No. 1. The undersigned hereby announces his appointment this day, by his Honor, Seth Low, Mayor, and by virtue thereof assumes control of this Department. The rules and regulations of the Department as now enforced, will continue until further orders. Under and by virtue of the statute in such case made and provided, I do hereby appoint William Leary Secretary of the Fire Department of The City of New York, to hold office at the pleasure of the Fire Commissioner of said City in place of Augustus T. Docharty whom I hereby remove.

THOMAS STURGIS, Fire Commissioner.

No. 2. The appointment of Richard H. Laimbeer, Jr., as Deputy Fire Commissioner of the Fire Department for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens is hereby announced to the Department. The business, duties and powers of the Fire Department in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens will be conducted, performed and exercised by the Deputy Commissioner as may be directed by the Fire Commissioner. The office of the Deputy Commissioner will be located at Nos. 365 and 367 Jay street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Commissioner also directed that the following circular be promulgated by the Chief of Department:

NEW YORK, January 1, 1902. Circular—Upon again assuming command, the Commissioner presents his cordial greetings to the officers and men of the Uniformed Force and to the civilian employees of all grades connected with the Department.

That no misunderstanding may exist, he makes the following brief announcement of the objects sought to be accomplished and the principles which will control during his administration:

First. The highest possible efficiency of fire service.

Second. Careful economy in expenditure consistent with such service and with progressive methods.

The Uniformed Force are informed: That promotions and other rewards will be made or given for merit only; that faithful and meritorious service will be thus recognized as far as it may be in the power of the Commissioner to do so; that transfers will be made solely for the good of the service; that strict discipline in accordance with the rules of the service and unquestioning subordination to proper authority will be required and exacted, and that lack of discipline, insubordination or negligence will be punished wherever found; that reasonable complaints will be heard and decided by the Commissioner in person, or by his Deputy in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens upon proper application and at suitable times; that absolute justice, so far as can be ascertained, will be meted out in each instance, free from favor or influence.

The employees, other than those of the Uniformed Force are informed: That each will be expected to give the Department the best service of which he is capable; that prompt and regular attendance, close attention to duty during the hours of service and such economy in the use of apparatus and materials as will give to the City the best results for the money expended will be required; that ability joined to faithful performance will be recognized, and therein will lie the road to advancement.

The Commissioner congratulates the Department on its past record and its deservedly high place in the esteem of the people of New York, and expresses the hope that the same hearty co-operation in his efforts for the good of the service which was given during his former term will be again shown in equal measure.

On motion of the Comptroller, Henry J. Storrs was appointed Chief Clerk of the Board.

The minutes of the meeting of November 29, 1901, were read and approved.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Amsterdam avenue to the Boulevard, and objections of John O. Baker, by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 3, 1901.

Mr. Flannery objected to the expenses connected with the work, and also claimed that the area of benefit should be larger, and that as the street is 100 feet in width and part of the park system the City should bear a portion of the expense.

On motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Board of Assessors stated that a general objection had been made to the assessment on the ground that the expenses connected with the work are excessive and that a portion of the cost of the improvement should be borne by the City.

Mr. Baldwin, attorney, opposed the assessment on the ground that the expenses for surveying, inspection and interest are excessive.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment \$3,000 and to reapportion the same accordingly, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 485 of the Laws of 1901, the Board of Revision of Assessments hereby audits the claim of Mary J. Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the name of the citizens of The City of New York, does hereby extend to Mr. Andrew Carnegie the sincere thanks of the municipality, and commends his action as an important event in the progress of civilization and education in our city, which will mark an epoch in the enlightenment of our citizens and offer much-needed opportunities for the higher education of the youth of the city; and be it also

Resolved, That this Board hereby approves the plan for the proposed improvement of the water-front on the south side of the Harlem river, between Third avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, as follows:

The proposed new plan comprises three slips inshore of the bulkhead and pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, with a marginal street of varying width, bounded on its exterior side by a bulkhead-line and on its interior side by a marginal-street line, said lines being described as follows:

The exterior line of the proposed marginal street, wharf or place will begin at a point where the prolongation of the easterly line of Third avenue intersects the bulkhead and pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, and will run thence northwesterly along said bulkhead and pierhead line to the prolongation of the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street; thence deflecting to the right and still northwesterly and along said bulkhead and pierhead line to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street; thence westerly and along the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street to the easterly side of Lexington avenue; thence northerly and along said easterly side of Lexington avenue to the bulkhead and pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890; thence northwesterly and along said bulkhead and pierhead line a distance of 114.27 feet to a line parallel with and distant 95 feet northerly from the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence westerly and along said parallel line 373.04 feet to a line parallel with and distant 34.12 feet easterly from the easterly line of Fourth avenue; thence along said parallel line distant 34.12 feet easterly from the easterly side of Fourth avenue 168.25 feet to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street; thence easterly and along said southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street 236.68 feet to the bulkhead and pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890; thence northwesterly and along said bulkhead and pierhead line to the prolongation of the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence deflecting to the right and northwesterly still along said bulkhead and pierhead line to the northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence westerly and along said northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to a point distant 115.32 feet easterly from the westerly line of Fourth avenue; thence along a line parallel with and distant 115.32 feet easterly from the westerly line of Fourth avenue 299.83 feet to a point in the aforesaid bulkhead and pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, where the easterly prolongation of the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street intersects the same.

The interior line of the marginal street wharf or place will begin at the southeasterly corner of Third avenue and East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and will run thence northerly along the prolongation of the easterly side of Third avenue to the masonry construction of the under-grade roadway or thoroughfare underneath the Third avenue bridge and its easterly approach, as shown on the accompanying maps; thence along said masonry construction in a meandering line, as shown on said map, to a point distant 75 feet inshore of or southwesterly from the bulkhead and pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, and on the northerly side of said bridge; thence northwesterly in a straight line parallel with and 75 feet distant southwesterly from that portion of said bulkhead and pierhead line which is intercepted by the easterly line of Third avenue and the southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street until it intersects said southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street; thence westerly along said southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-first street to the westerly line of Lexington avenue; thence northerly along said westerly line of Lexington avenue in a straight line until it intersects a line parallel with and distant 100 feet southwesterly from that portion of said bulkhead and pierhead line intercepted by the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street; thence northwesterly along said parallel line until it intersects the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence westerly along said southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street to the easterly line of Fourth avenue; thence northerly and along said easterly line of Fourth avenue to the northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street; thence easterly and along said northerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street in a straight line until it intersects a line drawn parallel with and distant sixty feet southwesterly from that portion of the aforesaid bulkhead and pierhead line intercepted by the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-third street and the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence along said parallel line sixty feet southwesterly from said bulkhead-line in a straight line until it intersects the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence westerly along said northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to the westerly side of Fourth avenue; thence northerly and along said westerly side of Fourth avenue to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

All of which is shown on the map submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to consent to and approve of the new plan for improving the water-front between the easterly side of Third avenue and the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street on the Harlem river, in the Borough of Manhattan, as above set forth.

The application of the Anchor Line for a lease of one of the new piers to be constructed between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, on the North river—preferably the pier to be constructed at the foot of West Fifteenth street—was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The application of Stokes & Thedford for a lease of the bulkhead between Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth streets, North river, was referred to Commissioner Meyer, as Treasurer pro tem.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Edison Company—To repair and renew, where necessary, the wires running between Battery Place Pier South, No. 1, and Battery Place Pier, North river.

