## First Assembly District.

The Twentieth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Rapelye avenue to Woodside avenue; the westerly side of Woodside avenue, from Jackson avenue to Middleburg avenue; the northerly side of Middleburg avenue, from Woodside avenue to Dickenson avenue; the westerly side of Dickenson avenue, from Middleburg avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road to Hunter's Point avenue; the northerly side of Hunter's Point avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to the canal; line through the centre of the canal, from Hunter's Point avenue to Thompson avenue, and the east side of Rapelye avenue, from Thompson avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-second Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Thompson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Betts avenue; the westerly side of Betts avenue, from Thompson avenue to Maurice avenue; the northerly side of Maurice avenue, from Betts avenue to Newtown Creek; Newtown Creek and the easterly side of Calvary Cemetery road and Old Bowery Bay road, from Newtown Creek to Thompson avenue.

The Twenty-third Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Train's Meadow road; the westerly side of Train's Meadow road, from Jackson avenue to Woodside avenue; the westerly side of Greenpoint avenue, from Woodside avenue to Shell road; the northerly side of Shell road, from Greenpoint avenue to Betts avenue; the easterly side of Betts avenue, from Shell road to Thompson avenue; the northerly side of Thompson avenue, from Betts avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the easterly side of Old Bowery Bay road to Dickenson avenue, the easterly side of Dickenson avenue to Middleburg avenue, the southerly side of Middleburg avenue to Woodside avenue and the easterly side of Woodside avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-eighth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of the North Side Division, Long Island Railroad, from the main line of the Long Island Railroad to Thompson avenue; the southerly side of Thompson avenue, from the North Side Division, Long Island Railroad, to Cook avenue; the southerly side of Cook avenue, from Thompson avenue to Court street; the westerly side of Court street, from Cook avenue to a line dividing the lands of D. Morrell Burroughs and Henry Euler; the westerly side of said division line, from Court street to Horse Brook; the southerly side of Horse Brook, from division line of the lands of D. Morrell Burroughs and Henry Euler to Flushing Creek; the westerly side of Flushing Creek, from Horse Brook to the division line of the former towns of Flushing and Newtown; the westerly side of said line to Union turnpike, the northerly side of Union turnpike, from the division line of the former towns of Flushing and Newtown to Metropolitan avenue; the northerly side of Metropolitan avenue, from Union turnpike to Trotting Course lane; the easterly side of Trotting Course lane, from Metropolitan avenue to the main line of the Long Island Railroad, and the easterly side of the main line of the Long Island Railroad, from Trotting Course lane to the North Side Division of the Long Island Railroad.

The Thirtieth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Shell road, from Betts avenue to Greenpoint avenue; the easterly side of Greenpoint avenue, from Shell road to Woodside avenue; the southerly side of Woodside avenue, from Greenpoint avenue to Broadway; the westerly side of Broadway, from Woodside avenue to the centre line of the North Side Division of the Long Island Railroad track; the northerly side of the North Side Division of the Long Island Railroad track, from Broadway to the main line Long Island Railroad track; the westerly side of the main line Long Island Railroad track, from the North Side Division Long Island Railroad track to Calamus road; the north side of Calamus road, from the main line Long Island Railroad track to Maurice avenue; the northerly and westerly sides of Maurice avenue, from Fisk avenue to Betts avenue, and the easterly side of Betts avenue, from Maurice avenue to Shell road.

The Thirty-first Election District is bounded by and within the easterly and southerly sides of Maurice avenue from Jay avenue to Fisk avenue; the westerly side of Fisk avenue from Maurice avenue to Grand street; the westerly side of Juniper avenue from Grand street to the northeast corner of Mt. Olivet Cemetery; thence following property of Mt. Olivet Cemetery until it reaches Mt. Olivet avenue; the northerly side of Mt. Olivet avenue from Mt. Olivet Cemetery property-line to Fresh Pond road; the easterly side of Fresh Pond road from Mt. Olivet avenue to Grand street; the easterly side of Clermont avenue from Grand street to Jay avenue and the northerly side of Jay avenue from Clermont avenue to Maurice avenue.

