REPORTS.

The Committee on Streets, to whom was referred the annexed resolution in favor of permitting Henry L. Hall to lay a three-inch pipe from No. 658 to No. 659 Hudson street, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed permission should be granted, as the said Henry L. Hall stipulates with the municipal authorities to save the city harmless from loss or damage in all respects; they therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Henry L. Hall to lay a three-inch iron pipe, with a covering of asbestos one and one-quarter inches thick, for conducting steam from No. 658 Hudson street to No. 659 Hudson street, two feet below the surface of the street, as shown on the accompanying diagram, upon payment to the city, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as may be determined an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, provided the said Henry L. Hall shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege hereby given during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipe, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

PETITIONS.

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned would respectfully submit for your consideration a proposal to abolish the present method of collecting garbage, as practised in all large cities, and replace it with an entirely new and economical system of having the accumulating filth permanently disposed of in a profitable, effective and speedy manner.

The removal of garbage is a bill of expense, and the cost of getting rid of the stuff tends continually to increase. Under this new system its disposal can be made a source of revenue from the peculiar fertilizing power of the garbage dried and carbonized under the process.

The substances that enter into the growth of plants are always present in its ashes. A crop of 4,500 pounds of clover hay harvested from an acre of land was found to contain 1,680 pounds carbon, 1,340 pounds of oxygen, 177 pounds of hydrogen and 74 pounds of nitrogen. As carbon is the predominant constituent of the dry matter in plants, the carbonization of garbage by this new process becomes one of great general interest and importance financially.

The cost or profit, however, of the disposal of garbage, is not a question to be seriously considered. The problem how to dispose of the garbage of a city is simply a sanitary question.

First and last the subject relates to the health and comfort of the citizens; and it needs to be understood that neither agriculture nor political economy has any concern as to what shall be done with the garbage of cities until all sanitary requirements have been fulfilled effectually and economically. The fact that a city expends large sums of money for removing garbage, or that it gains money by the sale of it as a fertilizer, cannot for a moment justify the maintaining of such an abomination as the present system of garbage collection. From the point of view of the citizen, it is in terms of health and comfort that the problem must be considered, and not in terms of money. It matters not what a carbonized debris of garbage may be worth as a fertilizer, so long as sanitary considerations require that the offensive material should not be allowed to remain around the premises to vitiate the air that permeates the building.

The Thermo-Sanitaire system gives every dwelling a private crematory of his own, from the smallest family to the largest, at a small outlay, which can be applied to any part of the kitchen range, heating-stove or chimney, wherein garbage and all household waste is resolved into, either a fertilizer or into charcoal, by means of the waste heat of the stove, and which can either be burned at once in the crematory, or reserved for use in the fire-grate of the range as fuel, free from odor or offense, effectually destroying the power of vegetable and animal matter to draw roaches, flies, vermin, or any disease germs in and around the dwelling.

There are also connected with the system larger crematories for use in the yards of dwellings, boarding-houses, restaurants, hotels, market-houses, public institutions and hospitals for the destruction of garbage, old rags, old shoes, dead rats, dead cats, dead dogs, and refuse matter of all kinds, the decomposition of which in the streets of a city is among one of the most active causes of cholera, typhoid fever and other filth diseases.

If the city authorities see proper to entertain such a proposition and allow the privilege of placing the system in any locality they may indicate, a practical demonstration will be given, free of all expense, during a provisional period.

Breslin, the proprietor of the Gilsey House, to erect an awning across the sidewalk upon the north side of West Twenty-ninth street, about one hundred feet east of Broadway, to be supported upon iron posts, to be placed next to and inside the curb-stone, the same to comply in every respect with the provisions of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to regulate the erection of awnings extending across the sidewalks and outside the stoop-lines in the streets of the City of New York," passed May 10, 1886, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Whereas, We recognize in the canal system of the State not only a great contributor to the commerce of this city, but also that which protects our mercantile, manufacturing and agricultural interests against exorbitant rates of freight by railroad monopolies; therefore

Resolved, That the President of this Board be and he is hereby authorized to appoint a committee of five to represent the City of New York at the convention which has been called under the auspices of the Union for the Improvement of the Canals of the State of New York, to meet at Buffalo, on the 19th inst., to co-operate with other cities, towns and the commercial interests of the State in the movement to secure such improvement of the canals as will place them in the highest degree of efficiency.