Welch a berth on the Wallabout canal, Borough of Brooklyn, commencing at a point on the southerly line of the Kent Avenue Basin along Wallabout place, about forty-seven feet east of the easterly side of Ross street, extended, from the opposite side of the Kent Avenue Basin, and running westerly a distance of about one hundred and twenty-five feet, more or less, along the bulkhead, being the premises now occupied by said Augustus W. Welch. The lessee to have the privilege of maintaining thereon an ice-bridge, scales and tally-house; said lease to be for a term of five years from January 1, 1902, at an annual rental of nine hundred and twelve dollars and fifty cents per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Augustus W. From Nicholas C. Cunningham—Requesting a lease of the north side of the Fifty-second Street Pier, No. 92, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto Nicholas C. Cunningham the northerly side of West Fifty-second Street Pier, No. 92, for a term of five years from January 1, 1902, at a rental to be hereafter fixed by the Treasurer of this Department, payable quarterly in advance; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Nicholas C. Cunningham shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company—Requesting a lease of the outer end of the south side of the Barrow Street Pier, No. 43, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company the outer southerly side of Barrow Street Pier, No. 43, North river, commencing at a point distant 223 feet westerly from the bulkhead line, and running thence westerly to the outer end of said pier, for a term of ten years, from the first day of January, 1902, at an annual rental of six thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-six and two-thirds cents, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Catskill and New York Steamboat Company shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease used by this Department.

From the President—Recommending that the permit granted the Consolidated Gas Company to use and occupy the north side of the West Twentieth Street Pier, North river, and to maintain a dumping-board thereat be revoked, to take effect at once. Recommendation adopted.

From Commissioner Meyer—

1st. Recommending that the application of the Rapid Transit Company for a renewal of the franchise of the Staten Island Ferry for a period of twenty years be denied, the lease of the existing franchise not yet having expired. Recommendation adopted.

2d. On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbuttel Coal Company, (First) the bulkhead, now in process of construction, commencing from a point one hundred and eighty-eight feet south of the southerly side of West Ninety-sixth street, extended, and running thence southerly a distance of one hundred and seventy-two feet, more or less, to the southerly end of said bulkhead; (Second) all that certain plot, piece or parcel of land between West Ninety-fifth and West Ninety-sixth streets, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point in the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street one hundred feet easterly from the bulkhead on the North river, and running thence southerly and parallel with the said bulkhead on the North river one hundred and fifty-eight feet; thence westerly and parallel with the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street fifty feet to a point; thence southwesterly to a point where the said bulkhead along the North river intersects the bulkhead known as the south bulkhead; thence easterly and parallel with the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street one hundred and sixty-two feet to the westerly line of the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; thence northerly along the westerly line of said right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street; thence westerly along said southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street sixty-two feet to the point or place of beginning; and including the two parcels described as follows: (1) Beginning at a point in the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street, which point is twelve feet westerly from

the westerly boundary line of the premises secondly above described; running thence southerly and parallel with the said westerly line of said premises forty feet to a point; thence southeasterly to a point on the westerly line of said premises and distant fifty feet from the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street; thence northerly along the westerly line of said premises fifty feet to the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street, and thence westerly twelve feet to the place of beginning; (2) beginning at a point on the westerly line of the premises secondly above described and distant one hundred and forty-eight feet from the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street; thence westerly and parallel with the southerly line of West Ninety-sixth street fifty feet to a point; thence southwesterly to a point on the North river ten feet northerly from the point where the south bulkhead intersects the bulkhead along the North river; thence southerly along the North River ten feet to the point where the south bulkhead intersects the bulkhead along the North river; thence northeasterly, easterly and northerly and along the lines of the premises secondly above described to the point or place of beginning; for a term of three years from the 1st day of January, 1902, at a rental of three thousand two hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbuttel Coal Company shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the application of the American Malting Company for a lease of the bulkheads at the foot of East Forty-eighth street and between Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth streets, East river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

2d. In relation to the application of the Department of Street Cleaning for additional facilities on the East river, and recommending that said Department be notified that as soon as the East Eighth Street Pier, No. 60, is put in good condition that the northerly side of the pier will be set aside for use as a dumping-board, if desired. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Terry & Tench Construction Company for the use of the property owned by the City on the southerly side of the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, be fixed at the rate of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing January 1, 1902. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending the compensation to be charged the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company for the use of the northerly half of the bulkhead between Pike Slip Pier East, No. 32, and Rutgers Slip Pier West, No. 33, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$900 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing from the date they began to use the premises. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for the privilege of maintaining cable-crossings at Newtown creek be fixed at the rate of \$25 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, commencing from the date of completion of the said cable landings. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Recommending that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to enter into a stipulation with the owners of the wharfage rights and property between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North river, where not already done, for the transferring of the possession of the property to the City.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby authorized to enter into stipulations (where stipulations have not already been entered into) with the owners of the property required for the improvement of the water front under the new plan, between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, on the North river, that on condition of said owners allowing this Department to enter into possession of the property required for the improvement, the City agrees to pay said owners six per cent. from the date of the Department entering into possession, on the amount which shall be subsequently awarded for the property by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the condemnation proceedings.

11th. Recommending that a lease be granted John W. Sullivan for a term of five years from January 1, 1902, of the easterly half of the Jackson Street Pier West, and of the bulkhead between Jackson Street Pier West, and Jackson Street Pier East, East river.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto John W. Sullivan the easterly half of the Jackson Street Pier West, together with the bulkhead between Jackson Street Pier West, and Jackson Street Pier East, East river, for a term of five years from January 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$225 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said John W. Sullivan shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the Secretary—

1st. Reporting that the sale of old material held December 2, 1901, netted the sum of \$742.50.

2d. Reporting that he has assigned Frederick Lange and Willis M. Wilbur as Notaries Public, and Charles J. Farley, Daniel D. Barry, Jacob Bauer, Nicholas F. Kenneally, Edmund K. Stevens and Patrick H. Bird, as Commissioners of Deeds, and recommending that the Board of Aldermen be requested to appoint John W. Ingalls, Francis J. Ryan, Robert F. Aram and Lucius C. Monaghan, all and singular, the bulkhead, between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, on the Harlem river, for a term of ten years, from December 1, 1901, at a rental of seven hundred and twenty dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; the lessee to have the privilege of mooring a floating dump at said bulkhead during the term of the lease and to maintain the necessary approach thereto; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said John Cloughen shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department, except that the lessee shall do all dredging.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto John A. Monaghan, the right to maintain bathing-houses and to carry on a bathing business between the southerly line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and the northerly line of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, North river, and between the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the bulkhead-line as established under the Act of 1857 at said locality; the lease to be for a term of ten years from January 1, 1902. The lessee to have the privilege of one renewal term of ten years. The rental for the first term of ten years to be at the rate of three hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; and the rental for the renewal term to be at an advance of five per cent. per annum on the rental for the first term, payable quarterly in advance as above. The said lessee shall have the privilege of maintaining during the term of said lease or any renewal thereof of the above-described premises, the necessary bathing-houses, floats and other structures for the purpose of carrying on the bathing business; all the structures to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him; it

being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said John A. Monaghan shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, December 13, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

A representative of the Penniman estate appeared and requested that action be taken with reference to the acquisition or condemnation of Market Street Pier West, formerly known as Pier, old 36, East river, and adjoining bulkhead; and a representative of C. H. Mallory & Co. appeared and requested that action be taken relative to their application for a lease of Burling Slip Pier East, No. 16, East river, and bulkhead southerly.

On motion, both matters were tabled until after January 1, 1902.

A representative of the New York Ice Company appeared and requested a reduction in the rental fixed for the privilege of running a pipe through the bulkhead foot of East Eighteenth street, which was denied.

The following communications were tabled:

From Albert H. Hastorf—Requesting permit for a dumping-board between Nineteenth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, together with the recommendation of the President that a site be assigned on the northerly side of the West Forty-seventh street Pier, No. 87.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting the erection of a dumping-board between Seventy-fifth and Ninety-first streets, East river.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for widening the Clinton Street Pier, East river.

From Anchor Line—Protesting against the granting to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of the right to use the water adjacent to Pier, new 54, North river.

From Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting permit to use and occupy Pier at East Twenty-first street. Application denied.

From Watson H. Bowne—Requesting a lease of the dock foot of Main street, Westchester. Application denied.

From Henry L. Spearin—Requesting an extension of twenty days from December 1, 1901, for the completion of Contract No. 706.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building a new pier at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street, North river, under Contract No. 706, Henry L. Spearin, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including December 21, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract be filed in this Department.

From Philbin, Beekman & Menken, attorneys—In reference to claim of Ward & Co. for use of land under water, foot of Broadway, Astoria. Secretary directed to transmit same to the Corporation Counsel.

From H. L. Herbert & Co.—Requesting repairs to Pier foot of East Twentieth street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and to report the cost for collection from the applicants.

From Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company—Requesting a lease of the southerly half of the Pier foot of West Fifty-eighth street. The action of the President in advising that said pier is already leased was approved.

From John J. Reilly—Requesting that permit granted him for 100 feet on the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge thereon be transferred to Thomas Costello, Jr.

On motion, application of Thomas Costello, Jr., for same was placed on file; the permit granted John J. Reilly to maintain an ice bridge at that locality was revoked, and permit granted said Costello to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Board 100 feet on the northerly side of said pier, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge thereon, compensation therefor to be at the rate of \$125 per month, payable in advance.

From August Grill—Requesting a lease of the present berth on Wallabout canal, with privilege of maintaining an ice bridge thereon.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto August Grill a berth beginning at a point where the southerly side of the Kent avenue basin or Wallabout canal intersects the westerly side of Hewes street; thence running northerly along said canal or basin a distance of one hundred and forty-two (142) feet, for a term of five years from January 1, 1902, at a rental of seven hundred and thirty dollars (\$730) per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer; the lessee to have the privilege of erecting and maintaining on said premises an ice bridge, scales and tally-house; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said August Grill shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the President—Recommending that the application of the Carroll Box and Lumber Company for a lease of the bulkhead to be built between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, East river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that the New York terminus of the Hoboken Ferry be changed from the foot of West Fourteenth street to a point south of the Erie Ferry, foot of West Twenty-third street. Recommendation adopted.

From the Treasurer pro tem.—

1st. Recommending that the rental to be paid by Nicholas C. Cunningham for the use of the northerly side of the West Fifty-second Street Pier, No. 92, be fixed at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Reporting that he has arranged with Lawrence Curtin for the necessary filling required between the westerly line of Burling slip and the easterly side of the Fulton Ferry, a distance of about 185 feet; and between the rear of the new bulkhead-wall now being built between these points and the face of the old bulkhead along South street, the sum of \$100 to be paid to the Department for the privilege. Commissioner Meyer submitted a recommendation that the application of P. J. Casey for a lease of the lower deck of the West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street Pier, No. 119, be denied, but the recommendation was not adopted, President Cram voting for the application.

From Cohalan Brothers, attorneys—Requesting, on behalf of Michael Egan, a lease of two hundred feet of the southerly side of the West Thirty-ninth Street Pier, No. 79, North river, with the privilege of maintaining a dumping-board thereat.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto Michael Egan, all and singular the following-described wharf property: two hundred feet of the southerly side of the pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street, extending from a point about three hundred and fifty feet from the outer end of said pier inshore a distance of two hundred feet, together with the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of said lease, a dumping-board extending from a line parallel to and about thirteen feet north of the southerly line of said pier to a line about sixteen feet south of the southerly side of said pier, in all a distance of about thirty-six feet. The lease of the above-described premises shall be for a term of ten years, from January 1, 1902, and the rental therefor shall be at the rate of one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer. The said Michael Egan shall have the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the said lease, on wharf property contiguous to the above-described premises, the necessary ramps, runways and approaches to said dump, and the Board of Docks hereby agrees to set aside such wharf property under its jurisdiction as may be required for such ramps, runways and approaches necessary for the operation of said dumping-board. It is understood and agreed that the above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Michael Egan shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property used by this Department, except that the lessee shall do all dredging.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, December 27, 1901, at 2 o'clock P.M.

Present—President Cram and Commissioner Meyer.

Absent—Commissioner Murphy.

The minutes of the meeting held December 20, 1901, were approved.

The communication from Albert H. Hastorf, requesting that a berth be assigned him between Nineteenth and Fifty-fifth streets on the North river, at which to maintain a dumping-board, together with the recommendation from the President recommending that such berth be assigned on the north side of the Pier foot of West Forty-seventh street, were taken from the table, but the recommendation of the President, not being seconded, was not approved.

The application of La Veloce Navigazione Italiana a Vapore for a lease of Wall Street Pier, No. 12, East river, was taken from the table and denied.

The recommendations of the President and Commissioner Meyer in relation to the rental to be charged the Old Dominion Steamship Company for the bulkheads adjoining Beach Street Pier, No. 26, North river, together with the recommendation from the Treasurer that a lease of said pier and bulkheads be granted for a term of ten years at the same rental as is now paid, were referred to the Commissioner of Docks.

The application of the New York Contracting and Trucking Company for permission to erect a coal hoist on the West Ninety-sixth Street Pier, No. 117, North river, was taken from the table, and,

On motion, the permit was granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the coal hoist to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The application of the War Department for a lease of Old Slip Pier East, East river, with the adjoining half bulkheads, was taken from the table, and,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the War Department that this Board will grant a lease to the United States Government, if desired, of the pier as it now stands, for a term of two years, at an annual rental of \$10,000.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, to construct a subsidiary connection to the Pike Slip Pier West, No. 31, East river; all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Brady Brothers, to drive bearing and fender piles at their pier at Stapleton, Staten Island.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting that dredging be ordered in the slip at the dumping-board foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging thereat.

From the John Gillies Company (Incorporated)—Transmitting consent of sureties to extension of time to December 31, 1901, granted for the completion of the outer end of the Burling Slip Pier East, No. 16, East river, under Contract No. 709.

From the Bridgeport Steamboat Company—Requesting a lease of the half bulkhead adjoining the easterly side of Pike Slip Pier West, No. 31, East river. Application denied.

Kidney all that certain portion of the north side of the Pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-third street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, beginning at the bulkhead thereat, and extending outshore a distance of two hundred feet, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of said lease, at the above-described premises, a dumping-board extending from a line parallel to and about eighteen feet south of the northerly side of said pier to a line eighteen feet north of and parallel to the northerly side of said pier, in all a distance of about thirty-six feet, together with the necessary runways, ramps and approaches required for the operation of said dump, for a term of three years from the first day of January, 1902, at a rental of nine hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance, it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said William I. Kidney shall within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department, except that the lessee shall do all dredging.

From Wichmann Brothers—Requesting that facilities be afforded for the unloading of coal in the vicinity of Nineteenth street, East river. Secretary directed to state that every possible facility will be given thereat.

From William J. Moore—Requesting permission to place a cable way on the approach to the West Forty-eighth Street Pier, No. 88. Application denied.

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company the inner southerly side of Barrow Street Pier, No. 43, North river, commencing at the bulkhead-line and running westerly a distance of two hundred and twenty-three (223) feet, for a term of ten years from January 1, 1902, at an annual rental of three thousand three hundred and thirty-three dollars and thirty-three and one-third cents (\$3,333.33 1/3) per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department, except that the lessee shall not be liable for painting to the structures now erected or to be erected on the said premises.

From Bart Dunn—Requesting a lease of the Pier foot of Fordham avenue, Harlem river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto Bart Dunn, the Pier at the foot of Fordham road, on the easterly side of the Harlem river, in the Borough of The Bronx, for a term of three years from January 1, 1902, at an annual rental of seven hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Bart Dunn shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

From Daniel S. McElroy—Requesting permission to construct a crib-bulkhead north of Twenty-eighth street, East river, and to fill in rear of same.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a permit be and hereby is granted Daniel S. McElroy to build a crib north of the Twenty-eighth Street Pier, East river, and fill in behind same, on the following conditions: First—No work to be done excepting in accordance with plans to be submitted and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

Third—That the owner of said property shall file in this Department his written agreement that, in case The City of New York should at any time acquire, either by purchase or by the exercise of the right of eminent domain, for the improvement of the water-front, the premises between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, East river, on which said improvement is to be made, that then and in that event, and in every such event, no additional item of value shall be claimed by or allowed to the owner of said property for or on account of any improvement made under said permit.

From the Allan State Line of Steamers—Requesting that the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier, No. 74, North river, be assigned for their use during the prosecution of the work of improvement at the foot of West Twenty-first street.

On motion, the recommendation of the President that the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier, No. 74, North river, and the Rutgers Slip Pier West, No. 33, East river, be set aside as shifting piers was approved, and the following resolution adopted, the compensation for the use of the piers to be fixed when the occupation of the piers becomes necessary:

Resolved, That the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier, No. 74, North river, and the Rutgers Slip Pier West, No. 33, East river, be and they are hereby set aside as shifting piers for the purpose of being temporarily used by tenants of piers within the lines of the proposed improvements on the North and East rivers, while such occupants are disturbed or temporarily ejected by reason of the progress of the improvements; and that the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to provide proper lighting on the said piers, and also to provide proper openings on the sides of the sheds that when the occasion requires tramp steamers may also be berthed thereat.

From the President—

1st. Reporting action of Counsel of Consolidated Gas Company, and recommending that the action of the Board November 8, 1901, respecting the property of the said Company, between Sixteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river, be rescinded. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted O. L. Recommendation adopted.

The minutes of the meeting held December 27, 1901, were approved.

The following communications were referred to the incoming Commissioners of Docks:

From C. O'D. Iselin—Requesting the elimination of the condition contained in the resolution adopted November 15, 1901, granting permission for the construction of a shed on the Old Slip Pier, formerly known as Pier, old 11, East river, "that no compensation shall be allowed the owner for the shed in the event of the City acquiring the property."

From John B. McDonald and the Union Stockyard and Market Company—Requesting that a new pier be constructed at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street in place of the pier now located thereat, that permission be granted them to construct a bulkhead-wall at the foot of said street, and that a lease of the new pier be granted them at an annual rental of \$10,000.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Horse Manure Company—To make general repairs to the West Forty-fifth Street Pier for a period of six months.

Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn—To make general repairs for a period of six months to the Hamilton, South, Wall, Fulton and Catharine Ferry premises, on the East river.

Edward Hett—To construct an extension 10 by 40 feet to his pier at New Dorp, Staten Island.

Townsend & Downey Shipbuilding and Repair Company—To rebuild the bulkheads on their property at Shooter Island, Staten Island, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Brown & Fleming—To use and occupy the inner 200 feet of the south side of Old Slip Pier East, East river, and to construct a dumping-board thereon; compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer.

New Jersey and Hudson River Railway and Ferry Company—To place a signal light on the southwest corner of the Pier at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North river.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting certified copy of resolutions adopted by the said Commissioners December 26, 1901, authorizing Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$1,000,000, and approving plan for the improvement of the water-front between Third avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, on the Harlem river.

On motion, said resolutions were ordered spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of \$1,000,000, the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the new plan for improving the water-front between the easterly side of Third avenue and the northerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, on the Harlem river, in the Borough of Manhattan, as adopted by the Board of Docks on December 6, 1901."

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of leases to Seaboard Contracting Company, Michael Egan, Bart Dunn and Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company. Commissioners authorized to execute same.

2d. Approving bonds submitted by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company for the maintenance of the asphalt pavement at the foot of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, Harlem river, on the lower deck of the Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street, at the foot of Gansevoort street, North river, and between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Fourth streets, Harlem river.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting that dredging be ordered at the bulkhead foot of Gold street, Brooklyn. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging thereat.

From Gottfried Westernacher—Transmitting copy of application to be made by him to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water at Rockaway Beach, Town of Hempstead, Borough of Queens.

From W. J. Murray—Requesting that dredging be ordered in front of the bulkhead between Battery Place Pier South, No. 1, and Battery Place Pier, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging thereat.

From William I. Kidney—Accepting the terms of the resolution leasing to him a portion of the West One Hundred and Thirty-third Street Pier.

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto John F. Walsh all and singular the northerly half of the Pier foot of Nineteenth street, East river, with the privilege of maintaining a dry-dock thereat for a term of one year from May 1, 1902, at an annual rental of one thousand two hundred dollars, payable quarterly in advance; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said John F. Walsh shall file in this Department, within ten days from the receipt of a copy hereof, his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property used by this Department.

From the President—

1st. Recommending that the application of the Consolidated Gas Company for a lease of the Piers foot of East Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, East river, for an aggregate period of thirty years, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the agreement entered into between the Board of Docks and the owners of the bulkhead between Gouverneur lane and the centre line of the slip between Piers, old 14 and 15, including Pier, old 14, East river, be resubmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval. "The following figures show the extent of the permanent improvement of the water-front made by the present Board of Docks of the Department of Docks and Ferries during the past four years:

"The increase in wharfage room has been in linear feet about eleven miles, and the increase in the area of the City's piers in square feet is equivalent to about seven hundred city lots.

"A systematic survey has been made of the Harbor of New York, which had never been made before.

"In the aggregate these improvements amount to about thirty per cent. of the whole of the permanent improvement of the water-front in existence to-day.

"During the same time the Department has collected the gross sum of \$11,125,550.91, and the revenue from now on will be in excess of three millions of dollars a year.

"During the same time the disbursements amounted in the aggregate to \$14,101,209.04, of which \$11,635,818.05 was for acquired property and construction, representing a permanent improvement on the water-front; the balance, \$2,475,390.99, was for general repairs and maintenance of the water-front."

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, COMMISSIONERS of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to all persons interested in this proceeding, and to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of all houses and lots and improved and unimproved lands affected thereby, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified to us at our office, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on or before the 21st day of January, 1902, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 23d day of January, 1902, at 3 o'clock p. m.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said city, there to remain until the 31st day of January, 1902.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Aqueduct avenue and distant 200 feet westerly therefrom; thence northerly along said parallel line and westerly along a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and distant 200 feet southerly therefrom and said line prolonged westerly to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northeasterly side of Sedgwick avenue and distant 100 feet at a right angle northeasterly therefrom; thence northeasterly along said parallel line to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of that part of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street between Tiebout avenue and Jerome avenue; thence easterly along said westerly prolongation and northerly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street aforesaid to the middle line of the block between Walton avenue and Jerome avenue; thence northerly along said middle line to its intersection with the middle line of the block between East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and East One Hundred and Eighty-third street; thence easterly along said middle line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Tiebout avenue and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; thence northerly along said parallel line to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the northerly side of that part of East One Hundred and Eighty-third street between Webster avenue and Tiebout avenue; thence easterly along said westerly prolongation and parallel line to the westerly side of Park avenue; thence southerly along said westerly side of Park avenue to its intersection with the easterly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of that part of East One Hundred and Eighty-third street between Creston avenue and Webster avenue and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; thence westerly along said easterly prolongation and parallel line and said parallel line prolonged westerly to its intersection with the middle line of the block between Creston avenue and Morris avenue; thence northerly along said middle line to its intersection with the middle line of the blocks between Burnside avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-first street; thence westerly along said middle line to its intersection with the middle line of the block between Jerome avenue and Davidson avenue; thence southerly along said middle line to its intersection with the easterly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; thence westerly along said parallel line to the point or place of beginning, as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened, as such area is shown upon our benefit maps deposited as aforesaid.
