The 800 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.49, against 22.48 for the previous week, and 23.05 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The increase of 66 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 8 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 9 from measles, of 11 from scarlet fever, of 6 from diarrhœal diseases, of 9 from bronchitis, of 28 from pneumonia, and of 9 from Bright's disease; there was a decrease of 10 in the deaths from heart diseases.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twenty-third Wards, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever also in the Nineteenth Ward.