No excavation or embankment shall be made or any pavement or flagging laid or moved by any person or persons within two feet of any monument or bolt which has been set by proper authority or designated on any official map as a landmark to denote street lines in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, unless a license for the same has been obtained from the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Sec. 2. Whenever it may be necessary to make any excavation or embankment or to lay or remove any pavement or flagging within two feet of any street monument or bolt, as aforesaid, any person or persons intending to do such work shall make a written application to the Commissioner of Street Improvements for a license, which application shall set forth the nature of the work proposed and the location of the monument affected thereby.

The said Commissioner of Street Improvements shall thereupon cause his Engineer in charge of the laying-out and monumenting of streets within the district above named, to take such measurements and field notes as may be necessary to restore such monuments to their correct positions after the completion of the contemplated work, and when such measurements and field notes have been taken, but not before, may issue such a license as desired, and the person so applying for license shall pay to the said Commissioner the sum of five dollars for each and every monument affected.

Sec. 3. If any person or persons shall make an excavation or embankment, or lay or take up any pavement or flagging within two feet of any street monument, or shall in any way remove, injure or deface any such monument, without first having obtained a license as aforesaid, such person or persons shall be subject to a penalty of fifty dollars for each offense, to be imposed by any Police Magistrate or Justice, either in his own view or in testimony taken in a summary manner, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, such Police Magistrate or Justice shall commit such offender to the City Prison for a period not to exceed thirty days, unless such fine is sooner paid.

As provided by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, I submit herewith, in writing, the Departmental Estimate of the amount of expenditure required for conducting the public business in the Finance Department of the City of New York for the year 1893, stating in detail the objects and purposes of such expenditure, and including a statement of the salaries of each of the officers, clerks and subordinates employed in the Department, and the compensation of temporary clerks engaged during a portion of each year.

Statements in detail are presented of stocks and bonds of different kinds and classes, which become due and payable in the year 1893, and the redemption of which is provided for as stated, under their several heads and classification, and also of installments payable in 1893, to be raised by tax for the redemption of water bonds at maturity, as follows:

1. Statement of bonds payable in the year 1893 from taxation, to be provided for by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, amounting to \$98,480.70.

2. Statement of stock payable in the year 1893 from the Sinking Fund, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 178, Laws of 1889, amounting to \$14,500.

3. Statement of bonds and stocks of the City of New York, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, and prior to September 1, 1892, and to be issued as estimated during the remainder of 1892, by authority of existing statutes, and the sums required to be set apart out of the surplus income, revenues and accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt for the year 1893 and subsequent years, which, with the accumulation of interest thereon, shall be sufficient to redeem said bonds and stocks by the time the same shall be payable, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, amounting to \$1,599,790.80.

4. Statement of bonds issued by the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms prior to their annexation to the city in 1874, becoming due and payable in 1893, amounting to \$18,000.

Interest becoming due in 1893 on bonds of the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms, amounting to \$37,310, is included in the statement of interest on stocks and bonds outstanding, exclusive of the funded debt held by the Sinking Fund.

5. Statement of bonds payable in the year 1893 from assessments, amounting to \$2,345,000.

6. Statement of the estimated amount of installments to be raised in 1893 for the redemption at maturity of stocks to be issued for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of article 8, section 11, of the State Constitution, from a special Sinking Fund formed for the purpose, amounting to \$1,204,287.43.

Statements in detail are also presented showing the amounts of interest becoming due and payable on stocks and bonds in 1893, as follows:

1. Statement of stocks and bonds outstanding September 1, 1892, exclusive of the funded debt held by the Sinking Fund as investments, showing interest becoming due thereon in 1893, amounting to \$4,552,079.78.

