

Remonstrance of residents of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards against removing the railroad tracks from Harlem Bridge:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

We, the undersigned citizens of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, beg leave respectfully to represent that we do not sympathize with the attempt made by certain agitators in our midst to work a wrong to the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway, and we do especially oppose that feature of their antagonism which goes so far as to request you to revoke the privilege granted to said company to run its cars across Harlem Bridge, unless the company shall reduce its fare to five cents.

The revocation of the privilege to cross the Harlem Bridge in the horse cars would have the effect of depopulating these wards, and would recoil with lasting disgrace upon all who advocate the privilege to the core have crossed the bridge, beginning with May 1870, there

effect of depopulating these wards, and would recoil with lasting disgrace upon all who advocate such an insane proceeding. Since the cars have crossed the bridge, beginning with May, 1879, there has been an unexampled demand in these wards for tenements, which were previously unoccupied, and real estate, which was previously unsalable at any price, is now active and much sought after. To deprive the people of these wards of the great accommodation now realized in making that close connection with the Elevated Railroads which our horse railroad now affords, would have the effect to drive from our midst all those families who have recently been attracted to live in this locality and depressed the value of real estate fully twenty five per cent.

We would all be glad to ride at five cent fare, and do not doubt but that ere long we shall be able so to do; but we do not desire to reach that point in the highway robbery style which seems to actuate those engaged in the present foray against the horse railroad company. That company has patiently borne with untold hardships, has bravely faced years of unprofitable work, has endured frightful expenditures in the frequent changing of the grades of the avenue upon which it is laid, and until last year the road has never paid a cent of dividend to its stockholders, while its rails by constant wear now need to be almost entirely renewed. We have some sense of gratitude for the great accommodation the horse railway has been to us during all these seventeen years when it was run at a loss to its stockholders; and we feel confident that the company, by its years of experience, knows best how to manage its own business, while we are assured that as soon as it finds itself in a financial position to warrant a reduction of its fare it will do so; the best evidence of its disposition to to do, is the voluntary reduction during the past two or three years of its fare from ten cents to

The present antagonism to the horse railway is not only unwarranted, but is exceedingly unjust as well as injudicious, and we earnestly hope that your Honorable Body will not permit your minds to be influenced to work so great a wrong to the community, as would a compliance with the very inconsiderate petition which has been worked up in an underhanded way, and presented to you in so surreputitions a manner.

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, January 31, 1883.

FRANCIS J. TWOMEY, Esq., Clerk of the Common Council:

SIR—I duly received a copy of the following resolution, adopted by the Common Council on the 16th instant, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on the 17th instant.

"Whereas, His Honor the Mayor, on the 30th of December, 1882, after the final adjournment of the Board of Aldermen, filed with the Clerk of the Common Council several communications purporting to return without his approval certain resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen at pre-

porting to return without his approval certain resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen at previous meetings; and

"Whereas, By reason of said final adjournment said objections of his Honor the Mayor were not presented at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen within the time specified by section to of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, nor have the same been 'entered at large in the Journal' as required by section 12 of said act; be it, therefore,

"Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he hereby is requested to inform this Board at its next meeting whether the aforesaid communications are valid vetoes of the accompanying resolution, and whether said resolutions do not now 'take effect as if he (the Mayor) had approved' them, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873."

Section 10, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873 is as follows: "The Mayor shall return such ordinance or resolution to the Board within ten days after receiving it, or at the next meeting of the Board after the expiration of said ten days." I am of opinion that no ordinance or resolution of the Board of Aldermen can become law merely because of the failure of the Mayor to make known his disapproval until after the "final adjournment" of that body.

Pursuant to this section, the Mayor has ten days of the lifetime of the Board in which to act; therefore, if any of the resolutions referred to by you in your communication had not, as a matter of

Pursuant to this section, the Mayor has ten days of the metine of the boath which in the act, therefore, if any of the resolutions referred to by you in your communication had not, as a matter of fact, been submitted to him for that length of time, when the last sitting of said Board terminated on the 30th of December, 1882, they are of no force and effect, and have failed.

But such of said ordinances or resolutions, if any, as were before the Mayor, duly certified, for the full period of ten days, when the said "final adjournment" took place, without written objections by said officer, are to be treated as if they had received his "approval," and have taken effect

In my judgment it is not necessary, in order that the Mayor's failure to approve should, in the case you present, operate as a "veto," that his objections should be first "entered at large in the journal" of the Board. His failure to approve a resolution, if the same be returned at any time

within the last ten days of the Board's existence, must have the effect of veto. The old Board could not reconsider the matter, unless they had ten days thereafter in which to act; for it is necessary that a veto should lie on the table ten days before action can be had thereon by the Board. The new Board cannot act, because all unfinished business of the old Board is dead with it.
