared with the corresponding month of last year. The number of deaths reported during the month from measles was 5; scarlatina, 52; diphtheria, 48; membranous croup, 14; whooping cough, 46; cerebro-spinal fever, 7; and malarial fevers, 27; 4 of the deaths from measles, 40 of scarlatina, 29 of diphtheria, 8 of membranous croup, 38 of whooping cough, 4 of cerebro-spinal meningitis, and 13 of the deaths from malarial fevers, were in tenement houses.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 81 were in institutions, 294 in tenement-houses, 161 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 125 on the first, 145 on the second, 111 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth and 2 on the sixth. 552 were residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 41 were stated to be single, 131 married, 42 widowed, and the condition of 239 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 549 deaths and still-births, or 91.81 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 251; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 49; Greenwood (undenominational), 53; Lutheran (undenominational), 87; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 14; Evergreen (undenominational), 25; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 10; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending August 24 was in the following wards: viz.: First, 7; Second, 1; Third, 3; Fourth, 10; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 17; Eighth, 12; Ninth, 28; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 39; Thirteenth, 20; Fourteenth, 22; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 29; Eighteenth, 26; Nineteenth, 69; Twentieth, 37; Twenty-first, 32; Twenty-second, 58; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 31 was 71.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.847, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 509, and the amount of rain-fall was .26 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