2. Statement of the estimated amount required to be raised by tax for interest payable in 1893, on stocks and bonds to be issued in 1892, after August 31, and in 1893, amounting to \$196,080.

3. Statement of interest to be paid on Revenue Bonds to be issued in 1893, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, to meet the current expenses of the City government, amounting to \$200,000.

The State taxes payable in 1893, as the quota of the County of New York, for the State fiscal year, commencing October 1, 1892, amounting to \$3,541,956.10, as shown by a communication from the State Comptroller. The amount required to be raised for the salary and expenses of the Shore Inspector is \$12,502.23, making a total of \$3,554,458.33, to be included in the estimate for 1893.

The amount of the quota of State taxes for 1892 was \$2,398,504.91.

Statements are also presented with the Departmental Estimate of the Finance Department of the amount of rents payable in the year 1893 on leases to the City of premises for the use of various departments and public offices, the Civil and Police courts, armories and drill-rooms for the National Guard, together with estimates of miscellaneous expenses chargeable upon the City Treasury, and on account of judgments against the Corporation, and a number of items of necessary expenditure, including the wages of Armorer, Janitors, Engineers and Laborers for armories, etc., which are not included in any Departmental Estimates.

Pending the litigation relating to the act of 1890 the Commission dispensed with the services of all other employees and reduced the salaries of their Secretary and Clerk.

In the above estimate an amount is included for engineering expenses, but the appointments will not be made until the Corporation Counsel secures title to the lands to be improved.

The salaries of the Secretary and Clerk were reduced with the understanding that they would be restored when active work should begin, and in the estimate for 1893 are included on the latter basis.

The payments for lands and the expenses of acquiring the same are not included, because the act of 1890 requires that those expenses be met with funds raised according to the act relating to the New Aqueduct.

At a meeting of the Harlem River Bridge Commission, held on Wednesday, October 5, 1892, at 3 P. M., on motion of Mr. King, seconded by Mr. Brown, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, At a meeting of this Commission, held on the 2d day of June, 1892, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 487 of the Laws of 1885, chapter 573 of the Laws of 1888, and chapter 249 of the Laws of 1890, requisition be made upon the Board of

Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York for the sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000), which is hereby specified as the amount needed by this Commission for the purposes specified in said acts during the current calendar year, excepting such amounts as may be required to pay for and improve any lands that may be required under the provisions of the two last-mentioned acts.

"And in pursuance thereof, requisition was made upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York for the sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000) to meet the expenses of this Commission for the current year; and

"Whereas, No provision has been made by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment to comply with said requisition, either by levy of tax or issue of bonds; and

"Whereas, It has become feasible to reduce said requisition for the current year by the sum of eight hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$825); now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That requisition be again made upon said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York for an appropriation of thirteen thousand one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$13,175), which is hereby specified as the amount needed by the Commission for the current calendar year for the purposes specified in and by said acts.

"And Whereas, The Court of Appeals of this State did, on the 4th day of October, instant, render its decision declaring the said chapter 249 of the Laws of 1890 constitutional, and did affirm the order of the Supreme Court, awarding a mandamus against William H. Clark, Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York, directing him to institute proceedings to acquire the lands specified in said chapter 249 of the Laws of 1890, and it is probable that so much of the said lands so acquired as were specified in said chapter 573 of the Laws of 1888 can be laid out, fenced, improved and completed in compliance with said last mentioned act during the season of 1893, if prompt provision of the necessary funds be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; therefore, be it

"Further Resolved, That requisition be made pursuant to said acts for the sum of sixty-six thousand eight hundred and eighty dollars (\$66,880), which is hereby specified as the amount needed for the purposes specified in said acts for the calendar year of 1893;

"And Further, That the Secretary be instructed to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, and to the Board of Aldermen, a detailed statement of the items constituting said sums above named."

