Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 171, 143, 172, 6 and o, against 167, 174, 155, 13 and o for the previous week, a total of 492 against 509. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh and Seventeenth Wards, and the decrease in the Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventh and Ninth Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Sixteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards. One of the 6 cases of typhoid fever reported was above Fortieth street, and 3 were below Fourteenth street. No case of By order of the Board. emall-pox was reported. EMMONS CLARK, Secretary.