The Thirty-fifth Election District is bounded by and within the easterly side of Fairview avenue from Gates avenue to the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery, to William street; thence easterly in a direct line through the Baker estate from William street to Mount Olivet avenue; the southerly side of Mount Olivet avenue from line through the Baker estate to Fresh Pond road; the westerly side of Fresh Pond road from Mount Olivet avenue to Gates avenue (or Magnolia street); the northerly side of Gates avenue (or Magnolia street) from Fresh Pond road to Fairview avenue.

## Second Assembly District.

The Fourteenth Election District is bounded by and within the line dividing the former towns of Newtown and Jamaica, from the former city line of Brooklyn to Woodhaven avenue; the westerly side of Woodhaven avenue from the dividing lines between the former towns of Newton and Jamaica to Atlantic avenue; the northerly side of Atlantic avenue from Woodhaven avenue to the former city line of Brooklyn, and along said line from Atlantic avenue to the line dividing the former towns of Newton and Jamaica.

The Seventeenth Election District is bounded by and within the line dividing the former towns of Newton and Jamaica, from Woodhaven avenue to Myrtle avenue; the southerly side of Myrtle avenue from said town line to Welling street; the westerly side of Welling street from Myrtle avenue to Jamaica avenue; the southerly side of Jamaica avenue from Welling street to Briggs avenue; the westerly side of Briggs avenue from Jamaica avenue to Atlantic avenue; the northerly side of Atlantic avenue from Briggs avenue to Woodhaven avenue, and the easterly side of Woodhaven avenue from Atlantic avenue to the line dividing the former towns of Newtown and Jamaica.

The Eighteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Atlantic avenue from centre line of the New York and Rockaway Branch Long Island Railroad to Greenwood avenue; the westerly side of Greenwood avenue from Atlantic avenue to Liberty avenue; the southerly side of Liberty,

avenue from Greenwood avenue to Van Wyck avenue; the westerly side of Van Wyck avenue from Liberty avenue to Bergen Landing road; the westerly side of Bergen Landing road from Van Wyck avenue to Jamaica Bay; a line running southerly from Bergen Landing road to Beach channel; thence westerly along Beach channel to a line opposite Hawtree creek; thence westerly along said line to the centre line of Hawtree creek from Jamaica Bay to New York and Rockaway Branch Long Island Railroad; the easterly side New York and Rockaway Branch Long Island Railroad from Hawtree creek to Liberty avenue; the northerly side of Liberty avenue from the New York and Rockaway Branch Long Island Railroad to Van Wicklin avenue; the easterly side of Van Wicklin avenue from Liberty avenue to Belmont avenue; the southerly side of Belmont avenue from Van Wicklin avenue to centre line New York and Rockaway Branch Long Island Railroad; the easterly side of New York and Rockaway Branch Long Island Railroad from Belmont avenue to Atlantic avenue.

The Twentieth Election District is bounded by and within the line dividing the former towns of Newton and Jamaica, from Myrtle avenue to Newtown road; the westerly side of Newtown road from said line to Van Wyck avenue; the westerly side of Van Wyck avenue from Newtown road to Atlantic avenue; the northerly side of Atlantic avenue from Van Wyck avenue to Briggs avenue; the easterly side of Briggs avenue from Atlantic avenue to Jamaica avenue; the northerly side of Jamaica avenue from Briggs avenue to Welling street; the easterly side of Welling street from Jamaica avenue to Myrtle avenue, and the northerly side of Myrtle avenue from Welling street to the line dividing the former towns of Newtown and Jamaica.

On motion, the Secretary of the Board was authorized to communicate with the Municipal and State Civil Service Commissions, in relation to the classification of four clerks not in former schedule.

The President reported that he had secured from the respective counsel of the contestants as to the election last fall in the Twenty-eighth Aldermanic District, and from the Chairman of the Committee on Privileges and Elections of the Board of Aldermen consents and a receipt as to the ballots cast in said district and returned by said committee under the order of the Supreme Court issued in said matter on April 19, 1902. Ordered on file.

The following resolution was adopted, viz:

Resolved, For the purpose of enabling this Board to revise and correct the list of qualified voters as enrolled in October, 1901, that the Board of Health be and hereby is respectfully requested to furnish a list of the names and residences, by boroughs, of all males of the age of twenty-one years and upward, who were residents of The City of New York, whose deaths have been reported to the Board of Health as occurring between the tenth day of October, 1901, and the present time, and that said Board be requested to continue to furnish weekly lists of such deaths from the present time to September 15, 1902.

On motion, the Board adjourned to meet on Monday, June 2, 1902, at 12 o'clock noon.

## BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

## THE BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

Amendment to the Plumbing and Drainage Laws of the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Richmond, published as required by paragraph 1 of section 141 of the Building Code.

Amendments to the Plumbing and Drainage Rules and Regulations of the Bureau of Buildings for the Borough of Richmond, published as required by paragraph 1 of section 141 of the Building Code:

Paragraph II. is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Once in each year every employee or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York, shall register his name and address in the office of the Bureau of Buildings in the borough in which his place of business is located."

Paragraph III. is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof these words:

"A plumber proposing to do work in a borough other than that in which he is registered shall present his certificate at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in that borough before commencing work, so that the fact of his having been properly registered may be recorded."

Section 79. Substitute the following:

"Section 79. A fresh air inlet must be connected with the house drain just inside of the house trap; where under ground, it will be of extra heavy cast iron. It must extend to the outer air and finish with a return bend at least one foot above the grade and ten feet away from any window or cold air box. When this arrangement is not possible, the fresh air inlet must open into the side of a box not less than eighteen inches square, placed below the sidewalk at the curb. The bottom of the box must be eighteen inches below the under side of the fresh air inlet pipe. The box must be of cast iron, or it may be constructed with eight-inch walls of brick or flagstone laid in hydraulic cement. The box must be covered by a flagstone fitted with removable metal grating, leaded into the stone, having openings equal in area to the area of the fresh air inlet, and not less than one-half inch in their least dimension. The fresh air inlet must be of the same size as the drain up to four inches; for five-inch and six-inch drains it must not be less than four inches in diameter; for seven-inch and eight-inch drains not less than six inches in diameter; and for larger drains not less than eight inches in diameter, the removable portion of grate to be at least eight by twelve inches in area. An automatic device approved by the Superintendent of Buildings may be used, when set in a manner satisfactory to the said Superintendent."

Section 97. Substitute the following:

"Section 97. No form of trap will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings, and no masons' cesspool, bell, pot, bottle or D-trap will be permitted, nor any form of trap that is not self-cleaning nor has interior chamber or mechanism, nor any trap, except earthenware ones, that depend upon interior partition for a seal."

Section 119. Substitute the following:

"Section 119. In lodging houses the water closet and urinal apartments must have a window opening to the air; if three stories or less in height, they may have such window opening on a ventilating shaft not less than ten feet in area."

Section 131. Substitute the following:

"Section 131. In lodging houses there must be one water closet on each floor, and where there are more than fifteen persons on any floor there must be an additional water closet on that floor for every additional fifteen persons or fraction thereof."

Change the number of section 134 to section 133 and substitute the following:

"Section 133. Water closets and urinals must be flushed from separate cisterns on each floor, the water from which is used for no other purpose; where flushometers are used, they must be supplied from separate tanks provided for that purpose, and in no case are connections to be made direct with the water service pipe."

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending April 3, 1902.

A public hearing was held on Thursday, April 3, 1902, upon the question of the advisability of the construction of a recreation pier at the foot of South Fifth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

A hearing was also held on Thursday, April 3, 1902, at the request of the House and Real Estate Owners' Association of the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards of The City of New York in the matter of the construction of the proposed exterior street along the East river, between Sixty-third and Ninety-fourth streets.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer in Chief.

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to repair its water front property on the North river, for a period of six months from April 1, 1902.

Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to repair its ferry premises in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn during the ensuing six months.

John Cloughen, to dredge in front of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river.

New York Launch and Engine Company, to construct a temporary walkway at its property at Morris Heights, Harlem river, the walkway to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

Rockaway Park Improvement Company, to construct a crib bulkhead, to fill in behind same, and to dredge, at its property at Rockaway Park, Borough of Queens, in accordance with plans and specifications submitted.

New York and College Point Ferry Company, to construct a crib bulkhead at its property in the vicinity of First avenue, College Point, Borough of Queens, in accordance with plans submitted.

E. F. Hudson, to place a boathouse, runway and float north of Tenth avenue, Flushing Bay, College Point, in the Borough of Queens, the structures to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

Standard Oil Company of New York, to drive piles at the foot of First street, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Estate of William Beard, to construct extensions to their docks in the Erie Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted.

J. M. Morton & Sons, to repair the bulkhead between Carroll and President streets, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

William Robinson, to repair the crib bulkhead at the foot of Canal street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Burlee Dry Dock Company, to construct a pier and basin at its property at Mariners' Harbor, Staten Island, in accordance with plans submitted.

Daniel Duffy, to drive piles at his boat house between Davis and Bement avenues, West New Brighton, Staten Island.

A. F. Walling, agent for the steamer "Magenta," to maintain a tally house on the south side of the Gansevoort Market Pier, North river, during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the Commissioner of Docks has power to regulate charges for wharfage, crandage and dockage of vessels berthed at wharf property constructed under the new plan.

At the request of the Comptroller, the application of the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission for consent to the construction of the Manhattan-Brooklyn tunnel, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what action should be taken in the matter by this Department.

The notice of application to be made by John H. Starin for a grant of land under water at New Brighton, Staten Island, was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel April 3, 1902.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were, on March 29, 1902, requested to approve of the establishment by the Commissioner of Docks of two ferries between the boroughs of The Bronx and Queens, subject to the condition that in case either of said ferries is not in full and complete operation within eighteen months from the date of the sale of the franchise, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that then and in that case such ferry shall be discontinued, and the action of the Commissioner of Docks in establishing such ferry and of the Commis-



sioners of the Sinking Fund in approving same, shall be null and void; the said ferries being described as follows.

Ferry No. 1—From and to the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, to and from a point between Eighth and Ninth avenues, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, in the late Village of College Point.

Ferry No. 2—From and to a point between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, in the Borough of The Bronx, thence to North Beach, and thence to the foot of First street, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, in the late Village of College Point.

The Commissioner, on April 3, 1902, agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto Eben E. Olcott, all and singular, the pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York, together with the right to use the shed thereon, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of \$18,333.33 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department, it being understood and agreed that the said offer shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted within ten days by said Eben E. Olcott, who shall also agree to execute a lease, and this agreement and lease shall be null and void unless first approved by resolution in writing passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

A form of lease of the franchise for a ferry from and to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth and Manhattan streets, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, over and across the waters of the Hudson or North river, to and from Dempsey avenue in Edgewater Borough (formerly Ridgefield Township), Bergen County, in the State of New Jersey; together with the wharf property belonging to the city and assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry for a term of twenty-five years, was on April 2, 1902, transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval; said lease to commence as soon as practicable after the adoption of a resolution by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the execution and delivery of the lease; the rental for said franchise and wharf property to be five thousand five hundred dollars per annum for the first ten years, payable quarterly in advance, and the rental for the balance of the term to be adjusted as follows:

On or before the 15th day of January in each of the years 1912 and 1922 the Commissioner of Docks and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall appoint a person to act on behalf of the city as arbitrator, and the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company shall appoint a person to act on its behalf as arbitrator, and the arbitrators so appointed shall determine upon a fair and reasonable amount to be paid as rent for said lease annually during the period covered by such adjustment and in quarterly payments in advance as hereinabove provided. And in case the arbitrators are unable within thirty days to agree as to the amount so to be paid as rent they shall appoint a third person to act as umpire, and if they are unable to agree within thirty days upon such umpire, then, at the request of either of the parties he shall be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, and the decision of two of said persons so selected shall be conclusive and binding upon both parties to this lease, but in no case shall the rental be less than five thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

Permission was granted the Crescent Ice Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, the bulkhead between Piers, new 57, and new 58, North river, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon, commencing April 11, 1902, or as soon thereafter as this permission shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and subject to the covenants and conditions contained in the usual form of lease now in use in this Department in regard to repairs, etc., at a rental of \$1,575 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department. This permission to be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said company and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Commissioner on April 3, 1902, agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto Stokes & Thedford the bulkhead extending from Pier, new 59, to Pier, new 60, North river, for a term of three years from May 1, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; the rental to be paid at the rate of two thousand three hundred and ten dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to this Department, it being understood and agreed that this agreement shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted within ten days by said Stokes & Thedford, who shall also agree to execute a lease, and the agreement and lease shall be null and void unless the same shall have been first approved by resolution in writing passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Permission was granted Joseph May April 3, 1902, to maintain, during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, two floats, one 60 feet long by 25 feet wide, and the other 50 feet long by 21 feet wide, at the north side, inner end, of the pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, commencing April 11, 1902, or as soon thereafter as this permission shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of thirty-five dollars per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master, it being understood and agreed that this permission shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said Joseph May and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Commissioner, on April 1, 1902, agreed to lease to John B. McDonald, all and singular, the northerly side and outer end of the new pier to be erected at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, Borough of Manhattan, together with the use of the entire surface of said pier, for a term of ten years, at an annual rental of \$15,000, payable quarterly in advance; the lessee to have the privilege of renewal for four additional terms of ten years each, the rental for each renewal term to be an advance on the rental for the preceding term, such advanced rental to be fixed as follows: Three months before the expiration of each term of ten years, the Commissioner of Docks shall appoint a person to act in behalf of the City as arbitrator, and the said John B. McDonald shall appoint a person to act as arbitrator in his behalf, and the arbitrators so appointed shall determine upon a fair and reasonable amount to be paid as rent under said lease annually during the period covered by such adjustment in quarterly payments in advance; in case the arbitrators are unable within thirty days to agree upon the amount so to be paid as rent, they shall appoint a third person to act as umpire, and if they are unable to agree within thirty days upon such umpire, then at the request of either of the parties, he shall be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, and the decision of two of said persons so selected shall be conclusive and binding upon both of the parties to said lease. The lessee shall have the right to construct and maintain "discharge and suction tunnels" under the marginal wharf, street or place laid out and determined by the Department of Docks and Ferries at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, also under and along the pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, and the lessee shall also have the privilege of erecting and maintaining coal handling and ash removing devices upon the said pier and over or under said street, in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer in Chief of this Department, all the work to be done under his direction and supervision; but no tunnels or other devices underground shall be less than three and one-half feet below the surface of the street, and nothing less than twenty feet in height above the street surface. It being understood and agreed that the offer to lease shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by John B. McDonald and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and unless the said John B. McDonald shall agree to execute the lease.

The Commissioner on April 3, 1902, agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Union Stock Yard and Market Company and the Western Stock Yard Company, all and singular, the pier at the foot of West Fortieth street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining thereon an ice bridge and a manure dump, for a term of five years from May 1, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of eight thousand eight hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department; it being understood and agreed that the offer to lease shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said Union Stock Yard and Market Company and the Western Stock Yard Company, who shall also agree to execute a lease, and this agreement and lease shall be null and void unless the same shall be first approved by resolution in writing, passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Commissioner on April 3, 1902, agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto the People's Co-operative Ice Company, all and singular, the bulkhead commencing at the centre line of West Eighty-first street and running thence southerly along said bulkhead a distance of one hundred and fifty feet, together with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon; the lease to

expire on May 1, 1905, and to commence April 15, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; the rental to be at the rate of one thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Department, it being understood and agreed that the offer to lease shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted within ten days by said company, who shall also agree to execute a lease, and this agreement and lease shall be null and void unless the same shall have been first approved by resolution in writing, passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Permission was granted on April 3, 1902, to the People's Co-operative Ice Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, one hundred and fifty feet of the southerly side of the East Sixtieth Street Pier, commencing at the southeast corner of said pier and running thence westerly a distance of one hundred and fifty feet, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon, commencing April 15, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said permission shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, the rental to be at the rate of one thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Department, it being understood and agreed that this permission shall be subject to the conditions and covenants contained in the lease to said company of the bulkhead commencing at the centre line of West Eighty-first street, and running thence southerly along said bulkhead a distance of one hundred and fifty feet, except as to the term thereof. And it is further understood and agreed that this permit shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said People's Co-operative Ice Company and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Permission was granted April 3, 1902, to Peter Hale to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, the bulkhead commencing on the southerly side of East One Hundred and Ninth street, and running thence southerly a distance of one hundred and twenty-five feet, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon, commencing April 15, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said permit shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, subject to the covenants and conditions contained in the usual form of lease now in use in this Department, in regard to repairs, etc., the rental to be at the rate of one thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Department, it being understood and agreed that this permission shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said Peter Hale and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were notified, March 31, 1902, that this Department will, if approved by them, lease the East Thirty-first street pier to James J. Godfrey, for a term of ten years, at an annual rental of two thousand three hundred dollars per annum.

The Commissioner, on April 3, 1902, in accordance with recommendation of the Deputy Commissioner, agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto Roscoe G. Carey, all and singular, the bulkhead platform at the foot of Willow lane or New Dock road, Pelham Bay, Borough of The Bronx, for a term of five years from April 11, 1902, or as soon thereafter as said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of one hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department, it being understood and agreed that this agreement to lease shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted within ten days by said Roscoe G. Carey, who shall also agree to execute a lease, and this agreement shall be null and void unless the same shall be first approved by resolution in writing passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were notified, April 2, 1902, that this Department will grant to Mary Fischer permission to maintain a float at the bulkhead adjoining the recreation pier at the foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, at the rate of two dollars and fifty cents per month, if approved by said Commissioners.

The Commissioner, on March 31, 1902, agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto La Veloce Navigazione Italiana a Vapore and the Navigazione Generale Italiana, all and singular, the pier at the foot of West Thirty-fourth street, North river, in the Borough of Manhattan, with the right to use the shed on said pier, for a term of five years from the first day of April, 1902, at a rental of \$30,000 for the first year, increasing \$1,000 for each succeeding year of said term, the rental for the last year to be \$34,000, payable in every case quarterly in advance, the Department reserving one hundred feet on the south side, inner end, of said pier for the purpose of mooring a float thereat, the agreement to lease to be of no force or effect unless the agents of the above-named steamship lines shall, on behalf of their respective principals, file in this Department, their written acceptance of the terms of this agreement, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department, with the exception, that in case of war with the Kingdom of Italy, and the use of the vessels of said steamship lines is by reason thereof interfered with, that then and in such case the lessees shall have the privilege of subletting said pier, during the continuance of such interference, provided that in the event of such subletting, the lessees and the sureties on said lease shall file in this Department a written agreement that their obligations under provisions of said lease shall in no manner be affected or impaired by reason of such subletting. Said lease shall also, among other things, contain a covenant and agreement that if, by reason of the total or partial destruction through fire, floating ice or the action of the elements, the wharf property hereinbefore described, including the shed thereon, shall require to be rebuilt, the same shall be so rebuilt under the direction of the Commissioner of Docks, in like manner and similar to the wharf property or shed destroyed, by and at the expense of the lessees, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks; and also that the lessees shall keep the shed on said pier well and sufficiently insured to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks, and in such manner and in such amount as he shall designate. The terms and conditions of said lease shall, if necessary, be subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the form thereof shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel. The lessees shall also agree to furnish a bond in the penal sum of \$64,000, that the said lessees shall perform, fulfill, observe and keep each and every of the terms, covenants and conditions of said lease, the form of which bond shall also be approved by the Corporation Counsel. The companies shall take possession of said pier upon the filing in this office of their acceptance of the terms and conditions hereof, and of an agreement to the effect that they will reimburse The City of New York for the premium paid by said city for insurance on the shed on said pier from the time the said companies take possession until such time as the companies shall insure said shed as hereinbefore provided.

A certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 26, 1902, was received from said Commission, approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to La Veloce Navigazione Italiana a Vapore and the Navigazione Generale Italiana, of the pier at the foot of West Thirty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a period of five years from April 1, 1902, at a rental of \$30,000 for the first year, increasing \$1,000 for each year of said term, the rental for the last year being \$34,000. A communication was also received from Bolognesi, Hartfield & Co., agents, accepting the terms of the proposed lease and agreeing to execute such lease.

A communication was received from the Comptroller submitting substitution of the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company, of Philadelphia, as surety in the place of John H. McKay, on the estimate of Naughton & Co. for furnishing white oak piles under Contract No. 723, and, on April 2, 1902, the consent of the Commissioner was granted to such substitution.

The Chief Clerk was, on March 31, 1902, directed to arrange for the daily collection from the Dock Masters of all cash received by them for wharfage during the previous day, this change to take effect April 1, 1902.

Upon the recommendation of the Dock Superintendent a charge of two dollars per day was made for the privilege of maintaining steam hoists along the water front, this charge to take effect April 1, 1902, and to be in addition to the regular wharfage.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel approving the form of advertisement for the sale of the franchise of the ferry from and to the foot of Forty-second street, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the sale was set for 11 o'clock a. m., April 14, 1902. Charles A. Berrian, auctioneer, being authorized to offer the franchise for sale at the office of the Commissioner at that time.

The application of Robert Gordon for permission to erect a coal hoisting tower on the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and



Thirty-fifth streets, North river, was denied, the plans providing for a wooden structure in violation of the Building Code.

The application of Henry Birdsall for permission to place a sign on the railway starter's box at the foot of Chambers street, North river, was denied, advertising on property under the jurisdiction of the Department being prohibited.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to furnish a list of persons eligible for appointment as Pile Driving Enginemen, in accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer in Chief.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer in Chief, the Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to hold an examination for promotion to the position of Pilot in this Department.

The specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer in Chief for furnishing yellow pine timber were approved March 29, 1902, and ordered printed and advertised.

The recommendation of the Engineer in Chief that the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company be authorized to make general repairs to the asphalt pavement along the water front where such repairs are not provided for in the guarantees of said company was approved, and the Engineer in Chief was directed to prepare requisitions for such paving from time to time as may be required, at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$800.

Kane & Wright were directed to make necessary repairs to the pier foot of One Hundred and Fifth street, East river, and were notified April 1, 1902, that unless the work is commenced within ten days it will be done by the force of this Department at their cost and expense, in accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer in Chief.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan was requested to have repairs made to the pavement on the bulkhead approach to Pier, old 29, East river, in accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer in Chief.

The permit to the New Jersey Steamboat Company to berth the steamer "Dean Richmond" on the north side of the West Thirty-ninth Street Pier was revoked, to take effect as of March 17, 1902, the Assistant Dock Superintendent having reported that said company vacated the berth on that date.

The permit granted Nicholas J. Carey to maintain a float at the bulkhead between Charles and Perry streets, North river, was revoked April 3, 1902, in accordance with the recommendation of the Assistant Dock Superintendent, permission to erect an ice bridge thereat having been granted to J. Wesley Smith.

The Engineer in Chief was directed to order dredging to a depth of thirty-four feet at mean low water in the half slip adjoining the southerly side of Pier, new 14, North river, under Contract No. 715, in accordance with the request of the International Navigation Company.

An application having been received from the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique for alterations to the northwest corner of Pier, new 41, North river, to enable said company to berth its steamships in the slip between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river, the Engineer in Chief was, on April 2, 1902, in accordance with the recommendation of the Deputy Commissioner, directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for making the necessary alterations to the corner of Pier, new 41, provided the consent of the lessee of said pier and of the sureties on the lease be granted for such alterations.

The Engineer in Chief was directed to repair the fender system on the north side of the East Twenty-sixth Street Pier as requested by the Department of Public Charities.

The following communications were laid over:

From the Mayor, transmitting communication from George Donaldson, relative to the leasing of the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier to the Italian lines.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Advising that section 845 of the Charter does not apply to the use of piers on the East river for dumping purposes, unless such piers have been in common and continuous use by vessels engaged in foreign commerce.

2d. Advising that the Commissioner of Docks may, at any time, with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, revoke the permit granted Brown & Fleming, to maintain a dumping board on Pier, old 12, East river.

From the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, requesting the assignment of berths for public baths for said borough. Copy of application transmitted to Department of Health for examination.

From John H. Garretson, requesting additional trucking facilities at the Staten Island Ferry.

From William A. Hall, requesting permission to berth a bath at the Battery during the season of 1902.

From R. J. Treat, requesting a lease of Pier, old 12, East river.

From Dennis Larkin, requesting that his title be changed from Dock Builder to Laborer.

From the Chief Clerk—

1st. In relation to the rental value of Pier, new 16, East river.

2d. In relation to the rental value of property now occupied by the Mallory line south of Fulton street, East river.

From the Engineer in Chief—

1st. In relation to the proposed construction of a free public bath on new made land between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river.

2d. Recommending the assignment of a Matron at the Public Comfort Station between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river.

The following communications were filed:

From the Comptroller, approving sureties on the estimate of Travers Brothers Company, for furnishing rope under Contract No. 721, and on the estimate of Brown & Fleming, for furnishing broken stone, under Class II. of Contract No. 722.

From the Corporation Counsel, in relation to the position to be taken by the city on applications made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for grants of land under water.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by said Commissioners March 26, 1902, approving the awards of Contracts Nos. 721, 722 and 723; and the purchase of one time stamp, one telephone booth and shelf, one typewriter with cabinet and chair, and 45 sheets of grants of lands under water in the County of Queens.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission, certifying name of James G. McMurray as eligible for temporary appointment to the position of Roundsman. Said Commission notified that James G. McMurray has declined the temporary appointment to the position.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office, transmitting notice of hearing to be held on various applications for grants of land under water.

From the New York Horse Manure Transportation Company, accepting the terms and conditions of the proposed lease of the West Forty-fifth Street Pier.

From Merritt N. Wagar, Donald H. Elder and William W. Whitesell, requesting berth for an ice bridge between Canal and West Fifteenth streets, North river. Applicants notified that there is no space available in the district in question.

From Philbin, Beekman & Menken, attorneys for the McGirr Transportation Company, requesting a lease of a portion of the West Thirtieth Street Pier for the purpose of dumping manure. From the Bridgeport Steamboat Company, requesting permission to land the steamer "Rosedale" at the East Thirty-first Street Pier. Said company notified that this Department is about to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that a lease of the pier be granted to James J. Godfrey.

From Lowther Brothers, stating that repairs will be made to the coal pockets between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, East river, without delay.

From the Assistant Dock Superintendent—

1st. Reporting the occupation of the bulkhead foot of Charles street, North river,

by J. Wesley Smith. The time for the commencement of the rental of said bulkhead was fixed at March 26, 1902.

2d. Reporting the death of James Doonan, Laborer.

From the Engineer in Chief—

1st. Reporting the death of William Barrett, Laborer.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 19165, recommending that the permit granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to erect a bulkhead shed near the foot of North Fifth street, Brooklyn, be revoked, as said company does not now desire to erect the structure. Permit revoked.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