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Starin to remove the pier (known as No. 18, being the pier at the foot of Cortlandt street in the City of New York, and the pier No. 19, being the first pier to the north thereof), and to extend the bulkhead line of the sea-wall property owned by said Starin, between Cortlandt and Dey streets aforesaid, to the bulkhead line as laid down under the provisions of the Act of 1871, and to build a sea-wall called for by the plans of the Dock Department for the improvement of the wharf front of said city, and to build a new pier commencing fifty-five feet south of the centre line of Dey street, of the width of one hundred feet, to the exterior of the pierhead-line as established under the provisions of the Laws of 1871, as amended by the Laws of 1890, and to shed said pier and bulkhead, said work to be done at his own expense, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary, as the said John H. Starin agrees to protect the City's interests in every way. They therefore recommend that the said annexed resolution be adopted.

Whereas, The Department of Docks has recently adopted the following preamble and resolutions:

"Whereas, John H. Starin is the owner of the bulkhead on the North river, in the City of New York, between Cortlandt and Dey streets, including a half ownership in the pier at the foot of Cortlandt street, and the entire ownership of the next pier to the north, and is entitled to the wharfage, crackage, benefits, advantages, and emoluments growing, arising or accruing by or from the said wharves and piers; and

Whereas, The City of New York, in pursuance of the general plan of improvement of the water-front of said city, is desirous that the exterior wharf, street or place to the westward of West street, one hundred and eighty feet in width, should be built, and that a sea-wall, in conformity with the plans of the Dock Department, should be built along the exterior line of said wharf, street or place; and said city is likewise desirous that the two piers hereinabove referred to be removed and one large pier be built in place thereof, one hundred feet in width, commencing at a point fifty-five feet south of the centre line of Dey street; and

Whereas, The City of New York does not desire at the present time to acquire the property of the said John H. Starin aforesaid, but is desirous that the aforesaid improvement should be made; now, therefore,

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the said John H. Starin to remove the pier (known as No. 18, being the pier at the foot of Cortlandt street in the City of New York, and the pier No. 19, being the first pier to the north thereof), and to extend the bulkhead-line of the sea-wall property owned by said Starin, between Cortlandt and Dey streets aforesaid, to the bulkhead-line as laid down under the provisions of the Act of 1871, and to build a sea-wall called for by the plans of the Dock Department for the improvement of the wharf front of said city, and to build a new pier commencing 55 feet south of the centre line of Dey street, of the width of 100 feet, to the exterior of the pierhead-line as established under the provisions of the Laws of 1871, as amended by the Laws of 1890, and to shed said pier and bulkhead.

This permit being granted upon the express terms, that if at any time in the future, the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall, if they see fit, condemn the wharf rights and property of the said Starin herein described, then, and in such event the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall pay to the said Starin the full value of his wharf property and wharf rights as it shall then exist as extended in pursuance of this permission, or shall repay to him, but without interest, the entire amount that he may expend in the aforesaid alterations and improvements, in addition to such compensation as said Starin shall be adjudged to receive for his wharf rights aforesaid.

The work of extending the bulkhead and building the sea-wall is to be done by the said Starin at his own expense, under the supervision of the Department of Docks, or, if he so desires, this Department will do the work at the expense of said Starin.

The new pier shall be built by the said Starin at his own expense under the supervision of the said Department.

The said Starin is to use the said pier and bulkhead for the purposes of steam transportation, and for the operation of a ferry to Staten Island, and for such other lawful purposes as he may deem proper under the terms of the original grant of his wharf, bulkheads and property; and

Whereas, The said John H. Starin is ready and willing to carry the terms of the said permit into effect, and it is considered desirable that the terms of the said permit should be embodied in an agreement between the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York and the said Starin;

Therefore Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation prepare an agreement with the said John H. Starin, which shall embody in it all the terms of the above resolution, and which shall give to him the permission and rights therein contained, and which shall require from him the agreements and conditions likewise therein contained on his part to be fulfilled and performed, which agreement when prepared shall be executed by the proper municipal authorities.

Alderman Morris moved that the whole matter be laid over for one week.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:
