The 800 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.49, against 22.48 for the previous week, and 23.05 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The increase of 66 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 8 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 9 from measles, of 11 from scarlet fever, of 6 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 9 from bronchitis, of 28 from pneumonia, and of 9 from Bright's disease; there was a decrease of 10 in the deaths from heart diseases.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twenty-third Wards, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever also in the Nineteenth Ward.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, December 31, 1891.

Present—President Post.

" Commissioner Cram.

" " Phelan.

The minutes of the meetings held the 23d and 24th instant were read and approved.

The President not voting on the approval of the minutes of the 24th instant, for the reason of his absence when said meeting was held.

Mr. Kiernan, representing Stephen A. Walker, attorney for the owners of certain land under water, and bulkhead rights, between the southerly line of West Twenty-sixth and the centre line of the block between West Twenty-fifth and West Twenty-sixth streets, lying westerly of Thirteenth avenue, was present, and agreed to sell the aforesaid property to the City for the sum of eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$85,500); whereupon,

On motion of Commissioner Phelan, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the said offer to sell the said property mentioned for the sum of eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$85,500) be and the same is hereby accepted, upon condition, however, that a good and sufficient title in all respects to the said property, together with all the rights, terms, easements and privileges appertaining thereto or connected therewith, can be acquired and obtained by and conveyed to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, free and clear in all respects of all charges, liens and incumbrances of whatever kind, description or nature, and also provided that the said owners or their representatives sign and deliver to this Department a release waiving all their rights of action in the said mentioned premises, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that an agreement to the foregoing effect and in pursuance of section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 be entered into by this Department to purchase the said property at the said price from the owner or owners thereof.

A petition, signed by various property-owners, merchants and others, objecting to locating the Health Department's "offal contractor" on the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, North river, was presented by Commissioner Cram, who moved that the action of the 10th instant, in setting apart said pier for such purpose, be rescinded.

Commissioner Phelan moved as an amendment that this subject be tabled until Thursday, January 14, 1892, which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—President Post.

" Commissioner Phelan.

Negative—" Cram.

Whereupon, Commissioner Cram gave notice of his intention to offer the following amendment to article III., section I., of the By-Laws: "The Auditing Committee shall consist of the President and Treasurer."

Commissioner Cram at this point retired from the meeting.

John S. Sutphen and J. M. Requa, executors of the estate of Charles Spear, were present and rejected the offer made by the City July 16, 1891, for the purchase of Pier, old 12, North river, and one-half of the adjoining bulkhead; they however agreed to sell the said property to the City for the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

On motion, their proposition was tabled until Thursday, January 14, 1892.

Cecil Campbell Higgins, attorney for James A. Striker, was heard respecting his communication of the 10th instant, addressed to the Treasurer, offering to sell, for the sum of ten thousand dollars, his client's interest in and to the water-front between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, North river, whereupon the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, By section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire for purchase, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking

Fund, and agree with such owners upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to agree upon a price, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said city; and

Whereas, The Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all riparian and wharfage rights and interests in or annexed to or appurtenant to the premises from the southerly side of Fifty-third street to the southerly side of Fifty-fourth street, North river, together with all rights in the lands and lands under water (as riparian owner or otherwise), lying to the west of the easterly line of the Twelfth avenue.

Whereas, It appears that James A. Striker is the owner in fee simple, with all its hereditaments, of the premises above named, including the riparian and wharfage rights;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the said riparian and wharfage rights, with all its hereditaments, and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor, free from all incumbrances, the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon James A. Striker, and he be and hereby is requested, within fourteen (14) days from receipt thereof, to notify this Board in writing, whether he will sell his said riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for the price above mentioned; and in the event that he shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so convey his respective riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said rights and interests between the owner thereof and this Department.

At this stage of the proceedings Commissioner Cram returned.

Henry McCloskey, attorney for the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company, appeared and requested that inasmuch as the said ferry company had been enjoined from occupying the premises foot of Twenty-second street, East river, they be released from paying the rent provided for by the resolution adopted November 6, 1890, until such time as the said company are placed in actual possession of the premises.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the said application was granted.

J. D. Layng, General Manager of the West Shore Railroad Company, was present and submitted a certified copy of the minutes of the executive committee of the West Shore and Ontario Terminal Company, held December 29, 1891 (as a substitute for the agreement prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation), confirming, ratifying, and approving his action, in accepting the proposition of this Board, dated September 17, 1891, for the purchase of certain wharf property between Harrison and Jay streets, North river, belonging to said company, and directing its officers to execute and deliver to the City of New York a deed for the same upon receipt of the sum of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000), provided the said amount be paid on or before March 1, 1892.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and a copy thereof directed to be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his approval.
